



FIRST READING

A reading from the book of Wisdom 18:6-9

That night had been foretold to our ancestors, so that, once they saw what kind of oaths they had put their trust in, they would joyfully take courage. This was the expectation of your people, the saving of the virtuous and the ruin of their enemies; for by the same act with which you took vengeance on our foes you made us glorious by calling us to you. The devout children of worthy men offered sacrifice in secret and this divine pact they struck with one accord: that the saints would share the same blessings and dangers alike; and forthwith they had begun to chant the hymns of the fathers. SECOND READING A reading from the letter to the Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19

Only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of the realities that at present remain unseen. It was for faith that our ancestors were commended. It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going. By faith he arrived, as a foreigner, in the Promised Land, and lived there as if in a strange country, with Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. They lived there in tents while he looked forward to a city founded, designed and built by God. It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore. All these died in faith, before receiving any of the things that had been promised, but they saw them in the far distance and welcomed them, recognising that they were only strangers and nomads on earth. People who use such terms about themselves make it quite plain that they are in search of their real homeland. They can hardly have meant the country they came from, since they had the opportunity to go back to it; but in fact they were longing for a better homeland, their heavenly homeland. That is why God is not ashamed to be called their God, since he has founded the city for them. It was by faith that Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac. He offered to sacrifice his only son even though the promises had been made to him and he had been told: It is through Isaac that your name will be carried on. He was confident that God had the power even to raise the dead, and so, figuratively speaking, he was given back Isaac from the dead. The word of the Lord.

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 12:32-48

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There is no need to be afraid, little flock, for it has pleased your Father to give you the kingdom. 'Sell your possessions and give alms. Get yourselves purses that do not wear out, treasure that will not fail you, in heaven where no thief can reach it and no moth destroy it. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. 'See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like men waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes and knocks. Happy those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. I tell you solemnly, he will put on an apron, sit them down at table and wait on them. It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third, but happy those servants if he finds them ready. You may be quite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what hour the burglar would come, he would not have let anyone break through the wall of his house. You too must stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.' Peter said, 'Lord, do you mean this parable for us, or for everyone?' The Lord replied, 'What sort of steward, then, is faithful and wise enough for the master to place him over his household to give them their allowance of food at the proper time? Happy that servant if his master's arrival finds him at this employment. I tell you truly, he will place him over everything he owns. But as for the servant who says to himself, "My master is taking his time coming", and sets about beating the menservants and the maids, and eating and drinking and getting drunk, his master will come on a day he does not expect and at an hour he does not know. The master will cut him off and send him to the same fate as the unfaithful. 'The servant who knows what his master wants, but has not even started to carry out those wishes, will receive very many strokes of the lash. The one who did not know, but deserves to be beaten for what he has done, will receive fewer strokes. When a man has had a great deal given him, a great deal will be demanded of him; when a man has had a great deal given him on trust, even more will be expected of him. The Gospel of the Lord.

POPE FRANCIS' LAST PAPAL FLIGHT INTERVIEW

Pope Francis: It was a genocide against indigenous peoples

On the return flight from Canada, Pope Francis speaks about his just-concluded Apostolic Journey and about old and new colonialisms. He says he has not yet thought of resigning, making light of it, and speaks about Germany's synodal path, doctrinal development, and the importance of women in the transmission of the faith.

It was a genocide of the indigenous peoples. On the return flight from Iqaluit to Rome, Pope Francis responded to a Canadian journalist's question and spoke about the themes of the just-concluded penitential pilgrimage, and of old and new colonialism

He also addressed the issue of resigning from the papacy, repeatedly prompted by the journalists' questions, explaining that for the time being, he does not intend to resign even though he considers it a possibility. At the start of the press conference, Pope Francis thanked the journalists flying with him: "Good evening and thank you for your accompaniment, for your work here. I know you have worked hard and I thank you for the company, thank you." The following is a working translation of the Pope's conversation with journalists:

Jessica Ka'nhehsíio DEER (CBC RADIO - CANADA INDIGENOUS)

As a descendant of a residential school survivor, I know that survivors and their families want to see concrete actions following your apology, including the rejection of the "doctrine of discovery." Considering that this is still enshrined in the Constitution and legal systems in Canada and the United States, where indigenous peoples continue to be defrauded of their lands and deprived of power, was it not a missed opportunity to make a statement to this effect during your trip to Canada?

Pope Francis

I didn't understand the second part of the question, could you explain what you mean by doctrine of discovery?

Jessica Ka'nhehsíio DEER

When I talk to indigenous people, they say that when people came to colonize America, there was this doctrine of discovery that somehow promoted the idea that the indigenous peoples of the new countries were inferior to the Catholics. This is how Canada and the United States became "countries."

Pope Francis

Thank you for the question. I think this is a problem of all colonialism. Every one, even to this day: today's ideological colonizations have the same pattern. Whoever doesn't enter its path is inferior. But I want to expand on this. They were considered not only inferior: some somewhat crazy theologian even wondered if they had a soul. When John Paul II went to Africa, to the port where the slaves were boarded [Gorée Island, the Door of No Return], he offered a sign so that we would come to understand the drama, the criminal drama: those people were thrown into the ship, in dire conditions, and then they became slaves in America. It is true that there were voices that spoke out, like Bartolomeo de las Casas, for example, or Peter Claver, but they were the minority. The consciousness of human equality came slowly. And I say consciousness, because in the unconscious there is still something. We have - allow me to say it - a somewhat colonialist attitude of reducing their culture to ours. It is something that comes to us from a developed way of life, our own, because of which we sometimes lose [discard] values that they have. For example: indigenous peoples have a great value, the value of harmony with Creation, and at least some people I know express that in the word vivere bene [good living]. That does not mean, as we westerners understand, to spend it well or to live la dolce vita [the good life]: no. 'Good living' means to cherish harmony, and that to me, is the great value of the original peoples. Harmony, We are used to reducing everything to the head - Instead. the personality of the original peoples, I am speaking generally, who know how to express themselves in three languages: that of the head, that of the heart and that of the hands. But all together, and they know how to have this language with Creation. Then, this accelerated progressivism of the somewhat exaggerated, somewhat neurotic development that we have, right? I'm not speaking against development, development is good. What is not good is the anxiety over development, development, development ... You see, one of the things that our overdeveloped, commercial civilization has lost is the capacity for poetry: indigenous peoples have that poetic capacity. I'm not idealizing. Then, this doctrine of colonization, which it's true, it's bad, it's unjust, and is still used today. It the same, maybe, with silk gloves, but it is still used today. For example, some bishops from some countries have said to me. "But, our country, when they ask for credit from an international organization, they put conditions on us, even legislative, colonialist conditions. To give you credit they make you change your way of life a little bit." Going back to the colonization of America—let's say that of the Americas, that of the British, the French, the Span-

Going back to the colonization of America—let's say that of the Americas, that of the British, the French, the Spanish, the Portuguese--there has always been a danger, a mentality of "we are superior and these indigenous people don't matter," and that is serious. That's why we have to work on what you say: go back and heal, let's put it that way, what was done wrong, in the knowledge that even today the same colonialism exists. Think, for example, about one case, which is universal, and allow me to say so. Take the case of the Rohingya, in Myanmar: they are considered inferior, they have no right to citizenship. Even today.

FROM FR. HENRY DUC

Dear Friends



In the mid of the 80s, I tried so many times times to escape from Vietnam, as my Formation program in the seminary was put on hold indefinitely, and I was in danger of being conscripted to fight the war between Vietnam and Cambodia, and might have got killed in a jungle somewhere in Cambodia just like many young Vietnamese then. Consequently I had to take action, and the only action available for me then, though highly risky, was to join the exodus then.

In one of the failed attempts, I boarded on a sampan and was kept sitting there with a group of other passengers for two days waiting anxiously to be smuggled onto a bigger boat for the trip. On the third day, my

friend's uncle, the organiser, suddenly appeared to inspect the boat and happened to see me in a rather miserable condition due to lack of sleep and hygiene, he then asked me to follow him, and sent me home for a break. 'Go home to have a shower and have a good rest,' said the boss, 'I'll get my nephew to take you back when we're ready.'

That was such a big relief for me when he said that, since I was so smelly and tired then. I quickly went to the presbytery of a friend of mine, which was about more than 100 kms away from where the boat was lurking like a ghost. Anyway, while taking the shower, my friend suddenly appeared at the presbytery and delivered the urgent message, 'the old man wants you back, right now.' Putting a new set of clothes on, I left the presbytery instantly and was taken to the spot, and sadly told, 'the boat had to leave me behind, since it was very risky for a big boat with a large number of boatpeople on board floating around.'

What was a miss, but a good miss anyway, since that boat was intercepted by a Japanese ship later on, and all passengers were offered settling in Japan, and I had to wait for another occasion to flee, and the occasion took me through Cambodia and Thailand and finally brought me to Sydney.

In the Gospel this Sunday, Jesus through the symbolic imagery of the faithful servants, dutifully dressed up and waiting to serve their master to come back from a wedding reception, means to remind us of our need to remain constantly vigilant all the days we live our lives on earth, meaning that we keep ourselves always ready for the Lord with hand holding the lamp of faith filled with the oil of grace and shining out the light of Christian qualities, and a strong desire to put together a heavenly portfolio, something neither thief can reach, nor moth can destroy. Other than that, we shall be in huge trouble, and Jesus has no hesitance to describe such a condition, in frank language, that 'the master will cut him off and send him to the same fate as the unfaithful.'

Encouraged by what Jesus asks us to carry out in the Gospel today, let us pray for the grace to live a life of vigilance, always getting ourselves body and soul ready for the day of the Lord through our efforts to build up our treasure not here, but in heaven by means of prayers and works of charity.

POPE FRANCIS' RECENT INTERVIEW

Dear brothers and sisters, buongiorno!

In the Gospel of today's liturgy, a man makes this request of Jesus: "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me" (*Lk* 12:13). This is a very common situation. Similar problems are still commonplace. How many brothers and sisters, how many members of the same family, unfortunately quarrel over their inheritance, perhaps no longer speaking to each other!

Responding to the man, Jesus does not enter into the particulars, but goes to the root of the divisions caused by the possession of things. He says clearly: "Be on your guard against all covetousness" (v. 15). "Be on your guard against all covetousness". What is *covetousness*? It is the unbridled greed for possessions, always desiring to be rich. This is an illness that destroys people, because the hunger for possessions creates an addiction. Above all, those who have a lot are never content, they always want more, and only for themselves. But this way, the person is no longer free: he or she is attached to, a slave, of what paradoxically was meant to serve them so as to live freely and serenely. Rather than *being served* by money, the person becomes a *servant* of money. Covetousness is a dangerous illness for society as well – due to covetousness, we have today reached other paradoxes: an injustice never before seen in history, where few have so much and so many have little or nothing. Let's consider wars and conflicts as well. The lust for resources and wealth are almost always behind them. How many interests are behind war! Certainly, one of these is the arms trade. This trade is a scandal that we must never resign ourselves to.

Today, Jesus teaches us that at the heart of all this are not only some who are powerful, or certain economic systems. The covetousness that is *in everyone's heart* is at the centre. And so, let us try to ask ourselves: Where am I at with my detachment from possessions, from wealth? Do I complain about what I lack, or do I know how to be content with what I have? In the name of money or opportunity, am I tempted to sacrifice relationships and sacrifice time with others? And yet again, does it happen that I sacrifice legality and honesty on the altar of covetousness? I said "altar", the altar of covetousness, but why did I say altar? Because material goods, money, riches, can become a cult, a true and proper idolatry. This is why Jesus warns us with strong words. He says, *you cannot serve two masters*, and – let's be careful – he does not say God and the devil, no, or even the good and the bad, but, *God and wealth* (cf. *Lk* 16:13). One would expect that he would have said that you cannot serve two masters, God and the devil, no: *God and wealth*. That wealth be at our service, yes; to serve wealth, no – that is idolatry, that is an offense to God.

And so, we might think, so, no one should desire to get rich? Certainly, you can; rather, it is right to want it. It is beautiful to become rich, but *rich according to God!* God is the richest of anyone. He is rich in compassion, in mercy. His riches do not impoverish anyone, do not create quarrels and divisions. It is a richness that knows how to give, to distribute, to share. Brothers and sisters, accumulating material goods is not enough to live well, for Jesus says also that life does not consist in what one possesses (see *Lk* 12:15). It depends, instead, on good relationships – with God, with others, and even with those who have less. So, let us ask ourselves: For myself, how do I want to get rich? Do I want to get rich according to God or according to my covetousness? And, returning to the topic of inheritance, what legacy do I want to leave? Money in the bank, material things, or happy people around me, good works that are not forgotten, people that I have helped to grow and mature?

May Our Lady help us understand what the true goods of life are, the ones that last forever.

After the Angelus, the Holy Father continued:

Dear brothers and sisters.

Yesterday morning I came back to Rome after a six-day apostolic journey to Canada. I intend to speak about it during the General Audience this coming Wednesday. But now I would like to thank all those who made this penitential pilgrimage possible, beginning with the Civil Authorities, the Chiefs of the Indigenous Peoples, and the Canadian Bishops. I sincerely thank all those who accompanied me with their prayer. Thank you to you all!

Also, during this journey, I did not cease praying for the suffering and battered Ukrainian people, asking God to free them from the scourge of war. If one looked at what is happening objectively, considering the harm that war brings every day to those people, and even to the entire world, the only reasonable thing to do would be to stop and negotiate. May wisdom inspire concrete steps toward peace.

I extend my greeting to you, people from Rome and pilgrims. A special greeting goes to the novices of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians who are about to make their first religious profession; the group of Catholic Action from Barletta; the young people from the Diocese of Verona; the boys and girls of *Unità pastoral "Pieve di Scandiano"*; and the "Gonzaga" group from Carimate, Montesolaro, Figino and Novedrate who have walked the Via Francigena.

On the feast of Saint Ignatius of Loyola, I extend a heartfelt greeting to my fellow-Jesuits. Continue to walk zealously and joyfully in serving the Lord. Be courageous!

I wish all of you a good Sunday. Please, do not forget to pray for me. Enjoy your meal and arrivederci!

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
