POPE FRANCIS URGES PEOPLE TO GET VACCINATED AGAINST COVID-19 By Devin Watkins

The Pope has joined his voice to those of Bishops across North and South America to urge people to get jabbed against Covid-19. In a video message produced in conjunction with the Ad Council, Pope Francis praised the work of researchers and scientists in producing safe and effective Covid-19 vaccines.

"Thanks to God's grace and to the work of many, we now have vaccines to protect us from Covid-19," he said in the video released on Wednesday.

Vaccination is an act of love

Pope Francis went on to say that getting a Covid jab that is "authorized by the respective authorities" is an "act of love." Helping other do the same, he said, is also an act of love. "Love for oneself, love for our families and friends, and love for all peoples. Love is also social and political."

The Pope noted that social and political love is built up through "small, individual gestures capable of transforming and improving societies."

"Getting vaccinated is a simple yet profound way to care for one another, especially the most vulnerable," he said. Pope Francis then prayed to God that "each one of us can make his or her own small gesture of love."

"No matter how small, love is always grand," he said. "Small gestures for a better future." 'Strength of faith' The Pope was joined in the video by several Cardinals and Archbishops from across the Americas. Archbishop Jose Gomez, president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and the Archbishop of Los Angeles, lamented the suffering and death the pandemic has wrought across the globe. He prayed that God might "grant us the grace to face it with the strength of faith, ensuring that vaccines are available for all, so that we can all get immunized."

Mexican Cardinal Carlos Aguiar Retes linked Covid-19 jabs to a better future for all. "From North to South America, we support vaccinations for all," said the Cardinal Safe, effective vaccines

Honduran Cardinal Rodriguez Maradiaga said the world has much to learn from the coronavirus. "But one thing is certain: the authorized vaccines are effective, and are here to save lives," he said. "They are the key to a path of personal and universal healing."

Brazilian Cardinal Claudio Hummes praised the "heroic efforts" of health professionals in developing "safe and effective" jabs. He also repeated the Pope's affirmation that "getting vaccinated is an act of love". Salvadorian Cardinal Gregorio Rosa Chavez said vaccination helps protect the most vulnerable. "Our choice to get vaccinated affects others," he said, adding that it is a moral responsibility. Unity across the Americas

Peruvian Archbishop Miguel Cabrejos rounded out the testimonies contained in the video with an appeal to unity. "We are united—North, Central, and South America and the Caribbean—to promote and support vaccination for all," he said, encouraging everyone to "act responsibly, as members of the great human family, seeking and protecting our integral health and universal vaccination."

SOUTH EAST ASIA BATTLES WORLD'S HIGHEST COVID-19 DEATHS By Vatican News staff reporter

Southeast Asia is battling the world's highest Covid-19 death toll driven by the Delta variant and unequal global distribution of vaccines. Hospitals remain overwhelmed by record surges across Southeast Asia, from Vietnam to Malaysia and Myanmar as fears mount of greater suffering and loss of life with Covid-19 spreading from cities to rural and regional areas, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) said on Wednesday. Record deaths in SE Asia

In the last two weeks, Southeast Asia has recorded 38,522 deaths from Covid-19, nearly twice as many as North America, according to the John Hopkins University Covid-19 data dashboard

"This Covid-19 surge driven by the Delta variant is claiming a tragic toll on families across Southeast Asia and it's far from over," said IFRC Asia Pacific Director, Alexander Matheou. "We fear that as the virus spreads from cities to regional and rural areas that many more lives will be lost among the unvaccinated," he warned.

Unfair vaccine access

east Asian nations have low portions of the population fully vaccinated and are languishing far behind. The United Kingdom has fully vaccinated 60 per cent of its population, while Canada and Spain stand at around 64 per cent and the United States at 50 per cent. according to Oxford University's Our World in Data updated until August 16. By contrast, Indonesia and the Philippines, the most populous countries in Southeast Asia, have only fully vaccinated around 10-11 per cent of their people, while Vietnam sits at below 2 per cent. Malaysia has fully vaccinated 34 per cent of its population. Seven of the top 10 countries where Covid -19 deaths have doubled the fastest are in Asia and the Pacific, with Vietnam, Fiji and Myanmar all in the top five, according to Our World in Data. Indonesia is the worst-case Covid-19 scenario in Southeast Asia, where a little over 10 per cent of the people have been fully inoculated. Currently, the country has one of the highest daily death tolls in the world, with 1,466 deaths reported on average over the past seven days. Sharing

Matheou stressed on the need for richer countries to "urgently share their millions of excess vaccine doses with countries in Southeast Asia" in the short term. Vaccine manufacturers and governments, he said, also need to share their technology and scale up production.

According to Matheou, "These coming weeks are critical for scaling up treatment, testing and vaccinations, in every corner of all countries in Southeast Asia." He said, "We must aim for mass vaccination rates of 70-80 per cent if we want to win the race against the variants and overcome this global pandemic." Until vaccination levels reach a critical mass, in the short-term it is also crucial to reinforce health protection measures, such as wearing a mask, physical distance and meeting outdoors or in well-ventilated spaces. The IFRC is seeking vital funding for its global emergency Covid-19 appeal, with around 60 per cent of the appeal covered so far. The funds are crucial to support the lifesaving actions of the IFRC and its member societies around the world. Headquartered in Geneva, Switzerland, the IFRC is an international humanitarian aid organization that reaches 160 million people each year through its 192-member national societies. (Source: IFRC)

POPE FRANCIS: MARY REMINDS US OF GOD'S CALL TO GLORY THROUGH HUMILITY By Vatican News staff writer

Addressing the faithful gathered in Saint Peter's Square for the Sunday Angelus on the August 15th Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into Heaven, Pope Francis offered his opening reflections on the importance of this Feast, saying "Mary's secret is humility." God looks at the heart, he said, and Mary's humility drew God's gaze to her. He observed that often times the human eye is instead overtaken with appearances and grandeur, while overlooking the essential importance of humility.

By looking to Mary assumed into heaven, the Pope said we see how "humility is the way that brings her to Heaven". To rise up to Heaven, we need to be humble he said, noting the origin of the word humble comes from the Latin word humus meaning "earth". Our gifts or wealth are not what allow us to be exalted by God, but instead it is our humility, our loving and serving God in total giving that matters, the Pope underscored.

This means we should examine ourselves and how we are doing with humility in our own lives, the Pope said. We need to ask ourselves if we are often seeking affirmation and praise only for ourselves, or if we could put more emphasis on serving. Do we listen, like Mary, or desire to be the one always talking in order to have the attention and praise. Do we try to lower tensions between people and find unity, or do we try to always dominate the situation? These are important questions to ask ourselves, the Pope said, and especially when looking to the Madonna, saying "in her littleness, Mary wins heaven first", because she recognized her "lowliness" since with God, "only those who recognise themselves as nothing can receive the all". The Pope said Mary is the "full of grace" due to her humility

We too should look to humility as the starting point in our faith journey, the Pope went on to say, noting that we need to be poor in spirit, which means "in need of God", so that through us the Lord can "accomplish great things".

Recalling the poet Dante who referred to the Virgin Mary as "humbler and loftier than any creature", the Pope said this beautiful reality should bring us to reflect on Mary, "the first to win heaven with her entire being, in soul and body" who lived out her life within the family in the ordinary day-to-day of life, often "in silence...externally, nothing extraordinary". At the same time, he added, "God's gaze was always upon her, admiring her humility, her availability, the beauty of her heart never stained by sin." "It is a huge message of hope for us", the Pope concluded, noting even in our own ordinary and often difficult lives we can follow the same example. "Mary reminds you today that God calls you too to this glorious destiny.", he stressed, and these are not just nice words, but "pure reality" he said, "as live and true as the Madonna assumed into Heaven".

In conclusion, he asked everyone to pray that Mary may "accompany us on our journey that leads from Earth to Heaven", striving to live with humility, the secret to our journey.

After leading the recitation of the Angelus on Sunday's Solemnity of the Assumption, Pope Francis expressed his concern over the situation in Afghanistan. He asked everyone to unite in praying to "the God of peace so that the clamour of weapons might cease and solutions can be found at the table of dialogue." He said only this way can the "battered population of that country men, women, elderly and children" be able to "return to their own homes, and live in peace and security, in total mutual respect".

The Pope also recalled the strong earthquake that shook Haiti overnight, causing numerous deaths, wounding many, and causing extensive damage. He expressed his "closeness to the dear people hard hit by the earthquake", offering his prayers to the Lord for the victims. He offered his encouragement to the survivors and hopes that the help of the international community might reach them. "May the solidarity of all alleviate the consequences of the tragedy!" he emphasized, inviting everyone in the Square to pray a Hail Mary for Haiti.

POPE FRANCIS AT THE AUDIENCE: ARE WE UNDER THE LAW OR ARE WE CHILDREN OF GOD?

Pope Francis continued his explanation of St Paul's Letter to the Galatians at Wednesday's General Audience, focusing on St Paul's understanding of the role of the Law for Christians.

St Paul, he said, "has taught us that the 'children of the promise,' - that is, all of us, justified by Jesus Christ - are no longer bound by the Law, but are called to the demanding life-style of the freedom of the Gospel.'

A turning point

He explained that for St Paul, the acceptance of faith is the turning point both for salvation history as a whole and in our own personal stories. At the heart of faith is the death and resurrection of Jesus, "which Paul preached in order to inspire faith in the Son of God, the source of salvation."

So, he said, for Christians, there is a period "before becoming believers" and "after receiving the faith"; and there is, therefore, "a 'before' and 'after' with regard to the Law itself.'

In the period before receiving the faith, being "under the Law" has a negative sense, "as if one is watched and locked up, a kind of preventative custody." This period, he said, "is perpetuated as long as one lives in sin."

The law as teacher and guardian

The Law, said Pope Francis, makes us aware of what it means to transgress the law and also makes people aware of their own sin. In a certain sense, it ends up "stimulating the transgression."

But he went on to explain, using St Paul's image of the Law as a pedagogue, that while the Law had a "restrictive" function, it also served to protect and support the people of Israel. "it had educated them, disciplined them, and supported them in their weakness." So, the Pope said, the Law also had a positive function, that was nonetheless limited in time: when children become adults, they no longer need a guardian. Likewise, "once one has come to faith, the Law exhausts its propaedeutic value and must give way to another authority."

Considering the role of the law

However, he said, the law still exists and is still important. Pope Francis said the role of the law "deserves to be considered carefully so we do not give way to misunderstandings and take false steps."

And so, he said, "it is good for us to ask ourselves if we still live in the period in which we need the Law, or if, instead, we are fully aware of having received the grace of becoming children of God so as to live in love."

It is a good question, he said, and added a second: "Do I despise the Commandments?" He also gave an answer: "No. I observe them, but not as absolutes, because I know that it is Jesus Christ who justifies me."

I am sure many of you had the chance to watch the footage last Sunday unfolding the final minutes of Kabul before it fell into the hands of the Taliban, the word known to me recently as 'students', who proved to be no students at all.

I don't know what you had in mind when you saw the American helicopter hovering over the sky of Kabul as many thousands of people had desperately tried to squeeze in to the last flight, and some people fell off the

plane or crushed to death beneath the plane, but to me that was truly a horrific scene to swallow, and the fall of Kabul reminds me so much of the fall of Saigon more than forty six years ago, following which were days of horror pushing waves of boat people leaving the country, including me. Let us pray today that the people of Afghanistan won't suffer the same fate with their 'students.'

Talking about the fall of the South of Vietnam, I remember that straight after the communists took over the government and life began to go back to the new normal. A student from my village, who enrolled at a teachers' college, hurried to see me after church one day, and whispered into my ear, 'my lecturer has condemned us Catholics as cannibalists.' He looked rather confused and horrified at the same time for such a horrible claim and not knowing how to respond to it. I asked him not to worry too much about such a misinformed charge, and tried to brief him about the Sacrament of the Eucharist, something which is dear to Catholics, but completely weird to outsiders, since we Catholics have been given the gift of faith to help us believe in the presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, and the outsiders on the other hand have no such a gift. My advice to him then was to keep calm, take a gentle approach to his lecturer, and try the best to be a good witness to the Lord in such a hostile environment.

I couldn't help but think of the student I met many years ago when I read the Gospel this Sunday, especially the way some people responded to Jesus' teaching on the Eucharist. They openly challenged the Lord that his language was both intolerable and unacceptable.

The point they referred to as intolerable and unacceptable here, actually was what Jesus said earlier to the crowds in his effort to connect his miraculous sign to multiply the five barley loaves and two fish feeding thousands of hungry people with the Eucharist he was going to establish at the Last Supper prior to his Passion, Death and Resurrection, that 'I am the living bread ... from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live forever,' and that 'my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him.' This is the heart of the theology of the Eucharist and we are so grateful to God for granting us the precious gift of faith, which helps us to understand and treasure the sacramental dimension of the Body and Blood of Christ given to us as food in the Eucharist, and come to share Peter's position professing Jesus as hav-

ing the message of eternal life and being the Holy One of God. Unfortunately many of Jesus' followers then and lot of others around us today on the contrary have failed to have such a privilege. Consequently it is guite comprehensible to see why they consider what Jesus taught about the Eucharist as intolerable and

unacceptable.

As we celebrate once again our Sunday Eucharist this week, let us give praise and thanks to the Lord our God for the marvelous gift of our faith to help us see and appreciate its beauty as a body and soul nourishing sacrament, and pray that our Holy Communion today whether physically or spiritually will continue to give us strength to walk our journey on earth, especially to get on top of this testing time.

ENCYCLICAL LETTER **FRATELLI TUTTI** OF THE HOLY FATHER **FRANCIS** ON FRATERNITY & SOCIAL FRIENDSHIP CHAPTER ONE - DARK CLOUDS OVER A CLOSED WORLD

<u>A "throwaway" world</u>

<u>18</u>. Some parts of our human family, it appears, can be readily sacrificed for the sake of others considered worthy of a carefree existence. Ultimately, "persons are no longer seen as a paramount value to be cared for and respected, especially when they are poor and disabled, 'not yet useful' – like the unborn, or 'no longer needed' – like the elderly. We have grown indifferent to all kinds of wastefulness, starting with the waste of food, which is deplorable in the extreme".

19. A decline in the birthrate, which leads to the aging of the population, together with the relegation of the elderly to a sad and lonely existence, is a subtle way of stating that it is all about us, that our individual concerns are the only thing that matters. In this way, "what is thrown away are not only food and dispensable objects, but often human beings themselves". We have seen what happened with the elderly in certain places in our world as a result of the coronavirus. They did not have to die that way. Yet something similar had long been occurring during heat waves and in other situations: older people found themselves cruelly abandoned. We fail to realize that, by isolating the elderly and leaving them in the care of others without the closeness and concern of family members, we disfigure and impoverish the family itself. We also end up depriving young people of a necessary connection to their roots and a wisdom that the young cannot achieve on their own.

20. This way of discarding others can take a variety of forms, such as an obsession with reducing labour costs with no concern for its grave consequences, since the unemployment that it directly generates leads to the expansion of poverty. In addition, a readiness to discard others finds expression in vicious attitudes that we thought long past, such as racism, which retreats underground only to keep reemerging. Instances of racism continue to shame us, for they show that our supposed social progress is not as real or definitive as we think.

21. Some economic rules have proved effective for growth, but not for integral human development. Wealth has increased, but together with inequality, with the result that "new forms of poverty are emerging". The claim that the modern world has reduced poverty is made by measuring poverty with criteria from the past that do not correspond to present-day realities. In other times, for example, lack of access to electric energy was not considered a sign of poverty, nor was it a source of hardship. Poverty must always be understood and gauged in the context of the actual opportunities available in each concrete historical period.
