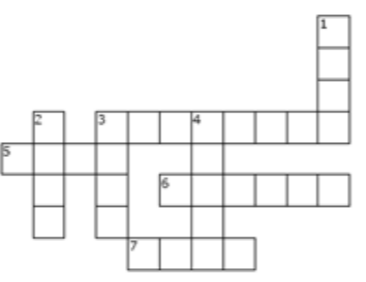

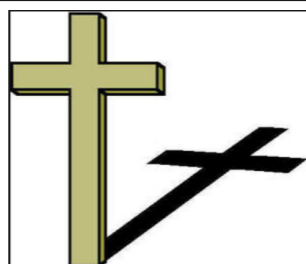
SECOND READING

John Paul I: the faith of the "Smiling Pope" in Vatican II

One of the shortest pontificates in history could bring to the honour of the altars another pope of the 20th century. John Paul I lived only 34 days on the Chair of Peter, but his testimony - not only in that short period of time, but more so in the previous decades as bishop and pastor, esteemed even outside the Italian borders - remains very tangible in the Church even today. It was 42 years ago that Albino Luciani, the Patriarch of Venice, was elected pope on the fourth ballot on August 26, 1978, and assumed the double name "John Paul", in homage to his immediate predecessors, John XXIII and Paul VI. The former appointed him Bishop of Vittorio Veneto, thus including him among the Fathers of the Council; while the latter transferred him to Venice and created him cardinal.

The "Smiling Pope"

The month-long pontificate of John Paul I earned for him from the media the title, "the Smiling Pope". The world came to learn that the mild character that his expression revealed was never an indication of a lack of spiritual clarity and pastoral energy. Proof of this was his attitude and the work he did at the Second Vatican Council.

Breath of the Universal Church

During the working sessions of the Council, the future pope lived an intense experience of the Universal Church. "In the Council hall," he wrote to the faithful of his diocese in 1963, "it is enough for me to raise my eyes to the steps in front of me." "There they are, the beards of missionary bishops, the black faces of Africans, the protruding cheekbones of Asians." "And it's enough for me to exchange a few words with them, and visions and needs open up, of which we have no idea". In other words, one feels the breath of "Christian optimism", which promises to be the fruit of the Council, against the "widespread pessimism" of relativistic culture.

Towards beatification

The cause of the sainthood of John Paul I has been underway since 2003. After three years of the diocesan phase, the documents arrived in Rome in 2006, and the "positio" (formal argument for sainthood) of Pope Luciani began to be examined by experts at the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. A meticulous investigation of the testimonies and documents led to the conclusion of the case in November 2017. A miracle that will clear him for beatification is currently being examined. It concerns a presumed extraordinary healing through the intercession of John Paul I that took place in 2011 in Argentina, in the Diocese of Buenos Aires.

Pope Francis: We are stewards called to share earth's fruits with everyone

Pope Francis opened his catechesis on Wednesday by inviting the faithful to "welcome the gift of *hope* that comes from Christ", especially during the pandemic, in which "many risk losing hope".

The Pope explained that it is Christ who "helps us to navigate the tumultuous waters of sickness, death and injustice, which do not have the last word over our final destination."

Continuing his catechesis on *Healing the World*, the Holy Father focused on the universal destination of goods and the virtue of hope.

Pandemic and social inequalities

Pope Francis went on to note that many social inequalities have been "highlighted and aggravated" by the pandemic. Many children are unable to continue receiving their education while many others instead can; some people are unable to continue their work from home, but many others can; and many nations cannot issue money to deal with the emergency without harming their financial future, while others can.

"These symptoms of inequality reveal a social illness. It is a virus that comes from a sick economy...the result of unequal economic growth, which disregards fundamental human values."

Reflecting the design of Creation

This "sin of wanting to possess and dominate our brothers and sisters...nature and God Himself...is not the design of creation", said the Pope.

He reminded the faithful that God gave the earth to all of us to care for and cultivate. God invited us to dominate the earth in His name, cultivating and tending it like a garden, "everyone's garden".

This garden must be protected and preserved, continued the Pope. This cannot be interpreted in a way that allows us "to do whatever we want with the earth. The Pope stressed that it has been given to us by God to the whole human race. Therefore, "it is our duty to make sure that its fruit reaches everyone, not just a few people."

Political authorities

Pope Francis went on to stress that, in order to ensure that what we possess "brings value to the community", political authorities have the right and the duty to "regulate the legitimate exercise of the right to ownership for the sake of the common good." Although "property and money are instruments that can serve the mission", we easily turn them into "individual or collective" ends, said the Pope.

When this happens, he explained, essential human values are undermined. "We forget that, being created in the image and likeness of God, we are social, creative and solidary beings, with an immense capacity to love."

"With our gaze fixed on Jesus and with the certainty that His love is operative through the community of His disciples, we must all act together in the hope of generating something different and better. Christian hope, rooted in God, is our anchor. It moves the will to share, strengthening our mission as disciples of Christ, Who shared everything with us."

In the Church, it has been the tradition for us to begin our worship gatherings and church meetings with the sign of the cross, and this tradition has enjoyed a long and unbroken history with a written report from Tertullian back to around 225.

According to him, Early Christians signed themselves this symbolic gesture as a way both to sanctify their daily lives, and to communicate with each other during periods of persecution. It then began to appear in the celebrations of Baptism, Eucharist, and other liturgical blessings of people and objects.

In the beginning, Christians used the right thumb to draw the sign of the cross on their forehead, and later on, the right hand was used to draw the sign from forehead to breast, and from left to right shoulder as we see today.

As Christians, we hold the cross very dearly to our hearts with utmost respects. We know it and even non-Christians have been aware of that as well. For instance, during the persecution time in Vietnam two hundred years or so ago, it then was very common that as Catholics got caught and brought before the court authority, officials would instruct them to carry out this act, which was to walk over a crucifix lying on the ground. If they co-operated with the order, their lives were saved, otherwise a brutal death was their only option, and many refused to follow the order, out of their deep respect for the cross.

In the Gospel this Sunday, we are invited by Jesus to demonstrate the authenticity of our discipleship through a willingness carry out this three step exercise, meaning to renounce ourselves, to take up the cross, and to follow his path. From a personal perspective, this exercise means to encourage us to embrace the cross of our everyday troubles, anxiety, sorrows, hardships and difficulties instead of running away from them, and turn them into opportunities to make us stronger in faith, to participate in his suffering, and to gain credits for us in his Kingdom.

Furthermore, from a social justice perspective that we are asked to focus on today, the Social Justice Sunday, it perhaps means to inspire us to carry out our shared responsibilities as Jesus' followers in the world, the ones Pope Francis pointed out in his *Amoris Laetitia* – the Joy of Love as 'solidarity with the poor, openness to a diversity of people, the protection of creation, moral and material solidarity with other families, including those most in need, commitment to the promotion of the common good and the transformation of unjust social structures, beginning in the territory in which the family lives, through the practice of the corporal and spiritual works of mercy.' (cf. Art. 290)

As we make the sign of the cross at Mass today, may it help to increase our awareness of the Passion of the Lord, the presence of the Holy Trinity, and our precious tradition, and pray that we shall be granted enough of the courage to accept our daily cross and the strength to carry it on our life-journey.

Have a cross-oriented week.

**FROM POPE FRANCIS
CHAPTER ONE— A SOCIAL DREAM - A sense of community**



20. Efforts to build a just society require a capacity for fraternity, a spirit of human fellowship. Hence, without diminishing the importance of personal freedom, it is clear that the original peoples of the Amazon region have a strong sense of community. It permeates “their work, their rest, their relationships, their rites and celebrations. Everything is shared; private areas – typical of modernity – are minimal. Life is a communal journey where tasks and responsibilities are apportioned and shared on the basis of the common good. There is no room for the notion of an individual detached from the community or from the land”. Their relationships are steeped in the surrounding nature, which they feel and think of as a reality that integrates society and culture, and a prolongation of their bodies, personal, familial and communal:

“The morning star draws near,
the wings of the hummingbirds flutter;
my heart pounds louder than the cascade:
with your lips I will water the land
as the breeze softly blows among us”.

21. All this makes even more unsettling the sense of bewilderment and uprootedness felt by those indigenous people who feel forced to migrate to the cities, as they attempt to preserve their dignity amid more individualistic urban habitats and a hostile environment. How do we heal all these hurts, how do we bring serenity and meaning to these uprooted lives? Given situations like these, we ought to appreciate and accompany the efforts made by many of those groups to preserve their values and way of life, and to integrate in new situations without losing them, but instead offering them as their own contribution to the common good.

22. Christ redeemed the whole person, and he wishes to restore in each of us the capacity to enter into relationship with others. The Gospel proposes the divine charity welling up in the heart of Christ and generating a pursuit of justice that is at once a hymn of fraternity and of solidarity, an impetus to the culture of encounter. The wisdom of the way of life of the original peoples – for all its limitations – encourages us to deepen this desire. In view of this, the bishops of Ecuador have appealed for “a new social and cultural system which privileges fraternal relations within a framework of acknowledgment and esteem for the different cultures and ecosystems, one capable of opposing every form of discrimination and oppression between human beings”.
