POPE FRANCIS RECENT INTERVIEW (CONTINUED)

But will Your Holiness be there? Yes, in principle the program is that I go. It all depends on how I feel at the time. But in fact, my speech is already being prepared, and the plan is to be there.

Let's talk about China if you would, Your Holiness... Within your own ranks, there are those who insist that you should not renew the agreement that the Vatican has signed with that country because it jeopardizes your moral authority. Do you have the feeling that there are many people who want to set the Pope's path? Even when I was a layman and priest, I loved to show the way to the bishop; it is a temptation that I would even say is licit if it is done with good will. China is not easy, but I am convinced that we should not give up dialogue. You can be deceived in dialogue, you can make mistakes, all that... but it is the way. Closed-mindedness is never the way. What has been achieved so far in China was at least dialogue... some concrete things like the appointment of new bishops, slowly... But these are also steps that can be questionable and the results on one side or the other. For me, the key figure in all this and who helps me and inspires me is Cardinal Casaroli. Casaroli was the man John XXIII commissioned to build bridges with Central Europe. There is a very nice book, The Martyrdom of Patience where he tells a bit about his experiences there. Or his experiences are recounted by the one who compiled everything. And it was small step after small step, creating bridges. Sometimes having to talk in the open air or with the faucet open in difficult moments. Slowly, slowly, slowly, he was achieving reserves of diplomatic relations which in the end meant appointing new bishops and taking care of God's faithful people. Today, somehow, we have to follow these paths of dialogue step by step in the most conflictive situations. My experience in dialogue with Islam, for example, with the Grand Imam al-Tayyeb was very positive in this, and I am very grateful to him. It was like the germ of *Fratelli tutti* afterward. But dialogue, always dialogue, or to be willing to dialogue. There is a very nice thing. The last time St. John Paul II met with Casaroli, he went to inform him where things were going... (Casaroli went every weekend to a juvenile prison. I think it was Casal del Marmo, I am not sure. And he was with the boys and wore a cassock like a priest. Nobody knew... Some didn't know who he was). And when they said goodbye and Casaroli was already at the door, St. John Paul II called him and said, "Eminence, do you still go to those boys?" "Yes, yes." "Never leave them." The testament of a saintly pope to a very capable diplomat: continue on this path of diplomacy, but don't forget that you are a priest, as you are doing. This for me is inspiring. Your Holiness, in Spain, euthanasia has been legalized, on the basis of what they call the "right to a dignified death." But that is a fallacious syllogism, because the Church does not defend incarnate suffering, but dignity to the end. How far does man have real power over his life? What does the Pope believe? Let us situate ourselves. We are living in a throwaway culture. What is useless is discarded. Old people are disposable material: they are a nuisance. Not all of them, but in the collective unconscious of the throwaway culture, the old... the most terminally ill, too; the unwanted children, too, and they are sent to the sender before they are born... In other words, there is this kind of culture.

Then, let us look at the peripheries, let us think of the great Asian peripheries, for example, to go far away and not think that we are just talking about things here. The discarding of entire peoples. Think of the Rohingyas, discarded, nomads around the world. Poor things. In other words, they are discarded. They are no good, they don't fit, they are no good. This throwaway culture has marked us. And it marks the young and the old. It has a strong influence on one of the dramas of today's European culture. In Italy, the average age is 47 years old. In Spain, I think it is older. That is to say, the pyramid has been inverted. It is the *demographic winter* at birth, in which there are more cases of abortion. The demographic culture is in loss because we look at the profit. It looks to the one in front... and sometimes using the idea of compassion: "that this person may not suffer in the case of ... "What the Church asks is to help people to die with dignity. This has always been done. And with regard to the case of abortion, I do not like to enter into discussions on whether it is possible up to here, or whether it is not possible up to there, but I say this: any embryology manual given to a medical student in medical school says that by the third week of conception, sometimes before the mother realizes [that she is pregnant], all the organs in the embryo are already outlined, even the DNA. It is a life. A human life. Some say, "It's not a person." It is a human life! So, faced with a human life I ask myself two guestions: Is it licit to eliminate a human life to solve a problem, is it fair to eliminate a human life to solve a problem? Second question: Is it fair to hire a hired killer to solve a problem? And with these two questions, what about the cases of elimination of people-on one side or the other-because they are a burden for society? I would like to remember something they used to tell us at home. About a very good family with several children and the grandfather who lived with them, but the grandfather was getting old and he began to drool at the table. Then, the father could not invite people because he was ashamed of his father. So he thought to set a nice table in the kitchen and he explained to the family that beginning the next day, Grandpa would eat in the kitchen so they could invite people. And so it was. A week later, he comes home and finds his little son, 8 or 9-years-old, one of the children, playing with wood, nails, hammers, and he says, "What are you doing?" "I'm making a little table, Dad." "For what?" "For you, for when you're old." In other words, what is sown in discarding, is going to be harvested later. (to be continued)

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POPE FRANCIS AT SYNOD: THE PARTICIPATION OF EVERYONE, GUIDED BY THE HOLY SPIRIT **Bv** Robin Gomes

As the Universal Church is about to embark on the synodal journey, Pope Francis on Saturday invoked the Holy Spirit on the People of God so that they will be able to move forward together, to listen to one another and discern our times, in solidarity with the struggles and aspirations of all humanity.

The Pope prayed as he presided over a moment of reflection in the Vatican's Synod Hall, on the eve the official inauguration of the diocesan phase of the Synod for all the dioceses around the world, marked by a solemn Mass in Rome's St. Peter's Square on Sunday, Oct. 10. Dioceses across the world will inaugurate the synodal journey at the local level on Oct. 17.

A special Synod

The theme of the upcoming 16th Synod of Bishops is: "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission". Synodality indicates walking together and listening to one another but above all to the Holy Spirit. To deepen this essential characteristic of the Church, the upcoming synod is unlike any previous one. It starts with, and involves all the faithful at local Churches across the world, promising to listen to all, especially to laypeople. That is why this Synod is a 2-year process, starting from October 10, 2021, to October 2023.

The diocesan listening phase will run until April 2022 and will be followed by a continental phase from September 2022 to March 2023. The final "universal Church phase" will culminate in the traditional assembly of the Synod of Bishops in the Vatican in October 2023.

The protagonist of the Synod – the Spirit

In his discourse at Saturday's moment of prayer and reflection, Pope Francis dwelt on how the synodality of the Church is achieved, namely, through communion, participation, and mission. He also pointed out the dangers it can run into, as well as the opportunities it offers.

"In the one People of God, therefore, let us journey together, in order to experience a Church that receives and lives this gift of unity, and is open to the voice of the Spirit," Pope Francis said, stressing that the Synod is an "ecclesial moment", not a parliament or an investigation into opinions, but "an ecclesial moment" whose protagonist is the Holy Spirit. "Without the Spirit, there is no Synod," he stressed.

Communion, participation, mission

Explaining the Synod's three key words - communion, participation, and mission - he said that communion and mission describe the mystery of the Church. Communion expresses the very nature of the Church, according to the Second Vatican Council.

According to Saint Paul VI "communion, that is, cohesion and interior fullness, in grace, truth and collaboration... and mission, that is, apostolic commitment to the world of today". Saint John Paul II stressed that koinonia gives rise to the Church's mission of serving as a sign of the human family's intimate union with God.

For this reason, Pope Francis said, Synods must be well prepared for, especially at the local level with the participation of all. All are called to participate

He pointed out that 'communion' and 'mission' can risk remaining somewhat abstract, unless synodality is concretely expressed at every step of the synodal journey and activity, encouraging real involvement on the part of each and all". "All the baptized are called to take part in the Church's life and mission."

He acknowledged the frustration and impatience felt by many pastoral workers, members of diocesan and parish consultative bodies, and women, who frequently remain on the fringes. "Enabling everyone to participate is an essential ecclesial duty!" he stressed, adding, it is an indispensable ecclesial commitment based on the "identity card" of the baptism.

POPE FRANCIS RECENT INTERVIEW (CONTINUED)

Some time ago, Your Holiness, you admitted that a few years ago ecological issues were of no interest to you. Now Your Holiness has changed, for you are one of the world leaders who speak out most on this issue, on the abuses committed against the Earth. Has the ecological choice made you enemies? Will you be in Glasgow for COP26? Two auestions in one.

I am going to make history: [The V General Conference of CELAM in] Aparecida was in 2007 if I am not mistaken. I'm a little lost for dates. In Aparecida I heard the Brazilian bishops talk about preserving nature, the ecological problem, the Amazon.... They insisted, insisted, and I wondered what this had to do with evangelization. That's what I felt. I didn't have the faintest idea. I'm talking about 2007. That shocked me. When I returned to Buenos Aires, I became interested, and slowly I began to understand something. Already being here, huh? I am a convert in this. And then I understood more. And somehow, I realized that I had to do something and then I had the idea of writing something as a magisterium because the Church in front of this... just as I was a "salami" as we say in Argentina, a fool who did not understand any of this, there are so many people of good will who do not understand... So, to give some catechesis on this. I summoned a group of scientists to explain to me the real problems; not the hypotheses, but the real thing. They made me a nice catalogue and rightly so. I passed it on to theologians who reflected on it. And that is how Laudato si came about.

A nice anecdote: when I went to Strasbourg, President Hollande sent the Minister of the Environment, who at that time was Mrs. Ségolène Royal, to receive me and see me off. And in the conversation I had with her, she said to me, "Is it true that you are writing something?" The Minister of the Environment understood. And I said, "Yes, I'm on this." "Please publish it before [the] Paris [summit] because we need endorsements." I came back from Strasbourg and sped up. And it came out before the Paris meeting. For me, the Paris meeting was the *summum* in becoming globally aware. Then what happened? Fear set in. And slowly, in the subsequent meetings, they went backward. I hope that Glasgow will now raise its sights a bit and bring us more in line.

Perhaps many of you, especially Afghanistan watchers, were aware of the fatal brawl between two key groups of the Taliban breaking out during a talk focused on arranging positions for the new government: One led Mr Baradar, the Taliban chief negotiator, who managed to talk to Donald Trump on the phone in 2020 leading to the chaotic withdrawal of the American troops and the allies recently, and the other by members of the Haggani group, who probably claimed most of the credits due to their fighting contribution to the victory. It was said that there was some shootings taking place in the palace where the talk was happening causing

fatalities and injuries, and forcing Mr Baradar to leave Kabul and seek refuge in Kandahar. It was scary to hear the story and we have nothing but to pray hard for the country, particularly those who happen to share no similar views with the Taliban. Anyway, such a public fall out between Mr Baradar's group and the Haggani's within the Taliban perhaps might help us reflect well upon the Gospel account this week, telling us the story about how James and John guietly approached Jesus and asked for top positions in his kingdom, which they, I guess, might visualize as the one capable of defeating the Roman conquerors. This back-door approach of the two brothers of course caused some tension within the group, and other apostles got upset with them as Mark reported to us here, and were obviously unaware of what Jesus asked the pair to do when they asked to be seated on his right and left, two most powerful seats in the cabinet, that had to be prepared to drink his cup and to go through his baptism.

Although James and John were eager to say yes to Jesus' invitation, but I doubt that they would have had any idea of what sort of cup and baptism Jesus offered them then, the cup of sorrow he took up at the Last Supper and the baptism of sufferings he went through in the Passion and Crucifixion to come as we know today. Very much conscious of the divisive nature of the encounter, Jesus was quick to make the decision to summon the entire group to share with them his leadership vision, which requires them not to lord over others under them as ordinary rulers, but to commit themselves to serve others as servants in the way he has led them by his own example. This is what we call 'servant leadership' in the Church, something Pope Francis has tried to single out and constantly urge his clergy to follow and model their lives and ministries accordingly.

Let us pray today for all Christian leaders both clergy in the Church and parents at home may be inspired by the model of servant leadership that Jesus presents to us in the Gospel this Sunday, so that they may be able to showcase their leadership through the humble way they choose to serve those entrusted under their care and guidance.

ENCYCLICAL LETTER **FRATELLI TUTTI** OF THE HOLY FATHER **FRANCIS** ON FRATERNITY & SOCIAL FRIENDSHIP CHAPTER ONE - GLOBALIZATION AND PROGRESS WITHOUT A SHARED ROADMAP

29. With the Grand Imam Ahmad Al-Tayyeb, we do not ignore the positive advances made in the areas of science, technology, medicine, industry and welfare, above all in developed countries. Nonetheless, "we wish to emphasize that, together with these historical advances, great and valued as they are, there exists a moral deterioration that influences international action and a weakening of spiritual values and responsibility. This contributes to a general feeling of frustration, isolation and desperation". We see "outbreaks of tension and a buildup of arms and ammunition in a global context dominated by uncertainty, disillusionment, fear of the future, and controlled by narrow economic interests". We can also point to "major political crises, situations of injustice and the lack of an equitable distribution of natural resources... In the face of such crises that result in the deaths of millions of children – emaciated from poverty and hunger – there is an unacceptable silence on the international level".[27] This panorama, for all its undeniable advances, does not appear to lead to a more humane future.

<u>30</u>. In today's world, the sense of belonging to a single human family is fading, and the dream of working together for justice and peace seems an outdated utopia. What reigns instead is a cool, comfortable and globalized indifference, born of deep disillusionment concealed behind a deceptive illusion: thinking that we are all-powerful, while failing to realize that we are all in the same boat. This illusion, unmindful of the great fraternal values, leads to "a sort of cynicism. For that is the temptation we face if we go down the road of disenchantment and disappointment... Isolation and withdrawal into one's own interests are never the way to restore hope and bring about renewal. Rather, it is closeness; it is the culture of encounter. Isolation, no; closeness, yes. Culture clash, no; culture of encounter, yes".[28]

<u>31</u>. In this world that races ahead, yet lacks a shared roadmap, we increasingly sense that "the gap between concern for one's personal well-being and the prosperity of the larger human family seems to be stretching to the point of complete division between individuals and human community... It is one thing to feel forced to live together, but something entirely different to value the richness and beauty of those seeds of common life that need to be sought out and cultivated". [29] Technology is constantly advancing, yet "how wonderful it would be if the growth of scientific and technological innovation could come with more equality and social inclusion. How wonderful would it be, even as we discover faraway planets, to rediscover the needs of the brothers and sisters who orbit around us".[30]
