

FIRST READING A reading from the Acts of the Apostles 1:1-11

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations; for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem. but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is' he had said, 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

POPE FRANCIS' AUDIENCE By Deborah Castellano Lubov

"The love of Christ was the strength that drove him to the furthest frontiers, with constant toil and danger, overcoming setbacks, disappointments and discouragement, indeed, giving him consolation and joy in following and serving him to the end." With these words, Pope Francis described St. Francis Xavier, "rightly considered the greatest missionary of modern times" at his weekly General Audience on Wednesday morning in St. Peter's Square, as he continued reflecting on figures who personified apostolic zeal. Reflecting on the patron saint of Catholic missions to the faithful in the Square, the Pope praised the saint's prolific care for the sick, poor, and children, wherever he found himself. "His intense activity was always united with prayer, with union with God."

Gratitude to today's misisonaries

"We can learn from St. Francis Xavier,' the Pope said, praising him as an example for missionaries and also for young people. With poverty and courage, the Pope said, the saint's "strength was consumed in his service to the mission" and he accomplished incredible endeavours. While celebrating St. Francis Xavier's achievements, the Pope praised all missionaries, who continue to dedicate themselves to helping others, inspired by the faith and love of Christ. "We see this courage in missionaries today, who do not go on ships, but on airplanes, but they have the strength to go out," the Pope applauded.

Dedication unreservedly to God

St. Francis Xavier, the Pope recalled, was born into a noble but impoverished family in Navarre, northern Spain, in 1506, who would later study at the University of Paris "in order to obtain a well-paid ecclesiastical position that will secure his future." The Pope recalled his reputation as a likeable and brilliant young man, excelling in sport and study. In college, he would meet an older "and somewhat special companion," St. Ignatius of Loyola. "They become great friends, and Ignatius helps Francis to live a new and profound spiritual experience," the Jesuit Pope highlighted. This friendship, he observed, resulted in "a true conversion to free himself from all ambition" and him "dedicate himself unreservedly to the service of God, loving and following Jesus Christ." After finishing his studies, the Holy Father explained, Xavier and some friends went to Rome, and made themselves available to the Pope for the "most urgent needs" of the Church in the world. "At the beginning there were about ten of them and they decided to call themselves the 'Society of Jesus." At this time, the Pope noted, horizons were expanding from Christian Europe towards the then-"unknown ends" of the world. "New continents, discovery of peoples who had not yet heard of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The King of Portugal," he recalled, "asked the Pope to send some Jesuits to the East Indies; among them is Francis Xavier."

Making Jesus Christ known

Here, he said, began the first of a numerous band of passionate missionaries, ready to endure immense hardships and dangers, to reach lands and meet peoples of completely unknown cultures and languages. What they had in common, he said, is that they were "driven only by the very strong desire to make Jesus Christ and his Gospel known, and thus 'save', lead so many people to God and their true good." Later, he noted, Xavier was appointed Apostolic Nuncio, Pope Paul III's representative to the rulers of the so-called Indies, and in little more than eleven years, he accomplished an extraordinary work. Even if ship voyages at that time were very hard and dangerous, with many dying *en route* from shipwrecks or illnesses, the Pope highlighted, Xavier spent over three and a half years on ships, a third of the entire duration of his mission.

All out of love for God

Having arrived in Goa, India, the capital of the Portuguese Orient, Xavier set up his base there, but did not stop there, the Pope said. Rather, he goes out to evangelise the poor fishermen of India's southern coast, teaching catechism and prayers to children, baptising and healing the sick. Then, during a night prayer at the tomb of the Apostle St Bartholomew, he feels he must go beyond India, and therefore, leaves for Moluccas, the most distant islands of the Indonesian archipelago, where he founded several Christian communities in two years. The Saint put the Catechism into verse in the local language and taught how to sing it. The Pope invited faithful to read his letters, to understand better his emotion.

"He writes: 'Dangers and sufferings, accepted voluntarily and solely for the love and service of God our Lord, are treasures rich in great spiritual consolations. Here in a few years one could lose one's eyes from too many tears of joy!" (20 January 1548)."

Great fruits in Asia

One day, in India, the Pope continued, Francis Xavier met a Japanese man, who told him about his distant country, where no European missionary had ever gone before, and decided to travel there after enduring an adventurous journey. "The three years in Japan are very hard, due to the climate, opposition and ignorance of the language," the Pope said, "but even here the seeds planted will bear great fruit." In Japan, the Pope pointed out, "Xavier understands that the decisive country for the mission in Asia was another: China." "With its culture, its history, its greatness," the Pope said, "it exercised *de facto* dominance over that part of the world."

Faced with failure

For this reason, Xavier returned to Goa, and shortly afterwards embarked again, hoping to enter China, even though it was closed to foreigners; however, he did not succeed. Xavier died at age 46 in 1552, in total abandonment to the Lord, on the small island of Sancian, waiting in vain to land on the mainland near Canton. "Thus ends the earthly journey of Francis Xavier," the Pope said. Pope Francis concluded by praising St Francis Xavier's exemplary prayer life, and closeness to Christ, until the very end.

Summary of the Holy Father's words

Dear brothers and sisters: In my recent Apostolic Journey to Hungary, I encountered a courageous people, conscious of its deep Christian roots and open to a future of hope. The nation's long history of sanctity was crowned in the twentieth century by the witness of many believers during the Nazi and Communist persecutions. Budapest, a city of bridges, symbolizes the challenge facing Hungary, and indeed all of Europe, to continue to build bridges of solidarity and peace between peoples. There I witnessed at first hand the "humanitarian bridge" created to welcome the numerous refugees from Ukraine, as well as the efforts of the Hungarian people to build a "bridge to the future" through care for the natural and human environment and efforts to ensure a sustainable future. At the impressive Mass that concluded my visit, I witnessed the vitality of the Church in Hungary and its commitment to strengthening the bridges of fraternity that unite Christians of different rites and confessions. As we begin this month of May, dedicated to Our Lady, I ask her, the Queen of Hungary, to intercede for the beloved Hungarian people and for all of us, so that, rooted in faith, we may build bridges of unity and concord in our communities and in our world. And brothers and sisters, let us not forget to pray for battered Ukraine. I offer my blessing to all of you.

Dear Friends,

Though all the four Gospels give us no detail about the length of time Jesus stayed on earth after his Resurrection, the book of the Acts of the Apostles we listen to today gives us the clue that for forty days after rising from the dead, Jesus kept appearing again and again to the disciples and 'was lifted up' to heaven before their eyes.

Based on this account, the Church for many years did celebrate the feast of the Lord's Ascension on the fortieth day after Easter, which fell on the Thursday of the seventh week of Easter. However, this feast was recently moved to Sunday to give more people a chance to celebrate such an important feast

day in the Church calendar. Similar to the Gospels of Luke and Mark, the Gospel of Matthew recounts the same message Jesus entrusted to those present to witness his Ascension with the mission to proclaim his Good News globally. Matthew and Mark, however, add the element of baptism on to Jesus' final instruction to their accounts, though Matthew is very specific about what the disciples were asked to say when baptising people. Jesus left them the formula to follow that they baptise people 'in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit', a Trinitarian formula if you like. Matthew even includes this important requirement following the sacrament of Baptism, that disciples were expected to teach those baptised to observe Jesus' commandments.

At almost all baptisms here in this parish, I love to remind parents and godparents of our shared responsibility with Infant baptisms: I am responsible to baptise children and parents and godparents are responsible to teach them to follow the path of Jesus' commandments summed up in the love of God and the love of people.

As we celebrate the feast of Ascension this week, let us give praise and thanks to Jesus for the gift of baptism each of us did receive and bestow on us the honour to be his chosen people, and we ask for the grace to help us remain faithful to loving God and loving others around us in our everyday lives.

Have heaven-oriented week.

ÖÖING A NEW

THING

Dear brothers and sisters, buongiorno!

The Gospel for today, the Sixth Sunday of Easter, speaks to us about the Holy Spirit, whom Jesus calls the Paraclete (cf. Jn 14:15-17). Paraclete is a word that comes from Greek, which means both consoler and advocate [editor's note: the word also means 'lawyer' in Italian] at the same time. This means that the Holy Spirit never leaves us alone, he is near to us, like an advocate who assists the accused person, standing by his or her side. And he suggests to us how to defend ourselves from those who accuses

us. Let us recall that the great accuser is always the devil, who puts sin inside of you, the desire to sin, wickedness. Let us reflect on these two aspects: his closeness to us, and his assistance against those who accuse us.

His closeness: the Holy Spirt, Jesus says, "dwells with you and will be in you" (cf. v. 17). He never abandons us. The Holy Spirit wants to stay with us: he is not a passing guest who comes to pay us a courtesy visit. He is a companion for life, a stable presence. He is Spirit and desires to dwell in our spirits. He is patient and stays with us even when we fall.

He remains because he truly loves us; he does not pretend to love us, and then leave us alone when things get difficult. No. He is faithful, he is transparent, he is authentic. On the contrary! If we find ourselves in a moment of trial, the Holy Spirit consoles us, bringing us God's pardon and strength. And when he places our errors before us and corrects us, he does so gently - there is always the timbre of tenderness and the warmth of love in his voice that speaks to the heart. Certainly, the Spirit, the Paraclete, is demanding, because he is a true, faithful friend, who does not hide anything, who suggests what needs to change and where growth needs to take place. But when he corrects us, he never humiliates us, and never instills distrust. Rather, he conveys the certainty that with God, we can always make it. This is his closeness. This is a beautiful

The Spirit as Paraclete is the second aspect. He is our advocate and he defends us. He defends us from those who accuse us: from ourselves when we do not appreciate and forgive ourselves, when we go so far as perhaps saying to ourselves that we have failed, that we are good for nothing; from the world who discards those who do not fit into to its dictates and patterns; from the devil who is the "accuser" par excellence and the divider (cf. Rev 12:10), and does everything to make us feel incapable and unhappy.

In the face of all these accusing thoughts, the Holy Spirit suggests to us how to respond. How? The Paraclete, Jesus says, is the One who "reminds us of everything Jesus told us" (cf. Jn 14:26). He reminds us, therefore, of the words of the Gospel, and thus enables us to respond to the accusing devil, not with our own words, but with the Lord's own words. He reminds us, above all, that Jesus always spoke of the Father who is in heaven, he made the Father known to us, and revealed the Father's love for us, that we are his children. If we call on the Spirit, we will learn to embrace and recall the most important truth of life that protects us from the accusations of the evil one. And what is the most important truth in life? That we are beloved children of God. We are God's beloved children: this is the most important truth, and the Spirit reminds us of this. Brothers and sisters, let us ask ourselves today: Do we call on the Holy Spirit? Do we pray to him often? Let us not forget about the one who is close to us, or rather, is within us! Then: Do we listen to his voice, both when he encourages us and when he corrects us? Do we respond with Jesus's words to the accusations from the evil one, to the "tribunals" of life? Do we remember that we are beloved children of God? May Mary make us docile to the voice of the Holy Spirit and sensitive to his presence.

POPE FRANCIS' PREFACE TO ITALIAN BOOK BY GAEL GIRAUD AND CARLO PETRINI ENTITLED 'THE TASTE OF

The good that appears as beautiful carries with it the reason why it must be done. This is the first thought that arose for me after reading this beautiful dialogue between Carlo Petrini, whom I have known and esteemed for years, a gastronome and activist known all over the world, and Gaël Giraud, a Jesuit economist whose contributions I have recently appreciated in La Civiltà Cattolica, where he writes qualified articles on economics, finance and climate change.

Why this connection? Because reading this text generated in me a real 'taste' of the beautiful and the good, that is, a taste of hope, of authenticity, of the future. What the two authors bring forward in this exchange is a sort of 'critical narration' with respect to the global situation: on the one hand, they elaborate a reasoned and compelling analysis of the economic-food model in which we are immersed, which, to borrow a writer's famous definition, 'knows the price of everything and the value of nothing'; on the other hand, they propose several constructive examples, established experiences, singular stories of care for the common good and the commons that open the reader to a look of goodness and trust on our time. Criticism of what is wrong, stories of positive situations: one with the other, not one without the other.

I would like to highlight a significant fact: the fact that in these pages Petrini and Giraud, one a 70-year-old activist, the other a 50-year-old economics professor, i.e. two adults, find in the new generations established reasons for trust and hope. Usually we adults complain about young people, indeed we repeat that the 'past' times were certainly better than this troubled present, and that those who come after us are squandering our achievements. Instead, we must admit with

sincerity that it is the young people who embody the change we all objectively need. It is they who are asking us, in various parts of the world, to change. Change our lifestyle, so predatory towards the environment. Change our relationship with the Earth's resources, which are not infinite. Change our attitude towards them, the new generations, from whom we are stealing the future. And they are not only asking us, they are doing it: taking to the streets, demonstrating their dissent from an economic system that is unfair to the poor and an enemy of the environment, seeking new ways forward. And they are doing it starting from the everyday: making responsible choices about food, transport, consumption.

Young people are educating us on this! They are choosing to consume less and experience interpersonal relationships more; they are careful to buy objects produced following strict rules of environmental and social respect; they are imaginative in using collective or less polluting means of transport. For me, seeing that these behaviours are spreading to become common practice is cause for consolation and confidence. Petrini and Giraud often refer to youth movements that, in different parts of the world, advance the demands of climate justice and social justice: the two aspects must be kept together, always.
