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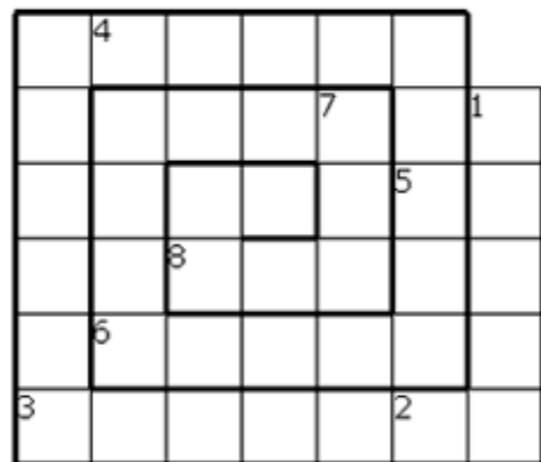

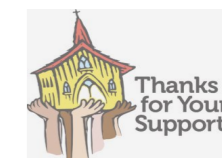

Pope Francis: Becoming restless seekers of the Kingdom of Heaven

At the Angelus on Sunday, Pope Francis reflected on two of the parables told by Jesus in the day's Gospel: that of the treasure hidden in the field, and that of the pearl of great value.

In both parables, those who find the "precious" items, that which is most dear to them, sell everything they have in order to obtain them. "With these two similes," said Pope Francis, "Jesus proposes to involve us in the building of the Kingdom of Heaven, presenting one of its essential characteristics: Those who fully pledge themselves to the Kingdom are those who are willing to stake everything."

Pope Francis said that the "decisive and radical" decision to give up everything to seek even more precious treasures shows that "the building of the Kingdom requires not only the grace of God, but also the active willingness of the human person."

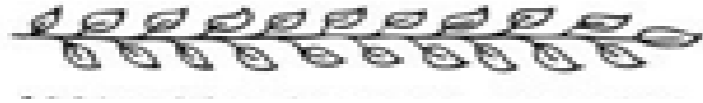
Healthily restless seekers

"We are called to assume the attitude of these Gospel figures," Pope Francis continued, "so that we too may become healthily restless seekers of the Kingdom of Heaven." As in the parables, this involves a cost: we must give up "worldly sureties" – such as "covetousness for possessions, the thirst for profit and power, and thinking only of ourselves" – which can hinder our search. Too often, said the Pope, people lead "mediocre and dull lives, because they do not go in search of real treasure." Seeking after the Kingdom of Heaven, on the other hand, is the very "opposite of a dull life: it is a treasure that renews life every day and leads it to extend towards wider horizons." Seekers after the Kingdom "have a creative and inquisitive heart" leading them to "new paths" for loving God, our neighbour, and ourselves.

The adventure of holiness

"Jesus, Who is the hidden treasure and the pearl of great value, cannot but inspire joy, all the joy in the world," said Pope Francis: "the joy of discovering a meaning in life, the joy of committing oneself to the adventure of holiness."

Pope Francis concluded his reflection with the prayer that the Blessed Virgin Mary "might help us to seek after the treasure of the Kingdom of Heaven every day, so that the love God has given us through Jesus may be manifested in our words and acts."



Pope to young people: use the 'fantasy of love' to reach out to the elderly

After reciting the Angelus in St Peter's Square, Pope Francis recalled the liturgical memorial of Saints Joachim and Ann, Jesus's grandparents.

Acts of tenderness

The Pope invited them to reach out tenderly to the elderly by doing something concrete for those "who are most alone in their homes or retirement residences, and who have not seen their loved-ones for months".

"Dear young people, the Pope continued, "each elderly person is your grandparent!" He then begged young people not to leave the elderly alone. "Use the fantasy of love", he told them.

Then he gave them some suggestions:

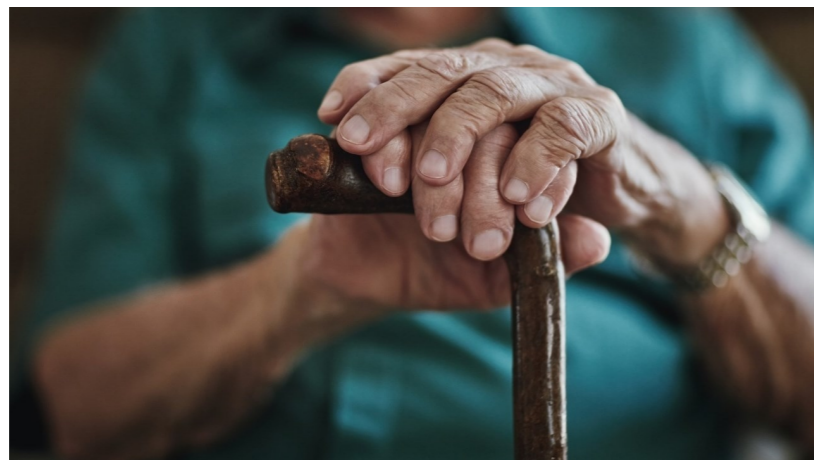
"Call them, videochat with them, send them messages, listen to them, go and visit them when it is possible while observing health precautions, send them a hug."

Connecting with one's roots

Pope Francis then picked up one of his favorite themes, reminding young people that the elderly are their "roots".

"An uprooted tree does not grow or bear flowers or fruit", he said. Being united and connected with the elderly is important because that is how we remain connected to our roots, he explained. He then quoted an Argentinian poet, who said that the flowers that we see on trees comes from what is underground.

After his words, the Pope asked for a round of applause for grandparents.

While taking a walk along a quiet street in the city on my day-off last Monday, I received two messages and a call, informing me of the reluctantly-expected departure of Christiansen Dias, one of the inaugural members of our Parish Young Adults Group. Though his death was expected as I said above, I couldn't help to feel saddened by such a devastated news, which was even more devastated to his beloved family and mates, and to ask the Lord the question 'why such this lovely young man?'

In Jesus' life, Jesus had to face with the pain of death lot of times, and twice he decided to use his divine power to cancel the power of death by bringing two deceased persons back to life, namely the young son of a widow from Naim (Lk 7.11-17), and Lazarus, his friend four days after his passing (11.1-44), and the Gospel this Sunday tell us of another death he had to face prior to his own, which is the one of John Baptist, his cousin, herald cum baptismal minister.

This Gospel account highlights both (1) Jesus' reaction to it, and (2) his decision to go ahead with the miracle multiplying five loaves and two fish in a deserted place to provide enough food for about more than five thousand people. Imagine about ten times the size of all our Sunday Weekend Masses put together and you can see how large it was. Some might wonder why Jesus failed to attend John's funeral when the news of the man's departure reached him, and opted to take his disciples to a lonely pray, instead. Perhaps, it's handy to remember that all Jewish burials, according to Jewish tradition, were expected to take place within 24 hours after the death, followed by the seven-day long period of mourning called Shiva. So, it was physically impossible for Jesus to return home on time for John's funeral, and his decision to travel with his entourage to a quiet location was quite logical, for he could observe the traditional Shiva, and recharge himself spiritually through prayers.

Out of his expectation, lot of people continued to search for him, track him down, and follow him, their eagerness and determination obviously touched him, and inspired (1) to heal the sick among them, and (2) to miraculously feed all of them, a crowd of thousands of people with only five loaves and two fish. They could eat as much as they felt, and twelve baskets full of the leftovers were finally collected.

More importantly, this miracle is considered as an allegory of the Eucharist, the sacrament Jesus established at the Last Supper, meant to offer himself as food for us, his believers.

Here it's worth to keep in mind the lively interaction between Jesus and the disciples throughout the making of this importantly symbolic miracle. The disciples kept him informed of the pressing situation and the accessible resources, and Jesus asked them to bring him the loaves and fish available, to distribute them after his prayer, and finally collect all the left-overs. It clearly foretells the interaction between the priest and the acolyte and other Extra-ordinary ministers of Communion today.

Pray that the grace of the Eucharist we receive will continue to nourish, bring us eternal life, and make us the people of the Eucharist, the people who can feel the pain and suffering of the needy, and are prepared to take life-changing action like Jesus.

FROM POPE FRANCIS

CHAPTER NINE — Listening and accompaniment

291. There are many priests, men and women religious, lay and professional persons, and indeed qualified young people, who can help the young with their vocational discernment. When we are called upon to help others discern their path in life, what is uppermost is the ability to listen. Listening calls for three distinct and complementary kinds of sensitivity.

292. The *first kind of sensitivity* is directed to *the individual*. It is a matter of listening to someone who is sharing his very self in what he says. A sign of this willingness to listen is the time we are ready to spare for others. More than the amount of time we spend, it is about making others feel that my time is their time, that they have all the time they need to say everything they want. The other person must sense that I am listening unconditionally, without being offended or shocked, tired or bored. We see an example of this kind of listening in the Lord; he walks alongside the disciples on the way to Emmaus, even though they are going in the wrong direction (cf. Lk 24:13-35). When Jesus says he plans to go farther, they realize that he has given them the gift of his time, so they decide to give him theirs by offering their hospitality. Attentive and selfless listening is a sign of our respect for others, whatever their ideas or their choices in life.

293. The *second kind of sensitivity* is marked by *discernment*. It tries to grasp exactly where grace or temptation is present, for sometimes the things that flit across our minds are mere temptations that can distract us from our true path. I need to ask myself what is it that the other person is trying to tell me, what they want me to realize is happening in their lives. Asking such questions helps me appreciate their thinking and the effects it has on their emotions. This kind of listening seeks to discern the salutary promptings of the good Spirit who proposes to us the Lord's truth, but also the traps laid by the evil spirit – his empty works and promises. It takes courage, warmth and tact to help others distinguish the truth from illusions or excuses.

294. The *third kind of sensitivity* is the ability to *perceive what is driving* the other person. This calls for a deeper kind of listening, one able to discern the direction in which that person truly wants to move. Apart from what they are feeling or thinking right now, and whatever has happened up to this point in their lives, the real issue is what they would like to be. This may demand that they look not to their own superficial wishes and desires, but rather to what is most pleasing to the Lord, to his plans for their life. And that is seen in a deeper inclination of the heart, beyond the surface level of their likes and feelings. This kind of listening seeks to discern their ultimate intention, the intention that definitively decides the meaning of their life. Jesus knows and appreciates this ultimate intention of the heart. He is always there, ready to help each of us to recognize it. We need but say to him: "Lord, save me! Have mercy on me!"

295. In this way, discernment becomes a genuine means of spiritual combat, helping us to follow the Lord more faithfully. [161] The desire to know our personal vocation thus takes on a supreme intensity, a different quality and higher level, one that better respects the dignity of our person and our life. In the end, good discernment is a path of freedom that brings to full fruit what is unique in each person, something so personal that only God knows it. Others cannot fully understand or predict from the outside how it will develop.

296. When we listen to others in this way, at a certain moment we ourselves have to disappear in order to let the other person follow the path he or she has discovered. We have to vanish as the Lord did from the sight of his disciples in Emmaus, leaving them alone with burning hearts and an irresistible desire to set out immediately (cf. Lk 24:31-33). When they returned to the community, those disciples heard the good news that the Lord was indeed risen (cf. Lk 24:34).

297. Because "time is greater than space", [162] we need to encourage and accompany processes, without imposing our own roadmaps. For those processes have to do with persons who remain always unique and free. There are no easy recipes, even when all the signs seem positive, since "positive factors themselves need to be subjected to a careful work of discernment, so that they do not become isolated and contradict one another, becoming absolutes and at odds with one another. The same is true for the negative factors, which are not to be rejected en bloc and without distinction, because in each one there may lie hidden some value which awaits liberation and restoration to its full truth". [163]

298. If you are to accompany others on this path, you must be the first to follow it, day in and day out. That is what Mary did, in her own youth, as she confronted her own questions and difficulties. May she renew your youthfulness by the power of her prayers and accompany you always by her maternal presence.

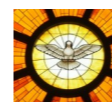
