

Pope at Audience: Recognize human dignity in every person

Pope Francis, continuing his catechesis on the effects of the current pandemic in light of the Church's social doctrine, noted how Covid-19 has highlighted how vulnerable and interconnected everyone is. "If we do not take care of one another, starting with the least, with those who are most impacted, including creation", he said, "we cannot heal the world."

Christian love of neighbour amid pandemic

Speaking from the Apostolic Library, the Pope commended the efforts of so many people "who have been offering evidence of human and Christian love for neighbour, dedicating themselves to the sick even at the risk of their own health."

But, he pointed out, "the coronavirus is not the only disease to be fought, but rather, the pandemic has shed light on the broadest social ills." One of these, he continued, is "a distorted view of the person, a gaze that ignores his or her dignity and relational character."

Throw-away culture

Pope Francis went on to say that at times others are seen as objects to be "used and discarded." In reality, he said, "this type of gaze blinds and fosters an individualistic and aggressive throw-away culture, which transforms the human being into a consumer good".

But if we are guided by faith, noted the Pope, we recognize God creates men and women, not as objects, "but as people loved and capable of loving, in His image and likeness."

The dignity of the human person

Pope Francis underlined that Jesus proposes a life of service and of giving one's life for others, "and He confirms it by immediately restoring sight to two blind men and making them His disciples." "We want to recognize the human dignity in every person, whatever his or her race may be," he said.

The Pope continued on this theme by saying that the Second Vatican Council emphasizes that this dignity is inalienable because it "was created 'to the image of God.'" In modern culture, he pointed out, "the reference closest to the principle of the inalienable dignity of the person is the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which Saint John Paul II defined as a 'milestone on the long and difficult path of the human race.'"

The power of faith

While the world awaits a cure to the coronavirus, Pope Francis stressed that "faith exhorts us to commit ourselves seriously and actively to combat indifference in the face of violations of human dignity; faith always requires us to let ourselves be healed and to convert from our individualism, both personal and collective."

May the Lord "restore our sight", the Pope said, "so as to rediscover what it means to be members of the human family."



Pope at Angelus: Gospel calls us to trusting abandonment to God

In his Angelus reflection on the readings from Sunday's Mass, Pope Francis said the Gospel account of Jesus walking on the water "is a call to abandon ourselves trustingly to God in every moment of our life, especially in moments of trial and fear."

The Gospel tells how Jesus, walking on the water in the midst of a storm, calls Peter to come to him on the water. Peter takes a few steps, but becomes frightened and begins to sink. He calls to Jesus, "Lord, save me!" and "Jesus grasps him by the hand and says to him, 'O man of little faith, why did you doubt?'"

Jesus, the strong and faithful hand of the Father
Pope Francis said, "When we have strong feelings of doubt and fear and we seem to be sinking, we must not be ashamed to cry out, like Peter: 'Lord, save me'."

Pope Francis said that this prayer is like knocking on God's heart and Jesus's heart. "We can repeat it many times," he said.

The Pope then invited us to contemplate Jesus's action: "Jesus is the Father's hand, who never abandons us, the strong and faithful hand of the Father, who always and only wants what is good for us."

God, the Pope said, recalling the Old Testament reading, is not in "the hurricane, the fire, the earthquake," but rather comes to us in "the light breeze, that never imposes itself, but asks to be heard."

The Pope reminded us that God knows how weak our faith is, and how difficult our journey is. "But He is the Risen One, the Lord who went through death in order to lead us back to safety. Even before we begin to seek Him, He is present beside us."

The boat, the image of the Church

In the Gospel story, the Pope said, "the boat at the mercy of the storm is the image of the Church, which in every age encounters headwinds, very harsh trials at times." He noted in particular "certain long and persistent persecutions" in the twentieth century, and added "and even today in certain places".

In such times, he continued, the Church "may be tempted to think God has abandoned her." However, he said, "it is precisely in those moments that the witness of faith, the witness of love, the witness of hope

At the age of 72, Abram was asked by God to leave his homeland, move to another land, change his name to become Abraham, and begin the father of God's chosen people, known as Israel (cf. Gen 20.17).

This well-documented history has been the pride of the Israelites, since there is no any nation on earth given such a privilege from God, and they have every right to be proud of it for sure. However, it became too much when some of them came to this extreme to claim that the Messiah would come to save Jewish people alone, and hence they inclined to look down upon non-Jewish people, meaning the

pagan or the outsiders, and the Canaanite lady in the Gospel narrative this Sunday obviously belonged to such a group of people.

Despite the exclusive view from his Jewish followers, and even his disciples that he should be sent 'only to the lost sheep of the House of Israel', and throw no children' food 'to the house-dogs', Jesus managed to free Himself from its confinement, and granted the pagan lady what she was looking for, it was the healing for her daughter from a mental illness, which she thought as tormented by a devil.

This miracle probably aims to send out a profound message about the universal dimension of Jesus' saving mission, which means that though born at Bethlehem in the land of Israel, the Son of God was sent to save people of all nations and races, not just the Israelites.

Let us give praise and thanks to our good Lord for calling us to join his universal family, and pray that we may be more open, and more inclusive in our witnessing role to bring Jesus to others around us.

FROM POPE FRANCIS
CHAPTER ONE— A SOCIAL DREAM



11. There is no need for me to repeat here the ample diagnoses presented before and during the Synod. Yet let us at least listen to one of the voices that was heard: "We are being affected by the timber merchants, ranchers and other third parties. Threatened by economic actors who import a model alien to our territories. The timber industries enter the territory in order to exploit the forest, whereas we protect the forest for the sake of our children, for there we have meat, fish, medicinal plants, fruit trees... The construction of hydroelectric plants and the project of waterways has an impact on the river and on the land... We are a region of stolen territories".

12. My predecessor **Benedict XVI** condemned "the devastation of the environment and the Amazon basin, and the threats against the human dignity of the peoples living in that region". [6] I would add that many of these tragic situations were related to a false "mystique of the Amazon". It is well known that, ever since the final decades of the last century, the Amazon region has been presented as an enormous empty space to be filled, a source of raw resources to be developed, a wild expanse to be domesticated. None of this recognizes the rights of the original peoples; it simply ignores them as if they did not exist, or acts as if the lands on which they live do not belong to them. Even in the education of children and young people, the indigenous were viewed as intruders or usurpers. Their lives, their concerns, their ways of struggling to survive were of no interest. They were considered more an obstacle needing to be eliminated than as human beings with the same dignity as others and possessed of their own acquired rights.

13. Certain slogans contributed to this mistaken notion, including the slogan "Don't give it away!", [7] as if this sort of takeover could only come from other countries, whereas in fact local powers, using the excuse of development, were also party to agreements aimed at razing the forest – together with the life forms that it shelters – with impunity and indiscriminately. The original peoples often witnessed helplessly the destruction of the natural surroundings that enabled them to be nourished and kept healthy, to survive and to preserve a way of life in a culture which gave them identity and meaning. The imbalance of power is enormous; the weak have no means of defending themselves, while the winners take it all, and "the needy nations grow more destitute, while the rich nations become even richer".

14. The businesses, national or international, which harm the Amazon and fail to respect the right of the original peoples to the land and its boundaries, and to self-determination and prior consent, should be called for what they are: *injustice and crime*. When certain businesses out for quick profit appropriate lands and end up privatizing even potable water, or when local authorities give free access to the timber companies, mining or oil projects, and other businesses that raze the forests and pollute the environment, economic relationships are unduly altered and become an instrument of death. They frequently resort to utterly unethical means such as penalizing protests and even taking the lives of indigenous peoples who oppose projects, intentionally setting forest fires, and suborning politicians and the indigenous people themselves. All this accompanied by grave violations of human rights and new forms of slavery affecting women in particular, the scourge of drug trafficking used as a way of subjecting the indigenous peoples, or human trafficking that exploits those expelled from their cultural context. We cannot allow globalization to become "a new version of colonialism".
