

FROM POPE FRANCIS CHAPTER TWO

In his adolescence and youth, Jesus' relationship with the Father was that of the beloved Son. Drawn to the Father, he grew up concerned for his affairs: "Did vou not know that I must be about my Father's business?" (Lk 2:49). Still, it must not be



thought that Jesus was a withdrawn adolescent or a selfabsorbed youth. His relationships were those of a young person who shared fully in the life of his family and his people. He learned his father's trade and then replaced him as a carpenter. At one point in the Gospel he is called "the carpenter's son" (Mt 13:55) and another time simply "the carpenter" (Mk 6:3). This detail shows that he was just another young person of his town, who related normally to others. No one regarded him as unusual or set apart from others. For this very reason, once Jesus began to preach, people could not imagine where he got this wisdom: "Is this not Joseph's son?" (Lk 4:22).

In fact, "Jesus did not grow up in a narrow and stifling relationship with Mary and Joseph, but readily interacted with the wider family, the relatives of his parents and their friends". [8] Hence we can understand why, when he returned from his pilgrimage to Jerusalem, his parents readily thought that, as a twelve-vear-old boy (cf. Lk 2:42), he was wandering freely among the crowd, even though they did not see him for an entire day: "supposing him to be in the group of travellers, they went a day's journey" (Lk 2:44). Surely, they assumed, Jesus was there, mingling with the others, joking with other young people, listening to the adults tell stories and sharing the joys and sorrows of the group. Indeed, the Greek word that Luke uses to describe the group – synodía – clearly evokes a larger "community on a journey" of which the Holy Family is a part. Thanks to the trust of his parents, Jesus can move freely and learn to journey with others.

REFLECTION - Trinity Sunday

For some, referring to God as "she" may sound strange however there are biblical passages that do desribe God in feminine terms. Isaiah 42:14 and 49:14-15 are just two examples. In the New Testament, St Paul says in Acts 17:28-29 that we live, move and exist in God because we are his children. Although Paul refers to God with a masculine pronoun in this passage, he seems to be clearly speaking about us being in God's womb because only a child in its mother's womb lives, moves and exists in someone else.

Notice that today's Gospel refers to the Holy Spirit as "he". Despite this, the Spirit is the most feminine of the persons of the Blessed Trinity. Because this assertion may sound radical, we definitely need to explain it.

Although the Old Testament does not use the term "Holy Spirit," it does contain many references to the "Spirit of God." Although the Jews did not understand this term to mean the same thing we mean when we speak about the Holy Spirit, it is the foundation for our own teaching about the third person of

Therefore, the way the Old Testament uses this term can shed some light on who the Holy Spirit really is.

The Hebrew words for "Spirit of God are ruah Yahweh. Ruah is a form of the word ruach, a Hebrew word that is feminine not only in gender but also in use. Since Hebrew is the language of the Old Testament, this indicates it would be proper to call the Holy Spirit "she".

The Old Testament sometimes also refers to God's Spirit as the Wisdom of God. Sophia, the Greek word for wisdom, is another feminine word. By Jesus' day, the Jews translated their Scripture (our Old Testament) into Greek and Jesus often quoted passages from this Greek translation. Therefore, Jesus and the apostles also would have been familiar with this feminine image of the Holy Spirit.

Although the above observations are interesting, they will probably not be enough to convince people to change the pronoun they use for the Holy Spirit. However, these examples should make it easier to respect those people whose mental image of God is perhaps different from your

For reflection:

Jesus tells us the Spirit will quide us to the truth. Pray that the Spirit will help you to truthfully assess the condition of your relationship with God and to see how that relationship can improve.

Formation for parish communities on our Liturgical celebrations

Postures and Gestures during Mass

Our different postures and gestures during Mass are intended to help us direct our minds and hearts more intently towards what we are celebrating.

While some of the gestures of Mass have fallen into disuse. one that has not been lost is the gesture prior to the proclamation of the gospel.

Once the priest announces the gospel reading, we sign ourselves with the cross three times; once each on the forehead, lips and chest, as we say (or sing) the response, "Glory to you, O Lord." Signing ourselves with the cross three times, serves as a prayer or petition in itself. Through signing ourselves with the cross we ask that the word of Christ be always in our minds, on our lips, and in our hearts. In other words, we pray that all that we say and do in our lives may make the gospel of Jesus something very real for us today. Posture is also an important part of the Liturgy of the Word. During the Introductory Rites we stand, united as the Body of Christ that has been gathered and formed to share in the ultimate act of thanksgiving that is the celebration of the Eucharist. Standing is also the typical posture for any time that the assembly prays during the liturgy, and the Introductory Rites include several different forms of prayer.

For the 1st and 2nd readings, as well as the responsorial psalm, we sit and listen to the Word of God. The role of the assembly has changed here from praying, to listening to the scripture proclamations. We stand again for the gospel, but not because we resume the role of praying. We stand because the gospel is the high point of the Liturgy of the Word. God speaks to us through all of the readings, but Christ is particularly made present to us through the proclamation of the gospel. The introduction to the Lectionary for Mass (book of readings) reminds us that "Christ himself is the centre and fullness of all of Scripture, as he his the entire liturgy" (article 5). Standing for the gospel is a sign and acknowledgement of the particular importance of the gospel both in the celebration of Mass, and in our lives as Christians.
