

Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.' He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. 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POPE FRANCIS AT THE AUDIENCE: EQUALITY IN CHRIST OVERCOMES OUR DIFFERENCES Bv Benedict Mavaki, SJ

Continuing his catechesis on the Letter of Saint Paul to the Galatians during the General Audience on Wednesday, Pope Francis noted the apostle's insistence to Christians not to forget the novelty of God's revelation that had been proclaimed to them. The Pope reflected on St. Paul's emphasis on faith in Jesus which has allowed us to truly become children of God and His heirs. Therefore, Christians are to remember with gratitude the moment we became such - the moment of our baptism - "so as to live the great gift we have received with greater awareness."

Faith makes us God's children "in Christ"

Once "faith has come" in Jesus Christ, the Pope noted, "a radically new condition was created that leads to divine sonship." It is not a sonship involving all men and women insofar as they are sons and daughters of the same Creator; rather, faith allows us to be children of God "in Christ."

Being Children of God "in Christ" thus, makes a difference, because through Jesus' incarnation he became our brother, and by His death and resurrection, He has reconciled us to the Father. So, "anyone who accepts Christ in faith, has "put on" Christ and His filial dignity through baptism."

Baptism transforms us

Pope Francis further explained that for St. Paul, who made reference to baptism several times in his letters, "to be baptized was the same as taking part effectively and truly in the mystery of Jesus." In the Letter to the Romans, for example, Paul stated that in baptism we have died with Christ and have been buried with Him, so as to live with Him (Rom 6: 3-14)

Baptism, therefore, is not merely an "external rite." Rather, those who receive it "are transformed deep within" and "possess new life" which allows them to turn to God and call Him with the name of "Abba, Father." The Holy Father, in this regard, encouraged Christians to find out their date of baptism and to celebrate it. Baptism goes beyond differences

Speaking further, the Pope noted St. Paul's audacious confirmation that the identity received with baptism is so new that it prevails over the differences that exist on the ethnic-religious level, beyond differences of Jew or Greek, slave or free, male or female (Gal 3:28).

"For Paul to write to the Galatians that in Christ, there is neither Jew nor Greek was equivalent to an authentic subversion in the ethnic-religious sphere," the Pope explained, because by the fact of belonging to a chosen people, the Jew was privileged over the pagan.

Similarly, taking out the distinction between the "free" and "slaves" introduced a shocking perspective, as by law, "free citizens enjoyed all rights, while not even the human dignity of slaves was recognized." Likewise, equality in Christ, which overcomes the social differences between the two sexes, "was revolutionary at the time" and "needs to be reaffirmed even today." In this way, St. Paul confirms the profound unity between all the baptized because every one of them is "a new creature in Christ." Thus, every distinction is secondary to the dignity of being children of God who "creates a real and substantial equality." Called to live as children of God

The Holy Father then highlighted that we are called in a more positive way to live a new life that roots its foundational expression in being children of God, discovering the beauty of being "brothers and sisters among ourselves, because we have been united in Christ."

"The differences and contrasts that separation creates should not exist among believers in Christ," the Pope said. "Rather, our vocation is that of making concrete and evident the call to unity of the entire human race." In this manner, everything that exacerbates differences and causes discrimination no longer has any meaning, thanks to the salvation effected in Christ.

"What is important is that faith that operates according to the path of unity indicated by the Holy Spirit," Pope Francis concluded, adding that "our responsibility is that of journeying decisively on along this path." **Greetings for Ethiopian New Year**

At the conclusion of the General Audience, Pope Francis had a special word of greeting for the people of Ethiopia, who will celebrate the beginning of the New Year - according to the Ethiopian calendar - on September 11. "I extend my heartfelt and affectionate greeting to the Ethiopian people," he said, "and especially to those who are suffering due to the ongoing conflict and the grave humanitarian situation it has cause." He added his hopes that the New Year "might be a time of fraternity and solidarity, in which we listen to the common desire for peace."

POPE FRANCIS LASTEST INTERVIEW

Well, I must ask you first of all, Holy Father, how are you feeling? I'm still alive. [Laughs.]

Your recent surgery, which was a major operation, left us with some concern...

Certainly, these things that are formed by the diverticula... and who knows... they become deformed, necrotic... but thank God it was taken in time, and here I am.

I understand, moreover, that it was the action of a nurse that pointed you out, that alerted you in the first place.

He saved my life! He told me: "You have to have surgery". There were other opinions: "Better with antibiotics..." but the nurse explained it to me very well. He is a nurse from here, from our health service, from the Vatican hospital. He has been here for thirty years, a very experienced man. It is the second time in my life that a nurse has saved my life.

When was the first time?

The first time was in 1957, when they thought it was the flu, one of those flu epidemics in the seminary, and the seminary nurse treated me with aspirin. And for the others it was fine, but with me it didn't work, so they took me to the hospital, where they took water out of my lungs. The doctor said I should receive... I don't remember how much, let's say a million units of penicillin and so many [units of] streptomycin—those were the only antibiotics at the time—and when he left, the nurse said: "Twice as much".

And that saved you?

Yes, because if it hadn't, I wouldn't have

One of the... I won't say one of the Vatican's best-kept secrets, but one of the issues that traditionally is of most interest is the Pope's health.

Yes, obviously.

There were no surprises, it was all planned...

It was all scheduled and it had been arranged... After the Angelus I left immediately. That would be almost one o'clock, and it was announced at 3.30 pm when I was already in the preliminaries.

You have said, Your Holiness, that "weeds never die".

That's right, that's right, and that goes for me too; it goes for everyone.

Has the media [sic] forbidden you to do anything, is there any ultimatum, is there anything that Your Holiness cannot do or that you are not willing to do?

I do not understand what you mean.

Have the doctors prevented you from doing anything?

Oh, the doctors! Sorry, I had understood "the media".

[Laughs] Well, the media, you know, also have temptations. But in this case, it's the doctors. [Spanish:

"medios" (media) and "médicos" (doctors)]

Now I can eat everything, which was not possible before with the diverticula. I can eat everything. I still have the post-operative medications, because the brain has to register that it has 33 centimetres less intestine. And everything is managed by the brain, the brain manages our whole body, and it takes time for it to register it. But besides that, I have a normal life, I lead a totally normal life.

You eat anything you want...

Yes. You walk, you exert yourself...

All morning today in hearings, all morning long.

Now you are going on a trip to Slovakia and Hungary. I understand that it is the 34th trip of the Pontificate.

I don't remember the times, but it may be so.

Is the program going to be as intense? I think the Popes, Your Holiness, are required to do a real gymkhana. I have always wondered why the Popes don't go for two more days and spread the work over two more days, because they spend about 18 hours out of 24 doing things. Are you going to have to take care of your strength more after the surgery or not?

Maybe in this first trip I should be more careful, because one has to recover completely, but in the end, it will be the same as the others, you will see. [Laughs.]

Does Your Holiness fear that one of the most insistent things with which the media, essentially Italian, distinguish you, Holy Father, is that when the Pope's health is questioned, many think or insist on the old argument of resignation, the "I'm going home, I can't take it anymore..."? It is a permanent theme, I believe, in your life as Pope, isn't it? Yes, they even told me that last week that was very popular. Eva [Fernández] told me that; she even said it with a very nice Argentine expression, and I told her that I had no idea because I read only one newspaper here in the morning, the newspaper of Rome. I read it because I like the way of its headline, I read it quickly and that's it, I don't get into the game. I don't watch television. And I do receive the report about some of the news of the day, but I found out much later, a few days later, that there was something about me resigning. Whenever a Pope is ill, there is always a breeze or a hurricane of conclave. [Laughter.]

FROM FR. HENRY DUC



Out of the conversation with Ian and Ryan last week relating to the story about an American priest who recently asked for a reform in the formation programs for all seminaries in the Church, based on the experience he had while attending the North American College in Rome, I was asked whether I had a black soutane – I guess you can guess what the rest of the conversation was about, and for those interested in following it up, the article written by Robert Mickens is available in La Croix International in its Letter From

Rome column.

In response to the query, I said that I do have one, though I have never donned it since I left St Patrick's College Manly at the end of 1993. Instead of wearing the back robe or clergyman shirt, I have opted for a cross pinned on my shirt when required. It was said that, devout Jewish people in ancient times were keen to trace the Hebrew letter 'TAU' on their forehead as a sign to let people know of their total dedication to God, and a TAU looks like a + or an X. Perhaps inspired by this tradition, early Christians began to place their right hand on their left shoulder and their left hand on their right shoulder as a sign of their dedication to Jesus. This practice gradually evolved into our distinctive Sign of the Cross that we proudly make when we pray, we meet or make important decisions in our lives. On the topic of the cross, we hear how Jesus in the Gospel this Sunday encourages both his disciples and ordinary followers to show their dedication to him by (1) denouncing themselves and (2) taking up their cross to follow him. Surely, the cross Jesus mentions here is different to the one he talked about earlier, the one on which was about to be crucified, but rather a symbolic one challenging his followers to get crucified symbolically by means of the hardships and sufferings they go through in their everyday lives.

Significantly, he makes this point as a direct response to Peter following his effort to tone down Jesus' prediction of his coming Passion and death. Jesus seems to treat Peter's intervention as some kind of a devil's temptation, that is why he uses the word 'Satan' to call Peter in his reprimand.

I hope that Jesus used it just as a friendly term to his right hand man to bring him back to the reality after a strong performance in identifying Jesus as 'the Christ', the Anointed of God. Unfortunately the Christ in Peter's mind wasn't the Christ in Jesus', and he was quickly reminded of such a difference in Jesus' next statement, 'the ways you think is not God's way but man's'. This is full of wisdom and also a treasure for all of us to take up and reflect upon day in and day out. Jesus' point here reminds us of this truth that our way is not necessarily God's way. An awareness of such a gap might help us avoid any disappointment when certain things do not go according to our plans,. On the other hand, it should inspire us to keep on searching for and focusing on God's way in all we do.

Let us pray today for the grace both to enlighten us in our ongoing search for God's way in our live, and to remember that the way of Cross was the one our Savior chose to walk through to bring us eternal life, so that we may be ever prepared for the cross entrusted to us to take up.




