

POPE FRANCIS TO ENTREPRENEURS: 'SHARE ECONOMIC GAINS WITH PHILANTROPHY, FAIR TAXATION, JOB CREATION'

Pope Francis urges entrepreneurs and participants at the Italian Confindustria public assembly to join efforts in order to bring about a different economic system, highlighting the importance of sharing through job creation, philanthropy and equitable taxation. By Benedict Mayaki, SJ

Pope Francis on Monday received in audience in the Vatican participants at the Confindustria public assembly. In his prepared remarks to members of the General Confederation of Italian Industry, the Holy Father called entrepreneurs "an essential component in building the common good," which is "a primary engine of development and prosperity."

The good entrepreneur amid difficult times

Pope Francis highlighted that these are difficult times for everyone, including the business world. He noted that the pandemic put a strain on many productive activities, hurting the economic system. More so, the war in Ukraine and the energy crises has further exacerbated the situation to boot. In these crises, the good entrepreneur, who feels the uncertainties and risks, also suffers, said the Pope, distinguishing between entrepreneurs similar to the Good Shepherd and "mercenary" entrepreneurs. Like the good shepherd, the good entrepreneur feels the sufferings of his workers and does not flee before the many wolves circling around, said the Pope, recalling the death of Alberto Balocco, who was esteemed by the business and civic community.

Labour and commerce in the Bible

The Pope further noted that the Church, from the very beginning, has "welcomed into its bosom merchants, forerunners of modern entrepreneurs" and the Bible speaks of labour and commerce in some parables (including the lost coin, the landowner, the steward and the precious pearls). In the parable of the Good Samaritan, for example, the "two denarii" offered to the innkeeper is very important, said the Pope – so also is important, the money Judas was offered to betray Jesus. In fact, "the same money can be used, yesterday as today, to betray and sell a friend or to save a victim," the Pope said, noting that the denarii of Judas and the denarii of the Good Samaritan coexist in the same markets, in the same stock exchanges, in the same marketplaces, but the economy "grows and becomes humane when the Samaritan's denarii become more numerous than those of Judas". The Holy Father also acknowledged that the life of entrepreneurs in the Church has not always been easy, pointing at Jesus words about the rich, the camel and the eye of a needle (Mt 19: 23 -24). He said that this has sometimes been too quickly extended to every entrepreneur and merchant. "In reality, one can be a merchant, an entrepreneur, and be a follower of Christ, an inhabitant of his Kingdom. The question then becomes: what are the conditions for an entrepreneur to enter the Kingdom of Heaven?"

Sharing

Reflecting on the conditions for an entrepreneur to enter into Heaven, the Holy Father underlined the importance of sharing. He said that wealth, while it can help a great deal in life on the one hand, can also complicate life on the other hand, because it can become an idol and a ruthless master who "takes all of one's life day after day". Wealth calls for responsibility said the Pope. "Once I own wealth, on me lies the responsibility to make it bear fruit, not to dissipate it, to use it for the common good." However, wealth also creates envy, backbiting, and perhaps violence and wickedness. The Holy Father then held up the example of wealthy people who were part of Jesus's first community, including Joseph of Arimathea, the women who supported the Apostles with their possessions and Zacchaeus of Jericho – noting that there have always been wealthy people who have followed the Gospel in an exemplary way. "Sharing is another name for evangelical poverty" he added, highlighting the great economic image of common sharing of goods narrated in the Acts of the Apostles.

Philanthropy, taxes and levies

Pope Francis said that every entrepreneur has to find his own from the different forms of living the evangelical spirit of sharing, according to one's own personality and creativity. One form is philanthropy – giving to the community in different ways, he said, acknowledging the gestures of support for the Ukrainian people. Another way, he added, is taxes and levies – "a form of sharing that is often not understood." He said the "fiscal pact is at the heart of the social pact" explaining that taxes are "a form of sharing wealth so that it becomes common goods, public goods: schools, health, rights, care, science, culture, heritage." However, Pope Francis cautioned, "taxes must be fair, equitable, set according to each person's ability to pay, as the Italian Constitution states", and "the fiscal system and administration must be efficient and not corrupt."

Job creation, support for families

"Another way of sharing is Job creation, jobs for all, especially for young people," the Pope pointed out, noting that young people are needed because businesses without them lose innovation, energy and enthusiasm. He added that work has always been a form of communion of wealth because "by hiring people you are already distributing your assets, you are already creating shared wealth." Thus every "new job created is a slice of dynamically shared wealth" and "therein also lies the centrality of work in the economy and its great dignity." However, the labor problem cannot be solved if it remains within the confines of the labor market, he stressed, saying that it is a model of social order that needs to be challenged. In this regard, the Pope pointed at the declining birth rate, which, coupled with the rapid aging of the population, is leading to a decrease in the supply of workers and an increase in pension spending. "There is an urgent need to support families and the birth rate in practice," Pope Francis stressed. The Holy Father also highlighted the positive role that businesses play in the reality of immigration by "fostering constructive integration and enhancing skills that are indispensable for the survival of the business in our current context." However, he warned against all forms of exploitation of people and the neglect of their safety.

The example of Adriano Olivetti

Pope Francis went on to remind entrepreneurs that they too are workers. He urged them not to lose contact with work, forgetting the "smell" of work and being out of touch with the life of their enterprises. He noted that creating work generates some equality in enterprises and in society, and added, even though there is a hierarchy in business, with different functions, "salaries should not be too different." If the gap between the highest and lowest salaries becomes too wide, the business community becomes sick, and soon the society becomes sick," he said. The Pope upheld the example of Adriano Olivetti who set a limit on the gap between the highest and lowest salaries because he knew that it could lead to a loss of common destiny in business and that community, empathy and solidarity will not be created among all. "For while it is true that every worker depends on his entrepreneurs and managers, it is also true that the entrepreneur depends on his workers, on their creativity, their hearts and souls: it depends on their spiritual "capital." Concluding, the Pope underlined that the challenges of our society cannot be met without good entrepreneurs and urged the participants at the assembly to be protagonists of a change of epoch, bringing about a different economic system through their creativity and innovation.

Recently I happen to open an old book and found a rather interesting story very much relating to the Gospel this week, and I guess it's appropriate to share with you this week.

The story was about the self- confession of a two dollar coin, which kind of lamented about its rather humble position in the monetary world compared to its bank note buddies. It said to itself, 'I'm not big enough to buy a paper or a beer these days. I can't buy a seat in the cinema or theatre, neither can I get myself a box of

chocolates to enjoy in the interval. It's not much I can do except being taken to church regularly. I've been popular there.' Well, as I mentioned earlier, this story has something to do with this Sunday Gospel, in which we are encouraged by Jesus to utilise our talents, worldly possessions, especially money as tools to gain ourselves a place in the heavenly banquet, despite their less desirable nature. He specifically warned the disciples not to treat money as their master, but choose God instead and twice he reminded the disciples that money is tainted, but went on to advise them to use it to win friends, who could make them welcomed in the world of eternity.

Here some of us might wonder who would be such friends, prophet Amos appears to offer us the answer in the first reading through his practical advices given to the Israelites of what they should do for the poor and the needy that they should lower the bushel, raise the shekel, swindle and tamper with the scales to make life easier for the marginalised, in other words, it is the compassion and care for the less fortunate as Jesus taught and led us throughout his life, or the social justice stand the Church has asked all of us to embrace and put into practice.

Enlightened by the message of both of the Gospel and the first reading this Sunday, let us pray for the grace to empower us in our efforts to use money and other worldly things that the Lord has provided for us to make our community, our country and our world a better place through our almsgivings and works of charity.

POPE FRANCIS IN KAZAKHSTAN: RELIGIONS 'KEY TO WORLD PEACE AND UNDERSTANDING'

In his address at the 7th Congress of Leaders of World and Traditional Religions in Nur-Sultan, Kazakhstan, Pope Francis underscores how religions need to grow in friendship in order to respond to the thirst for world peace and for the infinite that dwells in the heart of each of us. **By Vatican News staff reporter**

The first major event on the Pope's schedule in Kazakhstan took place on Wednesday morning in the nation's capital of Nur-Sultan when he addressed participants at the **7th Congress of Leaders of World and Traditional Religions**. The two-day meeting, which takes place every three years, has brought together religious leaders from around the world to focus this time on how religious leaders can foster the spiritual and social development in the post-pandemic world. Over 100 delegations from 50 countries are attending the Congress, made up of religious, cultural, civil, governmental, and non-governmental representatives. Drawn by the infinite Pope Francis travelled to Kazakhstan to participate personally in this meeting, following the invitation of the nation's president, Kassym-Jomart Tokayev.

In his speech to the Congress, the Pope began by addressing everyone as "brothers and sisters...in the name of the fraternity that unites us as children of the same Heaven." He noted that "before the mystery of the infinite that transcends and attracts us, the religions remind us that we are creatures...not omnipotent...journeying towards the same heavenly goal." This shared nature then creates naturally "a common bond, an authentic fraternity," said the Pope, recalling how the Central Asian nation of Kazakhstan throughout history has been a land of encounter involving ideas, faiths, and trade as in the ancient silk route. He expressed hopes for the encounter of religions to be always based on human relationships marked by "respect, sincere dialogue, respect for the inviolable dignity of each human being, and mutual cooperation."

Authentic religiosity

He quoted throughout his adress Kazakhstan's most renowned poet and the father of its modern literature, Abai (1845-1904), whose writings reflect deep religious devotion and "the noble soul of this people." He recalled how Abai frequently addressed the ultimate questions about life and meaning to cultivate a spirituality, and quoting him, the Pope said this keeps "the soul alive and the mind clear," and that people count on people of faith to be "examples of souls alive and minds clear" as well as reflecting "an authentic religiosity." The Pope recalled that fundamentalism "defiles and corrupts every creed" and that we must have "open and compassionate hearts." "The pursuit of transcendence and the sacred value of fraternity can inspire and illumine the decisions that need to be made amid the geopolitical, social, economic, ecological, but fundamentally spiritual crises that many modern institutions, including democracies, are presently experiencing, to the detriment of security and concord among peoples. We need religion, in order to respond to the thirst for world peace and the thirst for the infinite that dwells in the heart of each man and woman."

Religious freedom

Pope Francis then noted the importance of religious freedom as "an essential condition for genuinely human and integral development." Created free, every person "has the right to render public testimony to his or her own creed, proposing it without ever imposing it," through proselytism or indoctrination. Reflecting on the theme of this Congress looking at how to offer spiritual and social support in a post-pandemic world, the Pope focused on four challenges we all face and in special way urged religions to work together toward a greater unity of purpose.

Vulnerability and responsibility

The Covid-19 pandemic put everyone "in the same boat," the Pope observed, adding how it exposed our common vulnerability and need for help. He praised the "powerful sense of solidarity" that resulted from the pandemic but warned that we must not squander it. Here he said religions are "called to be present on the front lines, as promoters of unity amid the grave challenges that risk dividing our human family even further." "It is up to us, who believe in the Divine, to help our brothers and sisters at the present time not to forget our vulnerability...In a word, the sense of shared vulnerability that emerged during the pandemic should motivate us to move forward, not as we did before, but now with greater humility and foresight." The Pope then added that believers are "called to care" for humanity and become "artisans of communion, witnesses of a cooperation that transcends the confines of our community, ethnic, national and religious affiliations." He said we begin by listening to the poor, the neglected, the helpless show "suffer in silence and general disregard." "What I propose is not only a path to greater attentiveness and solidarity, but also a path to healing for our societies. For poverty is precisely what enables the spread of epidemics and other great evils that flourish on the terrain of poverty and inequality."

Challenge of Peace

The second global challenge the Pope highlighted is the challenge of peace.

Although discussed by religious leaders especially in recent decades, the scourge of war and confrontation still plagues the world, he observed. This requires a "leap forward" by the great religions to actively unite and commit to peace, the Pope said, if people of our day are to be inspired to engage in respectful and responsible dialogue.

"God is peace. He guides us always in the way of peace, never that of war. Let us commit ourselves, then, even more to insisting on the need for resolving conflicts not by the inconclusive means of power, with arms and threats, but by the only means blessed by heaven and worthy of man: encounter, dialogue and patient negotiations, which make progress especially when they take into consideration the young and future generations...Let us invest, I beg you, in this: not in more weapons, but in education!"

Fraternal acceptance

The third challenge facing us is "fraternal acceptance," the Pope explained, noting how every day "children, born and unborn, migrants and elderly persons, are cast aside...yet every human being is sacred."

It is especially the task of the religions to remind the world of this, the Pope said, recalling the massive exodus of people today caused by war, poverty and climate change. He said, "it is our duty to be mindful that the Creator, who watches over each of His creatures, exhorts us to regard others as He does, and in them to see the face of a brother or a sister."

"Let us rediscover the art of hospitality, of acceptance, of compassion. And let us learn also to be ashamed: yes, to experience that healthy shame born of compassion for those who suffer, sympathy and concern for their condition and for their fate, which we realize that we too share. This is the path of compassion, which makes us better human beings and better believers."

Care for our common home

The final challenge we all face is "care for our common home," that we protect the natural environment from the damage we cause through pollution, exploitation, and devastation.

He noted how "the mindset of exploitation" is destroying our common home and leading to "an eclipse of the respectful and religious vision of the world willed by the Creator."

Going forward together

In conclusion, Pope Francis encouraged everyone to "go forward together, so that the journey of the religions may be increasingly marked by friendship."

"May the Almighty...enable us to cultivate open and fraternal friendships through frequent dialogue and luminous sincerity of purpose. May we never aim at artificial and conciliatory forms of syncretism, but firmly maintain our own identities, open to the courage of otherness and to fraternal encounter. Only in this way, in these dark times in which we live, will we be able to radiate the light of our Creator."

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
