

AFGHANISTAN: POPE'S REQUEST FOR FASTING AND PRAYER 'A REVOLT' AGIANST WAR Bv Francesca Merlo

In light of the tragedy engulfing Afghanistan, marred by recent attacks and the desperate flight of thousands of people, Pope Francis is once again asking the faithful throughout the world to gather in prayer and to abstain from meals. He made that appeal during his Sunday Angelus address, which was repeated on his Twitter account @Pontifex. On numerous occasions during his pontificate, the Pope has called for this type of action, in the face of humanitarian tragedies. "I appeal to everyone to intensify prayer and practise fasting: prayer and fasting, prayer and penance. Now is the time to do it." Adding emphasis to his appeal, he continued, "I'm serious: Intensify prayer and practice fasting, asking the Lord for mercy and forgiveness."

Prayer and fasting in the face of humanitarian tragedies

In an interview with Vatican News' Salvatore Cernuzio, Andrea Riccardi, the founder of the Sant'Egidio Community, spoke about the Pope's request for fasting and prayer for the war-torn country. "Praying and fasting are not at all anachronistic practices, let alone spiritualistic," he says. "On the contrary, I believe that we pray too little for peace in our churches. On Sundays we hardly ever hear prayers for Afghanistan or, for example, for northern Mozambique with 800,000 refugees, or for so many forgotten wars. We pray little for peace." Prayer is a strength, he adds. Andrea Riccardi notes that there is indeed an urgency to launch these prayer and fasting marathons. "Faced with distant wars, with situations that we do not know how to resolve, it seems as if we cannot do anything and a sense of impotence is created." From this impotence, he warns, "comes indifference".

He notes that Pope Francis has often spoken against the globalisation of indifference. He explains that our indifference comes from the feeling that "we can do nothing" to help. "Instead," he continues, "I believe that in this global world, every man and woman can do something. If small groups can sow terror, small groups can sow peace. And they can do it through prayer which, together with fasting, which is also detachment from daily life, is a 'revolt' against war, as well as an invocation to the Lord, the Lord of history, so that He may open up paths of peace and arouse, through His spirit, the good will of men, of the powerful, of institutions." Speaking of the value the Pope's request can have for non-Catholics, and making reference to the Pope's consistent invitation for brothers and sisters of different religious demoninations to unite in prayer, Andrea Riccardi recalls the Pope's meeting in Bari in 2018 as a "purely evangelical image". "The agreement between 'brothers' can move us, can open a history of peace," he notes. "It is the Spirit of Assisi, the invitation to the prayer for peace, that revolutionary and decisive breakthrough introduced in 1986 by John Paul II: praying together for others, not against each other."

On Monday, Mr. Riccardi met the Pope in a private audience. Regarding his meeting, Mr. Riccardi notes that "the Pope is deeply concerned about Afghanistan; he follows the situation day by day." However, he adds, the Pope has "not abandoned the dream and the vision of building a new post-Covid world, in which social solidarity goes hand in hand with international solidarity."

"We live with too many emotions linked to the news, often forgetting that we are truly in a historical phase of great change, in which there is an urgent need to build a different world from the one before. And now we are faced with a drama like that of Afghanistan, which calls for spiritual and concrete solidarity in welcoming." Concluding the interview, Mr. Riccardi urges us to "ask ourselves: what kind of society do we want to build? The societies of walls and fear or the societies of hope and welcome? Hope and welcome that are nourished by praver." Prayer, he says, makes us both bold and capable of dreaming up new formulas for living together.

Overcoming indifference

Audience with the Pope

POPE FRANCIS AT ANGELUS: LOOK AT LIFE STARTING FROM THE HEART

The Gospel for today's liturgy shows a few scribes and Pharisees amazed by Jesus' attitude. They are scandalized because his disciples pick up food without first performing the traditional ritual ablutions. They think among themselves "This way of doing things is contrary to the religious practice" (cf. Mk 7:2-5).

Pope Francis recalled the day's Gospel reading, which recounts when a few scribes and Pharisees were scandalized because Jesus' disciples did not perform the traditional ablutions before eating. The Pope asked why they did not conform to these traditions, especially since they offer good ritual habits, such as simple washing before eating. The answer, he said, was more about making sure we keep faith at the centre of our focus in all matters and avoiding being focused solely on outward formality. This can become a religious practice where outward devotion and appearances matter most and we overlook the worship which Jesus desires with "a faith that touches the heart".

In the Gospel reading, Jesus says, "There is nothing outside a man which by going into him can defile him; but the things which come out of a man are what defile him" (v. 15). The Pope explained that it is "from within, out of the heart' (v. 21) that evil things are born." Jesus' teaching was a novelty for His time, changing the traditional perspective which saw externals as the cause of evil.

This truth concerns us today as well, the Pope said, especially since we tend to think that all problems arise due to other people's actions and behaviour. We put the blame on everyone else, on society or on the world, for what happens to us. It is as if all problems come from the outside; and so we blame others, saying it is their fault or the fault of those who govern. Blaming everything and everyone outside ourselves is a waste of time, the Pope stressed, and can cause us to become angry and bitter, keeping God far from our hearts. He added, one cannot be truly religious when these problems creep into your heart, since anger, resentment and sadness close the door to God.

To remedy this we need to ask the Lord to free us from these temptations, the Pope said. We need to pray for the grace not to waste time "polluting" our world with complaints, since this is not Christian. "Jesus instead invites us to look at life and the world starting from our heart", he said, and by sincerely asking God to purify our hearts. "Then we will start making the world cleaner," since a winning way to defeat evil is "by starting to conquer it within yourself."

In conclusion, the Pope encouraged us to look to Mary, "who changed history through the purity of her heart," in order to help us to purify our hearts and so overcome the vices of blaming and complaining, and keep faith at the center of our lives

POPE FRANCIS AT THE AUDIENCE: TAKE TIME TO REFLECT ON HOW WE LIVE OUR FAITH

Welcoming pilgrims to the Paul VI Audience Hall at the Vatican for his weekly General Audience, <u>Pope Francis continued his</u> <u>catechesis</u> on the Letter of Saint Paul to the Galatians. In this latest chapter, he recalls how the apostle Paul challenges the first Christians of Galatia to look at where they have strayed from their faith and how they risk nullifying the grace they have experienced if they do not correct course.

The Pope described how the Apostle uses strong terms, like foolishness, to describe their behaviour, because they risked losing their faith in Christ, which they initially received with enthusiasm, and so Paul appealed to their memory of his first proclamation when he offered them the possibility of attaining a new, hitherto unhoped-for freedom in faith.

The love of Christ, the wellspring of salvation

The point is to shake up their consciences, the Pope explained, when Paul reminded the Galatians how the word he preached to them focused on God's love, fully manifested in the death and resurrection of Jesus, and the grace they received from that. In summary, the Pope went on to say, Paul's intention is to compel the Galatians to avoid falling into the trap of a religiosity based solely on the scrupulous observance of precepts, overlooking "the love of Christ, crucified and risen again," which should "remain at the centre of our daily life as the wellspring of salvation".

The Galatians understood what Paul was saying, the Pope pointed out, since they had experienced the action of the Holy Spirit in their communities, through charity and other charisms that manifested themselves among them, "the fruit of the newness of the Spirit." God was bringing them to faith, the Holy Spirit had been the agent of their experience, the Pope added, but the Galatians were putting that all in the background seeing their own works as the protagonists, which Paul described as foolishness.

The Pope added that throughout history, even today, similar situations can arise where some propose a rigid religiosity or an artificial asceticism, with an "inflexibility that takes away from us that freedom in the Spirit that Christ's redemption gives us." We need to be aware of this reality, he noted, and this Letter to the Galatians speaks about it and encourages us to go forward "in the paschal vocation of Jesus"

Christ's love at the centre of our lives

In conclusion, the Pope said we also need to reflect on where our faith is, and how we live it; and to make sure that Christ's love remains at the centre of our lives, the way to our salvation. We must continually keep to this "precious treasure, to the beauty of the newness of Christ," rather than to externals, rather than "something that attracts us momentarily but then leaves us empty inside." He said we can be encouraged by the fact that, "even when we are tempted to turn away, God still continues to bestow His gifts... God does not abandon us but rather abides with us in His merciful love."

World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation

Before imparting his Apostolic Blessing, Pope Francis recalled that today marks the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, and the beginning of the <u>Season of Creation</u>, which will conclude on October 4, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. He said this year's theme is, <u>"A Home for All? Renewing God's Oikos"</u>, and that a message for the occasion will be released soon together with Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew, and the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby. He concluded inviting everyone to "pray and work for our common home in these times of grave planetary crisis," together with our brothers and sisters of different Christian denominations.





Mind you, we are talking about Jesus' time, so please do not try it yourselves. This socio-cultural background would help us to better understand the Gospel narrative this Sunday, though it may sound a bit crude to us in this day and age. Particularly during this Delta time to hear the story describing how Jesus placed his fingers into someone's ears and then used his spittle to touch the man's tongue to heal him from his hearing and speech deficiencies. I wonder why Jesus decided to do that, though he was absolutely capable of helping the man to hear and speak by simply telling him 'Ephphatha?' May be this is something we can ask him when he comes again at the end time! In the meantime, we'd better focus on the intention of the evangelist while writing down this account for us, surely his intention is about presenting to us Jesus as the Son of God, the Messiah who came into the world to save people from sin. This Messiah was foretold by the prophets in the Old Testament and Jesus was THE ONE who fulfilled all those prophecies about him, and the first reading from the book of Isaiah is a point in case. When we connect the Gospel reading with the first reading, we can see more clearly Jesus' divine identity, for the Gospel presents to us Jesus as the Divine with the power over human sickness, the one to unseal the ears of the deaf and open the tongues of the dumb, as Isaiah prophesized about him around 700 years before.

From a symbolic perspective, this Gospel seems to send an encouraging message to all who suffer a kind of spiritual deafness and dumbness, meaning those who fail (1) to listen to and hear the word of God or the wisdom of the Holy Spirit speaking to them, and (2) to says words to bring forth the Gospel values around them as love, mercy and forgiveness. These peoples would need a healing word and touch from Jesus, and he could help to cure them from such spiritual illnesses. From a practical perspective, this Gospel also helps raise our awareness of those who suffer hearing and speaking loss worldwide, especially members of our parish community, let us remember them especially in our prayer this weekend, and pray for Jesus' grace to open our ears to hear his teachings and empower our tongues to says words to bring joy and happiness to those around us, particularly during this time of lockdown. The Season of Creation is a time to renew our relationship with our Creator and all creation through celebration, conversion, and commitment together. During the Season of Creation, we join our sisters and brothers in the ecumenical family in prayer and action for our common home.

The season starts 1 September, the Day of Prayer for Creation, and ends 4 October, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology beloved by many Christian denominations.

This year's theme : A HOME FOR ALL? RENEWING THE OIKOS OF GOD

Christians join the Psalmist in proclaiming the Earth is the Lord's and all that is in it. (Psalms 24:1) However, the current climate crisis is accelerating ecological instability, which results in the loss of habitats that are homes for millions of species, including humans whose homes are at risk due to climate conflict, loss and damage.

As people of faith, our baptismal call compels us to till and keep God's garden, and participate in the renewal of the whole inhabited Earth, so that life may flourish and all may have a just and sustainable home.

By focusing the subtheme on the concept of oikos, we hope to lift up the integral nature of the many relationships that hold the web of life together. Within the whole inhabited Earth (oikoumene), the Church (oikoumene) calls all households and societies (oikos) to turn our political, social and economic systems (oikonomia) towards just, sustainable economies of life, which respect the limits and life giving ecological boundaries (oikologia) of our common home.

We hope that this Season of Creation renews our baptismal call to care and sustain an ecological turning so that life may flourish, and all creatures may find their place to flourish among our common home.
