

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POPE FRANCIS RECENT INTERVIEW (CONTINUED).....

You have not watched San Lorenzo because you haven't wanted to watch television for years...

That's right. I made a promise on July 16, 1990. I felt that the Lord was asking me to do so, because we were in community watching something that ended up tawdry, unpleasant, bad. I felt bad. It was the night of July 15. And the next day, in prayer, I promised the Lord not to watch it. Of course, when a president takes office I watch it, when there is a plane crash, I watch it, those things... but I am not addicted to it.

You didn't watch the Copa America, for example.

No, not at all.

There is an old legend that says that some Pope has escaped from the Vatican. Has Francis made any escapade that no one has known about so far?

No. The one who used to go skiing was St. John Paul II. An hour and a bit away there was a ski slope, and he had it in his soul. And he was right to escape, he was covered. But one day while he was in line to go up and a boy said, "The Pope!" I don't know how he found out. And he went back right away, and he tried to take more precautions. The houses of families where I have gone to visit, as far as I remember, are three: a half convent of the Teresian Sisters where I wanted to visit Professor Mara, already 90 years old, a great woman who taught at the University of La Sapienza and then taught at the Augustinianum, and I wanted to go to celebrate Mass for her. Then, to pay my condolences to probably my best friend, an Italian journalist, at his home. And the third house I visited was that of Edith Bruck, the lady, 90 years old now, who was in the concentration camp. She was Hungarian. Jewish. This was this year at the beginning, or last year, I can't remember. These are the only three houses I went to in secret, and then it came out. I would love to walk down the street, I would love to, but I have to deprive myself, because I couldn't walk ten meters.

Have you ever been tempted to wear civilian clothes?

No, absolutely not. No.

...with a hat and glasses?

[Laughs] No, no, not at all.

How does Pope Francis fight nostalgia, who cooks him *los palitos de anis* [aniseed sticks], or what he always had for breakfast in La Puerto Rico?

I try not to make my nostalgia melancholic, autumnal, although one nice thing about the Argentine autumn, in Buenos Aires, was the cloudy, foggy days, where you couldn't see ten meters from the window, and I was listening to Piazzola. I do miss that a bit, but Rome has its foggy days too. Not nostalgia, no. The desire to walk from one parish to another, yes; but not nostalgia. Are the days of headaches over words or attributed words that went too far and had consequences that you didn't

The danger is always there. A word can be interpreted one way or the other, can't it? These are things that happen. And what do I know... I don't know where they got it from last week that I was going to resign! What word did they understand in my country? That's where the news came from. And they say it was a commotion, when it didn't even cross my mind. When there are interpretations that are a little distorted about some of my words, I keep quiet, because trying to clarify them is worse.

Do people talk a lot about soccer here in Santa Marta?

Yes, Italian soccer. I'm getting to know things a little bit. There is a lot of talk about soccer, yes.

What kind of soccer player were you, Your Holiness?

I was a stick. They called me 'el pata dura,' that's why they always put me in the goal, that's where I defended myself more or less well.

In our [sports] program *Tiempo de juego*, our colleagues, when I told them that I was coming to see the Pope, [said] "Please, get the Pope to tell you what he thinks about Messi's signing, he has gone to France." What do you like about the whole soccer world, do you follow it closely?

I wrote a pastoral letter on sports. A pastoral letter that was not a pastoral letter. In two steps. First there was the article published in the *Gazzetta dello Sport* on January 2 of this year and based on that—I corrected it—the pastoral letter. An interview article. I only say this: to be a good soccer player you have to have two things: to know how to work in a team and not to be, as we say in Buenos Aires in our slang, one who 'bites' the ball, but always in a team. And secondly, not to lose the amateur spirit. When sport loses that *amateur* spirit, it starts to become too commercialized. And there are men who have known how not to let themselves be stained by this and to give their earnings and everything to good works and foundations. But above all, working as a team, which is a school of team sports, and not losing the *amateur* spirit.

Your Holiness, I thank you very much for this unforgettable hour that you have offered to the listeners of COPE.

A big greeting to those who are listening and I ask you all to pray for me, that the Lord will continue to protect me and take care

of me, because if He leaves me on my own, I am a mess.

Normally it is you who would say this to us, but today it is we [who say it to you]: God bless you.

And to you all, God bless you. Thank you.

POPE FRANCIS AT AUDIENCE: LOVE ALONE ATTRACTS, AND CHANGES THE HUMAN HEART

Saint Paul reminds the Galatians – and us – that the centre of salvation and faith is the death and resurrection of the Lord, Pope Francis said at Wednesday's General Audience.

The Pope warned that there are many people today "who still seek religious security rather than the living and true God, focusing on rituals and precepts instead of embracing God's love with their whole being."

Return to what is essential

So, he said, St Paul asks the Galatians "to return to what is essential, to the God who gives us life in Christ crucified." Pope Francis encourages us to "place ourselves in front of Christ crucified," including in Adoration of the Eucharist, when we feel we are losing the thread in our spiritual life.

This leads to a further step, he continued: When we meet Christ crucified, Jesus changes our hearts, which leads us to understand that "the Gospel is meant for everyone, not just for a privileged few." Thus, the Pope said, "the life of the community is regenerated" and through the Spirit, our lives as Christians are renewed, and we are able to continue "to engage in our spiritual battle."

Works of the flesh v. fruit of the Spirit

Here Saint Paul presents a dichotomy between the "works of the flesh" and the "fruit of the Spirit." Pope Francis explained that the works of the flesh are "behaviours that are contrary to the Spirit of God. St Paul does not intend to say that the flesh is evil in itself, but uses the term to indicate the condition of being turned in on oneself, "closing the door to the spirit" and reminding us that the things of the world grow old and pass away, "while the Spirit gives life."

Christians are called to live out our baptismal calling, which leads to the fruits of the Spirit: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control." Pope Francis invited Christians to read Saint Paul and reflect on our own behavior to see if we are bearing those fruits.

A challenge for our communities

"The Apostle's teaching poses quite a challenge for our communities, too," Pope Francis said. He explained, "the beauty of faith in Jesus Christ cannot be grasped on the basis of so many commandments or of a moral vision developed in many layers which can make us forget the original fruitfulness of love nourished by prayer from which peace and joyful witness flow. Nor, he said, can "the life of the Spirit ... be suffocated by a bureaucracy that prevents access to the grace of the Spirit, the initiator of conversion of the heart."

Proclaiming Christ crucified

Therefore, Pope Francis said in conclusion, "we have the huge responsibility of proclaiming Christ crucified and risen, enlivened by the breath of the Spirit of love. For it is this Love alone that possesses the power to attract and change the human

But you have more of a hand up there. [Laughs] I have always been struck by your relationship with the writer Jorge Luis Borges. Why did he pay so much attention to that young Jesuit?

I don't know why. I approached him because I was very close to his secretary. And then a friendliness... I was not a priest when I met him. I was 25 or 26 years old when I met him, and I was teaching in Santa Fe as a Jesuit, in those three years that we Jesuits taught at school, and I invited him to come and speak to my students of Literature. And he came, and he had his course... I don't know why. But he was a very good man. A very good man.

We have heard you talk a lot about your paternal grandmother, grand-mother Rosa, but we have heard you talk less about your mother, or perhaps we simply have not heard you talk about your mother...

There are two factors at work here. We are five siblings, all very close to our grandparents. God has preserved our grandparents until we grew up. I lost my first grandfather, the most distant of all, when I was 16 years old, and my last grandmother when I was a Jesuit provincial. So the grandparents remained with us always. There was also a tradition at home; the four older ones, because the youngest came six years later, spent the vacations with the grandparents, so that mom and dad could rest a little. It was fun. There is a lot of that grandparents' thing. About grandma Rosa what I tell are the same anecdotes as always, some of them are very funny. From the other grandmother, I also tell anecdotes, like the lesson she gave me the day of Prokofiev's death, about the effort in life. When I asked her how that man must have made it so far. I was a teenager. And ves. I also remember many things about my mother that I also recount... But perhaps it is more striking about grandma because I keep repeating some curious things about her, some unrepeatable things by letter, by radio programs... some sayings that taught us a lot. But, apart from the fact that we were very fond of our grandparents, well, in fact on Sundays we would go to our grandparents' house and then to the stadium to watch San Lorenzo. But grandparents had a great influence on our life.

Dear Friends.

Europe and America, as we know, have been the bastions of Christianity where the majority of people have their faith in Jesus in one way or another, but the way America and guite a few European countries have chosen to deal with migrants and refugees seem to trouble many non-Christian onlookers worldwide, since it is obviously against the very core teaching of Jesus, as he points it out to the scribe asking him about his top commandments. With no hesitation, he tells the inquirer straight away the top two: number one, he ought to love God wholeheartedly, and number two, he ought to love his neighbor as himself.

Here Jesus puts together the teaching of Deuteronomy (6.4) that we have in the first reading this Sunday, and the one of Leviticus (19.18), and make them his commandments, which all his followers are required to carry out with no excuse and exception. It's worth to pay attention to the language Jesus opted for while spelling out his highly distinctive commandments of love, that he chose the Greek word 'agape' to define what kind of love he expects his follower to live out. It is neither the erotic love nor the brotherly one people experience in their everyday lives, but it is the highest form of love, the father love of God given to humanity, and the reciprocal love of man offered to God.

What Jesus told the scribes at the end of their encounter that 'you are not far from the Kingdom of God' is highly significant. Jesus was kind of reminding him that he was close to the ultimate prize of all, and yet he has still had some more to do, and he perhaps needed to do was to put God's commandments that he knew so well into practice, meaning to show his love for God and for people around him.

As we know, a scribe was a very important person in Jesus' time, because he was entrusted with the task copying, studying and interpreting the Jewish Scriptures. The scribes were said to debate among themselves even about little things such as whether or not the law would permit a person to eat an egg laid a chicken on the Sabbath, and how far one could walk on the Sabbath in order not to violate the commandment to fully observe such a holy day.

The scribes even created 613 new laws, known as the oral traditions, to clarify the original laws God gave to Moses, and they then challenged each other to sum up all of these laws at once in as few rods as possible.

As a whole, the scribe in the Gospel story and his mates seemed to be more concerned with the technical side of the two commandments they all had been very familiar with, and fail to realize the magnitude of their application. As long as they remained stuck in such a position, they can claim no possession of the Kingdom of God.

Let us pray today for the wisdom to see the beauty and importance of Jesus' teaching in the Gospel this Sunday, and the strength not just to say love to God and our neighbor, but to show our most genuine, selfless and sincere love for God and all around us, no matter who they are, what they do and where they come from. Have an agape-oriented week.

ENCYCLICAL LETTER FRATELLITUTTI OF THE HOLY FATHER FRANCIS ON FRATERNITY & SOCIAL FRIENDSHIP CHAPTER ONE - PANDEMICS AND OTHER CALAMITIES IN HISTORY

32. True, a worldwide tragedy like the Covid-19 pandemic momentarily revived the sense that we are a global community, all in the same boat, where one person's problems are the problems of all. Once more we realized that no one is saved alone; we can only be saved together. As I said in those days, "the storm has exposed our vulnerability and uncovered those false and superfluous certainties around which we constructed our daily schedules, our projects, our habits and priorities... Amid this storm, the façade of those stereotypes with which we camouflaged our egos, always worrying about appearances, has fallen away, revealing once more the ineluctable and blessed awareness that we are part of one another, that we are brothers and sisters of one another".

33. The world was relentlessly moving towards an economy that, thanks to technological progress, sought to reduce "human costs"; there were those who would have had us believe that freedom of the market was sufficient to keep everything secure. Yet the brutal and unforeseen blow of this uncontrolled pandemic forced us to recover our concern for human beings, for everyone, rather than for the benefit of a few. Today we can recognize that "we fed ourselves on dreams of splendour and grandeur, and ended up consuming distraction, insularity and solitude. We gorged ourselves on networking, and lost the taste of fraternity. We looked for quick and safe results, only to find ourselves overwhelmed by impatience and anxiety. Prisoners of a virtual reality, we lost the taste and flavour of the truly real". The pain, uncertainty and fear, and the realization of our own limitations, brought on by the pandemic have only made it all the more urgent that we rethink our styles of life, our relationships, the organization of our societies and, above all, the meaning of our existence.

34. If everything is connected, it is hard to imagine that this global disaster is unrelated to our way of approaching reality, our claim to be absolute masters of our own lives and of all that exists. I do not want to speak of divine retribution, nor would it be sufficient to say that the harm we do to nature is itself the punishment for our offences. The world is itself crying out in rebellion. We are reminded of the well-known verse of the poet Virgil that evokes the "tears of things", the misfortunes of life and history 35. All too quickly, however, we forget the lessons of history, "the teacher of life". [Once this health crisis passes, our worst response would be to plunge even more deeply into feverish consumerism and new forms of egotistic self-preservation. God willing, after all this, we will think no longer in terms of "them" and "those", but only "us". If only this may prove not to be just another tragedy of history from which we learned nothing. If only we might keep in mind all those elderly persons who died for lack of respirators, partly as a result of the dismantling, year after year, of healthcare systems. If only this immense sorrow may not prove useless, but enable us to take a step forward towards a new style of life. If only we might rediscover once for all that we need one another, and that in this way our human family can experience a rebirth, with all its faces, all its hands and all its voices, beyond the walls that we have erected.

36. Unless we recover the shared passion to create a community of belonging and solidarity worthy of our time, our energy and our resources, the global illusion that misled us will collapse and leave many in the grip of anguish and emptiness. Nor should we naively refuse to recognize that "obsession with a consumerist lifestyle, above all when few people are capable of maintaining it, can only lead to violence and mutual destruction". The notion of "every man for himself" will rapidly degenerate into a freefor-all that would prove worse than any pandemic.
