

#### **FIRST READING** A reading from the first book of Kings 17:8-16

And then the word of the Lord came to Elijah, 'Up and go to Zarephath, a Sidonian town, and stay there. I have ordered a widow there to give you food.' So he went off to Sidon. And when he reached the city gate, there was a widow gathering sticks. Addressing her he said, 'Please bring a little water in a vessel for me to drink.' She was setting off to bring it when he called after her. 'Please,' he said 'bring me a scrap of bread in your hand.' POPE FRANCIS TO YOUTH IN MEDJUGORJE: FOLLOW CHRIST WITH COURAGE AND JOY

The guiding theme of the youth festival underway in Medjugorje until August 6 is: "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" They cite the words of the rich young man of whom the Synoptic Gospels speak (cf. Mt 19:16-22; Mk 10:17-22; Lk 18:18-23), when he set out, or rather, ran to meet the Lord, to inquire about gaining eternal life, that is, happiness. Pope Francis sent his good wishes to the participants with a message offering some reflections on the theme.

#### An occasion to encounter Jesus

Manifest, the Pope reminds his readers, is in fact a "week of prayer and encounter with Jesus Christ, especially in his living Word, in the Eucharist, in adoration and in the Sacrament of Reconciliation," which has the power to "set us on our way to the Lord." And so this young man of the Gospel, whose name we do not know but whose soul we do know, becomes the symbol of all those who participate in this event.

The Pope recalled that the young man recounted in the Gospels was "educated and very knowledgeable" and motivated with a "healthy restlessness that urged him to seek true happiness, life in its fullness". It is for this reason that he set out on his journey to find in Jesus Christ an "authoritative, credible and reliable" guide who "directed him to God, who is the one and supreme good from whom all other good comes". Eternal life, the good for which he yearns, the Pope writes, is certainly not a material good to be conquered with "one's own strength" but requires going through various stages of maturation.

#### Making steps towards eternal life: loving one's neighbor

The first step, indicated by Jesus, is "concrete love for one's neighbor," not the love given simply by the observance of precepts, rather a "gratuitous and total" love. Jesus notices the "desire for fullness that the young man carries in his heart", but also his "weak point", which is his attachment to "many material goods". For this reason, as a second step, Jesus suggests moving "from a logic of 'merit' to one of giving."

"If you wish to be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." (Mt 19:21). Jesus changes the perspective: he invites him not to think of securing the afterlife, but to give everything in his earthly life, thus imitating the Lord. It is a call to further maturity, to pass from precepts observed to receive a reward, to one that is about love by giving freely without limit. Jesus asks him to leave behind all that weighs down the heart and hinders love. What Jesus recommends is not so much that everything be taken away as much as being free to love and rich in relationships with others.

#### To be free from all attachments

The Pope went on to explain that if the heart is crowded with possessions, the Lord and one's neighbor become merely "things", because "having and wanting too much" suffocate us and "make us unhappy and incapable of loving".

The third step that Jesus proposes to the young man marks a radical choice, the Pope observed when Jesus asks him: "Come! Follow me!" It is a matter of "being disciples of Jesus", which means, not imitating Him outwardly but "conforming to Him" deep in our hearts in order to receive in return "a rich and happy life, in the company of the many brothers and sisters, fathers, mothers and children".

Following Christ is not a loss, but an incalculable gain, the Pope writes, while renunciation concerns the obstacle that blocks this pathway. The rich young man, however, has his heart divided between two masters: God and money. The fear of risking and losing his possessions makes him return home sad.

#### Drawing close to Christ to be happy: saying yes without holding back

It marked a sad moment, because "he did not find the courage to accept the response, which is the proposal to 'untie himself' from himself and from riches in order to 'bind himself' to Christ, to walk with Him and discover true happiness", the Pope observed. He writes:

"Have the courage to live your youth by entrusting yourselves to the Lord and setting out with Him. Let yourselves be conquered by his loving gaze that frees us from the seduction of idols, from the false riches that promise life but bring death. Do not be afraid to welcome the Word of Christ and accept his call. Do not be discouraged like the rich young man in the Gospel; instead, fix your gaze on Mary, the great example of the imitation of Christ, and entrust yourselves to her who, with her affirmative response "Here I am", answered unreservedly to the Lord's call."

## Mary as an example for all of us

May Mary, to whose maternal intercession the Pope entrusts the young people present at the Festival, be the source of the "strength" from which we draw to say our own "here I am", but also a model for "bringing Christ to the world" and for "transforming our lives into a gift for others". Like her, the Pope asks us to strive to be attentive to others and to discover in God's will "our joy", welcoming it even if it is not easy but with the certainty that "it will make us happy".

The Pope writes: "the joy of the Gospel fills the heart and the whole life of those who encounter Jesus. Those who allow themselves to be saved by Him are freed from sin, from sadness, from inner emptiness, from isolation. With Jesus Christ, joy is always born and reborn."

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#### POPE FRANCIS AT ANGELUS: WELCOME JESUS AS THE BREAD OF LIFE

Greeting the faithful in Saint Peter's Square on a sunny and sultry Roman Sunday, Pope Francis offered reflections on the day's Gospel reading which speaks about the crowds following Jesus, after they had witnessed the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves. However, the crowds did not grasp the meaning of what Jesus had done and appeared to be more concerned more about having their fill of material bread.

The Pope said we too risk from this same narrow mentality, what might be called an "idolatrous temptation" he described as one where we seek God only for our own use and needs of the moment. This requires us to ask, "why do we seek the Lord?", he said, and to think about what are our true motivations, to consider if our faith concerns seeking God primarily when we need him and forgetting about Him when we are satisfied. The Pope said it is right to present our needs before God, but we need to understand that the Lord first of all "wishes to live with us...in a relationship of love", and to know that in response to our prayers He "acts far beyond our expectations". True love is all gift, not expecting a favor in return, the Pope observed, and the relationship with God "goes beyond the logic of interest and calculation."

In the today's Gospel reading, the crowds then ask Jesus what they can do then to accomplish the works of God. The Pope said it was as if they were asking how we go from a faith that is only concerned about our immediate needs to one that pleases God. Jesus' answer, the Pope said, is "that the work of God is to welcome the One whom the Father has sent, that is, Himself, Jesus." The key here is "welcoming Jesus into our lives, living a story of love with Him", the Pope pointed out, saying only Jesus can purify our faith and strengthen our "loving relationship" with Him. He summed it up: "before the things we receive and do, there is Him to love".

This same thinking applies also to our human and social relationships, the Pope added, saying we need to be aware when we risk using others for our own interests. In society we need to keep people at the centre of our concern rather than simply as interests, he stressed. In conclusion, before leading the recitation of the Angelus, he said, "let us welcome Jesus as the bread of life and, starting out from our friendship with Him, learn to love each other" freely and abundantly, looking to the example of the Blessed Virgin Mary "who lived the most beautiful story of love with God" and can help us receive this grace.

#### POPE FRANCIS' PRAYER INTENTION FOR AUGUST: CHURCH ON THE WAY

In his video message for his prayer intention for August, Pope Francis reminds the faithful that "the vocation of the Church is evangelization," and even more, "the Church's identity is evangelization."

In this month, the Holy Father reflects on the situation of the Church, its vocation and its identity, and calls us to renew it "by discerning God's will in our daily life," and "embarking on a transformation guided by the Holy Spirit."

"Our own reform as persons is that transformation," the Pope said. This allows the "Holy Spirit, the gift of God in our hearts, to remind us what Jesus taught and helps us to put into practice."

#### **Evangelization and a more missionary option**

Pope Francis begins with the specific vocation of the Church, which is to evangelize. The Holy Father dreams of an even more missionary option: "one that goes out to meet others without proselytism and transforms its structures for the evangelization of today's world."

He emphasizes that he is not talking about proselytism but rather a reform of the Church through "a reform of ourselves, without prefabricated ideas, without ideological prejudices and rigidity."

To make progress in this regard, Pope Francis invites all to move forward based on spiritual experience: "an experience of prayer, an experience of charity and an experience of service."

## **Reforming the Church**

"Let us remember that the Church always has difficulties," the Pope said, explaining that the Church goes through crises because she is alive; not like the dead who do not go through crises.

In a statement accompanying the Pope's prayer intention, the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network, which prepares "The Pope Video" each month, explains that in the recent letter Pope Francis wrote to Cardinal Reinhard Marx, in which he refused his offer of resignation, the Holy Father acknowledged the crisis in the Church brought about by abuse cases, emphasizing the

"A reform... does not consist in words but in attitudes that have the courage to face the crisis, to assume reality whatever the consequences may be. And every reform begins with oneself. The reform in the Church was made by men and women who were not afraid to enter into crisis and let themselves be reformed by the Lord," the Pope said.

Concluding the video message, the Holy Father invited all to pray for the Church, "that she may receive from the Holy Spirit the grace and strength to reform herself in the light of the Gospel."

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#### FROM FR. HENRY DUC

Dear Friends.



As part of our Formation program at St Patrick's College, Manly, we students were required to do at least two semesters in Latin and two in Greek, just enough for us to feel comfortable with words in Latin and Greek we were going to encounter on our journey ahead to conquer the Bachelor of Theology.

For some, they were just a piece of cake, but for others, they were just the Himalayas to climb, since it was their first experience with a new language. Prior to my Latin class in the seminary here, I spent five years fighting with it back in Vietnam, and the truth was that it was always on top of me.

Though it was not quite easy to chew, we had to get through it, otherwise we would be left frustrated for not knowing what some of the theological concepts found in our text books or lectures were about.

In the Gospel account this Sunday, Jesus began the catechetical process to transcend his Jewish audience from the everyday world to the theological one, meaning from their experience of a miraculous meal made of five barley loaves and two fish to the acclamation 'I am the bread that came down from heaven.'

The Jewish crowd, of course, was confused by such a switch from Jesus and proved themselves totally unprepared for it, consequently they began to complain as John reported.

While they were trying to point out the lack of logic in his statement, Jesus went on to take them deeper into the world of the Eucharist by re-phrasing what he said in the beginning that 'I am the bread of life' and 'I am the living bread which has come down from heaven,' which is his flesh, and will help to connect those who receive it with life in heaven, a life in eternity. Interestingly, right in this catechetical session. Jesus also issued a very important statement about faith that 'everybody who believes has eternal life', which St Paul took up and developed in his famous letters, and has become the point of contention between Protestants and Catholics.

Compared to the Jewish crowd in the Gospel today incapable of grasping the message Jesus meant to convey to them, we today obviously are more fortunate than them, since we are more prepared to handle it thanks to our informed faith, something the crowd in the past failed to enjoy.

As we celebrate the Eucharist and come to receive Holy Communion today whether spiritually and physically, let us give praise and thanks to Jesus for giving us the precious food of Himself in the Eucharist to nourish us on our journey to the Promised Land of heaven, and also for the privilege to see, believe and taste it.

May the grace of the Eucharist keep us firm in faith and give us strength to persevere in this testing time.

ENCYCLICAL LETTER *FRATELLI TUTTI* OF THE HOLY FATHER **FRANCIS**ON FRATERNITY & SOCIAL FRIENDSHIP
CHAPTER ONE -

DARK CLOUDS OVER A CLOSED WORLD

9. Without claiming to carry out an exhaustive analysis or to study every aspect of our present-day experience, I intend simply to consider certain trends in our world that hinder the development of universal fraternity.

SHATTERED DREAMS 10. For decades, it seemed that the world had learned a lesson from its many wars and disasters, and was slowly moving towards various forms of integration. For example, there was the dream of a united Europe, capable of acknowledging its shared roots and rejoicing in its rich diversity. We think of "the firm conviction of the founders of the European Union, who envisioned a future based on the capacity to work together in bridging divisions and in fostering peace and fellowship between all the peoples of this continent".[7] There was also a growing desire for integration in Latin America, and several steps were taken in this direction. In some countries and regions, attempts at reconciliation and rapprochement proved fruitful, while others showed great promise. 11. Our own days, however, seem to be showing signs of a certain regression. Ancient conflicts thought long buried are breaking out anew, while instances of a myopic, extremist, resentful and aggressive nationalism are on the rise. In some countries, a concept of popular and national unity influenced by various ideologies is creating new forms of selfishness and a loss of the social sense under the guise of defending national interests. Once more we are being reminded that "each new generation must take up the struggles and attainments of past generations, while setting its sights even higher. This is the path. Goodness, together with love, justice and solidarity, are not achieved once and for all; they have to be realized each day. It is not possible to settle for what was achieved in the past and complacently enjoy it, as if we could somehow disregard the fact that many of our brothers and sisters still endure situations that cry out for our attention".[8]

12. "Opening up to the world" is an expression that has been co-opted by the economic and financial sector and is now used exclusively of openness to foreign interests or to the freedom of economic powers to invest without obstacles or complications in all countries. Local conflicts and disregard for the common good are exploited by the global economy in order to impose a single cultural model. This culture unifies the world, but divides persons and nations, for "as society becomes ever more globalized, it makes us neighbours, but does not make us brothers".

[9] We are more alone than ever in an increasingly massified world that promotes individual interests and weakens the communitarian dimension of life. Indeed, there are markets where individuals become mere consumers or bystanders. As a rule, the advance of this kind of globalism strengthens the identity of the more powerful, who can protect themselves, but it tends to diminish the identity of the weaker and poorer regions, making them more vulnerable and dependent. In this way, political life becomes increasingly fragile in the face of transnational economic powers that operate with the principle of "divide and conquer".

# Pope Francis' Prayer to Mary during the coronavirus pandemic

O Mary, you always shine on our path as a sign of salvation and of hope.

We entrust ourselves to you, Health of the Sick, who at the cross took part in Jesus' pain, keeping your faith firm.

You, Salvation of all People, know what we


