Pope at Audience: Wrestling with God a metaphor for prayer

Pope Francis continues his cycle of catechesis on prayer at the Wednesday General Audience, focusing on the story of Jacob "wrestling with God" in the book of Genesis.

At the General Audience on Wednesday, Pope Francis reflected on the life of the patriarch Jacob, whose story is told in the book of Genesis.

A self-made man

Pope Francis introduced Jacob as "a man who shrewdly developed his best talent," what we might call a "self-made" man, who obtains what he desires through his own ingenuity. "The biblical account tells us about the difficult relationship Jacob had with his brother Esau" from the very beginning, a rivalry that is never overcome.

But although he is the younger son, Jacob, through trickery, obtains "the blessing and birthright" of the first born from his father Isaac. "It is only the first in a long series of ploys of which this unscrupulous man is capable," Pope Francis said. Jacob manages, seemingly through his own devices, to succeed in life. Even when he is forced to flee from his brother, he is able to enrich himself and to enter a promising marriage. "But something is missing," the Pope said. "And one day he hears the call of home" and sets out for his "ancient homeland" where his brother still lives.

Wrestling with God

When he reaches the final stage of his journey, Jacob pauses, wondering what awaits him upon his return. It is here, while he is reflecting on the reception he will receive, that "suddenly, a stranger grabs him and begins to wrestle with him." Pope Francis, quoting from the Catechism, explained that "the spiritual tradition of the Church has retained the symbol of prayer as a battle of faith and as the triumph of perseverance."

After wrestling with the stranger throughout the night, Jacob is finally overcome when his opponent strikes his sciatic nerve. After asking Jacob his name, he tells him, "Your name shall no more be called Jacob, but Israel... for you have striven with God and with men, and have prevailed." He refuses to tell Jacob his own name, but blesses him instead — and, the Pope said, "Jacob understands he has encountered God 'face-to-face'."

A metaphor for prayer

Pope Francis explained that "wrestling with God" is "a metaphor for prayer."

Jacob, who had always succeeded in life by his own effort, is reminded that he is "a mortal man who trembles and fears. For once Jacob has only his frailty and powerlessness to present to God." This, said Pope Francis, is when he is finally able to receive "God's blessing, with which he limps into the promised land: vulnerable and wounded, but with a new heart." We too, said the Pope, "have an appointment in the night with God: in the night of our life, in the many nights of our life, dark moments, moments of sin, moments of disorientation." It is when we are alone, and are able to recognize our own

Pope at Audience: Mystery of Creation opens us up to prayer

Pope Francis holds his weekly General Audience during Laudato Si' Week, and reflects on the mystery of Creation and how it opens us up to prayer.

Continuing his catechesis cycle on the theme of prayer at the Wednesday General Audience, Pope Francis spoke about the relationship between creation and prayer.

The Bible, he said, begins with the account of God creating the world. The passage "resembles a great hymn of thanks", he said.

"The account of Creation," he continued, "is punctuated with refrains in which the goodness and beauty of all things that exist are continually reaffirmed."

Greatness and frailty

Pope Francis said the beauty and mystery of Creation sets in motion the first movement that stirs prayer. Psalm 8, proclaimed at the beginning of the audience, affirms this.

The human person "in prayer contemplates the mystery of existence around them. He or she sees the starry sky above - which astrophysics shows us today in all its immensity - and wonders what design of love there must be behind such a powerful work!"

This contemplation leads the person who prays to wonder: "What is man?"

Despite humanity's frailty, said the Pope, "the human being is the only creature aware of such a profusion of beauty."



Overwhelmed by wonder

The Pope said prayer is closely linked to the sentiment of wonder.

"The greatness of the human person is infinitesimal in relation to the dimensions of the universe," he said. "In prayer a sentiment of mercy is overwhelmingly affirmed."

Psalm 8 calls human beings "little less than a god, crowned with glory and honor".

"The relationship with God," said Pope Francis, "is our greatness: his enthronement. By nature we are almost nothing, but by vocation we are children of the great King!"

Many of us, he added, have experienced this while contemplating elements of Creation.

FROM FR. HENRY DUC



When I grew up, the feast of the Body of Blood of Christ or Corpus Christi as known by then, was one of the most anticipated feasts for children in my village, just after Christmas and Easter, due to its demonstrative nature involving an outdoor procession and liturgical dance, in which a group of young female dancers walked ahead of the monstrance carried by the Parish priest, and occasional threw up flower petals paving the way for the procession. We, kids, just loved it, because it was different to other normal Sunday Masses thanks to its colourful and entertaining elements.

I, for sure, knew nothing of the link between the Corpus Christi procession in the Mekong Deltabased parish and the procession started in the diocese of Liege, France many centuries before that, in 1246 to be exact. I knew nothing of its impetus, which is to highlight the redemptive aspects of the Eucharist, instead of its institutional dimension as Holy Thursday.

Historically, this feast began with private revelations of the French sister named Juliana of Mont-Cornillon. I was first celebrated in Liege and enthusiastically embraced around Europe, and finally added on to the Church calendar by Pope Urban IV in 1264.

From a sacramental perspective, the Gospel narrative this Sunday helps to highlight the redemptive side of the Eucharist as mentioned above. It is worth to keep in mind a few key points Jesus pointed out in his catechetical discourse following his miraculous multiplication of the loaves to nourish big crowds of his hungry followers. Jesus used the miracle as the platform to bring his audience to the theological level, when he presents himself as the living bread sent by the heavenly Father to the earth to give eternal life to its sharers. Some of his followers obviously had problems to grasp his message due to their failure to embrace the new way, which Jesus invited them to follow. The sacramental way if you like to call.

As we celebrate the feast of the Body of Blood of Christ today, let us ask Jesus to open our mind, eyes and heart, so that we can see the sacrament of the Eucharist in the way he wants us to see, and come to a better understanding of its meaning, and hence a greater appreciation of its redemptive nature, which is the food to nourish us body and soul, and bring us eternal and never-ending life.

FROM POPE FRANCIS

Chapter 8 CHAPTER EIGHT— Being there for others

253. I would now like to speak of vocation in the strict sense, as a call to missionary service to others. The Lord calls us to share in his work of creation and to contribute to the common good by using the gifts we have received. 254. This missionary vocation thus has to do with service. For our life on earth reaches full stature when it becomes an offering. Here I would repeat that "the mission of being in the heart of the people is not just a part of my life or a badge I can take off; it is not an 'extra' or just another moment in life. Instead, it is

something I cannot uproot from my being without destroying my very self. I am a mission on this earth; that is the reason why I am here in this world". It follows that every form of pastoral activity, formation and spirituality should be seen in the light of our Christian vocation.

255. Your own personal vocation does not consist only in the work you do, though that is an expression of it. Your vocation is something more: it is a path guiding your many efforts and actions towards service to others. So in discerning your vocation, it is important to determine if you see in yourself the abilities needed to perform that specific service to

256. This gives greater value to everything you do. Your work stops being just about making money, keeping busy or pleasing others. It becomes your vocation because you are called to it; it is something more than merely a pragmatic decision. In the end, it is a recognition of why I was made, why I am here on earth, and what the Lord's plan is for my life. He will not show me every place, time and detail, since I will have to make my own prudent decisions about these. But he will show me a direction in life, for he is my Creator and I need to listen to his voice, so that, like clay in the hands of a potter, I can let myself be shaped and guided by him. Then I will become what I was meant to be, faithful to my own reality.

257. To respond to our vocation, we need to foster and develop all that we are. This has nothing to do with inventing ourselves or creating ourselves out of nothing. It has to do with finding our true selves in the light of God and letting our lives flourish and bear fruit. "In God's plan, every man and woman is meant to seek self-fulfilment, for every human life is called to some task by God". Your vocation inspires you to bring out the best in yourself for the glory of God and the good of others. It is not simply a matter of doing things, but of doing them with meaning and direction. Saint Alberto Hurtado told young people to think very seriously about the direction their lives should take: "If the helmsman of a ship becomes careless, he is fired straightaway for not taking his sacred responsibility seriously. As for our lives, are we fully aware of the course they are taking? What course is your life taking? If it is necessary to give this more thought, I would beg each one of you to give it the highest consideration, because to get it right is tantamount to success; to err is guite simply to fail".[141]


258. In the life of each young person, this "being there for others" normally has to do with two basic issues: forming a new family and working. 14. I urgently appeal, then, for a new dialogue about how we are shaping the future of our planet. We need a conversation which includes everyone, since the environmental challenge we are undergoing, and its human roots, concern and affect us all. The worldwide ecological movement has already made considerable progress and led to the establishment of numerous organizations committed to raising awareness of these challenges. Regrettably, many efforts to seek concrete solutions to the environmental crisis have proved ineffective, not only because of powerful opposition but also because of a more general lack of interest. Obstructionist attitudes, even on the part of believers, can range from denial of the problem to indifference, nonchalant resignation or blind confidence in technical solutions. We require a new and universal solidarity. As the bishops of Southern Africa have stated: "Everyone's talents and involvement are needed to redress the damage caused by human abuse of God's creation". All of us can cooperate as instruments of God for the care of creation, each according to his or her own culture, experience, involvements and talents.
