

Only the man who believes that Jesus is the Son of God; Jesus Christ who came by water and blood, not with water only, but with water and blood; with the Spirit as another witness – since the Spirit is the truth.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 20:19-31

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.' As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.' After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.' Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him: 'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

A lesson from the angels

Pope Francis then went on to note that we can reap a precious teaching from the angel's words.

"We should never tire of seeking the Risen Christ who gives life in abundance to those who meet Him," he said. He explained that "to find Christ means to discover peace of heart." The same women of the Gospel, after initially being shaken, experience great joy in discovering the Master alive, he said.

"In this Easter Season, my wish is that everyone might have the same spiritual experience, welcoming in our hearts, in our homes and in our families the joyful proclamation of Easter: 'Christ, having risen from the dead dies now no more; death will no longer have dominion over Him."

Finally, Pope Francis concluded that it is this certainty that "moves us to pray today and throughout the Easter Season." "The angel Gabriel had greeted [Mary] thus the first time: "Rejoice, full of grace!" (see Lk 1:28). Now Mary's joy is complete:

Jesus lives; Love has conquered."

"May this be our joy as well!" said the Pope.

Pope Francis at Regina Coeli: Encountering Christ means finding peace at heart

Leading the recitation of the Regina Coeli from the library of the Apostolic Palace, Pope Francis recalled that the day is also known as *Monday of the Angel* because "we recall the meeting of the angel with the women who arrived at Jesus' tomb" after He had risen.

The Pope noted that the angel said to them: "I know that you seek Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has risen" This expression - "He has risen" - goes beyond human capacity, said the Pope.

Even the women who had gone to the tomb and had found it open and empty could not confirm "He has risen", but only that the tomb was empty.

"Only an angel could say that Jesus had risen", he said, just as only an angel had been able to say to Mary: "you will conceive a son...and he will be called the Son of the Most High."

The Lord's intervention

The Pope then noted that Matthew the Evangelist narrates that on Easter morning "there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven and came and rolled back the stone, and sat on it."

He explained that the large stone, which "was supposed to be the seal of the victory of evil and death, was put underfoot," and "becomes the footstool of the angel of the Lord."

All of the plans and defenses of Jesus's enemies and persecutors were in vain, he said. The image of the angel sitting on the stone before the tomb is "the concrete, visible manifestation of God's victory over evil, of Christ's victory over the prince of this world, of light over darkness."

Jesus's tomb was not opened by a physical phenomenon, but "by the Lord's intervention", said the Pope. The angel's appearance, "was like lightning, and his raiment white as snow."

"These details are symbols that confirm the intervention of God himself, bearer of a new era, of the last times of history," said the Pope.

A two-fold reaction

There is a two-fold reaction in beholding this intervention on God's part, said Pope Francis.

The first is that of the guards, "who cannot face the overwhelming power of God and are shaken by an interior earthquake: they became like dead men." The power of the Resurrection overthrows those who had been used to guarantee the apparent victory of death.

The second is the reaction of the women, which the Pope described as being "very different" because "they are expressly invited by the angel of the Lord not to be afraid and not to seek Jesus in the tomb."

Pope Francis at Easter Urbi at Orbi: 'Risen Christ is hope that does not disappoint.'

Pope Francis delivers his traditional Easter message "Urbi et Orbi" – to the city and the world – underscoring how today we celebrate the event that gives us the hope that does not disappoint: "Jesus who was crucified has risen".

Throughout the world, the Church proclaims the joyous news that "Jesus, who was crucified, has risen as He said. Alleluia!", Pope Francis said at the start of his Easter message broadcast live around the world.

He delivered his *Urbi et Orbi* message inside St. Peter's Basilica, just like last year, due to coronavirus safety measures. He had just concluded presiding over the Easter Sunday Mass at the Altar of the Chair with a small congregation participating. The Basilica featured arrays of Avalanche roses given by Dutch florists who traditionally filled St. Peter's Square with flowers on Easter every year, but had to stop temporarily due to the pandemic.

The Easter reality of the Resurrection offers concrete, tangible hope and consolation, the Pope noted, but its message does not offer us "a mirage or reveal a magic formula" we might wish as an escape exit to the world's difficult realities.

Among them, the spread of the pandemic, social and economic crisis hitting the poor especially, but also, he noted the

"scandalous" fact that "armed conflicts have not ended and military arsenals are being strengthened."

Hope that does not disappoint

The Easter message of hope tells us concisely that "the crucified Jesus, none other, has risen from the dead", Pope Francis said, adding that God the Father raised Jesus, who accomplished His saving will by taking upon Himself our weakness, infirmities, the weight of our sins, even our death. Because of this, the Pope said, "God the Father exalted Him and now Jesus Christ lives forever; He is the Lord."

The wounds Jesus bears in His hands, feet and side are "the everlasting seal of His love for us", the Pope noted, and all who experience trials in body or spirit can find refuge in them and "receive the grace of the hope that does not disappoint."

Hope and solidarity in pandemic times

Pope Francis went on to say that the Risen Christ gives hope and comfort for those suffering from the pandemic, the sick and those who have lost a loved one. He also prayed that the Lord might "sustain the valiant efforts of doctors and nurses". He stressed that everyone, especially the vulnerable, needs assistance and has a right to care, and vaccines are essential. He appealed to the international community "to commit to overcoming delays in the distribution of vaccines and to facilitate their distribution, especially in the poorest countries."

The Risen Lord is comfort for the unemployed and those suffering economic difficulties, the Pope said. He prayed that Christ might "inspire public authorities to act so that everyone, especially families in greatest need" can be provided with help in order to avoid sliding into poverty, a sad reality the pandemic has dramatically worsened.

The Pope referred also to the psychological weight of the pandemic on young people, who are often forced to stay at home without attending school or visiting friends in person. He expressed his "closeness to young people throughout the world".

Recently I met a couple from a neighboring parish who sang praise of overseas born clergy for filling the gap in the Church caused by the shortage of ordained ministers, or lack of vocation in our country as we often said, and my reply was, 'Yes, I know, but it's not good enough.'

When asked for clarification, I said to them, 'Our overseas supplies for vocations won't last forever, and will run dry one day, since one day they will have to face the problem as we are at the moment. We'd better put our thinking cap on and need to be daring and brave to provide a solution for the crisis of ours.'

They then began to ask, 'What should we do?' 'That's a million dollar question, I answered, you and I, and the entire people of God need to ask this vital question in faith and with courage, and hopefully our good Lord will help us to come up with an answer.' Honestly I had my answer, but tried not to scare them for the sake of Christian charity, just in case they might have a heart attack after that.

I can't help to share with you this story and encourage you to ask the 'what should we do' question with regard to the issue of ordained vocation and even beyond that in the light of the word of God on this Divine Mercy Sunday, especially the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

According to it, earliest members of the Early Church, so driven by their piety and devotion to Jesus, and the belief that his second coming was imminent, had decided to let go of what they owned by putting all of their money, properties and possessions together for a common ownership. They actually were forebears of Marx, Mao and Pol Pot's disciples today, who once forced their own peoples to abolish any form of private ownership and followed the commune model.

Fortunately, the Apostles were wise and brave enough to put the brake on the experiment when the initiative proved to be impractical to go on, and Church-members were encouraged to bury the practice and go back to live their normal lives as before. Perhaps this failed experiment of the Early Church and its courage to take concrete action to re-adjust itself on time as presented in the first reading today seem to give us, members of the Church today a lot to think about in the way we deal with a wide range of various issues of our time, such as vocation, re-married people, birth-control, social justice, and so on. Let us pray that such a daring and creative example of the Early Church leaders will inspire and encourage our Church to follow its example in the process of discerning and making courageous decisions when required to make the Church and its voice ever relevant to people today.



CHAPTER FOUR: AN ECCLESIAL DREAM—continued



65. Any project for growth in the Christian life needs to be centred continually on this message, for "all Christian formation consists of entering more deeply into the kenggaa". The fundamental response to this message, when it leads to a personal of

kerygma". The fundamental response to this message, when it leads to a personal encounter with the Lord, is fraternal charity, "the new commandment, the first and the greatest of the commandments, and the one that best identifies us as Christ's disciples". Indeed, the kerygma and fraternal charity constitute the great synthesis of the whole

best identifies us as Christ's disciples". Indeed, the kerygma and fraternal charity constitute the great synthesis of the whole content of the Gospel, to be proclaimed unceasingly in the Amazon region. That is what shaped the lives of the great evangelizers of Latin America, like Saint Turibius of Mogrovejo or Saint Joseph of Anchieta.

Inculturation

66. As she perseveres in the preaching of the kerygma, the Church also needs to grow in the Amazon region. In doing so, she constantly reshapes her identity through listening and dialogue with the people, the realities and the history of the lands in which she finds herself. In this way, she is able to engage increasingly in a necessary process of inculturation that rejects nothing of the goodness that already exists in Amazonian cultures, but brings it to fulfilment in the light of the Gospel. Nor does she scorn the richness of Christian wisdom handed down through the centuries, presuming to ignore the history in which God has worked in many ways. For the Church has a varied face, "not only in terms of space... but also of time". Here we see the authentic Tradition of the Church, which is not a static deposit or a museum piece, but the root of a constantly growing tree. This millennial Tradition bears witness to God's work in the midst of his people and "is called to keep the flame alive rather than to quard its ashes".

67. Saint John Paul II taught that in proposing the Gospel message, "the Church does not intend to deny the autonomy of culture. On the contrary, she has the greatest respect for it", since culture "is not only an object of redemption and elevation but can also play a role of mediation and cooperation". Addressing indigenous peoples of America, he reminded them that "a faith that does not become culture is a faith not fully accepted, not fully reflected upon, not faithfully lived". Cultural challenges invite the Church to maintain "a watchful and critical attitude", while at the same time showing "confident attention". If undergoes a process of reception that enriches her with the fruits of what the Spirit has already mysteriously sown in that culture. 68. Here I would reiterate what I stated about inculturation in the Apostolic Exhortation Evangelii Gaudium, based on the conviction that "grace supposes culture, and God's gift becomes flesh in the culture of those who receive it".[91] We can see that it involves a double movement. On the one hand, a fruitful process takes place when the Gospel takes root in a given place, for "whenever a community receives the message of salvation, the Holy Spirit enriches its culture with the transforming power of the Gospel".[92] On the other hand, the Church herself undergoes a process of reception that enriches her with the fruits of what the Spirit has already mysteriously sown in that culture. In this way, "the Holy Spirit adorns the Church, showing her new aspects of revelation and giving her a new face".[93] In the end, this means allowing and encouraging the inexhaustible riches of the Gospel to be preached "in categories proper to each culture, creating a new synthesis with that particular culture".[94]

Pope Francis' Prayer to Mary during the coronavirus pandemic


O Mary, you always shine on our path as a sign of salvation and of hope.
