



POPE FRANCIS'S INTERVIEW ON THE WAY BACK TO ROME AFTER HIS IRAQ TRIP (final)

I wanted to know how you felt from the helicopter seeing the destroyed city of Mosul and then praying in the ruins of a church. If I may, since it's Women's Day, I wanted to ask a little question about women as well. You supported the women in Qaraqosh with very beautiful words, but what do you think about the fact that a Muslim woman in love cannot marry a Christian without being discarded by her family or worse?

"Of Mosul I said a little "en passant" what I felt. I stopped in front of the destroyed church, I had no words. Unbelievable, unbelievable... Not only that church but other churches, even a destroyed mosque. You can tell [the perpetrators] didn't agree with these people. Unbelievable our human cruelty. Right now, I don't want to say the word, we are starting again: look at Africa. And with our experience of Mosul these churches destroyed and everything, it creates enmity, war, and also the so-called Islamic State is starting to act again. This is bad, very bad. One question that came to my mind in the church was this: who sells the weapons to these destroyers? Why don't they make the weapons at home. Yes, they make some explosive devices... But who sells the weapons? Who is responsible? I would at least ask these gun sellers for the honesty to say: we sell guns. They don't say that. It's ugly.

Now women. Women are braver than men, but that has always been the case. But even today women are humiliated, of you showed me the price list for women (prepared by Isis who were buying Christian and Yazidi women, ed). I couldn't believe it: if this is what a woman is like, depending on her age, she costs so much... Women are sold, women are enslaved. Even in the center of Rome, the work against trafficking is an everyday job. During the Jubilee I visited one of the many houses of the Opera Don Benzi. Ransomed girls, one with her ears cut off because she hadn't brought money that day, the other brought from Bratislava in the trunk of a car, a slave, kidnapped. This happens among us, eh! The trafficking of people. In these countries, especially in a part of Africa, there is mutilation as a ritual that must be done. But women are still slaves and we have to fight, struggle, for the dignity of women. They are the ones who carry history forward, this is not an exaggeration, women carry history forward and it is not a compliment because today is Women's Day. Even slavery is like that, the rejection of women... Just think there are places where there is the debate regarding whether repudiation of a wife should be given in writing or only orally. Not even the right to have the act of repudiation! This is happening today, but to keep us from straying, think of what happens in the center of Rome, of the girls who are kidnapped and are exploited. I think I have said it all on this. I wish you a good end to your journey and I ask you to pray for me.

Pope Francis: 'Let us ask for the grace to be amazed' By Vatican news staff writer

For the second year in a row, Pope Francis led the celebration of Palm Sunday inside Saint Peter's Basilica with a limited congregation participating due to the Coronavirus pandemic. At the same time, millions joined the celebration with the customary global television and radio broadcasts and live streaming.

From admiration to amazement

In his homily for the occasion, the Holy Father focused his thoughts around the sense of amazement evoked in today's liturgy and all of Holy Week, since we go from the joy of welcoming Jesus as he enters Jerusalem to the sorrow of seeing him condemned to death and crucified. We hear of the crowds shouting "Hosanna" and a few days later crying out "Crucify him". The Pope said this contrast reflected a reality where people *admired* Jesus, but did not let themselves be *amazed* by him. He said both terms are fundamentally different: *admiration* "can be wordly" since it follows its own likes and expectations, whereas, *amazement* remains open to the wonder of others and the newness they bring, allowing our attitudes and lives to change as a result. We have to go beyond admiring Jesus, the Pope said, and "follow in his footsteps, to let ourselves be challenged by him; to pass from admiration to amazement."

Glory through humiliation

The Lord and his Passover amazes us, as he achieves glory through humiliation, the Pope observed; he triumphs "by accepting suffering and death, things that we, in our quest for admiration and success, would rather avoid." And Jesus did this for us, going to the depths of human experience, existence, and weakness "to draw near to us and not abandon us in our suffering and our death", the Pope said, "to redeem us, to save us". In this way the Lord "redeemed and transformed" our deepest struggles and conflicts, he noted; "God triumphs, but the palm of victory passes through the wood of the cross."

Ask for the grace to be amazed

A faith that no longer experiences a sense of amazement can grow dull, the Pope noted, whereas we should remember to be "astonished and amazed" by the love of Jesus which always brings forgiveness and the possibility of new beginnings. The Pope invited everyone to "lift our eyes to the cross, in order to receive the grace of amazement", to be moved by God's boundless love and let go of our regrets or disappointments that might be trapping us from experiencing it.

"Lord, how much you love me!"

"Let us be amazed by Jesus so that we can start living again" the Pope underscored, and realize that we are loved by Jesus upon whom we gaze on the cross. The grace of amazement helps us also realize that in welcoming the dismissed and discarded who surround us – those ill-treated in life – "we are loving Jesus", the Pope said, "for that is where he is: in the least of our brothers and sisters, in the rejected and discarded."

Truly this man was the Son of God!

The exclamation of the Roman Centurion who upon seeing that Jesus died said: "Truly this man was the Son of God!" is a powerful testimony of his amazement in witnessing the gratuitous and unprecedented love of Jesus, the Pope said. The Gospels mention many others who admired Jesus for his miracles and works, but Christ silenced them, the Pope noted, because they risked embracing only the idea of a God to be adored and feared for his power and might. That understanding must evolve since at the foot of the cross, "God has revealed himself and reigns only with the disarmed and disarming power of love", which is why today, the Pope concluded, "let us be filled with that amazement as we gaze upon the crucified Lord. May we too say: "You are truly the Son of God. You are my God".

Pope Francis: Common efforts needed in education to combat climate change.

Pope Francis sent a message to the participants at the recently-held UNESCO Forum on Biodiversity organized to discuss ideas to shape and fuel a dialogue on environmental challenges and their implications for the world.

The virtual event which took place on 24 March, also marked the official launch of the 50th-anniversary celebrations for the UNESCO Man and the Biosphere (MAB) programme. The forum was attended by prestigious speakers and biodiversity protectors from around the world.

The Pope's message, read by Archbishop Francesco Follo, Permanent Observer of the Holy See to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), was centered around the theme of "Climate change and poverty."

The need for a new development model

Expressing gratitude for the opportunity for discussion presented by the forum, Pope Francis highlighted the importance of the fight against climate change and poverty which he describes as "two complex and interdependent objectives" in light of which it is necessary to redefine a new model of development.

This new model, the Pope explained, is one that places each man and woman, and the whole man at the center "as the fundamental pillar to be respected and protected, while adopting a methodology that integrates the ethics of solidarity and political charity."

Only in this way, he insisted, will it be possible to promote the "truly universal common good and a true civilization of love where there is no place for a pandemic of indifference and waste."

Education to tackle climate warming

Speaking further, the Pope said that it is in this perspective – the same in which the Paris Agreement is inserted – that we are becoming more aware that climate change is "much more a moral than a technical issue" which can only be tackled by investing in "educating new generations on lifestyles that are respectful of creation, which have so far remained unexplored."

"It is particularly important that young people are trained in the safeguarding of creation and respect for others, to be able to engage in the promotion of new production and consumption habits, in order to generate a new model of economic growth that puts the environment and people at the center," the Pope said.

Moreover, the impact of global warming on the poorest people already pushes us to consider the response to the socio-environmental crisis as a unique opportunity to responsibly take charge of the fragility of our common home.

The necessity of joint efforts

Pope Francis added that if we want to effectively combat climate change, "we must act together, taking into account the need to implement a thorough examination of the current development model in order to correct its anomalies and distortions."

"Providing concrete responses to the serious phenomenon of global warming is a moral imperative," he stressed. "Failure to act will have secondary effects, especially among the poorest strata of society, who are also the most vulnerable to these changes."

In this regard, the Holy Father highlighted the crucial importance of the work of UNESCO which is based on the ethical implications of the climate emergency in order to deepen the scientific aspects.

The Pope also underlined the contribution that not only government representatives, but also civil society, the academic and scientific world, local communities and indigenous people can bring to the fight against climate change. He noted that "these non-state actors, often at the forefront of the fight against climate change, show particular sensitivity in the search for innovative ways to promote a sustainable production and consumption system and thus become interpreters of the cry of the earth and the poor."

Concluding, the Holy Father impressed the urgency of joint action, stressing that "time is running out for the search for global solutions and the current health emergency obliges us to "recover our concern for human beings, for everyone, rather than the benefit of a few." He also expressed hope that the forum may "contribute to strengthening the processes of transformation necessary to counteract the phenomenon of climate change and at the same time fight against poverty, thus promoting true integral human development."



FROM FR. HENRY DUC

This weekend, we reach the pinnacle of the Church liturgical life, namely the celebration of Easter, or the commemoration of Jesus' triumphant Resurrection from the dead after days and phrases of preparation for it through Lent and the Holy Week.

Our Easter celebrations begin with the Easter vigil's liturgy, a continuation of a long tradition in the Church, which can be traced back to the very early years of the Church thank to our oral traditions, and especially to the travel diary kept in 383 by Egeria, a Christian lady who made the trip to Jerusalem from Europe around that time.

Egeria gave us an informative account of how Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and the Easter Vigil were celebrated in Jerusalem by local Christians and pilgrims then. According to her, the liturgy known to us now as Easter Vigil originally started in midafternoon on Holy Saturday, with the final preparation for the adult catechumens, and at night fall, all participants kept vigil, while the catechumens were being baptized. Then, all the neophytes joyfully proceeded into the church, where all were waiting for them for the celebration of the Eucharist.

As a whole, the Easter Vigil includes four distinct parts: liturgy of the Light, liturgy of the Word, liturgy of Baptism, and liturgy of the Eucharist, aimed to help us immerse deeper into the history of divine salvation and the Paschal Mystery of Christ in particular.

For our Easter Vigil this year, we are blessed to have Vanessa Moore and Emma Skinner to join our RCIA journey and receive the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and First Holy Communion tonight. We welcome and thank them and their families for enriching us with their living examples and precious presence.

On Easter Sunday, once again, we will have a chance to listen to John's own account of Jesus' Resurrection, first discovered by Mary of Magdala, and carefully checked, investigated and verified by John himself and Peter, who ran to the tomb immediately after Mary broke the news of the empty tomb.

John then sums up all of his feelings and reaction to the incredible scene unfolding right before his eyes in five powerful words, 'he saw and he believed', meant to tell his readers for generations to come that he really eye-witnessed the empty tomb of the Lord, who foretold many times that he was going to resurrect from the dead, and he was convinced that He was true to his words, therefore they should have the peace of mind to trust in what he and his friends talked about the Risen Christ.

Today let us give praise and thanks to God for sending his Son Jesus to open the gate of heaven for us to enter through his death and Resurrection. Pray that the joy and hope of Easter will brighten up our lives, and inspire us all in our call to share the Risen Christ with others in our families, our parish community, our country and our world.
