



POPE FRANCIS: LAY MINISTERS MUST SERVE AND NEVER BE SELF-REFERENTIAL By Lisa Zengarini

Laypeople in the Church can and must carry out many instituted ministries, supplementary services, assignments and offices, which, however, should "never become self-referential", but always tend "to transform society" by bringing Christian values into the world. Pope Francis made this remark on Saturday in his address to the members of the Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life as they concluded their Plenary Assembly on the theme "The laity and ministeriality in the synodal Church". Welcoming the participants in the Clementine Hall, the Pope reaffirmed that "the willingness to serve the brethren, and in them, to serve Christ" is the true motivation that must inspire any faithful who assumes an ecclesial task and any commitment to Christian witness in the reality where he or she lives"

The origin of the ministeriality of the Church -Referring to the theme of the three-day session, Pope Francis reflected on the meaning of ministeriality in the Church and on the role of laypeople in this context. He noted that when we speak of Church ministries in general, the thought immediately goes to "instituted" ministries such as the ones of lector, acolyte, and catechist "which are all well known". However, he said, these instituted ministries "do not represent the full extent of the ministeriality of the Church, which is broader and, ever since the first Christian communities, regards all the faithful".

The common priesthood of all the faithful based on Baptism—The Pope recalled that its origin lies in Baptism and in the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Indeed, the Sacrament is "the root of the common priesthood of all the faithful which is in turn

expressed in the ministries". This is because all the baptized – whether lay people, celibate, married people, priests, religious - are Christifideles, that is believers in Christ, "and are therefore required to take part in the mission He entrusted to the Church, also through the assumption of specific ministries". The ministry of the laity in particular, the Pope continued, also "stems from the charism that the Holy Spirit distributes within the People of God for its edification". This, the Pope said,

explains even more clearly why the ministeriality of the Church cannot "be reduced merely to instituted ministries, but rather embraces a far vaster field"

Participating in the prophetic and regal function of Christ-Even today, "as in the first Christian communities. faced with particular pastoral needs, without resorting to the institution of ministries, pastors can entrust certain supplementary functions to laypeople, that is, temporary services, as in the case of the proclamation of the Word of the distribution of the Eucharist." Moreover, Pope Francis continued, "besides the instituted ministries, supplementary services, and other regularly entrusted offices, the laity can carry out a range of tasks, which express their participation in the prophetic and regal function of Christ: not only within the Church, but also in the environments where they live", for example in reaching out to those affected by old and new forms of poverty, including migrants.

Family ministry—The Pope also mentioned the field of family ministry which is all the more relevant today in light of the many challenges the family is facing and which was another focus of the Plenary. Recalling the magisterium of Pope St. John Paul II and of Pope St. Paul VI, Pope Francis highlighted, amongst other things, the educational mission of the family as a ministry of evangelization.

Mission and service- All these ministries, services, assignments and offices, the Pope emphasized, "must never become self-referential" and have two fundamental things in common: "Mission and service", because they "are an expression of the one mission of the Church and all are forms of service to others". "I like to emphasize that at the root of the term ministry there is the word minus, which means "minor". And Jesus said so: those who command should make themselves the

smallest, otherwise they do not know how to command. It is a small detail, but of great importance. Those who follow Jesus are not afraid to make themselves "inferior", "minor", to place themselves at the service of others. Indeed, Jesus himself taught us: "whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all" (Mk 10: 43-44)." Only by serving the brethren "and in them, Christ", Pope Francis concluded, will "all the baptized be able to discover the meaning of their own life, joyfully experiencing being 'a mission on this earth' that is, being called, in different ways and forms, to 'bring light, bless, enliven, raise up, heal and free'.

POPE FRANCIS: 'THE SOCIAL AND ENVIRONEMTAL CRISES ARE ONE' By Deborah Castellano Lubov

"We need, in a word, to acknowledge that the environmental and social crises of our time are not two separate crises but one..." insisted Pope Francis as he addressed Interfaith Leaders from Greater Manchester in the Vatican on Thursday. The Pope expressed his appreciation for their efforts, as religious and political leaders, to raise awareness of the "urgent need" to protect the environment and work concretely to address the effects of climate change. "Your united witness," the Pope told them, "is particularly eloquent, since the history of your city is closely linked to the industrial revolution, with its legacy of immense technical and economic progress, together with an admittedly negative impact on the human and natural environment."

Safeguarding and respecting human dignity

"It has become increasingly evident, in fact, that our present commitment to safeguarding God's gift of creation," the Pope said, "must be part of a broader effort to promote an integral ecology that respects both the dignity and value of each human person and acknowledges the tragic effects of environmental degradation on the lives of the poor." "We need, in a word, to acknowledge that the environmental and social crises of our time are not two separate crises but one," he stressed. Certainly, the Pope acknowledged, this demands the creation of new and far-sighted economic models, but also "a determination to overcome the 'throwaway' culture of waste generated by present-day consumerism and by a globalized indifference that inhibits efforts to address these human and social problems in the light of the common good."

Duty to protect

Pope Francis said their work is distinguished by its "common witness to the intrinsically moral and religious dimension of our duty to protect the environment as a God-given gift calling for our responsible stewardship." Within their communities, and guided by the wisdom of their various traditions, he said, "you play an important role in contributing to a much-needed "ecological conversion" grounded in the values of respect for nature, sobriety, human solidarity, and concern for the future of our societies." An essential aspect of this contribution, he said, is their commitment, as men and women of faith, "to forming the minds and hearts of the young," and "seconding their demand for a change of course and for farsighted policies that have as their goal a sustainable and integral human development." Pope Francis concluded by addressing those before him as friends, offering his prayerful good wishes for their work and their intentions. "Upon all of you, I cordially invoke the divine blessings of wisdom, strength, and peace. And I ask you kindly to remember me in your prayers."



FROM FR. HENRY DUC

Dear Friends.



Recently a young Vietnamese was ordained in the Philippines and his priestly ordination sent shock ways through the ecclesiastical circle in the Church of Vietnam due to the murky background of the newly ordained whose controversial ordination happen to come to people's attention due to the fanfare of his Thanksgiving Masses.

His background is murky, because he was jailed by the Vietnamese government together with a group of high profile officials in a corruption case, and a senior clergy from a diocese in Vietnam was stood down by its bishop for faking his signature on the documents required to support the

ordination and lying to him about his trip to attend the ordination ceremony, more importantly it was said that his uncle is the head of the Central Committee office, the most powerful organisation in the Communist Vietnam. Therefore, a lot of questions have then been asked not just about him, but also about those related to him, both Church men and government officials.

Obviously this is a typical case Jesus describes as 'thieves' and 'brigands' in the Gospel today, for they storm their way to enter the sheepfold instead of going through the main gate. These false shepherds will do nothing but bring destruction to the People of God, since they come only 'to steal and kill and destroy', and the sheep will never listen to them and will run away.

On the contrary, Jesus presents himself as the Good and authentic shepherd, the ultimate model for Church leaders who officially enter the main gate, knows the sheep and leads them, and the sheep will listen to him, follow him, be safe and enjoy a full life through his ultimate sacrifice of himself on the Cross and Resurrection from the dead, the events we just commemorated not long ago. From the exegetical perspective, the Greek word for 'good' is 'kalos', which also means noble, beautiful, perfect, precious and wonderful. In this sense, it would be more accurate and appropriate, if we could refer to Jesus as 'the Perfect or Wonderful Shepherd.'

Inspired by Jesus' example as the 'kalos shepherd', let us pray especially for all shepherds in the Church. Pray that they will be given the grace to make them noble, beautiful, perfect, precious and wonderful shepherds, who will be able to bring life to their sheep.

Dear brothers and sisters, buongiorno! On this third Sunday of Easter, the Gospel narrates the encounter of the Risen Jesus with the disciples of Emmaus (cf. Lk 24:13-35). These are two disciples who, resigned to the death of the Master, decide on the day of Passover to leave Jerusalem and to return home. Perhaps they were a little uneasy because they had heard the women coming from the sepulchre and saying that the Lord was like that... they go away. And while they are walking, sadly talking about what has happened, Jesus appears beside them, but they do not

recognize him. He asks them why they are so sad, and they say to him: "But, are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" (v. 18). And Jesus replies: "What things?" (v. 19). And they tell him the entire story, and Jesus makes them tell him the story. Then, while they are walking, he helps them reinterpret the facts in a different way, in the light of the prophecies, of the Word of God, of all that had been proclaimed to the people of Israel. To reread: that is what Jesus does with them, helping to reread. Let us dwell on this aspect. Indeed, for us to it is important to reread our history together with Jesus: the story of our life, of a certain period, of our days, with its disappointments and hopes. Besides, we too, like those disciples, faced with what happens to us, can find ourselves lost in the face of these events, alone and uncertain, with many questions and worries, disappointments, many things. Today's Gospel invites us to tell Jesus everything, sincerely, without being afraid of disturbing him: he listens; without fear of saying the wrong thing, without shame at our struggle to understand. The Lord is happy whenever we open ourselves to him; only in this way can he take us by the hand, accompany us and make our hearts burn again (cf. v. 32). We too, then, like the disciples of Emmaus, are called to spend time with him so that, when evening comes, he will remain with us (cf. v. 29). There is a good way of doing this, and today I would like to propose it to you: it consists of dedicating some time, every evening, to a brief examination of conscience. But, what happened today within me? That is the question. It is a matter of rereading the day with Jesus, rereading my day: opening the heart to him, bringing to him people, choices, fears, falls and hopes, all the things that happened; to learn gradually to look at things with different eyes, with his eyes and not just our own. We can thus relive the experience of those two disciples. Before Christ's love, even that which seems wearisome and unsuccessful can appear under another light: a difficult cross to embrace, the decision to forgive an offence, a missed opportunity for redress, the toil of work, the sincerity that comes at a price, and the trials of family life can appear to us in a new light, the light of the Crucified and Risen, who knows how to turn every fall into a step forward. But to do this, it is important to drop our defences: to leave time and space for Jesus, not to hide anything from him, to bring him our miseries, to let ourselves be wounded by his truth, to let our heart vibrate at the breath of his Word. We can begin today, to dedicate this evening a moment of prayer during which we ask ourselves: how was my day? What were its joys, what were its sorrows, what were its mundanities, what happened? What were the pearls of the day, possibly hidden, to be thankful for? Was there a little love in what I did? And what are the falls, the sadness, the doubts and fears to bring to Jesus so that He can open new ways to me, to lift me up and encourage me? May Mary, wise Virgin, help us to recognize Jesus who walks with us and to reread- the word: re-read - every day of our life in front of him.

Yesterday, in Paris, Henri Planchat, priest of the Congregation of Saint Vincent de Paul, Ladislas Radigue and three companion priests of the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary were beatified. Pastors inspired by apostolic zeal, they were united in their witness to the faith to the point of martyrdom, which they suffered in Paris in 1871, during the so-called Paris "Commune". A round of applause for the new Blesseds! Yesterday was Earth Day. I hope that commitment to care for creation may always be united with effective solidarity with the poorest. Unfortunately, the situation in Sudan remains grave, and therefore I renew my appeal for an end to the violence as soon as possible and for a return to the path of dialogue. I invite everyone to pray for our Sudanese brothers and sisters. Today is the 99th Day of the Catholic University of the Sacred Heart, on the theme For the love of knowledge. The challenges of the new humanism. I hope that that largest Italian Catholic university will face these challenges with the spirit of the founders, in particular the young Armida Barelli, proclaimed Blessed a year ago. Next Friday I will go to Budapest, in Hungary, for three days, to complete the trip I made in 2021 for the International Eucharistic Congress. It will be an opportunity to embrace once again a Church and a people so dear to me. It will also be a journey to the centre of Europe, over which the icy winds of war continue to blow, while the displacement of so many people puts urgent humanitarian questions on the agenda. But now I wish to address you with affection, dear Hungarian brothers and sisters, as I look forward to visiting you as a pilgrim, friend and brother of all, and to meet, among others, the authorities, the bishops, the priests and consecrated persons, the young, the university community and the poor. I know you are making great efforts to prepare for my arrival: I thank you from my heart for this. And I ask you all to accompany me on this journey with your prayers. And let us not forget our Ukrainian brothers and sisters, still afflicted by this war. I greet you all from my heart, Romans and pilgrims from Italy and many countries - I see the flags of so many countries - in particular those of Salamanca and the students of Albacete, as well as the Veneto-Trentino grouping of the Order of Malta Relief Corps. I greet the faithful of Ferrara, Palermo and Grumello del Monte; the community of the Diocesan School of Lodi; the young people of various towns in the dioceses of Alba, Bergamo, Brescia, Como and Milan; the candidates for Confirmation from many Italian parishes; the pupils of the Sacred Heart Institute of Cadoneghe; the "Volcentieri" cooperative from Casoli and the "Mototurismo" group from Agna. I wish you all a good Sunday; and please do not forget to pray for me. Enjoy your meal, and arrivederci!
