FIRST READING

A reading from the prophet Isaiah 5:1-7

Let me sing to my friend the song of his love for his vineyard. My friend had a vineyard on a fertile hillside. He dug the soil, cleared it of stones, and planted choice vines in it. In the middle he built a tower, he dug a press there too. He expected it to yield grapes, but sour grapes were all that it gave. And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah I ask you to judge between my vineyard and me. What could I have done for my vineyard that I have not done? I expected it to yield grapes. Why did it yield sour grapes instead? Very well, I will tell you what I am going to do to my vineyard: I will take away its hedge for it to be grazed on, and knock down its wall for it to be trampled on. I will lay it waste, unpruned, undug; overgrown by the briar and the thorn. I will command the clouds to rain no rain on it. Yes, the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the House of Israel, and the men of Judah that chosen plant. He expected justice, but found bloodshed, integrity, but only a cry of distress.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 21:33-43

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people, 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a land-owner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. "They will respect my son," he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures: It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone. This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see?

'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'


All-powerful God, you are present in the whole universe



Pope at Angelus: 'a true Christian chooses good over evil everyday' By Vatican News

Pope Francis on Sunday reminded believers that Christian life is not made up of dreams or beautiful aspirations, but of concrete actions, the capacity to open ourselves to God's will and to love our brothers and sisters.

The Pope was addressing the faithful gathered in St. Peter's Square for the Angelus Prayer.

He took his cue from the Gospel reading (Mt 21: 28-32) that recounts the parable of two sons who are invited by their father to go and work in the vineyard. The first son impulsively responds "no", but then he repents and goes. Instead, the second son, immediately replies "yes", but does not do so. "Obedience does not consist of saying "yes" or "no", but of acting, of cultivating the vineyard, of bringing about the Kingdom of God," he said.

Christianity is not an external facade

This parable, the Pope explained, teaches us that the Lord asks us to go beyond a religion that is made up of external and habitual practice which does not affect people's lives and attitudes.

He went on to say that the exponents of this "façade" of religiosity, of which Jesus disapproves, are "the chief priests and the elders of the people", who, according to the Lord's admonition, will be preceded in the Kingdom of God by "tax collectors and prostitutes." This does not mean, he continued, that Jesus indicates publicans - sinners - and prostitutes as models of life, but as "privileged of Grace", which "God offers to anyone who opens up and converts to Him."

"Indeed, these people, listening to his preaching, repented and changed their lives," he said.

God is patient

The Pope assured the faithful that while God asks us to convert, He is patient with us: "He does not tire, He does not desist after our "no"; He leaves us free even to distance ourselves from Him and to make mistakes. But He anxiously awaits our "yes", so as to welcome us anew in His fatherly arms and to fill us with His boundless mercy."

Faith in God, he continued, asks us "to renew every day the choice of good over evil, the choice of the truth rather than lies, the choice of love for our neighbour over selfishness."

Quoting from Luke he said those who convert to this choice, will be the first to find place in the Kingdom of heaven, "where there is greater joy for a single sinner who converts than for ninety-nine righteous people."

The grace of conversion

The Pope also pointed out that conversion is a painful process "of purification from moral encrustations." It is a path, he added, in which there is renunciation and sacrifice. Today's Gospel passage, he said, calls into question the way of living a Christian life that must consist of concrete actions and commitments and love for the other.

Pope Francis concluded invoking the Most Holy Mary to help us to be docile to the actions of the Holy Spirit "who melts the hardness of hearts and disposes them to repentance so we may obtain the life and salvation promised by Jesus."

Pope prays for those who are forced to flee their homes on World Day of Migrants and Refugees By Robin Gomes

Pope Francis on Sunday marked the World Day of Migrants and Refugees held each year on the last Sunday of September. Addressing the faithful gathered in the Vatican for the Sunday Angelus, he had special greetings for migrants and refugees in St. Peter's Square and said he is praying for them and for all those who assist them.

He also turned his attention to the bronze sculpture in the Square entitled "Angels Unawares" and explained that in this Message for the World Day this year he has highlighted the plight of Internally Displaced People whom, he said, "are forced to flee just like Jesus and his family."

The Caritas confederation of Catholic charities worldwide has joined Pope Francis in echoing the cry of the world's internally displaced people (IDPs) for justice, dignified life and safe return home.

Caritas Internationalis reiterated its call as the Catholic Church marks World Day of Migrants and Refugees on Sunday, September 27. Making use of the annual observance to draw attention to the often forgotten tragedy of internally displaced people (IDPs), it urged governments to provide unconditional access to basic services and a dignified and safe return home for all internally displaced people around the world.

Pope's call

The Catholic Church has designated the last Sunday of September as World Day of Migrants and Refugees. "Forced like Jesus Christ to flee" is the theme that Pope Francis chose for the 106th edition of the annual observance this year.

In a message for the occasion in May, the Holy Father called for attention and new policies for the world's growing number of internally displaced people (IDPs). He said he embraced all who are suffering precariousness, abandonment, marginalization and rejection as a result of Covid-19. The cause of migrants and refugees has been a salient feature of the pontificate of the 83-year old pontiff.

IDP's cry for justice

Taking up the call of Pope Francis, Caritas Internationalis Secretary General, Aloysius John said, "On this special day, we want to echo their cry for justice by calling for immediate and timely action." He said that throughout the world, Caritas has been in constant and direct contact with those living the dramatic situation of being displaced in their own countries. They are people left all on their own, deprived of conventional legal protection.

According to the Global Report by the Internal Displacement Monitoring Centre, 45.7 million people were internally displaced as a result of conflict and disasters in 61 countries and territories around the world by the end of 2019.

Refugees and IDP status

He explained that unlike refugees, who are granted international protection, IDPs don't benefit from a high level of legal international protection, because they remain within the borders of their own countries.

John said, "They are victims of undemocratic political systems and environmental disorder which leads to hunger, war and violence." "They are among the most vulnerable people on the planet yet they are denied their basic right to live a dignified life."

IDP children, especially young girls, and women, he said, are even more vulnerable and are often objects of exploitation, abuse and sexual violence.

Addressing root causes

Caritas Internationalis noted that many situations of internal displacement have become protracted because the root causes of forced displacement have not been addressed or remain unresolved, such as in the conflict situations of Syria, Colombia and Ukraine. People have also been internally displaced as a result of natural disasters and famines such as in Somalia, Burkina Faso, Mali and the Philippines, or due to climate change, where continuing conditions of insecurity prevent forcibly internally displaced people from returning home.

Governments, international community

"We cannot continue to close our eyes to this tragedy," John said, urging "governments and the international community to take immediate action for internally displaced people." Caritas particularly called on them to ensure that internally displaced people have unconditional access to basic needs - such as food and water - and services, thus enabling them to live a dignified life, especially at this time of COVID-19 pandemic. It urged them to ensure a safe and dignified return to their homes for those who want and can return. It also appealed for a "global ceasefire, in order to suspend the conflicts that are among the main causes that force internally displaced people to flee".

This is the third Sunday in a row we have the vineyard as the principal theme in a series of Jesus' talks about the Kingdom of God.

If one wonders why Jesus seemed to hold dearly to his teaching the vineyard concept, a study of the first reading from the prophet Isaiah this Sunday would give us the key to unlock the secret. Isaiah used the viticultural language to denote the relationship between God and the Israelites, and even called the people of Israel 'the vineyard of the Lord of hosts' as we hear in the last part of the reading. Though expected to yield good grapes of righteousness and faithfulness to God, its owner, it produced only sour grapes of idolatry and unfaithfulness.

A return to the book of Genesis might even surprise us with the long and well-documented history of viticulture with a passage presenting to us Noah as the first vineyard cultivator and winemaker who got drunk from the wine he made to the point of lying down with nothing on in his tent and found later on by his sons. What happened next was no less fascinating, and I think I'd better leave the rest for you to go to the Bible and find out (cf. Gen 9.18-28).

Jesus perhaps was well aware of these vineyard-related passages of the Hebrew Scripture, which, of course, were also popular to his audience, particularly the educated group of the chief priests and the elders as we see in the Gospel today. Here Jesus picked up the traditional element of the vineyard understood by his listeners as the symbol of Israel in relation to God, and added on his new elements of the tenants representing Jewish people, the servants representing the prophets sent to Jewish people by God, the vineyard owner and his son representing Jesus himself.

Reading this story between the lines, one can see both a well-documented indictment of the crimes committed by his listeners' ancestors against the prophets of old, and a repeat of history, which was about to be unfolded through his coming Passion and death.

Jesus then sent them a very stern warning to let them know that they shall be held accountable for those horrible acts of theirs through the termination of their working contract and the reception of a wretched fate, and on the other hand, a new vineyard-working lease shall be arranged for new batch of tenants, symbolising us Christians, those who follow Jesus, the Son of God and are entrusted with the kingdom-building task refused by the first tenants, God's original chosen people.

Let us give praise and thanks to God for the opportunity to be part of His vineyard, the Church, and pray that we may be able to work hard and produce sweet grapes of good and exemplary works for the Lord as expected.

FROM POPE FRANCIS
CHAPTER TWO— ENDANGERED CULTURES, PEOPLES AT RISK

39. The globalized economy shamelessly damages human, social and cultural richness. The disintegration of families that comes about as a result of forced migrations affects the transmission of values, for “the family is and has always been the social institution that has most contributed to keeping our cultures alive”. Furthermore, “faced with a colonizing invasion of means of mass communication”, there is a need to promote for the original peoples “alternative forms of communication based on their own languages and cultures” and for “the indigenous subjects themselves [to] become present in already existing means of communication”.

40. In any project for the Amazon region, “there is a need to respect the rights of peoples and cultures and to appreciate that the development of a social group presupposes an historical process which takes place within a cultural context and demands the constant and active involvement of local people from within their own culture. Nor can the notion of the quality of life be imposed from without, for quality of life must be understood within the world of symbols and customs proper to each human group”. If the ancestral cultures of the original peoples arose and developed in intimate contact with the natural environment, then it will be hard for them to remain unaffected once that environment is damaged.

This leads us to the next dream.
