GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 14:22-33

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side while he would send the crowds away. After sending the crowds away he went up into the hills by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, while the boat, by now far out on the lake, was battling with a heavy sea, for there was a head-wind. In the fourth watch of the night he went towards them, walking on the lake, and when the disciples saw him walking on the lake they were terrified. 'It is a ghost' they said, and cried out in fear. But at once Jesus called out to them, saying, 'Courage! It is I! Do not be afraid.' It was Peter who answered. 'Lord,' he said 'if it is you, tell me to come to you across the water.' 'Come' said Jesus. Then Peter got out of the boat and started walking towards Jesus across the water, but as soon as he felt the force of the wind, he took fright and began to sink. 'Lord! Dear Friends,

If it weren't for the feast of the Lord's Transfiguration, we would have a different Gospel story recounting the miracle in which Jesus multiplied the five loaves and two fish to feed more than five thousand people following him into a deserted place to listen to him.

This Sunday we have a Gospel account telling us what happened next when Jesus asked the disciples to go to the other side of the lake by boat while he stayed behind to see the crowds off and then go up into the hills by

himself to pray.

Meanwhile the disciples were peddling far off the shore, their boat was faced with a choppy sea causing a head-wind which threatened to capsize it. Surely the disciples had to be fearful and panicked because of such a near-death experience they were encountering in the dark sea.

Right in the mid of their desperation, Jesus, however, came to their rescue. He walked on angry waters, sometime between three to six AM, to reach their troubled boat. The disciples could not believe what they were seeing and were scared of such an unusual scene. Jesus then calmed them down by letting them know that it was him and asked them to be brave instead of being afraid. Peter tried to verify what Jesus said and had no hesitation to ask for the power to walk on waters towards Jesus, and he secured the approval from the master. While enjoying the exclusive privilege to walk on waters, Peter got frightened and started to sink. He had to cry out pleading to Jesus to save him, the master, of course, stretched out his hand to hold Peter. He then reminded Peter that his faith was weak and questioned him about why he had his doubt

Eventually the sea became calm when Jesus and Peter embarked the boat, and the story helped to consolidate the disciples faith in Jesus as the Son of God, as they bowed down before him at the end and proclaimed that, 'truly, you are the Son of God.'

More than an account to showcase Jesus' divine power over the power of nature and hence confirm Jesus' claim as the Son of God, this Gospel also has a symbolic dimension, for the images of the boat and the sea often symbolize both the life of the Church and also of each one of us. The rough sea stands for the problems and challenges both the Church and each of us have to face with in this world. Though our problem sometimes seem to be insurmountable, we won't be left to fight them alone. The Lord will be with us and help us to get through given that we have to believe and trust in him.

Let us pray today for the grace to keep us strong in faith, consequently we always remain optimistic and confident in living our everyday lives, no matter what happens to us. Have a faith-filled week,

9 WEEK NOVENA towards the Diocesan Synod

WEEK 1 SETTING OUT ON THE JOURNEY

+ In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

REFLECTION

A certain rich man came up to Jesus "as he was setting out on his journey" (Mk 10:17).

The Gospels frequently show us Jesus "on a journey"; he walks alongside people and listens to the questions and concerns lurking in their hearts. He shows us that God is not found in neat and orderly places, distant from reality, but walks ever at our side.

He meets us where we are, on the often rocky roads of life.... as we begin this synodal process, let us begin by asking ourselves - all of us, Pope, bishops, priests, religious and laity - whether we, the Christian community, embody this "style" of God, who travels the paths of history and shares in the life of humanity. Are we prepared for the adventure of this journey? Or are we fearful of the unknown, preferring to take refuge in the usual excuses: "It's useless" or "We've always done it this way"?

Celebrating a Synod means walking on the same road, walking together. Let us look at Jesus. First, he encounters the rich man on the road; he then listens to his questions, and finally he helps him discern what he must do to inherit eternal life. Encounter, listen and discern.

(pause for a moment of silent reflection)

PRAYER

O God, who always walks with us on the journey of life, we call upon you to lead us forth united. Bless and guide our Diocesan Synod. Keep us anchored in your love.

Open our hearts as we listen and discern. Reveal to us the way we are called to go out into the deep. Give us the courage to pursue the mission with bold humility.

May we experience renewal in our local Church today, and for generations to come.

We ask this prayer through Jesus Christ, who in the power of the Holy Spirit continues to guide your Church, to the fullness of your Kingdom now, and forever.

Dear brothers and sisters, good evening!

Today you will walk with Jesus. Jesus is the Way and we will walk with him, because he himself undertook the journey. When he was among us, Jesus walked. He walked along healing the sick, caring for the poor, doing works of justice. As he walked he preached and taught. Jesus walked. But the journey most engraved on our hearts is the way of Calvary, the way of the Cross. And today you and I will prayerfully retrace the Stations of the Cross. We will see Jesus passing by, and walk with him. Jesus' journey is this: God going out of himself in

order to walk by our side. Often we hear at Mass that, "the Word became flesh and lived among us". Do you remember? The Word became a man and walked by our side; and he does this out of love, out of love. The Cross which accompanies every World Youth Day is the icon or image of this journey. The Cross is the greatest sign of the greatest love, the love with which Jesus wants to embrace our lives. Our lives? Yes! Your lives, the life of every one of you, each of us. Jesus walks for us. We must all say it: "Jesus undertakes this journey for me, in order to give his life for me". And no one has greater love than those who gives their lives for their friends, than those who give their lives for others. Do not forget this: no one has greater love than those who give their lives. Jesus taught us this; which is why, when we look at the Crucified Christ, though it be painful and difficult, we see the beauty of the love that gives its life for each one of us. A very devout believer once said something that struck me very much: "Lord, as I contemplate your terrible sufferings, I find myself able to believe in love". Lord, as I contemplate your terrible sufferings, I find myself able to believe in love. Jesus walks along, but he hopes for something: he desires our company, he hopes that we will fix our eyes on him. Perhaps he hopes to open the windows of my soul, of your soul, of each of our souls. How unattractive are those self-centred souls that strive and smile only inwardly. They makes no sense! Yet, Jesus walks along expressing his hope through love and tenderness, so as to give us consolation, to dry the tears of our lives. Now I will ask you a question, but please do not answer out loud; each of you answer within yourself. Do you sometimes weep? Are there things in your life that make you cry? We have all cried in life, and we still weep. And Jesus is there with us, he weeps with us, because he accompanies us into those dark places that make us cry. Now, in a moment of silence, let each of share with Jesus what causes us to cry in our lives; let us tell him that now, in silence...Jesus dries our hidden tears with his tenderness. Jesus wishes to relieve our loneliness with his closeness. Moments of loneliness are sad indeed, yet Jesus is there; he wants to relieve that loneliness. Jesus wishes to calm our fears, your fears, my fears; he wants to calm those deep fears with his consolation. He also desires to encourage us to embrace the risk of loving. Indeed, you know it well, better than I do, that to love is risky. We must take the risk of loving. Yet, though it is a risk, it is a risk worth taking, and Jesus accompanies us as we do. He always accompanies us, always walks with us. Throughout our lives, he is always by our side. I do not wish to say much more. Today we are going to journey with Jesus along the path of his suffering, along the path of our worries, the path of our loneliness. Now, in a further moment of silence, let each of us think about our own sufferings, our own worries, our own weaknesses. Do not be afraid, just think about them. And think of the desire our souls have to shine once more... And Jesus journeys to the Cross, dies on the Cross, to enable our souls to shine. Amen.

POPE FRANCIS' LATEST INTERVIEW By Lisa Zengarini

During his flight back to Rome from his Apostolic Journey to Portugal for World Youth Day 2023, on Sunday evening, Pope Francis said he was very positively impressed by the huge participation and enthusiasm shown by so many young people in Lisbon and also by the successful organization of the event, the best of all the ones he has attended so far (Rio de Janeiro, Krakow and Panama). "For me it was beautiful!", he told journalists travelling with him in his customary post-visit press conference aboard the return flight to Rome.

Young people need to be accompanied

Commenting on the over a million youths joining the WYD last week, the Pope remarked "they are religious, they are looking for a non-hostile, non-artificial, non-legalistic faith, for an encounter with Jesus Christ", which "is not easy", he said. Some may object that young people today don't always abide by moral rules, however, Pope Francis remarked, we all make mistakes in life, and despite this the Lord is always waiting for us because He is merciful". "Who among us has not made a moral mistake in our lives?. Everyone has! Life is like that, but the Lord is always waiting for us because He is merciful." While highlighting the need to accompany young people, our future, as they "seek to look forward", Pope Francis stressed once again the vital importance of "dialogue between old and young" so they don't lose their roots.

The Church is open to everyone, but there are rules in the Church

In the conversation the Pope spoke also about his health, his silent prayer for peace in Fatima, sexual abuse, his upcoming visit to Marseille, in France, and his assertion that the Church is open to all with no exception ("Todos, todos, todos", as he repeated several times during the WYD). Asked by a reporter if he didn't think that this assertion was somehow incoherent with the fact that some people, such as women and gay people, do not have the same rights and cannot receive some Sacraments, Pope Francis reiterated that the Catholic Church welcomes everyone and that it has a duty to accompany them on a personal path of spirituality, but within the framework of its rules. "The Church is open to everyone but there are laws that regulate life inside the Church," he said. According to these laws, certain people they cannot partake in (some) Sacraments. "This does not mean that it is closed. Each person encounters God in their own way inside the Church," the Pope said.

All forms of abuse must be addressed by the Church and society

Pope Francis was also asked about his private meeting with a group of victims of abuse in Lisbon and his opinion on the Portuguese bishops' policies to to address the scourge of sexual abuse in the Church, following the recent publication by independent commission pointing to nearly 5,000 victims over the past decades in the country. Pope Francis said he knows things are proceeding well in this respect and reiterated that all forms of abuse against minors and vulnerable people, whether sexual or not, must be addressed by the Church and society at large.

Exploitation of migrants is criminal

Finally, a French reporter asked Pope Francis about his upcoming visit to the French port city of Marseille in September and his reason for never visiting France as a country. Pope Francis explained that the specific purpose of the visit is to join an international conference hosted by the archdiocese (the "Rencontres Méditerranéennes") gathering bishops and religious leaders of the Mediterranean to discuss, amongst other issues, immigration in the region, an issue which is of particular concern to him. "The exploitation of migrants is criminal", he said referring in particular to Sub-Saharan African migrants blocked in North Africa. He added that at the moment his priority are smaller and more remote countries, rather than big countries like France.




