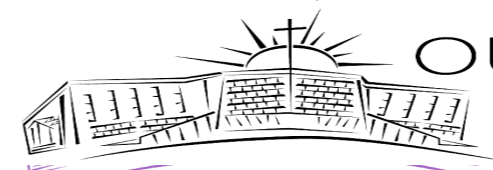

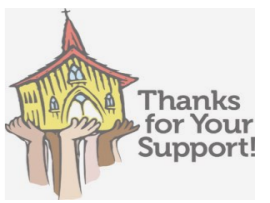

FIRST READING A reading from the Acts of the Apostles 8:5-8, 14-17

Philip went to a Samaritan town and proclaimed the Christ to them. Pope at Audience: Christian prayer is intimate, trusting, confident

Pope Francis reflects on the essential characteristics of prayer in his catechesis at the weekly General Audience, and says prayer is universal, intimate, and entirely trusting in God.

At the Wednesday General Audience, Pope Francis considered several of the core aspects of prayer. He said prayer is common to all people, no matter what their religion, and "probably even to those who profess no religion." The Pope recently demonstrated the universality of prayer. He has invited people of all religions to take part in a day of prayer on Thursday, 14 May, to implore God for an end to the coronavirus pandemic. The initiative is promoted by the Higher Committee of Human Fraternity.

Flows from heart

In his catechesis, Pope Francis said prayer involves the most intimate mystery of our being. Christian writers have always said prayer is "born within the secrecy of our beings, in that interior place called the 'heart'."

Our emotions, intelligence, and body all participate in prayer, though prayer cannot be identified with any one aspect of our being. "Every part of the human person prays," he said.

God is not shrouded in mystery

Prayer, said Pope Francis, is a yearning that takes us beyond ourselves as we seek some "other". It is an "I" in search of a "You".

A Christian's prayer, he added, begins with the revelation that the "You" we seek is not shrouded in mystery.

"Christianity is the religion that continually celebrates the 'manifestation' of God, His epiphany."

Intimate relationship

God has revealed Himself to us in His Son, Jesus Christ. So the prayer of a Christian brings us into relationship with God, without any fear or trepidation.

"Christianity has banished any type of 'feudal' relationship from the connection with God," he said.

Tendencies toward subjection or vassalage, said Pope Francis, are replaced with friendship, covenant, and communion.

"God is the friend, the ally, the bridegroom," he said. "One can establish a relationship built on confidence with Him in prayer."

Trusting wholly in God

Pope Francis went on to say that Jesus taught us to approach God with trust, calling him "Our Father".

"We can ask God for anything, explain everything, tell Him everything."

Whatever our situation or perception of our lowliness, we know that God is always faithful, and embraces us with mercy.

"God is the faithful ally: if men and women cease to love, He continues to love, even if love leads Him to Calvary."

Mystery of the Covenant

Pope Francis concluded his catechesis with an invitation to enter into "the mystery of the Covenant."

"Let us place ourselves in prayer between the merciful arms of God to feel embraced by that mystery of happiness which is the Trinitarian life, to feel like those who are invited but have not merited such an honour." As we remain with God in prayer, he said, let us repeat with awe: "Is it possible that You know love alone?"

FROM POPE FRANCIS

Chapter 7 Youth Ministry—a pastoral care that is synodal—Areas needing to be developed (continued) Always missionaries

Here I would point out that it doesn't take much to make young people missionaries. Even those who are most frail, limited and troubled can be missionaries in their own way, for goodness can always be shared, even if it exists alongside many limitations. A young person who makes a pilgrimage to ask Our Lady for help, and invites a friend or companion along, by that single gesture is being a good missionary. Inseparable from a "popular" youth ministry is an irreplaceable "popular" missionary activity that breaks through our customary models and ways of thinking. Let us accompany and encourage it, but not presume to overly regulate it. If we can hear what the Spirit is saying to us, we have to realize that youth ministry is always missionary. Young people are greatly enriched when they overcome their reticence and dare to visit homes, and in this way make contact with people's lives. They learn how to look beyond their family and their group of friends, and they gain a broader vision of life. At the same time, their faith and their sense of being part of the Church grow stronger. Youth missions, which usually take place during school holidays after a period of preparation, can lead to a renewed experience of faith and even serious thoughts about a vocation. Young people can find new fields for mission in the most varied settings. For example, since they are already so familiar with social networks, they should be encouraged to fill them with God, fraternity and commitment.

FROM FR. HENRY DUC

Sometime around 1969, a young priest called Peter was sent to my village parish as its assistant, and helped to transform the lives of so many villagers, including me, with his two major programs, namely: sport and secondary education.

First, he asked the Parish priest to allow him to turn a piece of church empty land into a soccer field and start the Parish team with him as its inaugural captain. That was an instant success, for it won bodies and souls of lot of people for a long time both as players and spectators.

Second, he introduced secondary education to the community, something, which was simply beyond reach of the majority of local children after Primary school. He began with the introduction of year 6 in September 1969, and added on year 7, 8 and 9 in following years. I was part of the first group of students, and the only one to join the priestly formation, while lot of my classmates became very useful for the Communist government later on as its local officials, when it came to power in 1975.

My path to priesthood wasn't easy from day one, since my Parish priest adamantly refused to endorse my application, probably as a way to retaliate my paternal grandma, who courageously said no to his effort to negotiate a land swap with my grandparents on behalf of his house-keeper's family. Sometimes I couldn't help to see a bit of my grandma in me, especially in dealing with authorities!

Anyway, Fr Peter quietly carried out his own investigation, and when he learned that my poor grandma did nothing wrong, but rightly challenged his cranky old boss, he called my parents and me in for a meeting, and told us that I had his support in applying for the seminary's entrance exam in 1970. I did that with his blessing and got through to the exam, and the rest, as we say, is history, now.

I couldn't help to think of my priestly benefactor of old, when I stumbled upon the word 'Advocate' in this Sunday's Gospel, the one that Jesus picked up to describe the Holy Spirit or the Spirit of truth, sent to empower, inspire and keep both the disciples' company in the past, and ours in this present time on Jesus' behalf.

According the Macquarie Dictionary, an advocate means an intercessor, or someone who pleads for or on behalf of someone else, or someone who defends or upholds a cause by argument.

In this sense, Fr Peter was very much of an advocate to plead on my behalf, when circumstances put me into a difficult position with my former Parish priest, and we, I suppose, can look with trust and confidence upon to the Holy Spirit as our Advocate from a similar perspective, because He can surely provide each of us with the guidance, support, and strength we need for our journey toward the heavenly promised land, like He did for the Apostles and Christians in the Early Church as shown in the first reading today.

It is worth to note St Augustine's warning issued to the Church in the fourth century about the danger of oversimplifying the role of the Holy Spirit. In his On John I, he wrote, 'who in the present day expects that those on whom hands are laid for the bestowal of the Sprit will suddenly begin speaking in tongues?' In other words, he meant to say that it is unhealthy to narrow down to the role of the Holy Spirit to one single aspect to satisfy certain utilitarian purposes, since His role is much broader.

Today, let us look upon the Holy Spirit and ask Him to renew his gifts in each of us, consequently, we can grow and show our better love for the Lord through our better observance of his love-based commandments.
