

First Reading

A reading from the second book of Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14

There were seven brothers who were arrested with their mother. The king tried to force them to taste pig's flesh, which the Law forbids, by torturing them with whips and scourges. One of them, acting as spokesman for the others, said, 'What are you trying to find out from us? We are prepared to die rather than break the Law of our ancestors.'

With his last breath the second brother exclaimed, 'Inhuman fiend, you may discharge us from this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up, since it is for his laws that we die, to live again for ever.'

After him, they amused themselves with the third, who on being asked for his tongue promptly thrust it out and held out his hands, with these honourable words, 'It was heaven that gave me these limbs; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again.' The king and his attendants were astounded at the young man's courage and his utter indifference to suffering.

When this one was dead they subjected the fourth to the same savage torture. When he neared his end he cried, 'Ours is the better choice, to meet death at men's hands, yet relying on God's promise that we shall be raised up by him; whereas for you there can be no resurrection, no new life.'

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 2:16-3:5

Some Sadducees – those who say that there is no resurrection – approached Jesus and they put this question to him, 'Master, we have it from Moses in writing, that if a man's married brother dies childless, the man must marry the widow to raise up children for his brother. Well, then, there were seven brothers. The first, having married a wife, died childless. The second and then the third married the widow. And the same with all seven, they died leaving no children. Finally the woman herself died. Now, at the resurrection, to which of them will she be wife since she had been married to all seven?'

Jesus replied, 'The children of this world take wives and husbands, but those who are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead do not marry because they can no longer die, for they are the same as the angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God. And Moses himself implies that the dead rise again, in the passage about the bush where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all men are in fact alive.'

POPE FRANCIS: JESUS IS THE SOURCE OF ST FRANCIS UNIQUE HOLINESS

Pope Francis receives members of the Ecclesial Coordination for the 800th Anniversary of the death of St Francis of Assisi, who are beginning a three-year period of preparation that will culminate in 2026. In his address, the Holy Father emphasized that Jesus, and faith in Him, was the source of St Francis' life of holiness.

Pope Francis on Monday welcomed members of the group coordinating the 800th anniversary of the death of St Francis of Assisi, which will take place in 2026.

At the beginning of his address, the Holy Father said that when he chose the name "Francis" at the beginning of his pontificate, he recognized that Francis of Assisi was a popular, but also misunderstood, saint. The source of the saint's devotion to peace, to poverty, to creation was Jesus Christ, and St Francis' faith in Him. "From this source, [Francis] received an abundance of the Holy Spirit, who urged him to imitate Jesus and follow the Gospel to the letter."

Franciscan 'places'

The Pope said that the upcoming anniversary will not be just a ritual commemoration if it is able to understand together both the imitation of Christ and love for the poor. This will be possible, he added, "thanks to the atmosphere that emanates from the different Franciscan 'places'" that will be at the centre of the celebrations.

The first of these places is Fontecolombo, near the Italian city of Rieti, which is associated both with the Franciscan "Rule" and, along with Greccio, with the Nativity scene. These places call us to "rediscover the Incarnation of Jesus Christ as the 'way' of God."

The second place, La Verna, recalls the Stigmata received by St Francis, which assimilated the saint "to the crucified Christ," and allowed him to enter intimately into the "human story, radically marked by pain and suffering." Finally, Assisi itself, where St Francis died and where his earthly remains reside, "reveals the essence of Christianity: the hope of eternal life."

In the school of the Poverello

Pope Francis insisted that the Little Poor Man of Assisi remains, even now, a mystery. To find an answer to this mystery, he said, "one must put oneself in the school of the Poverello, finding in his evangelical life the way to follow in

footsteps of Jesus."

"In concrete terms, this means listening, walking, and proclaiming to the peripheries."

Saint Francis, the Pope explained, listened to Jesus speaking to Him, responded generously, and gradually came to understand what the Lord was asking of Him.

The Saint was also a "wayfarer," who travelled throughout Italy and beyond, drawing close to the people and reducing the distance between the Church and the people. This, the Pope said, is "the style of a Christian community" that wants to draw near to all and not withdraw within itself.

"This teaches us that those who follow St Francis must learn to be steadfast and walking: steadfast in contemplation, in prayer; and then moving forward, walking in witness, witnessing Christ."

Finally, the Pope said that, in preaching to the peripheries, there is a need not only for justice, but for trust. "Only faith restores the breath of the Spirit to a closed and individualistic world," he explained. But with this breath, he said, we will be able to face "the great current challenges, such as peace, care for the common home, and a new model of development."

Living the anniversary fully

Pope Francis concluded his address by encouraging his listeners to live the upcoming Franciscan centenary "to the full," expressing his hope "that this spiritual and cultural journey may be combined with the Jubilee of 2025, in the conviction that St Francis of Assisi still urges the Church to live its fidelity to Christ and its mission in our time."

POPE FRANCIS: PRAY FOR MY JOURNEY TO BAHRAIN

On Tuesday, the Solemnity of All Saints, Pope Francis prayed the Angelus with the faithful gathered in St Peter's

After the prayer, he addressed those present, beginning by discussing his upcoming Apostolic Journey to Bahrain. Journey to Bahrain

On Thursday, Pope Francis will travel to the Kingdom of Bahrain, where he will remain until Sunday.

'It will be a journey under the banner of dialogue,' he said. While in the country, the Pope will participate in the 'Bahrain Forum for Dialogue: East and West for Human Coexistence', which, he said, will have as its theme 'the inescapable need for East and West to come more closely together for the sake of human coexistence.'

The Holy Father added that during his trip he will have the opportunity to engage with religious representatives. particularly Islamic.' After the Forum for Dialogue, the Pope will meet with Sheikh Ahmad Muhammad Al-Tayeb, Grand Imam of Al-Azhar, and hold an audience with the members of the Muslim Council of Elders. These encounters will be followed by an ecumenical meeting and prayer for peace with members of various Christian denominations, at the Our Lady of Arabia Cathedral in Awali.

The Pope concluded his address by asking for prayers for his journey.

'I ask everyone to accompany me with prayer, so that every meeting and event might be a fruitful opportunity to promote, in the name of God, the cause of fraternity and peace, which our times so desperately and urgently need.'

Prayer for Ukraine

The Pope also used the period after the Angelus to ask for prayers for Ukraine, a request he has made continually since the outbreak of war in the country.

'Dear brothers and sisters, please, let us not forget martyred Ukraine," he said. 'Let us pray for peace; let us pray that there might be peace in Ukraine.'

Greeting to pilgrims and runners

The Holy Father also took the opportunity to greet various groups of pilgrims gathered in the crowd, as well as participants in the 'Race of the Saints', a ten-kilometre run beginning in St Peter's square, which this year aims to race awareness of the difficulties faced by children in the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

'I am happy to welcome the participants in the Race of the Saints, promoted by the "Missioni Don Bosco" Foundation,' Pope Francis said. 'Thank you for your beautiful initiative and your presence!'

Dear Friends.

Recently, my first cousin, arrived in Sydney with her international student daughter. We all went out for lunch on our day-off. While sitting in the car, she kept telling me that she was feeling that the car was on the wrong side of the road, meaning keeping left, instead of staying to the right like the traffic in Vietnam. I explained to her the difference between the Paris-based and the London-based systems and asked her not to worry about it, since we were right, though we stayed on the left side of the road! This story very much


highlights this truth that we are different in lots of different ways though we live on the same planet. Consequently the truth on this side of the Pyrenees would not necessarily be the one the other side, as the Europeans love to say. It is even truer in a biblical context as the Prophet Isaiah reminds us of the difference between God's thoughts and ours, and God's ways and ours (cf.55.8). Therefore, we should be wise enough to avoid frustrating ourselves by trying to measure God's ways and thoughts based on ours.

The Sadducees of old thought they could outsmart Jesus in the Gospel this Sunday with an attempt to apply our human experience in the area of human relationship to argue against Jesus' teaching on the resurrection in the world to come, an important part of our Christian Catholic belief that we have kept professing at every Sunday Mass, but, their endeavor fell apart as Jesus revealed to them that the world to come is not the same as the one they had experienced now, since inhabitants of such a world known as God's sons and daughters will be like God's angels, and so current rules and regulations such as the one of marriage won't be required there.

Let us pray today for the grace to help us treasure the truth that God's ways and thoughts are beyond ours. Let us also give praise and thanks to God for giving us a glimpse into the coming world, and ask for the strength from our Holy Communion today to support us in our effort here and now to preserve for us a place in such an everlasting world. Have a resurrection-oriented week.

POPE FRANCIS AT ANGELUS: 'LIKE SAINTS, BE BUILDERS OF PEACE'

Speaking to the faithful gathered in St. Peter's Square for the Angelus on the Solemnity of All Saints, Pope Francis reflected on today's Gospel, the Beatitudes of Jesus (*Mt* 5:1-12), saying they serve as a form of "identity card" for the saints. Rather than having the stereotypical view that all saints lived "perfect" and "precise" lives, the Pope said the Beatitudes rather show another side of the equation: the saints lived radically "countercultural" and "revolutionary" lives.

'Blessed are the peacemakers'

Taking the example of the beatitude "Blessed are the peacemakers" (v. 9), the Pope said the type of peace Jesus brings is often very different from what we imagine or would like peace to be defined as.

Often, the Pope noted, the definition of "peace" for us means tranquillity, to be left alone without any disruption or problems. Rather, Jesus calls on us to act as peacemakers, building peace through works of justice and mercy.

"The Bible speaks of a 'sowing of peace' because it germinates from the soil of life, from the seed of our heart; it grows in silence, day after day, through works of justice and mercy, as the luminous witnesses we are celebrating today show us." Jesus' life, and those of the saints, Pope Francis continued, shows us that the "seed of peace must first die" in order to grow and bear fruit.

"Peace is not achieved by conquering or defeating someone, it is never violent, it is never armed."

Disarming the heart

What must one do to become a peacemaker?

Pope Francis notes that although we all have the ability to say sharp words or have aggressive thoughts, the first step to becoming a peacemaker is rather to disarm the heart by opening ourselves to Jesus, standing before His Cross, and receiving from Him in Confession "forgiveness and peace."

"This is where we begin, because being peacemakers, being saints, is not our ability, it is His gift, it is grace."

An eternal reward for those who build peace

Pope Francis continued by asking if in our everyday lives, we desire to bring peace or if we seek to bring pain, gossip, and controversy through our daily actions.

The Pope noted that building peace is about caring for those at the margins, fighting injustice, and forgiving others.

Those who build the path towards peace will be, as Jesus says, ultimately rewarded in heaven and called "children of God."

Although they may seem "out of place" in today's world, the Pope noted, peacemakers in Heaven will be closest to God.

"Those who love everyone and hurt no one win: as the Psalm says, 'there is a future for a man of peace."

The Pope concluded by invoking the Virgin Mary, "Queen of all saints," to help us "be peacemakers in our daily lives."

POPE FRANCIS AT ALL SOULS MASS

Presiding over Mass in St Peter's Basilica offered in suffrage for the Cardinals and Bishops who died during the year, Pope Francis noted that two words struck him from the readings they just heard: expectation and surprise.

Living in expectation

Beginning with the first word, the Pope noted that expectation expresses the meaning of life, "because we live in expectation of the encounter: the encounter with God, which is the reason for our intercessory prayer today".

He explained that we all live in expectation, in the hope of one day hearing those words of Jesus: "Come, you blessed of my Father".

Pope Francis urged those present to ask themselves, "How does my waiting go? Do I go to the essentials or am I distracted by many superfluous things? Do I cultivate hope or do I go on moaning because I value too much so many things that do not matter?"

As we wait for tomorrow, the Pope noted that we are helped by today's Gospel. It is here, he continued, that the second word, surprise, comes in.

The Gospel, full of surprise

There is great surprise every time we listen to Matthew chapter 25, said the Pope. "It is similar to that of the protagonists, who say: "Lord, when did we see you hungry and give you food, or thirsty and give you drink?"

Through the phrase, "When did we ever...?" the Pope said, "the surprise of all, the astonishment of the righteous and the dismay of the unrighteous are expressed".

In this same way, he continued, we would expect that the judgement on life and on the world will take place under the banner of justice, before a decisive tribunal that, sifting through every element, would shed light on situations and intentions forever. "Instead, in the divine tribunal, the only head of merit and accusation is mercy towards the poor and the discarded: The Most High dwells in the least, He who dwells in the heavens dwells among the most insignificant to the world", said the Pope.

Let us not be surprised

"Let us also not be surprised", urged the Pope. Reflecting on the phrase, "When did they ever?", Pope Francis noted that both the just and the unjust ask themselves this in surprise. "The answer is only one: the 'when' is now. It lies in our hands, in our works of mercy: not in polished analyses, not in individual or social justifications".

Today, the Pope concluded, the Lord reminds us that death comes to make truth of life and removes all extenuating circumstances for mercy. Finally, the Pope noted that "the Gospel explains how to live the waiting: we go to meet God by I oving because He is love. And on the day of our farewell, the surprise will be happy if we now allow ourselves to be surprised by the presence of God, who waits for us among the poor and wounded of the world. And he waits to be caressed not with words, but with the love of God".
