





POPE FRANCIS INFILGHT INTERVIEW FROM THE RECENT EUROPEAN TRIP

Istávan Károly Kuzmányi (Magyar Kurír): Holy Father, thank you for your visit to Budapest where you quoted the venerable Cardinal Mindszenty who said, "If there are one million Hungarians praying, I am not afraid of the future..." So, hee is my question: Why did you decide, after 21 years, to participate as Pope in the Eucharistic Congress beginning with this event? How do you view Christianity in Europe, and what do you think we can do, we Hungarians, about this? Thank you.

Well, thank you, thank you very much. At the beginning it was not well understood: "But you are coming only for the ceremony, and you aren't going to visit us Hungarians? And some people thought badly. No: I explained that a visit had already been planned -- it was in mind -- to Slovakia and the other began after. But I promised your President whom I met -- this is the third time I have met him -- I promised to see whether it will be possible to come back next year or the following one because the Hungarians have so many values. I was struck by the sense of ecumenism, for example that you have, but with a deep, deep, deep profundity. This is what hit me. In general, Europe - I always say this - must reassume the dreams of the founding fathers of the European Union. The European Union is not a gathering to get things done, there is a spirit behind the EU that Schuman, Adenauer, De Gasperi, these great men: go back there. Because there's the danger to be just a managment office, the European Union, and that is not good. It must move precisely toward mysticism, in search of Europe's roots and bring it forward. And I think all the countries must move forward. It is true that there are some interests, perhaps not European ones, that attempt to use the European Union for ideological colonization, and this is not good. No: the European Union must be indepedent in and of itself, and all the countries on the same level, inspired by the dream of its Great Founders. This is my idea. And you Hungarians: I was with you last year [editor: 2 years ago] in Transylvania, that Mass in Hungarian was beautiful.

Bohumil Petrik (Dennik Standard): Vaccination has divided Christians, even in Slovakia. You say that it is an act of love to get vaccinated. So, when someone is not vaccinated, what would you call that? Because some believers even, feel discriminated against. There are different approaches in different Dioceses on this issue. Even prior to your visit only those who were vaccinated could come to the papal events, then it changed and even those with a negative covid test could attend. How do we reconcile on this issue?

This is important, no? It is a bit strange, no? Because humanity has a friendly history with vaccines: we as children, even the measles, the other one for polio... all children were vaccinated and no said "mu", no? This one has come. Perhaps it has come because of the virulence and the uncertainty, not only regarding the pandemic, but also due to the diversity of vaccines, and also the reputation of some vaccines that they are not suitable or that they are little more than distilled water. This has created fear in people. Then, there are others who say they are dangerous because with the vaccine the virus linside, and a lot of argumentation that have created this division. Even in the College of Cardinals, there are some anti-vaxxers, and one of them, poor man, was hospitalized with the virus. But, life is ironic. Yes, I can't explain it well: some say it's because of the difference of where the vaccines come from that there has not been sufficient testing and they are afraid. But thins need to be clear, clarify and speak sincerely about this. In the Vatican, everyone has been vaccinated except a small group under study to know how to help them.

Daniel Verdú Palay (El Pais): Good afternoon, Your Holiness. How are you? On Sunday morning you met with the president [editor: prime minister], Viktor Mihály Orbán. It has been noticed and it can be understood some of your differences on themes such as migrants, Europe, nationalism. We wanted to as you and know how the meeting went, whether you touched the topic of migrants that has returned to be very important with the Afghanistan crisis, and what you think about the laws on homosexuals that he has enacted. We are asking you also because we think that you asked him not to let Christian Hungary die. But listening to your discorses these past days, it would seem that at times there are policies that kill Christian values...

Good. I received him, because the President came to me, he had the courtesy. This kindness, he came. It is the third time I have met him -- he came with the Prime Minister and the Deputy Minister, there were three of them But the President spoke. The first topic -- that was dominant -- was ecology. Truly, hats off to you Hungarians for the ecological conscience you have. Impressive. He explained how they purify the rivers, things that I did not know! This was the main thing. Then I asked about the average age, because I am concerned about the demographic winter. In Italy, if I am not mistaken, the average age is 47, and I think in Spain it is even worse. Many villages are empty or with a dozon elderly people. It is a serious concern. How can it be resolved? Here, the president explained to me -- still the president -- explained to me the law they have to help young couples marry and have children. It is interesting. It is a law...I do not know if...it is somewhat similar to the French, but more developed. Because of this, the French do not have the tragedy that Spain has or we have.... They explained this to me, and they added something technical, the Prime Minister and the Deputy Minister about what this law is about. And then, what other things did they speak about? On immigration, nothing, no, it did not come up. Then we returned to ecology, and yes, the family, in the sense of what I had asked, you can see that there are so many young people, so many children. But even In Slovakia: I was surprised, there are so many children and many young couples, and this is a promise. Now the challenge is to find jobs, so that they don't go abroad after, because if there are no jobs, they go abroad looking for work. But these were the things... But, the president spoke all the time, and both ministers added some precise data. There was a good atmosphere. The meeting lasted long enough, about 35-40 minutes I think.

Gerard O'Connell (America Magazine): First, we are all happy that the surgery had a wonderful effect, you are rejuvenated!

Pope Francis: They told me that someone wanted to have the operation, I don't know who it was... But it wasn't cosmetic, eh!

POPE FRANCIS AT AUDIENCE: BELIEVING IN JESUS MEANS FOLLOWING HIM

"To believe in Jesus means to follow Him," Pope Francis said at Wednesday's General Audience, adding, "At the same time, it means avoiding the opposite way, that of selfishness, of seeking one's own interest."

The Holy Father, continuing his catechesis on the Letter to the Galatians, reflected on St Paul's exhortation to "walk in the Spirit." The Holy Spirit, he said, is our guide on our "journey along the way of Christ," – a "stupendous, but difficult journey, that begins in Baptism and lasts our whole life."

Walking according to the Spirit

Following the path of Jesus, he said, leads Christians to "a positive vision of life," that does not deny the evils and difficulties seen in life, but means instead "that belief in God is always stronger than our resistance and greater than our sins." St Paul, the Pope said, includes himself when he invites the Galatians "to walk in the Spirit." "Even though he knows that Christ lives in him," St Paul "is also convinced that he has not yet reached the goal." Pope Francis explains that Paul "does not place himself above his community, but places himself in the midst of the journey that everyone is on, in order to provide a concrete example of how necessary it is to obey God, corresponding more and more to the Spirit's guidance."

Not judging others

Pope Francis emphasised that walking according to the Spirit involves us not only as individuals, but also as a community. It is easy, he said, to try to live up to the "exciting, but demanding" call to follow Jesus by having recourse to rigid precepts. But this, he said, "means straying from the path of freedom." Instead, "journeying along the way of the Spirit requires space to grace and charity."

The supreme rule of love

In particular, the Pope said, we can often be tempted to judge others if they make a mistake or fall away from the path of Jesus. Pope Francis encouraged the faithful to examine our own lives when we are tempted to judge others. If we do feel the need to correct others, he said, we should do so with gentleness and humility. "In addition to giving us the gift of gentleness," he said, "the Holy Spirit invites us to be in solidarity, to bear others burdens." The Pope insisted, "the supreme rule regarding fraternal correction is love: to desire the good of our brothers and sisters."

Pope Francis concluded his audience by encouraging us "to walk along this path with joy and patience, allowing ourselves to be guided by the Holy Spirit."

PAPAL NOVEMBER PRAYER INTENTION: FOR THOSE WHO SUFFER FROM DEPRESSION

"Overwork and work-related stress cause many people to experience extreme exhaustion —mental, emotional, affective, and physical exhaustion."

Pope Francis opened the video accompanying his prayer intention for November with those words with which most people can probably identify.

His intention was released in this month's The Pope Video, prepared by the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network.

It comes as people living in the Northern Hemisphere enter the Autumn and Winter seasons, during which cooler weather is often accompanied by rainy days and more time spent indoors.

Silent listening

The Pope took note of that seasonal situation in his timely prayer intention.

"Sadness, apathy, and spiritual tiredness end up dominating people's lives, who are overloaded due to the rhythm of life today," he said.

Pope Francis thus encouraged everyone to reach out to those around us who are depressed, desperate, or without hope. And he advised against comforting others with too many words.

"Often," he said, "we should just simply listen in silence, because we cannot go and tell someone, 'No, life's not like that. Listen to me, I'll give you the solution."

"There is no solution," remarked the Pope

Jesus' offer of comfort

However, he continued, besides "indispensable psychological counseling", Jesus' words can help us and others to find solace: "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

With that advice in mind, Pope Francis wrapped up his prayer intention video message with a renewed invitation to assist those around us.

"Let us pray that people who suffer from depression or burn-out will find support and a light that opens them up to life," he prayed.

Choosing life amid depression

The November edition of The Pope Video was created in conjunction with the <u>Association of Catholic Mental Health Ministers</u>, which offers spiritual support for people suffering various forms of mental illness.

According to a press release accompanying the video, around 1 in 10 people worldwide lives with a mental health disorder, amounting to 792 million people or 11 percent of the population.

Depression and anxiety account for around 3 and 4 percent, respectively, of those illnesses.

They can sometimes lead to suicide when left untreated or are severe and recurrent. Some 700,000 people commit suicide each year, making it the fourth leading cause of death in people aged 15 to 29.

Covid-related difficulties

As has been well-noted, the Covid-19 pandemic, and its associated restrictions on daily life, has led severely tested the mental and emotional resilience of many people.

Recently David Beasley, director of the United Nations' World Food Programme, had a go at world billionaires for accumulating lot of wealth and failing to care for the hungry, and went on to say that a 6 billion contribution could help solve world's hunger.

His comment was immediately challenged by Elon Musk who sent out a message on Twitter asking Beasley to describe how to fix the world's hunger with 6 billion and he would be happy to sell off his Tesla stocks to do it.

Mr Musk also added a clause asking for transparency and accountability with the program. Let's hope that UN could satisfy his request to get him on board in the attempt to fix once for all the global hunger.

Talking about charity, we have the second part of the Gospel account this Sunday highlighting a beautiful example of what it means to be charitable.

After warning his disciples about the greedy and hypocrisy of the scribes who were more interested in seeking honour, recognition and money than anything else in their relationship with others. Jesus invited them to pay attention to a poor widow, who donated a small amount of money, the equivalent of a penny according to Mark. Compared to what other rich people put into the temple treasury, her contribution was really insignificant, but Jesus singled her out as giving the most to the temple, because she, according to Jesus, donated all she had to survive, while the others just offered the extra money they had. Jesus obviously appreciated her generosity by offering to God everything she had, though the size of her donation was just a tiny bit compared to others who could afford to give so much more.

So Jesus through this story probably meant to encourage us to be generous to God in giving the most we can afford, and what counts before God is not about how much we give to those in need or to a good cause, but about the desire and the effort we put into our charity works.

Pray that the example of the poor widow much admired by Jesus in the Gospel today might inspire us to be most generous to the Lord in whichever way we can to make His name glorified in the world. Have a charity-filled week.

ENCYCLICAL LETTER *FRATELLI TUTTI* OF THE HOLY FATHER *FRANCIS* ON FRATERNITY & SOCIAL FRIENDSHIP CHAPTER ONE - AN ABSENCE OF HUMAN DIGNITY ON THE BORDERS

37. Certain populist political regimes, as well as certain liberal economic approaches, maintain that an influx of migrants is to be prevented at all costs. Arguments are also made for the propriety of limiting aid to poor countries, so that they can hit rock bottom and find themselves forced to take austerity measures. One fails to realize that behind such statements, abstract and hard to support, great numbers of lives are at stake. Many migrants have fled from war, persecution and natural catastrophes. Others, rightly, "are seeking opportunities for themselves and their families. They dream of a better future and they want to create the conditions for achieving it".

38. Sadly, some "are attracted by Western culture, sometimes with unrealistic expectations that expose them to grave disappointments. Unscrupulous traffickers, frequently linked to drug cartels or arms cartels, exploit the weakness of migrants, who too often experience violence, trafficking, psychological and physical abuse and untold sufferings on their journey". Those who emigrate "experience separation from their place of origin, and often a cultural and religious uprooting as well. Fragmentation is also felt by the communities they leave behind, which lose their most vigorous and enterprising elements, and by families, especially when one or both of the parents migrates, leaving the children in the country of origin". For this reason, "there is also a need to reaffirm the right not to emigrate, that is, to remain in one's homeland".

- **39.** Then too, "in some host countries, migration causes fear and alarm, often fomented and exploited for political purposes. This can lead to a xenophobic mentality, as people close in on themselves, and it needs to be addressed decisively". Migrants are not seen as entitled like others to participate in the life of society, and it is forgotten that they possess the same intrinsic dignity as any person. Hence they ought to be "agents in their own redemption". No one will ever openly deny that they are human beings, yet in practice, by our decisions and the way we treat them, we can show that we consider them less worthy, less important, less human. For Christians, this way of thinking and acting is unacceptable, since it sets certain political preferences above deep convictions of our faith: the inalienable dignity of each human person regardless of origin, race or religion, and the supreme law of fraternal love.
- **40.** "Migrations, more than ever before, will play a pivotal role in the future of our world". At present, however, migration is affected by the "loss of that sense of responsibility for our brothers and sisters on which every civil society is based". Europe, for example, seriously risks taking this path. Nonetheless, "aided by its great cultural and religious heritage, it has the means to defend the centrality of the human person and to find the right balance between its twofold moral responsibility to protect the rights of its citizens and to assure assistance and acceptance to migrants".
- **41.** I realize that some people are hesitant and fearful with regard to migrants. I consider this part of our natural instinct of self-defence. Yet it is also true that an individual and a people are only fruitful and productive if they are able to develop a creative openness to others. I ask everyone to move beyond those primal reactions because "there is a problem when doubts and fears condition our way of thinking and acting to the point of making us intolerant, closed and perhaps even without realizing it racist. In this way, fear deprives us of the desire and the ability to encounter the other".
