



POPE URGES INCLUSIVE AND SUSTAINABLE FOOD SYSTEMS

Pope Francis has pledged the support of the Holy See and the Catholic Church for the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) in its "dedication to a more just world, at the service of our defenseless and needy brothers and sisters". He urged special attention for the poor rural food producers, who are more likely to suffer from malnutrition and hunger.

The Pope made the remarks on Monday in a message to Michal Kurtyka, the Polish Minister of Climate and Environment, who is chairing FAO's 42nd Conference at it headquarters in Rome, June 14-18. While reviewing the state of food and agriculture in the world, the virtual session has as its overall theme, "Agriculture Food Systems Transformation: From Strategy to Action".

Creating inclusive and sustainable food systems

FAO coordinates international efforts to defeat hunger and improve nutrition and food security. The Pope said that this task assumes a special prominence during the Covid-19 pandemic, as "many of our brothers and sisters still do not have access to the food they need, either in quantity or quality". Last year, he noted, the number of these people was the highest in the last five years. With conflicts, extreme weather events, economic crises, together with the current health crisis, the future could be worse. Hence, policies capable of tackling the structural causes of these growing vulnerabilities need to be adopted. In this regard, a circular economy, which guarantees resources for all, including future generations, and promotes the use of renewable energies, will help create resilient, inclusive and sustainable food systems that will provide healthy and affordable diets for everyone. However, the fundamental factor in recovering from the crisis that is ravaging us is an economy tailored to mankind, not subject only to profit, but anchored in the common good, friendly to ethics and respectful of the environment.

Farming and rural communities

The reconstruction of post-pandemic economies should take into account the valuable role of family farming and rural communities. The Pope lamented that those who produce food are the ones who suffer from the lack or scarcity of food. "Three-quarters of the world's poor", he said, "live in rural areas and depend primarily on agriculture for their livelihoods". However, due to lack of access to markets, land ownership, financial resources, infrastructure and technologies, they are most vulnerable to food insecurity.

Pope Francis expressed appreciation for the international community's effort to enable individual countries achieve food autonomy while preserving local ecosystems and biodiversity. He urged innovative ways to support and help small producers improve their capacities and resilience.

Fraternity vs virus of indifference

As the world prepares to re-launch after the pandemic, Pope Francis said it is fundamental to promote a culture of care against the individualistic and aggressive tendency to discard, which is very present in our societies. "While a few sow tensions, confrontations and falsehoods", he said, "we, on the other hand, are invited to patiently and decisively build a culture of peace, which is directed towards initiatives that embrace all aspects of human life and help us to reject the virus of indifference".

Pope Francis said mere outlining of programs is not enough. Tangible gestures are needed that have as their point of reference the common belonging to the human family and the fostering of fraternity. Gestures that facilitate the creation of a society that promotes education, dialogue and equity.

He urged that all welcome the current trial as an opportunity to prepare for a future for all without discarding anyone, warning, "without an all-embracing vision, there will be no future for anyone".

The Conference is FAO's supreme governing body whose main functions are to determine the policies of the Organization, approve the budget, and make recommendations to members and international organizations.

POPE FRANCIS AT ANGELUS: DISCOVER THE PResence OF GOD IN OUR LIVES

Speaking to pilgrims gathered in Saint Peter's Square for the Sunday Angelus, Pope Francis reflected on the day's Gospel: the two parables Jesus tells that open up an understanding of the mystery of God and how human events unfold. The parables show us that everyday life, which sometimes may seem monotonous or difficult, is always "inhabited by God's hidden presence", he noted, and it takes our attentive eyes to be able "to seek and find God in all things".

God at work in our lives

Recalling how Jesus compares the Kingdom of God, His presence dwelling in the heart of all things, to the tiny mustard seed which becomes the tallest of trees, Pope Francis noted that is how God works in our lives and the world. The challenge is that our busy lives can sometimes prevent us from seeing this reality - but "God is at work, like a good little seed that silently and slowly germinates" to become "a lush tree, which gives life and rest to everyone". He went on to say that the seeds of our good works may seem small by comparison, "yet all that is good pertains to God", and good "always grows in a humble, hidden, often invisible way".

Discover God's presence

This parable should give us confidence, the Pope said, despite the many times in life when we might be discouraged by thinking, mistakenly, that good is weak and evil is having the last word. At the same time, he said we should not be overcome with doubts either, even if we work hard and the desired results or changes never happen. The Gospel calls on us continually to look at ourselves and reality with eyes wide open that can see beyond appearances and "discover the presence of Gods humble love is always at work in the soil of our life and that of history", the Pope observed, underscoring that with this confidence we have "the strength to go forward every day, patiently, sowing the good that will bear fruit". This attitude and approach is what is needed to recover from the pandemic, he said, the confidence of "being in God's hands" in order to rebuild, start again with "patience and perseverance".

God's action in our lives

The Pope also observed that we need to be aware even in the Church of the "weeds of doubt" seen with the crisis of faith and various projects or initiatives that do not seem to work out. The help here, he said, is to always remember that the results of sowing does not depend on us; rather, "they depend on the action of God" and it is our concern simply "to sow, with love, dedication, patience". The force of the seed is divine, he noted, while the other parable in today's Gospel explains how the farmer sows the seed and is amazed at how it "grows spontaneously, day and night, when he least expects it", showing "there is always hope", even in the most infertile soil.

In conclusion, the Pope prayed that Our Lady, the Lord's humble handmaid, might "teach us to see the greatness of God who works in the little things", to remain hopeful and trusting in Him every day.

POPE FRANCIS AT AUDIENCE: ON THE CROSS JESUS PRAYED FOR EACH OF US

As he concluded his catechetical cycle on prayer – which began over a year ago, in May 2020 – Pope Francis said "the most beautiful thing to remember" is "the grace that we do not only pray, but that, so to speak, we have been 'prayed for,' we have already been received in Jesus's dialogue with the Father, in communion with the Holy Spirit."

Prayer, the Pope said, "is one of the most evident features in Jesus' life... because the dialogue with the Father was the incandescent core of His whole existence."

Core of Christian proclamation

Although Jesus prayed throughout His earthly life, said the Pope, His prayer became even more intense in the days and hours leading to His Passion and Death, the "central core" of the Christian proclamation, which shed light on the whole of Jesus' life. Jesus "was not a philanthropist who took care of human suffering and illness: He was and is much more," the Pope said. Jesus offers us "total salvation, messianic salvation, that gives hope in the definitive victory of life over death."

And so, Pope Francis added, "in the last days of His final Passover, we find Jesus fully emersed in prayer": In the agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, where He confidently addressed God as 'Abba,' Father, a word expressing intimacy and trust; and on the Cross, "obscurely shrouded in the silence of God," where once again He calls on God the Father.

Cross fulfills Father's gift

On the Cross, said Pope Francis, "the gift of the Father is accomplished — who offers love. That is, our salvation is accomplished." When Jesus cried out to God on the Cross, saying, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit," the Pope explained, He offered "everything. Everything is prayer, in the three hours of the Cross."

Jesus' prayer, the Pope said, "is intense, the prayer of Jesus is unique and also becomes the model for our prayer." Pope Francis insisted, "Jesus prayed for everyone, He also prayed for me, for each one of you. Each one of us can say: 'Jesus prayed for me on the Cross.' He prayed. Jesus can say to each one of us: 'I prayed for you, at the Last Supper, and on the wood of the Cross."

We are never alone

Pope Francis said we must "keep this in our heart, we must never forget" that Jesus prayed for each of us personally. "We were willed by Jesus Christ, and even in the hour of his Passion, Death, and Resurrection, everything was offered for us." So, the Pope concluded, "with prayer and with life, all that is left for us is to have courage, hope, and with this courage and hope to experience strongly the prayer of Jesus and go forward: so that our life might give glory to God in the awareness that He prays for me to the Father, that Jesus prays for me."

FROM FR. HENRY DUC

Dear Friends.



From what I have heard and seen, Sihanoukville is a very busy place in Cambodia as its Casino city, and completely different to the humble and sleepy town known as Kom Pong Som, where I took refuge for two nights in a fishing village mixing and mingling with Vietnamese fishermen camping on the beach, while waiting for the call to embark on the escape boat.

When the time came, I was taken to a nearby village by car at the twilight of the day, squizzed inside the house, owned by the person whose niece and two young daughters were about to join me in the trip, and finally boarded a small fishing boat at the early hour of the next day with eleven others on board.

It was a stroke of divine mercy for our group that day, that when our boat was spotted by the coast-guards patrolling the area, and began to go after us, a storm took place just in time to make the sea more choppy and blurry, slowing down their boat considerably, and on top of that, the starting of the extra engine on our boat also gave us the edge over the effort of our chasers, consequently the distance between our boat and theirs became further and further, till they gave up the pursue and left us alone to follow our dream to reach the free shore.

Far from seeing storms as their allies, fishermen would consider them as threats to their livelihood and their own lives. So it was quite normal to see why the disciples got so panicky, while they were on board of their primitive boat crossing the Sea of Galilee during the violent storm.

In contrast to the panicking state of the disciples, Jesus kept resting like nothing had ever happened around him, till he was woken up by his frightened companions, pleading him to save them from the anger of the sea.

Jesus then woke up and ordered the storm to stop, and everything happened accordingly. More significantly, he made the disciples think hard of their state of faith by challenging them with two questions about (1) why they were so scared of the storm despite of his presence, and (2) why they remained faithless though they had opportunities to witness his divine power, to which the disciples made no attempt to respond.

Jesus' intention here, perhaps, is to allow his disciples to see his power over the force of nature, which belongs to no one, but the Divine, and through that the disciples were convinced that Jesus was the Son of God as he had claimed.

Interestingly, some writers in the Old Testament used a body of water to symbolize the dwelling place of evil spirits and wind to stand for their power. So, Jesus through his intervention to stop the wind and calm the rough sea seemed to convey the message that he is more powerful than the devil. All in all, Jesus has more than just over the forces of nature, he is capable of defeating both the devil and his works, namely sins.

More significantly, the sea also serves as the world where we live and our lives are just like all sorts of boats crossing its waters, which sometimes might become choppy and unfriendly due to the troubles and difficulties we each encounter every day. We might have some comfort and confidence in this same Gospel account, for it appears to remind us that the powerful Son of God is with us on our boats and always prepared to take action to keep us safe. All we need to do is to have faith and trust in him.

Let us ask the Lord to be mindful of his ever presence in our lives, and have the confidence to turn to him in prayers, especially in our time of need.

CHAPTER FOUR: The strength and gift of women

<u>99</u>. In the Amazon region, there are communities that have long preserved and handed on the faith even though no priest has come their way, even for decades. This could happen because of the presence of strong and generous women who, undoubtedly called and prompted by the Holy Spirit, baptized, catechized, prayed and acted as missionaries. For centuries, women have kept the Church alive in those places through their remarkable devotion and deep faith. Some of them,

speaking at the Synod, moved us profoundly by their testimony.

100. This summons us to broaden our vision, lest we restrict our understanding of the Church to her functional structures. Such a reductionism would lead us to believe that women would be granted a greater status and participation in the Church only if they were admitted to Holy Orders. But that approach would in fact narrow our vision; it would lead us to clericalize women, diminish the great value of what they have already accomplished, and subtly make their indispensable contribution less effective.

101. Jesus Christ appears as the Spouse of the community that celebrates the Eucharist through the figure of a man who presides as a sign of the one Priest. This dialogue between the Spouse and his Bride, which arises in adoration and sanctifies the community, should not trap us in partial conceptions of power in the Church. The Lord chose to reveal his power and his love through two human faces: the face of his divine Son made man and the face of a creature, a woman, Mary. Women make their contribution to the Church in a way that is properly theirs, by making present the tender strength of Mary, the Mother. As a result, we do not limit ourselves to a functional approach, but enter instead into the inmost structure of the Church. In this way, we will fundamentally realize why, without women, the Church breaks down, and how many communities in the Amazon would have collapsed, had women not been there to sustain them, keep them together and care for them. This shows the kind of power that is typically theirs.
