



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Pope at Audience: Healing the world is an opportunity to build something better

The ongoing coronavirus pandemic has not only "exposed the plight of the poor and the serious inequality that reigns in the world," but even exacerbated them, Pope Francis said at the Wednesday General Audience.

Continuing his catechesis on "Healing the World," the Holy Father said our response to the pandemic must be twofold: "finding a cure for this small but terrible virus," but also curing "a larger virus, that of social injustice, inequality of opportunity, marginalization, and lack of protection for the weakest."

In meeting that challenge, he said, we must always keep in mind the "preferential option for the poor." This is not a political, ideological, or partisan option, he said. Rather, "the preferential option for the poor is at the centre of the Gospel."

Closeness to the poor

Following the example of Jesus, the Pope said, Christians "are recognised by their closeness to the poor, the least, the sick and the imprisoned, the excluded and the forgotten, those without food and clothing." This, he said, "is a key criterion of Christian authenticity." And he emphasised that it is not the duty only of a few, but of every Christian: "It is the mission of the Church as a whole."

The preference for the poor is rooted in the virtues of faith, hope and love. Going beyond the bare necessities, "it implies walking together, allowing ourselves be evangelized by [the poor], who know the suffering Christ well, letting ourselves be 'infected' by their experience of salvation, their wisdom, and creativity."

Going to the peripheries

Closeness to the poor, said Pope Francis, also implies working to overcome the "unhealthy social structures," as we strive to return normality in the aftermath of the pandemic.

This "normality," however, should not include returning to "social injustices and the degradation of the environment" that marks contemporary society, the Pope said. He lamented an economy focused on profits over people, arguing that "the preferential option for the poor, this ethical-social need that comes from God's love, inspires us to conceive of and design an economy where people, and especially the poorest, are at the centre."

Prioritising those who have greatest need

Similarly, as treatments for the coronavirus become more widely available, society should prioritise those who have the greatest need, rather than those who have the most money, the Pope insisted. "How sad it would be if, for the Covid-19 vaccine, priority were to be given to the richest."

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Pope Francis also warned against the "scandal" of directing economic assistance during the pandemic primarily to "industries that do not contribute to the inclusion of the excluded, the promotion of the least, the common good, or the care of creation" - which he proposed as four criteria for determining which industries should be helped.

Changing the world

Looking ahead, Pope Francis said, "if the virus were to intensify again in a world that is unjust to the poor and vulnerable, then we must change the world."

Pointing to the example of Jesus, "the doctor of integrated divine love," the Holy Father said, "we must act now, to heal the epidemics caused by the small, invisible viruses, and to heal those caused by the serious and visible social injustices."

Pope Francis proposed to accomplish this "by starting from the love of God, placing the peripheries at the centre and those who are least in first place."

Prayer for Our Earth

All-powerful God, you are present in the whole universe and in the smallest of your creatures.

You embrace with your tenderness all that exists.

Pour out upon us the power of your love, that we may protect life and beauty.

Fill us with peace, that we may live as brothers and sisters, harming no one.

O God of the poor,
help us to rescue the abandoned and forgotten of this
earth, so precious in your eyes.
Bring healing to our lives,
that we may protect the world and not prey on it,
that we may sow beauty, not pollution and destruction.
Touch the hearts of those who look only for gain
at the expense of the poor and the earth.

Teach us to discover the worth of each thing, to be filled with awe and contemplation, to recognize that we are profoundly united with every creature as we journey towards your infinite light.

Pope at Angelus: humble faith has no bounds

On Sunday Pope Francis focused his words before reciting the Angelus on the day's Gospel. He highlighted the faith of the Canaanite woman who sought healing for her daughter and showed that humble faith has no bounds.

Cry of suffering

While Jesus is in foreign territory to the north of Galilee a Canaanite woman approached him begging Him to heal her daughter. "Have mercy on me, Lord" is the cry from a mother who feels helpless, a "cry that is born out of a life marked by suffering", Pope Francis said.

The mother insists, even though "Jesus initially ignores her," and even after Jesus says His mission "is directed only to 'the lost sheep of the house of Israel'." At that point, Pope Francis said, Jesus "puts her to the test, citing a proverb: It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs".

Jesus' admiration

Her response, said the Pope, shows that the woman senses the Most High God present in Jesus: "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." That trust-filled wisdom "touches the Master's heart," provoking Him to admire her faith with the words "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish" (v. 28).

Pope Francis then reflected on "What type of faith is great." Our faith is great when we bring our wounded past to Jesus's feet, "asking Him to heal it, to give it meaning."

Bringing our story to the Lord

Each one of us, the Pope continues, has our own story, a story that is often difficult, filled with pain, misfortunes, and sins. "What do I do with my story," he asked. "Do I hide it?" No, the Pope said. Instead, "We must bring it to the Lord," with the prayer, "Lord, if you will it, you can heal me."

This is what the woman in Sunday's Gospel teaches us, the Pope said, inviting everyone to consider their own life-story and to make the Canaanite woman's prayer their own. "Let us go to Jesus, knock on Jesus's heart, and say to Him, 'Lord, if you will it, you can heal me'."

Jesus loves us as we are

We will be able to do this, the Pope continued, "if we always have the face of Jesus before us." Pope Francis insisted that Jesus loves us "as we are, without make-up," with a love and compassion "that bears our sins, our mistakes, and our failures."

Finding Jesus in the Gospels

The Holy Father once again invited everyone to carry a copy of the Gospels with them, in their pockets or purses, or even on their phone – because it is there, in the Gospels, "that you will find Jesus as He is, as He presents Himself... You will find Jesus who loves us, who loves us a lot, who tremendously wants our well-being."

Pope Francis concluded his reflection with the prayer that the Blessed Virgin Mary "might intercede with her prayer so that the joy of faith and the desire to communicate it with the witness of a consistent life might grow in every baptized person," and that we might be given the courage to draw near to Jesus and pray, "Lord, if You will it, You can heal me."

In the Church hierarchy, as we know, the pope is our highest leader, who is in charge of both the papal office and jurisdiction called the papacy, and all this originated from the role, which Jesus entrusted to Peter to lead the Church in its mission as we hear from the Gospel reading this Sunday.

Due to the tradition that Sts Peter and Paul both were martyred in Rome, the bishop of the local Church of Rome has been considered as the highest authority to oversee all the other bishops, whose relationship with him very much reflects the one between the Apostles and Peter in the very Early Church. Throughout the course of history, such a healthy and well-balanced relationship between the pope and

his bishops was not always maintained at the level it was desired to be from the beginning, and the Fathers of the Vatican II Council managed to introduce the concept of collegiality encouraging all the bishops around the world to work with the Bishop of Rome to better the Church mission. In this regard, Pope Saint Paul VI periodically convoked the World Synod of Bishops for advisory purposes, and Pope Francis, who has been an ardent advocate of collegiality, and often referred to himself as the Bishop of Rome instead of other papal titles, has been doing the same, if not more with the establishment of the Council of Cardinals always known as the C9 together with the World Synods of Bishops.

This papal background above surely will help us appreciate better the leadership position Jesus officially appointed Peter to take up and carry out in the Church. He was given the symbolic keys to open or lock all Church matters and issues following his spot-on profession, that Jesus is 'the Christ, the Son of the living God.'

It is worth to remember that Peter, the first pope, did show a great example in his collegial relationship with his brothers, especially though his willingness to listen to and embrace Paul's position to abolish circumcision in the Church (cf. Acts 15.1-11), and that he also had his moment of weakness as he infamously denied his Lord and Master three times in front of people, and was truly sorry for such a shameful act (cf. Mt 26. 69-75).

Let us remember in our prayer today Pope Francis, the Bishop of Rome and all other bishops, the apostolic leaders in their dioceses throughout the world. Pray that they always maintain faithful to the collegial model of working relationship in the way Peter, Paul and the Apostles have shown them, and the Vatican II Council has taught them, consequently they may be able to find new ways to well respond to the new issues of the world.

Let us also pray for all Christian families, particularly families in our parish, that all mums, dads and children would commit to keep a collegial connection between each other through their ability to listen to each other's need and respond to it appropriately, so that their family bond could always remain healthy and strong. Have a collegial-oriented week.

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FROM POPE FRANCIS CHAPTER ONE— A SOCIAL DREAM - To feel outrage and to beg forgiveness



15. We need to feel outrage, as Moses did (cf. Ex 11:8), as Jesus did (cf. Mk 3:5), as God does in the face of injustice (cf. Am 2:4-8; 5:7-12; Ps 106:40). It is not good for us to become inured to evil; it is not good when our social consciousness is dulled before "an exploitation that is leaving destruction and even death throughout our region... jeopardizing the lives of millions of people and especially the habitat of peasants

and indigenous peoples". The incidents of injustice and cruelty that took place in the Amazon region even in the last century ought to provoke profound abhorrence, but they should also make us more sensitive to the need to acknowledge current forms of human exploitation, abuse and killing. With regard to the shameful past, let us listen, for example, to an account of the sufferings of the indigenous people during the "rubber age" in the Venezuelan Amazon region: "They gave no money to the indigenous people, but only merchandise, for which they charged dearly and the people never finished paying for it… They would pay for it but they were told, "You are racking up a debt" and the indigenous person would have to go back to work… More than twenty ye'kuana towns were entirely razed to the ground. The ye'kuana women were raped and their breasts amputated, pregnant women had their children torn from the womb, men had their fingers or hands cut off so they could not sail… along with other scenes of the most absurd sadism".

- 16. Such a history of suffering and contempt does not heal easily. Nor has colonization ended; in many places, it has been changed, disguised and concealed, while losing none of its contempt for the life of the poor and the fragility of the environment. As the bishops of the Brazilian Amazon have noted, "the history of the Amazon region shows that it was always a minority that profited from the poverty of the majority and from the unscrupulous plundering of the region's natural riches, God's gift to the peoples who have lived there for millennia and to the immigrants who arrived in centuries past".
- 17. Yet even as we feel this healthy sense of indignation, we are reminded that it is possible to overcome the various colonizing mentalities and to build networks of solidarity and development. "The challenge, in short, is to ensure a globalization in solidarity, a globalization without marginalization". Alternatives can be sought for sustainable herding and agriculture, sources of energy that do not pollute, dignified means of employment that do not entail the destruction of the natural environment and of cultures. At the same time, the indigenous peoples and the poor need to be given an education suited to developing their abilities and empowering them. These are the goals to which the genuine talent and shrewdness of political leaders should be directed. Not as a way of restoring to the dead the life taken from them, or even of compensating the survivors of that carnage, but at least today to be authentically human.
- 18. It is encouraging to remember that amid the grave excesses of the colonization of the Amazon region, so full of "contradictions and suffering", many missionaries came to bring the Gospel, leaving their homes and leading an austere and demanding life alongside those who were most defenceless. We know that not all of them were exemplary, yet the work of those who remained faithful to the Gospel also inspired "a legislation like the Laws of the Indies, which defended the dignity of the indigenous peoples from violence against their peoples and territories". Since it was often the priests who protected the indigenous peoples from their plunderers and abusers, the missionaries recounted that "they begged insistently that we not abandon them and they extorted from us the promise that we would return".
- 19. Today the Church can be no less committed. She is called to hear the plea of the Amazonian peoples and "to exercise with transparency her prophetic mission". At the same time, since we cannot deny that the wheat was mixed with the tares, and that the missionaries did not always take the side of the oppressed, I express my shame and once more "I humbly ask forgiveness, not only for the offenses of the Church herself, but for the crimes committed against the native peoples during the so-called conquest of America" as well as for the terrible crimes that followed throughout the history of the Amazon region. I thank the members of the original peoples and I repeat: "Your lives cry out… You are living memory of the mission that God has entrusted to us all: the protection of our common home".
