The desire to know God's desire

Pope Francis concluded by asking what would be our answer if the Lord were to ask us, like the blind man in Jericho, "what do you want me to do for you?" He recommended that we answer by asking Him "to help us know His deepest desire, that God himself has placed in our heart. And to give us the strength to make it materialize." "This is an immense grace, the basis of all the others: to allow the Lord, as in the Gospel, to work miracles for us. Because He too has a great desire for us: to make us share in His fullness of life."

POPE FRANCIS' LATEST INTERVIEW

On the flight back to Rome from Kazakhstan on Thursday, Pope Francis tells reporters that "the decadent West breeds populism; in politics we must start again from values.... With China, we need the patience of dialogue."

We must dialogue, always. On the flight back to Rome on Thursday, Pope Francis answers questions from journalists who accompanied him to Kazakhstan, discussing the war in Ukraine, the right of a nation to defend itself, and arms trafficking.

He also talks about the role of politics and the West in a crisis of values which risks generating populism.

Responding to a question about the situation in Germany, Pope Francis explains that the Church needs pastors, not pastoral plans. At the beginning of the press conference, the Pope wished a happy birthday to Avvenire journalist Stefania Falasca and then had a cake served to celebrate her.

Here is an unofficial translation of the press conference:

Zhanat Akhmetova, TV AGENCY KHABAR

"Good day, Holy Father. Thank you very much for your visit to Kazakhstan. What is the result of your visit, to the origins of our people, what inspired you?"

For me it was also a surprise, because of Central Asia - except for Borodin's music – I truly knew nothing. It was a surprise to find representatives of these nations. And also Kazakhstan was really a surprise, because I didn't expect it to be like that. I knew that it was a country, a city, which has developed well, in an intelligent manner. Yet, thirty years since independence to find such a development, I did not expect it.

Also, it is such a large country, with nineteen million people – unbelievable. Very disciplined, and beautiful. With so much beauty: the architecture of the city is well-balanced, well-arranged. A modern city, a city I would perhaps say "of the future."

That's what impressed me so much: the desire to move forward not only in industry, in economic and material development, but also in cultural development. It was a surprise I did not expect. Then, the Congress was a very important event. It is in its seventh edition. This means it's a country with foresight, bringing into dialogue those who are usually discarded. Because there is a progressive perception of the world for which religious values are the first thing to be discarded. It is a country that offers the world such a proposal – already seven times now; it is wonderful! If there is time I will come back to this interfaith meeting. You can be proud of the country and the homeland you have.

Rudiger Kronthaler, ARD "Holy Father thank you for your message of peace, I am German, as you can hear from my accent. My people are responsible for millions of deaths eighty years ago. I would like to ask a question about peace, since my people are responsible for millions of deaths, we learn in school that you should never use weapons, never violence: the only exception is self-defense. In your opinion, should Ukraine be given weapons at this time?"

This is a political decision, which can be moral – morally acceptable – if it is done according to the conditions of morality, which are manifold, and then we can talk about it. But it can be immoral if it is done with the intention of provoking more war or selling weapons or discarding those weapons that are no longer needed. The motivation is what largely qualifies the morality of this act. To defend oneself is not only lawful but also an expression of love of country. Those who do not defend themselves, those who do not defend something, do not love it, instead those who defend, love.

Here you touch on something else that I said in one of my speeches, which is that one should think more about the concept of just war. Because everybody is talking about peace today: for so many years, for seventy years, the United Nations has been talking about peace; they have been making so many speeches about peace. But right now how many wars are going on? The one you mentioned, Ukraine-Russia, now Azerbaijan and Armenia which had stopped for a while because Russia acted as a guarantor: a guarantor of peace here and makes war there... Then there is Syria, ten years of war, what is going on there for which it never stops? What interests are moving these things? Then there is the Horn of Africa, then northern Mozambique, or Eritrea and a part of Ethiopia, then Myanmar with this suffering people that I love so much, the Rohingya people who go around and around and around like a gypsy and find no peace. But we are in a world war, please...I remember a personal event, as a child; I was nine years old. I remember hearing the alarm of the biggest newspaper in Buenos Aires sounding: sometimes to celebrate and other times to give bad news. They would sound that – now it doesn't sound anymore – and it could be heard all over the city. Mother said, "What's going on?" We were in the war, the year 1945. A neighbor came to the house, and said, "The alarm sounded..." and she cried, "The war is over!" And I still see mom and the neighbor crying with joy because the war was over, in a South American country, so far away! These women knew that peace is greater than all wars, and they cried with joy when peace was made. I cannot forget that.

I wonder, I don't know if our hearts are educated well enough today to cry for joy when we see peace. Everything has changed. If you don't make war, you are not useful! Then there is the arms business. This is a store of assassins. Someone who understands statistics told me that if you stopped making weapons for a year you would solve all the hunger in the world – I don't know if that's true or not. But hunger, education; it's no use, you can't because you have to make weapons.

In Genoa a few years ago, three or four years ago, a ship arrived loaded with weapons that was going to transfer them to a bigger ship that was going to Africa, near South Sudan. The dock workers didn't want to do it; it cost them, but they said, "I won't cooperate." It is an anecdote but one that makes one feel a consciousness of peace.

You spoke about your homeland. One of the things I learned from you is the ability to repent and ask forgiveness for the mistakes of war. And also, not only to ask forgiveness, but to pay for the mistakes of war – this speaks well of you. It is an example that we should imitate. War itself is a mistake; it is a mistake! And we right now are breathing this air: if there is no war it seems there is no life. A bit messy but I said all I wanted to say about just war. But the right to defense yes, that yes, but use it when necessary.

Sylwia Wysocka, PAP "Holy Father, you said: we can never justify violence. Everything that is happening in Ukraine now is pure violence, death, total destruction by Russia. We in Poland have the war so close to our doorstep, with two million refugees. I would like to ask if you think there is a red line beyond which you should not say: we are open to dialogue with Moscow. Because so many people have a hard time understanding this openness. And I would also like to ask if the next trip will be to Kyiv."

I will answer that, but I would prefer that the questions about the trip be asked first...I think it is always difficult to understand the dialogue with the states that started a war, and it seems that the first step was from there, from that side. It is difficult but we must not discard it; we must extend the opportunity for dialogue to everyone, to everyone! Because there is always the possibility that in dialogue we can change things, and also offer another point of view, another point of consideration.

I don't exclude dialogue with any power, whether it's at war, whether it's the aggressor... sometimes dialogue has to be done in this manner, but it has to be done; it "stinks", but it has to be done. Always one step ahead, an outstretched hand, always! Because otherwise we close off the only reasonable door to peace.

Sometimes some do not accept dialogue: too bad! But dialogue must always be done, at least offered, and this is good for those who offer it; it helps them to breathe.

FROM FR. HENRY DUC

Dear Friends.



One of my good friends is a solicitor with a strong sense of social justice and always prepared to offer help to the needy in the community, and I once called on him for assistance after a car accident caused by a truck when I stopped at traffic lights, the company refused to accept responsibility for their driver and even instructed their lawyers to write me a very nasty letter.

I showed him the letter and he then penned a very sound reply to them the next day. His letter was so effective, to the point that the opposition had to change their tune immediately from threatening to conciliatory. I always remember what he kept telling me with a cheeky smile, 'You can always trust poor solicitors, and I'm the poorest among them.'

In the Gospel today, Jesus talks about legal matters, more specifically about a judge, someone higher compared to solicitors in the legal system, and not about any ordinary judge but an unjust one who had no fear of anyone, even God Himself. This unjust and fearless man, however, had to give in to a persistent widow, who had kept bothering him day in day out by pleading with him for a just hearing against the person trying to harm her. We might say he feared no one but the widow, out of her patience and persistence in preserving her legitimate rights.

Jesus utilized the powerful imagery of such a widow as an inspiring example to encourage us to do the same with our daily prayers, meaning that we need to ask for help from God with patience and persistence, similar to the way the widow approached the judge in the story, and the chance is that we will receive a favourable hearing from God, for He is just, kind and generous, much, much more than the unjust judge, and we can count on Him in our needs.

In this Silver Jubilee Mass today, may I ask everyone in the community to join with me in our prayer of thanksgiving for God's guiding and protective grace in our lives, especially in my past years, and let us pray that the Lord will continue to guide and protect us on the days ahead, and respond favourably as we call on Him in our needs today and every day in our lives.

POPE FRANCIS AT MASS ON THE 60TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE OPENING OF THE VATICAN II COUNCIL: 'LEARN FROM VATICAN II HOW TO SEE THE CHURCH'

"Do you love Me? Feed My sheep." These words of Jesus, originally spoken to St Peter, are "also addressed to us, to us as Church," said Pope Francis in his homily at Mass celebrated on Tuesday, marking the sixtieth anniversary of the opening of the Second Ecumenical Council of the Vatican – Vatican II.

In fact, the Pope said, the Council was "one great response" to the Lord's question, "Do you love Me?"

"To rekindle her love for the Lord," he said, "the Church, for the first time in her history, devoted a Council to examining herself and reflecting on her nature and mission."

Pope Francis then suggested three ways we can learn from the Council to look at the Church, beginning with looking at her from God's point of view, "from on high, with God's eyes, eyes full of love." He warned against looking at the Church from our own point of view, condemning both "progressivism" and "traditionalism" as infidelity, "forms of Pelagian selfishness that puts our own tastes and plans above the love of God."

Instead, he said, "Let us rediscover the Council in order to restore primacy to God, to what is essential: to a Church madly in love with its Lord and with all the men and women whom He loves."

"Let us rediscover the Council's passion and renew our own passion for the Council!"

Church exists for sake of love

Turning to the word "feed," Pope Francis explained that this is the kind of love that Jesus desires from St Peter. Originally a fisherman, Peter was made a shepherd, one who is called to live among his sheep and to love them.

This, the Pope said, is the second way of looking at the Church: looking around, being in the world without looking down on others. "How timely the Council remains!" he said. "It helps us reject the temptation to enclose ourselves within the confines of our own comforts and convictions," and leads us to "imitate God's approach," to seek the lost sheep and lead them back to the fold.

He said, "the Church, our holy and hierarchical Mother, springing from the heart of the Trinity, exists for the sake of love," and called on the faithful to "resist the temptation to self-absorption." The People of God, said Pope Francis, "are a pastoral people," called especially to care for the poor and the outcast.

Single, unified of the Lord

Pope Francis concluded his homily with an impassioned plea for unity in the Church.

God, he said, "wants us to see the whole" and this is the third way of looking at the Church. The Pope lamented the tendency of Christians to "choose sides" in the Church, instead of being servants to all.

"We are His sheep, His flock," the Pope said, "and we can only be so together, and as one."

"Let us overcome all polarization and preserve our communion!"

Finally, Pope Francis thanked the Lord "for the gift of the Council," and prayed that He might "free us from the presumption of self-sufficiency and from the spirit of worldly criticism... to lead us forth from the shadows of self-absorption... [and] save us from the forms of polarization that are the devil's handiwork."

POPE FRANCIS AT AUDIENCE: 'DERIRE IS THE COMPASS TO DISCERN OUR DIRECTION'

During his Catechesis at the Wednesday General Audience, Pope Francis continued reflecting on discernment, focusing on its indispensable "ingredient": desire.

He said that "discernment is a form of searching, and searching, always stems from something we lack, but somehow know."

Desire

Explaining further about this knowledge of something we lack, but somehow know, Pope Francis noted that spiritual teachers refer to it as "'desire' - a nostalgia for fullness that never finds full fulfilment, and is the sign of God's presence in us."

He said that the Italian word *desiderio*, comes from the Latin term *de-sidus* which means "the lack of the star," of the reference point, which orients our path of life.

"It evokes a suffering, a lack, and at the same time a tension to reach the good that is missing," the Pope said, and hence, desire is the "compass to understand where I am and where I am going."

Desire, the Pope continued, is "not the craving of the moment."

"A sincere desire knows how to touch deeply the chords of our being, which is why it is not extinguished in the face of difficulties or setbacks."

Illustrating further, the Pope referred to instances when we are thirsty, noting that if we do not find something to drink, we do not give up. On the contrary, our yearning for water increasingly occupies our thoughts and actions, until we become willing to make any sacrifice in order to quench our thirst.

"Obstacles and failures do not stifle the desire; on the contrary, they make it even more alive in us," the Pope said.

Desires last through time

"Unlike the desire or emotion of the moment," he said, "desire lasts through time, even a long time, and tends to materialize."

He gave the example of a young person who wants to be a doctor, and embarks on a course of study and work that occupies years of their life.

This choice, the Pope explained, means he will have to set limits, say "no" to other courses of study, avoid diversions and distractions, especially during the most intense times of study.

It is thus, "the desire to give his life a direction and reach that goal enables him to overcome these difficulties."

"In effect, a value becomes beautiful and more easily achievable when it is attractive. As some have said, 'more important than being good is having the desire to become good."

Desires and miracles

The Pope then highlighted that Jesus, before performing a miracle, often questioned the person about his or her desire.

Recalling the example of the paralytic at the pool of Bethsaida whom Jesus asked: "Do you want to be well?" (Jn 5:6), Pope Francis noted that the paralytic's answer reveals a series of strange resistances to healing, which do not relate only to him.

In fact, Jesus' question was an invitation to bring clarity to his heart, to welcome a possible leap forward, to no longer think of himself and his life "as a paralytic," transported by others; however, the man does not seem to be convinced.

Here the Pope noted that "by engaging in dialoguing with the Lord, we learn to understand what we really want from life."

Desire separates lasting projects from wishful thinking

"Often it is indeed desire that makes the difference between a successful, coherent and lasting project, and the thousands of wishes and good intentions with which, as they say, 'hell is paved with," the Pope said.

Particularly in this era which seems to promote the maximum freedom of choice, but at the same time reduces desire to the "desire of the moment," the Pope suggested, we are bombarded by a thousand proposals, projects and possibilities, "which risk distracting us and not permitting us to calmly evaluate what we really want."

In this regard, he noted that many people suffer because "they do not know what they want from their lives," and because "they have probably never got in touch with their deepest desire." Thus, they risk "passing one's existence between attempts and expedients of various kinds, never getting anywhere, and wasting precious opportunities. And so certain changes, though desired in theory, when the opportunity arises, are never implemented."
