



The Body and Blood of Our Lord



Today we celebrate the feast of the Body and Blood of Our Lord in the Holy Eucharist.

At the Last Supper, Jesus changed bread and wine into His own Body and Blood. He has the power to do this because He is God. He did this because He wanted to stay with us even after He died and went into Heaven.

Jesus comes to us in every Mass. The priest takes the place of Jesus, saying the words that Jesus said at the Last Supper, and the bread and wine become the real Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus even though they still look like bread and wine.

How do I receive Communion well?

1. Be ready! Think about what is going to happen. Make sure that you don't have any big sins on your soul. If you do, then go to confession first.

2. Don't eat or drink anything other than water or medicine for an hour before going to Holy Communion. This is a sign of respect for Our Lord.

3. After receiving Holy Communion, take some time to thank Jesus for coming to you and talk to Him. He is

your best friend and loves spending time with you!



However, it does not detract from the fact that women, with regards to gratitude and tenderness of faith, can teach men some things that men may have a hard time understanding, and even Peter's mother-in-law, before the Apostles arrived, along the path of following Jesus, showed the way to them too.

He went on to highlight Jesus' special gentleness of taking Simon's mother-in-law "by the hand" and lifting her up, which shows his special sensibility to the weak and the sick, which he had certainly learned from his mother. Concluding, the Pope urged everyone to make efforts to bring young and old people together so that the young may learn from the wisdom of the elderly.

POPE FRANCIS MESSAGE FOR THE WORLD DAY OF THE POOR: 'WE MUST UPHOLD VALUES OF RESPONSIBILITY, SOLI-DARITY.' In his message for the 6th World Day of the Poor, Pope Francis invites Christians to greater solidarity and responsibility for the poor in society, stressing the importance of putting our faith into practice through personal involvement that cannot be delegated to others. The World Day of the Poor is commemorated annually on the 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time in the liturgical calendar, which this year falls on 13 November.

In this year's message for the annual observance themed "For your sakes Christ became poor (2 Cor. 8:9)". Pope Francis recalled the words of St. Paul to the Christians of Corinth, in order to encourage their efforts to show solidarity with their brothers and sisters in need. The Pope noted that the World Day this year comes "as a healthy challenge, helping us to reflect on our style of life and on the many forms of poverty all around us."

Covid-19, war in Ukraine

Reflecting on current events in the world, Pope Francis pointed to the Covid-19 pandemic from which the world is emerging, including showing signs of an economic recovery that could benefit millions made poorer by the loss of their jobs. He lamented that "another catastrophe" - the war in Ukraine - "has destined to impose on our world a very different scenario." This, he added, is made more complex due to the direct intervention of a "superpower" aimed "at imposing its own will in violation of the principle of the self-determination of peoples."

Pope Francis also highlighted the great poverty produced by the "senselessness of war" and how violence "strikes those who are defenceless and vulnerable."

In this regard, he considered the deportation of thousands of persons, "in order to sever their roots and impose on them another identity," and the millions of women, children and elderly people "forced to brave the danger of bombs just to find safety by seeking refuge as displaced persons in neighbouring countries." More so, many remain in war zones, living each day with fear, lack of food, water, medical care and human affection.

"In these situations," he added, "reason is darkened and those who feel its effects are the countless ordinary people who end up being added to the already great numbers of those in need."

Responding to the needs of the poor

The sixth World Day of the Poor, celebrated in the midst of this situation, invites us to reflect on the summons of the Apostle to "keep our gaze fixed on Jesus" who though rich became poor so that by his poverty we might become rich, the Pope said. He recalled that when St. Paul's visited Jerusalem he met with Peter, James and John, who urged him not to forget the poor, and the Apostle set about organizing a great collection to aid the community of Jerusalem that was experiencing a great hardship due to food shortages. In the same manner, every Sunday during the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, said the Pope, we have done the same thing, "pooling our offerings so that the community can provide for the needs of the poor"- something that Christians have always done "with joy and a sense of responsibility."

Renewing initial motivation

Pope Francis pointed out that St. Paul wrote to the community of Corinth, asking them to relaunch their collection after their initial outburst of enthusiasm began to falter and the initiative proposed by the Apostle had lost some of its impetus. On this note, the Holy Father thought of the generosity that has led entire populations "to open their doors to welcome millions of refugees from wars in the Middle East. Central Africa and now Ukraine." with families opening their homes to make room for other families and communities generously accepting many in order to enable them live with dignity. However, he acknowledges that "the longer the conflicts last, the more burdensome their consequences become" and the people who offer welcome find it increasingly difficult to maintain their relief efforts past the emergency stage. "This is the moment for us not to lose heart but to renew our initial motivation," the Pope urged. "The work we have begun needs to be brought to completion with the same sense of responsibility." Solidarity

Solidarity, the Pope explained, "is sharing the little we have with those who have nothing, so that no one will go without," The sense of community and of communion as a style of life increases and a sense of solidarity matures, he added. He invited Christians to consider that in some countries, over the past decades, families have experienced a significant increase in affluence and security as a positive result of private initiatives, economic growth and concrete incentives to support families and social responsibility. The benefits of these, in terms of security and stability "can now be shared with those who have been forced to leave behind their homes and native countries in search of safety and survival," the Pope said. "As members of civil society, let us continue to uphold the values of freedom, responsibility, fraternity, and solidarity. And as Christians, let us always make charity, faith and hope the basis of our lives and our actions." He noted that St. Paul did not oblige Christians in Corinth to perform works of charity but was prompted by the need for concrete assistance. The Apostle, instead, was "testing the genuineness of their love by the earnestness of their concern for the poor" - a sign of love shown by Jesus Himself.

"Generosity towards the poor has its most powerful motivation in the example of the Son of God, who chose to become poor," the Pope said.

POPE FRANCIS AT ANGELUS: HOLY TRINITY REVOLUTINEZES OUR WAY OF LIFE

The Holy Trinity, Pope Francis says, "is not so much a theological exercise," but "a revolution in our way of life." The Pope stressed this during his Sunday Angelus address in St. Peter's Square, on the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity. The Holy Father began by reflecting on today's Solemnity, recalling today's Gospel passage in which Jesus presents the Father and the Holy Spirit. The Spirit, Jesus explains, "will not speak on His own authority, but whatever He hears, He will speak, and He will declare to you the things that are to come."

The Pope pointed out that the Holy Spirit speaks, but not of Himself, rather He announces and speaks about Jesus and reveals the Father. Likewise, the Father, "who possesses everything, because He is the origin of all things," gives to the Son everything He possesses and keeps nothing for Himself.

What about ourselves?

The Holy Father encouraged the faithful to look at themselves and about what we pronounce and possess. He observed how normally, when we speak, we tend to speak about ourselves and what we do. "How different this is from the Holy Spirit, who speaks by announcing others!" Moreover, the Pope lamented our tendency to hold tightly onto our possessions, not sharing what we possess with others, "even those who lack the basic necessities!"

Living for others, and shown through our actions The Holy Father stressed that our words must translate into actions.

"This is why," Pope Francis said, "celebrating the Holy Trinity is not so much a theological exercise, but a revolution in our way of life." God, in whom each Person lives for the other, not for himself, provokes us to live with others and for others.

"Today we can ask ourselves if our life reflects the God we believe in: do I, who profess faith in God the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, truly believe that in order to live I need others. I need to give myself to others, I need to serve others? Do I affirm this in words or with my life?" God, One and Triune, the Pope underscored, must be shown with deeds rather than words.

God, the Pope continued, "is transmitted not so much through books, but rather through the witness of life."

"Think about good, generous, meek people we have met; recalling their way of thinking and acting, we can have a small

reflection of God-Love. And what does it mean to love? Not only to wish them well and to do good, but first and foremost, at the root, to welcome others, to make room for others, to give space to others. This is what it means to love..." We are not islands

The Trinity, the Pope said, teaches us that one can never be without the other. "We are not islands," the Holy Father noted, "we are in the world to live in God's image: open, in need of others and in need of helping others."

He encouraged the faithful to ask themselves: "In everyday life, am I too a reflection of the Trinity?"

"The Sign of the Cross that I make every day, remains a gesture for its own sake, or does it inspire my way of speaking, of encountering, of responding, of judging, of forgiving?"

Pope Francis concluded, praying: "May Our Lady, daughter of the Father, mother of the Son and bride of the Spirit, help us to welcome and bear witness in life to the mystery of God-Love."

POPE FRANCIS AT AUDIENCE

Continuing his catechesis on the value of old age at the General Audience, Pope Francis invites the elderly to overcome the temptation to stand aside, because the Lord never discards them, but rather restores their strength to serve. By Benedict Mayaki, SJ

During the Wednesday General Audience, Pope Francis continues his catechesis series on the elderly, reflecting on the account of the healing of Simon's mother-in-law in the Gospel of Mark

"We do not know if it was a mild illness, but in old age, even a simple fever can be dangerous," the Pope said, adding "when you are old, you no longer command your body. One must learn to choose what to do and what not to do."

He noted that in old age, the vigor of the body fails and abandons us even though our heart does not stop yearning and we must then learn "to purify desire: to have patience, to choose what to ask of the body, or of life."

Illness and the elderly

Illness weighs on the elderly in a different and new way than when one is young or an adult, said the Pope, noting that an old person's illness appears to hasten death and diminishes the time we have to live, which is already considered short. For many elderly people, he explains, doubt begins to creep in that they would not recover and they may begin to lose hope in the future.

But the Gospel scene helps us to hope and offers a first lesson: that Jesus did not visit the sick woman alone, rather, he went there with the disciples. In the same manner, "the Christian community that must take care of the elderly relatives and friends," the Pope said. Christian community and the elderly Pope Francis insists that visits to the elderly should be done by many, together and often, especially in these days when the number of the elder has increased.

He adds that we should feel a responsibility to visit the elderly who are often alone and present them to the Lord with our prayers. "A society truly welcomes life when it recognizes that it is also precious in old age, in disability, in serious illness and even when it is fadina.'

Thus, Jesus sees the sick woman, takes her by the hand and heals her. With this gesture of love, noted the Pope, Jesus gives a first lesson to the disciples, that "salvation is announced or, better, communicated through attention to that sick person; and the woman's faith shines in gratitude for the tenderness of God who bent over her."

Service by the elderly

Following the woman's healing, she "arose and served them," Pope Francis pointed out, indicating that this is the second lesson given to us by the woman.

In this regard, he notes that even elders can and should serve the community, cultivating the responsibility to serve and overcoming the temptation to stand aside, because "the Lord does not reject them; on the contrary, he restores to them the strength to serve."He said that elders who preserve the disposition for healing, consolation, and intercession for their brothers and sisters, are perhaps "the highest testimony to the purity of this gratitude that accompanies faith."

So, if elders were placed at the center of collective attention instead of being rejected and removed from community events, they would be encouraged to exercise the valuable ministry of gratitude to God.

The elders' gratitude for the gifts received from God in their lives, as Peter's mother-in-law teaches us, "restores to the community, the joy of living together and confers to the faith of the disciples the essential feature of its destination," the Pope said.

Service of womenThe Holy Father goes on to highlight that the spirit of intercession and service which Jesus prescribes for his disciples is not simply a women's affair, because "there is no trace of this limitation in Jesus' words and deeds." In fact, he notes, the evangelical service of gratitude for God's tenderness is not in any way written according to the grammar of the man who is master and the woman who serves.

Dear Friends.



This week we celebrate a special feast called the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, traditionally known as Corpus Christi, meant to celebrate both the body and blood of Christ at the same time. In a sense, this feast duplicates the Eucharistic focus of Holy Thursday, highlighting the saving dimension of the sacrament. Today marks the end of a series of feasts such as the Ascension, Pentecost, Most Holy Trinity and takes us back to Ordinary Time. Corpus Christi originally began in the diocese of Liege, France (1246), inspired by revelations of

Juliana of Mont-Cornillon, a French nun (1192-1258). It was enthusiastically welcomed in Europe and promulgated universally by Pope Urban in 1264 on the recommendation of St Thomas Aquinas. A prominent feature of this feast since 14th century has been a Eucharistic procession, taking place after Mass, in which the host was carried out onto the streets as an act of public witness to Jesus in the Eucharist. In the Eucharist this Sunday, we have the chance to listen to the account of Luke recounting the story of how Jesus miraculously turned the five loaves and two fish into food enough to feed the crowd of five thousand people following him to hear him talk to them about the Kingdom of God and experience his healing power, a highly symbolic work preparing the disciples in particular for the Eucharist he was going to establish later on at the Last Supper.

It is worth while to keep in mind what Jesus did to get the disciples involved in the miracle by inviting to them to organize the crowds into small groups of fifty, then distribute the food, and finally collect the leftover, twelve baskets full of food from the humble five loaves and two fish at the start. As we celebrate this amazing feast today, let us give praise and thanks to Jesus for giving us the gift of himself in the Eucharist. May the grace of the Eucharist we receive today help strengthen our faith in the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist we celebrate today and always, and inspires us to be his healing hands in where ever we live.
