

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse 7:2-4, 9-14

I, John, saw another angel rising where the sun rises, carrying the seal of the living God; he called in a powerful voice to the four angels whose duty was to devastate land and sea, 'Wait before you do any damage on land or at sea or to the trees, until we have put the seal on the foreheads of the servants of our God.' Then I heard how many were sealed: a hundred and forty-four thousand, out of all the tribes of Israel.

After that I saw a huge number, impossible to count, of people from every nation, race, tribe and language; they were standing in front of the throne and in front of the Lamb, dressed in white robes and holding palms in their hands. They shouted aloud, Victory to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!' And all the angels who were standing in a circle round the throne, surrounding the elders and the four animals, prostrated themselves before the throne, and touched the ground with their foreheads, worshipping God with these words, 'Amen. Praise and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour and power and strength to our God for ever and ever. Amen.'

One of the elders then spoke, and asked me, 'Do you know who these people are, dressed in white robes, and where they have come from?' I answered him, 'You can tell me, my Lord.' Then he said, 'These are the people who have been through the great persecution, and they have washed their robes white again in the blood of the Lamb.'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

(R.) Lord, this is the people that longs to see your face.

The Lord's is the earth and its fullness, the world and all its peoples. It is he who set it on the seas; on the waters he made it firm. (R.)

Who shall climb the mountain of the Lord? Who shall stand in his holy place? The man with clean hands and pure heart, who desires not worthless things. (R.)

He shall receive blessings from the Lord and reward from the God who saves him. Such are the men who seek him, seek the face of the God of Jacob.

SECOND READING

A reading from the first letter of St John 3:1-3

Think of the love that the Father has lavished on us, by letting us be called God's children; and that is what we are. Because the world refused to acknowledge him, therefore it does not acknowledge us. My dear people, we are already the children of God but what we are to be in the future has not yet been revealed; all we know is, that when it is revealed we shall be like him because we shall see him as he really is. Surely everyone who entertains this hope must purify himself, must try to be as pure as Christ.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! Come to me all you that labour and are burdened, and I will give you rest, says the Lord. Alleluia!

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 5:1-12

Seeing the crowds, Jesus went up the hill. There he sat down and was joined by his disciples. Then he began to speak. This is what he taught them:

'How happy are the poor in spirit: theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Happy the gentle: they shall have the earth for their heritage.

Happy those who mourn: they shall be comforted.

Happy those who hunger and thirst for what is right: they shall be satisfied.

Happy the merciful: they shall have mercy shown them.

Happy the pure in heart: they shall see God.

Happy the peacemakers: they shall be called sons of God.

Happy those who are persecuted in the cause of right: theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Happy are you when people abuse you and persecute you and speak all kinds of calumny against you on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven.'



PRAYER FOR SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

My Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Most Blessed Sacrament of the altar. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You.

Pope at audience: God remains near to us in suffering when we pray By Devin Watkins

Pope Francis continued his catechesis cycle on prayer at the weekly General Audience, focusing on the Book of Psalms. He called the Old Testament book a "gymnasium and home of countless men and women of prayer."

How to pray

As part of the books of wisdom, the Psalms communicate to the believer "knowing how to pray". "In the Psalms we find all human sentiments: the joys, the sorrows, the doubts, the hopes, the bitterness that colour our lives," said the Pope.

God, he added, inspired the language of prayer in the books so that those who read them might learn how to praise, thank, implore, and invoke Him.

"In short, the Psalms are the word of God that we human beings use to speak with Him." The prayers in the Psalms arise out of lived experience, not abstract ideas, said the Pope. "To pray them it is enough for us to be what we are," with all our problems and uncertainties.

Question of suffering

Pope Francis went on to explore how the Psalmist confronts the issue of suffering, saying it is accepted as part of life and thus transformed into a question.

"Until when?" he said, is the question that remains unanswered. "Every suffering calls for liberation, every tear calls for consolation, every wound awaits healing, every slander a sentence of absolution."

The Psalms, said the Pope, reminds us that life is not saved unless suffering is healed. The person who prays, he added, knows that they are "are precious in the eyes of God, and so it makes sense to cry out."

Prayer: a cry to God

The Psalms show us that crying out to God in prayer "is the way and beginning of salvation." Pope Francis said prayer turns pain into "a relationship: a cry for help waiting to intercept a listening ear." "All human pains for God are sacred," he added. "Before God we are not strangers, or numbers. We are faces and hearts, known one by one, by name."

God's door always open

So, said Pope Francis, the believer finds an answer to suffering in the Psalms. "He knows that even if all human doors were barred, God's door is open. Even if the whole world had issued a verdict of condemnation, there is salvation in God."

The Pope said the person who prays knows that problems are not always solved, but "if we are listened to, everything becomes more bearable."

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God cries with us

In conclusion, Pope Francis said prayer saves us from suffering in abandonment, because our prayers rise up to God who "cries for every son and daughter who suffers and dies." "If we maintain our relationship with Him," he said, "life does not spare us suffering, but we open up to a great horizon of goodness and set out towards its fulfilment."

Pope: 'we never pray alone: Jesus prays with us'

Pope Francis on Wednesday told the faithful that prayer is the eternal expression of their dialogue of love with the Father, and he invited them to persevere in prayer at every moment of their lives.

Greeting those gathered in the Paul VI Hall for the weekly General Audience, before beginning his catechesis the Pope expressed his sorrow for not being able to come close to the faithful because of Covid precautions, but assured them he was close in spirit and invited them to stay safe.

He then continued his series of catechises dedicated to prayer, reflecting on the beginning of Jesus' public ministry that took place with His baptism in the river Jordan.

Noting that the evangelists are in agreement in attributing fundamental importance to this episode, he said they all narrate how the people came together in prayer, and pointed out that this gathering had a clearly penitential nature (Mk 1: 5; Mt 3: 8).

Jesus' choral prayer

"Jesus' first public act is therefore participation in a choral prayer of the people, a penitential prayer, in which everyone recognises him- or herself as a sinner," he said.

The Pope went on to say that "This is why the Baptist wishes to oppose it, saying: "I need to be baptised by you, and do you come to me?" (Mt 3: 14).

But Jesus, he explained, insists because "His is an act of obedience to the will of the Father, an act of solidarity with our human condition.

Jesus, Pope Francis reiterated, "prays with the sinners of the people of God. He does not stay on the opposite side of the river, to mark His difference and distance from the disobedient people, but rather He immerses His feet in the same purifying waters."

Thus, he explained, Jesus is not a distant God. Inaugurating His mission, He placed Himself at the forefront of a people of penitents, "opening a breach through which all of us, after Him, must have the courage to pass."

Jesus came for all of humanity

Pope Francis said that on that day, on the bank of the river Jordan, is all of humanity, "with its unexpressed yearning for praver."

Above all, he continued, there is the population of sinners: "those who thought they were not beloved by God, those who did not dare cross the threshold of the temple, those who did not pray because they did not consider themselves worthy."

But Jesus, the Pope said, came for everyone, even for them, and He begins precisely by joining them.

He then went on to explain that by praying, "Jesus opens the door to the heavens, and the Holy Spirit descends from that breach."

We are never alone when we pray, he stressed, "Jesus prays with us!"

Through Baptism we share in Jesus' prayer

He told the faithful that through baptism we become brothers and sisters of Christ, and through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are enabled to share in Jesus' own prayer, "the eternal expression of his dialogue of love with the Father." Throughout the whirlwind of Jesus' life, the condemnation of the world and the hard and sorrowful experiences he endured,

the Pope said, "even when hatred and persecution are unleashed around Him, Jesus is never without the refuge of a dwelling place: He dwells eternally in the Father."

Jesus, the Pope continued, obtained for us this gift, and He invites us to pray as He prayed.

There may be times, he continued, that during prayer we feel sluggish and empty, and it may seem that life has been completely useless. It is at that time especially, the Pope explained, that we must beg that Jesus' prayer also become our own. Pope Francis concluded saying that "We will then hear a voice from heaven, louder than the voice rising from the depths of ourselves, whispering words of tenderness" telling us that we are the beloved children of God, the joy of the Father in heaven.

Many in our parish might have family members live in different parts of the world, and have still kept in touch with them through letters and phone in the past, and through Facetime and Zoom these days. I guess some might even had Zoom meetings to connect relatives living in various corners of the world at the same time. This everyday life experience helps us to appreciate better our belief in the Communion of Saints, which we celebrate in November starting with the feasts of All Saints and all Souls. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the Communion of Saints is about the living, the dead in the process of purification, and the blessed in heaven, all together formed as one Church (cf. No 962).

As a family of the Church, the saints in heaven ceaselessly intercede for us before us, and our communion with them helps join us to Christ, the head of the Church, the source of all grace, and the deceased, in turn, will be 'loosed from their sins' thanks to the prayers of the living offered to God on their behalf. A re-visit of Church history for sure will help consolidate this traditional belief of ours. Let us begin with the earliest account in the second book of Maccabees (12.43-46) mentioning the ancient tradition to pray for the dead as an expression of care given to the dead by the faithful both on earth and in heaven. Tertullian then put it in the Christian context as he talked about the practice of offering the Eucharist for the dead in his On Monogamy, about the relief of the suffering after death as a result of the intercession given by the living in his On the Resurrection of the Body. St Augustine also discussed this matter in his Confessions. In the VII century, Gregory I in his Dialogues made this significant point that the prayers of the faithful on earth and of the saints in heaven could aid in obtaining the release of those in purgatory. On the feast of All Saints this Sunday, the Gospel story highlights the Beatitudes in which Jesus lays out the paths his followers are encouraged to embark on for a place among his blessed ones in the Church in heaven, namely the path of poverty in spirit, gentleness, suffering, righteousness, mercy, chastity, peacemaking, and perseverance in trials. They truly are distinctive, counter-cultural and beyond the grasp of all conventional wisdom and values. The Eucharist of All Souls day and others throughout November allow us to stay connected with all the faithful who have gone before us and relied so much on our prayers to get through the purifying process they might have endured. Today let us give praise and thanks to God for all the Holy Women and Men in the Church, whose shining examples continues to inspire us to walk the path of the Beatitudes in the hope that one day we shall be given the opportunity to sit in their company, and let us also keep in our prayers and Mass offerings all the deceased, especially our loved ones, pray that the grace of God's mercy shall be shone upon them, wash away their past sins and bring them into ever lasting peace. Have a Communion of Saints-oriented week and month. Fr Henry



BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE



November envelops are also available for you to offer November Mass intentions at our church doors.



FROM POPE FRANCIS

CHAPTER THREE—This dream made of water—continued



When the forest is eliminated, it is not replaced, because all that is left is a terrain with few nutrients that then turns into a dry land or one poor in vegetation. This is quite serious, since the

interior of the Amazonian forest contains countless resources that could prove essential for curing diseases. Its fish, fruit and other abundant gifts provide rich nutrition for humanity. Furthermore, in an ecosystem like that of the Amazon region, each part is essential for the preservation of the whole. The lowlands and marine vegetation also need to be fertilized by the alluvium of the Amazon. The cry of the Amazon region reaches everyone because "the conquest and exploitation of resources... has today reached the point of threatening the environment's hospitable aspect: the environment as 'resource' risks threatening the environment as 'home'". The interest of a few powerful industries should not be considered more important than the good of the Amazon region and of humanity as a whole. 49. It is not enough to be concerned about preserving the most visible species in danger of extinction. There is a crucial need to realize that "the good functioning of ecosystems also requires fungi, algae, worms, insects, reptiles and an innumerable variety of microorganisms. Some less numerous species, although generally unseen, nonetheless play a critical role in maintaining the equilibrium of a particular place."[61] This is easily overlooked when evaluating the environmental impact of economic projects of extraction, energy, timber and other industries that destroy and pollute. So too, the water that abounds in the Amazon region is an essential good for human survival, yet the sources of pollution are increasing.

50. Indeed, in addition to the economic interests of local business persons and politicians, there also exist "huge global economic interests". The answer is not to be found, then, in "internationalizing" the Amazon region, but rather in a greater sense of responsibility on the part of national governments. In this regard, "we cannot fail to praise the commitment of international agencies and civil society organizations which draw public attention to these issues and offer critical cooperation, employing legitimate means of pressure, to ensure that each government carries out its proper and inalienable responsibility to preserve its country's environment and natural resources, without capitulating to spurious local or international interests".
