



"Fratelli tutti": short summary of Pope Francis' Social Encyclical: Conclusion By Isabella Piro

Blessed Charles de Foucauld, "the universal brother"

The Encyclical concludes by remembering Martin Luther King, Desmond Tutu, Mahatma Gandhi and above all Blessed Charles de Foucauld, a model for everyone of what it means to identify with the least in order to become "the universal brother" (286-287).

The last lines of the Document are given to two prayers: one "to the Creator" and the other an "Ecumenical Christian Prayer", so that the heart of mankind may harbour "a spirit of fraternity".

Pope at audience: Psalms lead to adore God and love His children

Pope Francis began Wednesday's General taking into account the rising numbers of Covid-19 infections worldwide, including in Italy. Even though he would like to come close to those attending the audience, he cannot do so because of the danger of contagion for all. "I am sorry to do this but it is for your safety," he said. Hence instead of shaking hands, he suggested to those present that they greet each other at a distance, but assured they were close to his heart.

The Pope then said his attention had been caught during the reading of the Bible passage at the start of the catechesis by a mother in the crowd who was cuddling her crying child. He said, "this is what God does with us, like that mamma." These beautiful images of a mother's tenderness, the Pope said, are the image of the Church, the symbol of God's tenderness for us. Hence, he said, "Never silence a crying baby in Church, never, because it is the voice that attracts God's tenderness." Pope Francis then began the second and final catechesis on the Psalms in his series on prayer. The Psalms, he says, "help us not to fall into the temptation of the 'wicked', that is, of living, and perhaps also of praying, as if God does not exist, and as if the poor do not exist".

Seeing reality with God's eyes

Instead, the Pope explains, the prayer of the Psalms are a fundamental reality of life, because the reference to the absolute, the transcendent, which the spiritual masters call the "holy fear of God", makes us completely human. Prayer, he says, prevents us from venturing into life in a "predatory and voracious manner."

However, the Pope warns against "false prayer" which calls for the admiration of others or to show off the latest fashion, which Jesus Himself admonishes against. Rather, the true spirit of prayer in the heart "allows us to contemplate reality with God's very eyes".

The Pope also warns against tiring and rote prayer like a parrot. Rather, prayer should be the centre of life, from the heart. "If there is prayer, even a brother, a sister, even an enemy, becomes important," he says, adding, "those who adore God, love His children. Those who respect God, respect human beings."

Prayer, the Holy Father continued, should not be regarded as a "sedative that alleviates life's anxieties", which is not a Christian form of prayer. "Rather, prayer makes each of us responsible," as we see in the "Our Father" that Jesus taught His disciples.

Prayer holds temple and world together

The psalter, the Pope notes, often "bring out the scars of existence." Yet these prayers, even the most intimate and personal ones, were first used in the Temple, and then in the synagogues. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* says that the Psalms "take shape both in the liturgy of the Temple and in the human heart" (n. 2588). Thus, personal prayer is nourished "first by the prayer of the people of Israel, then by the prayer of the Church."

"Even the Psalms in the first person singular," are a "collective patrimony," the Pope says, "to the point of being prayed by everyone and for everyone". The prayer of the Christian has the "breath" and spiritual "tension" of holding the "temple and the world together."

"Prayer," Pope Francis explains, "can begin in the penumbra of a church's nave, but can come to an end on the city streets." "And vice versa, it can blossom during the day's activities and reach its fulfilment in the liturgy." Thus, he says, the church doors let everyone's groans in.

Hence, the Pope stresses, the world is always present in the prayer of the psalms. They assure the divine promise of salvation for the weakest, warn against the danger of worldly riches or open the horizon to God's view of history.

Love of God and neighbour

"In short," the Pope says, "where there is God, the human person must be there as well." This is not because "we love, but because He first loved us". Pope Francis quotes 1 John who says "if anyone claims he loves God and hates his brother, he is a liar, for if one does not love his brother whom he or she has seen, cannot love God whom he has not seen."

The Pope further explains that God does not support the "atheism" of those who repudiate the divine image that is "imprinted in every human being." Believing in God while distancing others and hating them, the Pope said, is practical atheism. "It is a sacrilege, an abomination, the worst offense that can be directed toward the temple and the altar."

Pope Francis concludes his catechesis saying the Psalms prevent us from falling into the temptation of "living, and perhaps also of praying, as if God does not exist, and as if the poor do not exist".

Pope Francis: 'No one is saved alone'

Pope Francis set the tone of his speech on Tuesday by recalling the historic Assisi Meeting desired by Saint Pope John Paul II on 27 October 1986, in which for the first time in Church history the Pope invited leaders of other religions to join him in prayer for peace for the human family.

That meeting, he said, contained a prophetic seed "that by God's grace has gradually matured through unprecedented encounters, acts of peacemaking and fresh initiatives of fraternity."

He noted that since that Meeting many painful events have taken place, at times in the name of religion, but that we also acknowledge the fruitful steps undertaken since then in interreligious dialogue.

"This is a sign of hope that encourages us to continue cooperating as brothers and sisters," he said, recalling the *Document on Human Fraternity for World Peace and Living Together*, which he signed with the Grand Imam of Al-Azhar, Ahmad Al-Tayyeb, in 2019.

Pope Francis also referred to his just-released encyclical, *Fratelli tutti*, in which he reiterates that "the commandment of peace is inscribed in the depths of the religious traditions."

Religions at the service of peace and fraternity

"Believers have understood that religious differences do not justify indifference or enmity. Rather, on the basis of our religious faith we are enabled to become peacemakers, rather than standing passively before the evil of war and hatred," he said. For this reason, he continued, this gathering is an encouragement "to religious leaders and to all believers to pray fervently for peace, never resigned to war, but working with the gentle strength of faith to end conflicts."

"We need peace! More peace! We cannot remain indifferent," the Pope appealed, noting that the world has a profound thirst for peace.

Indifference and the pandemic aggravating the evil of war

In many countries, people are suffering due to wars, he said, and there is the risk that in political life and public opinion we grow inured to the evil of war as if it were simply a part of human history.

Quoting again from *Fratelli tutti*, the Pope said "Let us not remain mired in theoretical discussions, but touch the wounded flesh of the victims... Let us think of the refugees and displaced, those who suffered the effects of atomic radiation or chemical attacks, the mothers who lost their children, and the boys and girls maimed or deprived of their childhood".

All this pain, he continued, is aggravated by the suffering caused by the coronavirus and the impossibility, in many countries, of access to necessary care.

Peace is the priority of all politics

The Pope said those who hold political responsibilities have the solemn duty, before God, to put an end to war: "Peace is the priority of all politics."

He recalled the words Jesus spoke to Peter: "Put your sword back into its place; for all who take the sword will perish by the sword." He added that those who perpetrate violence possibly, but erroneously, believe that it will resolve difficult situations quickly.

"Enough!" was Jesus' unambiguous response to any form of violence, the Pope said, highlighting how "That single word of Jesus echoes through the centuries and reaches us forcefully in our own time: enough of swords, weapons, violence and war!"

We can only be saved together

Pope Francis said the dream of all men and women of goodwill is for a world rid of every war. But how do we go about, he asked, achieving this dream?

"No people, no social group, can *single-handedly* achieve peace, prosperity, security and happiness," he said, noting that the lesson learned from the coronavirus pandemic is "the awareness that we are a global community, all in the same boat, where one person's problems are the problems of all."

"Once more we realized that no one is saved alone; we can only be saved together." (cf. Fratelli tutti, 32).

All of us, the Pope said, peoples, communities, government leaders and international organizations must realise that we are a single human family and that "we can only be saved together through encounter and negotiation, setting aside our conflicts and pursuing reconciliation, moderating the language of politics and propaganda, and developing true paths of peace (cf. *Fratelli tutti*, 231).

Pope Francis concluded his speech noting that all the persons of different religious traditions, gathered together at the Capitoline Hill, are sending a message of peace: "To show clearly that the religions do not want war and, indeed, disown those who would enshrine violence."

And asking everyone to pray for reconciliation and to strive to enable fraternity to pave new paths of hope, he expressed his firm belief that "With God's help, it will be possible to build a world of peace, and thus to be saved together."

In 1972 when I was in year 8 in the seminary, a newly ordained priest from my parish was assigned to join the seminary staff, and began to introduce to us the concept of Agape meal, which he translated literally into Vietnamese as 'fraternal meal.'

Despite the priest's enthusiasm when talked about it, just like he has found 'a new world', I took little notice of it, and showed little interest in it. Not much I remember about what he presented nearly sixty years ago, but I can never forget his excitement about this topic.

Perhaps to show my repentance for my ignorance of old, I do some research for you this week about the Agape meal, since it has something to do with the first reading and the Gospel story this Sunday.

Please note that the Greek word Agape was always Jesus' choice of word when he talked about love throughout all the four Gospels. It is the highest form of love, different to the one we offer each other as family members or friends, and you can call it charity if you like.

Early Christians used to prepare a community meal after each Eucharist, which they called Agape, a 'love feast' meant to highlight both the divine and human love through liturgy and fellowship, and had become very popular by the end of the second century according to Tertullian in Apology 39, Clement of Alexandria in Paedagogue 2.1, and Hippolytus in Apostolic Tradition 26.1-2. This Christian tradition was gradually phased out in the Church after that for unknown reasons, perhaps it was not practical when the Church began to grow bigger and bigger, until rediscovered by fathers of the Vatican II Council in their ressourcement effort, meaning their creative return to Church early sources.

In the Gospel today we see how Jesus, in his response to the Pharisees' question about the greatest commandment of the Law, highlights the heart of his entire teachings, which is about his dual commandment of love, meaning the love of God and the love of people, seen as his interpretation of the Ten Commandments and also of the Jewish oral tradition mentioned in the first reading.

Let us pray today for all Christians throughout the world to remain authentic to their name by the way they show their 'agape' both to God and to others around them, genuine, generous and unconditional.

46. Popular poets, enamoured of its immense beauty, have tried to express the



feelings this river evokes and the life that it bestows as it passes amid a dance of dolphins, anacondas, trees and canoes. Yet they also lament the dangers that menace it. Those poets, contemplatives and prophets, help free us from the technocratic and consumerist paradigm that destroys

nature and robs us of a truly dignified existence:

The world is suffering from its feet being turned into rubber, its legs into leather, its body into cloth and its head into steel... The world is suffering from its trees being turned into rifles, its ploughshares into tanks, as the image of the sower scattering seed yields to the tank with its flamethrower, which sows only deserts. Only poetry, with its humble voice, will be able to save this world".

The cry of the Amazon region

The river is a cord enclosing animals and trees.


If pulled too tight, the river could burst.


It could burst and spatter our faces with water and blood".




