FROM POPE FRANCIS

Signs of Holiness in today's world

Within the framework of holiness offered by the Beatitudes and Matthew 25:31-46, I would like to mention a few signs or spiritual attitudes that, in my opinion, are necessary if we are to understand the way of life to which the Lord calls us. I will not pause to explain the means of sanctification already known to us: the various methods of prayer, the inestimable sacraments of the Eucharist and Reconciliation, the offering of personal sacrifices, different forms of devotion, spiritual direction, and many others as well. Here I will speak only of certain aspects of the call to holiness that I hope will prove especially meaningful. The signs I wish to highlight are not the sum total of a model of holiness, but they are five great expressions of love for God and neighbour that I consider of particular importance in the light of certain dangers and limitations present in today's culture. There we see a sense of anxiety, sometimes violent, that distracts and debilitates; negativity and sullenness; the self-content bred by consumerism; individualism; and all those forms of ersatz spirituality – having nothing to do with God – that dominate the current religious marketplace.

Perseverance, Patience and Meekness

The first of these great signs is solid grounding in the God who loves and sustains us. This source of inner strength enables us to persevere amid life's ups and downs, but also to endure hostility, betrayal and failings on the part of others. "If God is for us, who is against us?" (Rom 8:31): this is the source of the peace found in the saints. Such inner strength makes it possible for us, in our fast-paced, noisy and aggressive world, to give a witness of holiness through patience and constancy in doing good. It is a sign of the fidelity born of love, for those who put their faith in God (pístis) can also be faithful to others (pístós). They do not desert others in bad times; they accompany them in their anxiety and distress, even though doing so may not bring immediate satisfaction. Saint Paul bade the Romans not to repay evil for evil (Rom 12:17), not to seek revenge (v. 19), and not to be overcome by evil, but instead to "overcome evil with good" (v. 21). This attitude is not a sign of weakness but of true strength, because God himself "is slow to anger but great in power" (Nah 1:3). The word of God exhorts us to "put away all bitterness and wrath and wrangling and slander, together with all malice" (Eph 4:31). We need to recognize and combat our aggressive and selfish inclinations, and not let them take root. "Be angry but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger" (Eph 4:26). When we feel overwhelmed, we can always cling to the anchor of prayer, which puts us back in God's hands and the source of our peace. "Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything, by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts..." (Phil 4:6-7). Christians too can be caught up in networks of verbal violence through the internet and the various forums of digital communication. Even in Catholic media, limits can be overstepped, defamation and slander can become commonplace, and all ethical standards and respect for the good name of others can be abandoned. The result is a dangerous dichotomy, since things can be said there that would be unacceptable in public discourse, and people look to compensate for their own discontent by lashing out at others. It is striking that at times, in claiming to uphold the other commandments, they completely ignore the eighth, which forbids bearing false witness or lying, and ruthlessly vilify others. Here we see how the unguarded tongue, set on fire by hell, sets all things ablaze (Jas 3:6). Inner strength, as the work of grace, prevents us from becoming carried away by the violence that is so much a part of life today, because grace defuses vanity and makes possible meekness of heart. The



saints do not waste energy complaining about the failings of others; they can hold their tongue before the faults of their brothers and sisters, and avoid the verbal violence that demeans and mistreats others. Saints hesitate to treat others harshly; they consider others better than themselves (Phil 2:3).

It is not good when we look down on others like heartless judges, lording it over them and always trying to teach them lessons. That is itself a subtle form of violence. Saint John of the Cross proposed a different path: "Always prefer to be taught by all, rather than to desire teaching even the least of all". And he added advice on how to keep the devil at bay: "Rejoice in the good of others as if it were your own, and desire that they be given precedence over you in all things; this you should do wholeheartedly. You will thereby overcome evil with good, banish the devil, and possess a happy heart. Try to practise this all the more with those who least attract you. Realize that if you do not train yourself in this way, you will not attain real charity or make any progress in it". **Pope Francis, apostolic exhortation, GAUDETE ET EXSULTATE**

FROM FR. HENRY DUC

For the Jewish people, God's salvation tends to be something exclusive, since they believe that it is a God-given gift they had inherited from Abraham, their ancestor, whom we, Christians, are also proud to call our father in faith.



On the other hand, our Christian belief is rather inclusive, for we believe that God's salvation is universal, meaning it is a gift that God has given to all nations and people through His Son, Jesus. This Sunday, we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany, a Greek word meaning 'manifestation which aims to highlight such a significant aspect of Christianity.

By revealing Himself to the Wise men from the east through the light of the star, the infant Saviour seems to send out to every one this very clear message: that the Son of God was born into the world and he is here to bring salvation both to the people of Israel represented by the shepherds and to the rest of the world represented by the Wise men.

Though the evangelist gives us no exact detail of how many Wise men came to pay homage to Jesus at Bethlehem, we often refer to them as the three Kings or Wise men based on the three gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh they brought along to offer Jesus, and their ability to decode the celestial message from above.

Traditionally there was a custom to mark the lintels of doorways with chalk. For instance, the markings for this year 2019 include 20 + C + M + B + 19, and the three letters represent the three initials of the names of the Wise men: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar, written between the numbers of the year, and separated by four crosses.

As we celebrate this feast of Jesus' manifestation to the world, let us celebrate the universal dimension of our faith, and give praise and thanks to God for calling us all to share such a precious gift. Pray that we may be proud and faithful witnesses to that faith as we leave the church and return to our own homes and communities, and to make the light of Christ to shine through our exemplary lives.
