

“To Heal the World”: The Pope’s Catechesis on the Pandemic

In *To Heal the World* Pope Francis offers an invitation to join him on a "pilgrimage" inspired by the Gospel, with the theological virtues of faith, hope and charity as "beacons". It is a journey that will help us to deal with the crisis which has highlighted our vulnerabilities, so that it may become an opportunity to build a more just world where we care of one another.

It is in this spirit that Cardinal Peter K. Turkson, Prefect of the Dicastery for the Promotion of Integral Human Development, authored the book's preface. The volume presents the words of Pope Francis on the coronavirus pandemic spoken during his general audiences from August 5, 2020 to September 23, 2020. The purpose of the publication published by LEV can be found in the Pope's own words pronounced at the conclusion of the general audience on August 5: "It is my desire that everyone reflect and work together, as followers of Jesus who heals, to construct a better world, full of hope for future generations".

Healing and consolation

Cardinal Turkson recalls the days of greatest suffering for Italy due to Covid-19 between March 21 and 26. He also remembers March 27 when Pope Francis held a special moment of prayer in front of an empty St. Peter's Square during the lockdown. The photos captured of that prayer vigil, Cardinal Turkson notes, recall that of the "suffering servant" of Isaiah who bears the despair and pain of the world. His words on the international crisis expressed the world's "collective anxiety" but also recalled the image of the "high priest" who represents the human family before God, seeking healing and consolation in the face of bewilderment.

Crises as a time to begin again

The task of someone who consoles others is explained in the Wednesday catechesis dedicated precisely to healing a world shaken by the pandemic. Cardinal Turkson points out that during the pontificates of Benedict XVI and Pope Francis, the world has gone through three crises: the financial crisis of 2008-2009 and the "current twin crises of climate change and Covid-19." These crises also present challenges to make changes for the better. As Benedict XVI challenged in 2008, a crisis becomes an opportunity for "new approaches" and exhorts us to face difficulties with confidence rather than with resignation.

Ways to deal with the crisis proposed by Francis

The preface then highlights the nine Wednesday discourses of that period. They indicate that the way out of the crisis for a better world is "a common endeavor". It proceeds from the introductory catechesis that presents Jesus as the healer, to the second one on healing relationships in a world where everyone is truly interconnected. His discourses touch the root of social injustice, the importance of the preferential option for the poor, healing social pandemics and countering attitudes of indifference. They also recall the universal destination of goods and how inequality is the result of unequal economic growth. Central to this journey are solidarity and empowering local people, as well as the call to put oneself at the service of building a "civilization of love" that promotes the common good at all levels. Thought is also given to the relationship with creation that must be safeguarded. It's a new path that cannot be separated from keeping our gaze fixed on Jesus "our healer" who sends us out as those who console others.

At the conclusion of each of the Pope's discourses, the book encourages readers to follow this path, offering points to help face the journey, by asking questions about on a personal, family and community level, looking at various themes and concrete actions to be taken.

Pope Francis' comment following the death of Edwin, a homeless Nigerian at St Peter's Square in Rome less than a month ago.

'This past 20 January, a few metres from Saint Peter's Square, a 46-year-old homeless Nigerian man named Edwin was found dead due to the cold. His story joins that of many other homeless people who have recently died in Rome under the same tragic circumstances. Let us pray for Edwin. Let us be admonished by what Saint Gregory the Great said, who before the death of a mendicant due to the cold, stated that that day Mass would not be celebrated because it was like Good Friday. Let us think of Edwin. Let us think of what this 46-year-old man felt, in the cold, ignored by everyone, abandoned, even by us. Let us pray for him.'

Pope's prayer intention for February: For women who are victims of violence


The Pope Video for February has been published, with the prayer intention that Francis is entrusting to the entire Catholic Church through the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network. It is a powerful message against the violence that millions of women suffer daily: "psychological violence, verbal violence, physical violence, sexual violence." For Pope Francis, these abuses are "acts of cowardice and a degradation of all humanity." Consequently, he asks us to pray for the victims, "that they may be protected by society and have their sufferings considered and heeded by all."

This month's Pope Video seeks to make the drama of this issue visible also through narration with images. Thanks to the collaboration of Hermes Mangialardo—an Italian creative who has won international prizes and is a professor of animation design—the video represents, through animated illustrations, the story of a woman who is the victim of violence, who finds courage to escape from the tunnel of abuse thanks to her own strength and to the help of the community.

Violence against women, in numbers

"It's shocking how many women are beaten, insulted, and raped," says the Holy Father in The Pope Video. Indeed, the statistics compiled by UN Women, updated in November of 2020, are stunning: each day, 137 women are killed by members of their own family; adult women make up nearly half of the victims of human trafficking identified worldwide; and globally, one in three women have experienced physical or sexual violence at some point (and 15 million adolescent girls worldwide aged 15 to 19 have experienced forced sexual relations). What's more, last year there was the aggravating factor of the pandemic: the restriction of movement, social isolation and economic insecurity made women globally even more vulnerable to violence in private environments.

In his February message, the Pope asks for society to protect these victims. Although at least 155 countries have approved domestic violence laws and 140 have legislation regarding workplace sexual harassment, to give two examples, this does not mean that these laws always conform with international norms and recommendations, nor that they are applied and enforced

Simon and other Apostles obviously paid no attention to the prayer side of their Master's life, they were rather more concerned with his healing works, which might had brought both him and them fame and recognition. I guess they could have been rather disappointed, when Jesus asked them to leave the place and move on to a new location.

Let us pray today that we may be able to be inspired by Jesus' example by starting the day in prayer. Let us ask our beloved Jesus to help us to make prayer the center of our daily activities and the means to keep us closely connected with Him, the source of all grace and blessings.

CORONAVIRUS UPDATE—Attendance at Mass

NSW Health has revised the COVID-19 guidelines for places of worship effective from 29 January. Released by: The Premier – Statement from Gladys Berejiklian and Brad Hazzard (extract)

For our parish this means. The 4 m² rule still remains in place and attendance will be limited to 100 people. You may still only be seated behind the white tabs. Families from the one household may be seated together, but only one family per row.

Face masks will be mandatory in the following indoor settings:, places of worship, Compliance will start from Monday, 4 January 2021 with \$200 on the spot fines for individuals for non-compliance. Children under 12 are exempt but are encouraged to wear masks where practicable.

There is to be no congregational singing during Worship Services.

All weekend Masses will continue to be live streamed.

Directives:

All people coming to Mass are to wear a mask.

All People are to sanitise their hands.

All people are to sign in.

You may only sit in the designated seats.

You Are asked to keep your distance when lining up for Holy Communion.

There can be no gathering outside the church before, during or after our services.

FROM POPE FRANCIS

CHAPTER THREE—Ecological education and habits



58. In this regard, we can take one step further and note that an integral ecology cannot be content simply with fine-tuning technical questions or political, juridical and social decisions. The best ecology always has an educational dimension that can encourage the development of new habits in individuals and groups. Sadly, many of those living in the Amazon region have acquired habits typical of the larger cities, where consumerism and the culture of waste are already deeply rooted. A sound and sustainable ecology, one capable of bringing about change, will not develop unless people are changed, unless they are encouraged to opt for another style of life, one less greedy and more serene, more respectful and less anxious, more fraternal.

59. Indeed, "the emptier a person's heart is, the more he or she needs things to buy, own and consume. It becomes almost impossible to accept the limits imposed by reality... Our concern cannot be limited merely to the threat of extreme weather events, but must also extend to the catastrophic consequences of social unrest. Obsession with a consumerist lifestyle, above all when few people are capable of maintaining it, can only lead to violence and mutual destruction".

60. The Church, with her broad spiritual experience, her renewed appreciation of the value of creation, her concern for justice, her option for the poor, her educational tradition and her history of becoming incarnate in so many different cultures throughout the world, also desires to contribute to the protection and growth of the Amazon region.

This leads to the next dream, which I would like to share more directly with the Catholic pastors and faithful.


The name 'Matt's Point' reminds us of the life and call of St Matthew, one of the twelve Apostles in the New Testament (cf. Mt 9.9-13).
