

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 22:1-14

Jesus said to the chief priests and elders of the people: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a feast for his son's wedding. He sent his servants to call those who had been invited, but they would not come. Next he sent some more servants. "Tell those who have been invited" he said "that I have my banquet all prepared, my oxen and fattened cattle have been slaughtered, everything is ready. Come to the wedding." But they were not interested: one went off to his farm, another to his business, and the rest seized his servants, maltreated them and killed them. The king was furious. He dispatched his troops, destroyed those murderers and burnt their town.

Then he said to his servants, "The wedding is ready; but as those who were invited proved to be unworthy, go to the crossroads in the town and invite everyone you can find to the wedding." So these servants went out onto the roads and collected together everyone they could find, bad and good alike; and the wedding hall was filled with guests. When the king came in to look at the guests he noticed one man who was not wearing a wedding garment, and said to him, "How did you get in here, my friend, without a wedding garment?" And the man was silent. Then the king said to the attendants, "Bind him hand and foot and throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth." For many are called, but few are chosen.'

Dear Friends,

As we know, the Jewish rabbis often used the image of a wedding banquet to describe the kingdom of God, for they believed that God would invite his Chosen people, namely the Jews to attend this banquet, and that the leaders of the Jewish people would be given the places of honour there due to their holiness. Jesus, however, had a different idea, and he made it known through this Gospel account, a parable about the wedding of the prince.

The king, according to Jesus, first sent out his servants to invite the first group of his special guests to come to the wedding, unfortunately they made all sorts of excuses to turn down his invitation, some even maltreated his men and killed them, they were then dealt with accordingly. The king then asked his servants to go out again, and this time they were instructed to invite everyone available on the streets to join the royal party.

What happened was extraordinary, because the king decided to throw a guest out of the wedding reception for this very reason, that the person failed to put on the wedding garment when he came to join the party. Surprisingly, he was tough with this person as much as he was with those who refused his invitation and became violent to his servants

From a symbolic perspective, we know that the king symbolizes God himself, the Son stands for Jesus, the servants for the prophets, the first guests for the Jews and those gathered from the streets for the Gentiles, the people outside the Jewish circle, the people considered by the Jews as having no faith. Here Jesus once again had a go at the chief priests and the elders of the Jews for turning down God's invitation to attend the banquet of salvation, the wedding party of his Son, and they gave God's prophets the hardest times. Consequently, God will turn to the Gentiles and ask them to come to the banquet. This means to say that God's salvation now becomes a universal gift and all peoples and nations can enjoy it.

However, people have to realise that a free ticket to the wedding banquet does not mean that they can do whatever they like. They have to prepare themselves accordingly, meaning that they need to wrap themselves appropriately with the garment of faith and good works.

Let us give praise and thanks to God for inviting us to participate in the banquet Jesus has prepared for us today preparing for our perpetual participation in the eternal banquet in heaven, and let us also pray for the grace to keep the garment of faith and good works at all times.

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS

In his Angelus address on Sunday, Pope Francis reflects on the parable of the wicked tenants. By Christopher Wells

In Sunday's Gospel, the parable of the wicked tenants shows us how "ungrateful and greedy thoughts insinuated themselves into the minds of the tenants, who imagined "the product of our work belongs to us alone". Instead of caring for the garden and sharing the harvest with the landowner, they sought to keep everything for themselves, mistreated the master's servants, and ultimately killed his son.

Ingratitude leads to violence

Reflecting on this parable, Pope Francis said that the tenants "should have been grateful for what they received and for how they had been treated. Instead, ingratitude gives rise to greed and a progressive sense of rebellion grew within them, leading them to see the situation in a distorted way, to feel that the owner was in their debt rather than that they were in debt to the owner who had given them work."

And thus, the Pope said, "from being tenants, they become assassins."

Pope Francis went on to explain that, in this parable, Jesus reminds us what happens when a person deceives him or herself into thinking he or she does things on their own and forgets to be grateful..." This attitude, he said, can lead to dissatisfaction, misunderstandings, resentment, and ultimately violence. "Yes, dear brothers and sisters," he said, "ungratefulness generates violence... while a simple 'Thank you' can bring back peace!"

Learning to say 'Thank you'

The Holy Father invited us to ask ourselves if we recognize that life and faith, our very selves, and everything we have "comes from the grace of the Lord..."; and if, in response to grace, we "know how to say 'Thank you'?"

Pope Francis concluded his Angelus reflection with the prayer that the Blessed Virgin Mary, "whose soul glorifies the

Lord," might "help us to make gratitude the light that dawns daily in our hearts."

POPE FRANCIS' APPEALS FOR PEACE AND RESTRAINT IN ISRAEL-HAMAS WAR

Pope Francis appeals for peace in the Holy Land and says Israel has the right to defend itself, but affirms that violence cannot help achieve a lasting peace built on justice.

Speaking at the Wednesday General Audience, Pope Francis expressed his "sorrow and concern" for the war that has broken out between Israel and Hamas, an Islamist militant organization operating in Palestine.

The Pope mourned the many people who have been killed and injured.

"I pray for those families who have seen a day of celebration turned into a day of mourning and ask for the immediate release of the hostages," he said.

Militants from Hamas launched a surprise attack on the southern part of Israel on Saturday, as Jews marked the feast of *Simchat Torah*, or "joy of the Torah".

Hamas took dozens of hostages during its incursion into Israel and has threatened to execute them if Israel attacks areas within the Gaza Strip.

Violence cannot lead to peace

In his appeal, Pope Francis acknowledged that "it is the right of those who are attacked to defend themselves".

However, he expressed concern for the "total siege facing the Palestinians in Gaza, where there have also been many innocent victims."

Israel announced a "complete siege" on Gaza, promising to shut off access to electricity, food, water, and gas.

The Pope invited both parties to restraint in hopes of reaching a solution to the war.

"Terrorism and extremism do not help to reach a solution to the conflict between Israelis and Palestinians, but fuel hatred, violence, and revenge, causing suffering to both sides," he said.

Pope Francis concluded his appeal for peace in the Middle East with a call for fraternity and dialogue.

"The Middle East does not need war but peace, a peace built on justice, dialogue, and the courage of fraternity," he said.



POPE FRANCIS' CATECHESIS

The passion for evangelization: the apostolic zeal of the believer. Saint Josephine Bakhita: witness of the transforming power of Christ's forgiveness.

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!

In our path of catechesis on apostolic zeal – we are reflecting on apostolic zeal - today we will let ourselves be inspired by the witness of Saint Josephine Bakhita, a Sudanese saint. Unfortunately, for months Sudan has been torn by a terrible armed conflict, of which little is spoken today; let us pray for the Sudanese people, so they might live in peace! But the fame of Saint Bakhita has exceeded every boundary and reached all those to whom identity and dignity is denied. Born in Darfur – troubled Darfur! – in 1869, she was abducted from her family at the age of seven, and made a slave. Her abductors called her "Bakhita", which means "fortunate". She passed through eight masters – each one sold her on to the next. The physical and moral suffering she suffered as a child left her with no identity. She suffered cruelty and violence: on her body she bore more than a hundred scars. But she herself testified: "As a slave I never despaired, because I felt a mysterious force supporting me". In the face of this, I wonder: what is Saint Bakhita's secret? We know that often a wounded person wounds in turn: the oppressed easily becomes an oppressor.

Instead, the vocation of the oppressed is that of freeing themselves and their oppressors, becoming restorers of humanity. Only in the weakness of the oppressed can the force of God's love, which frees both, be revealed. Saint Bakhita expresses this truth very well. One day her tutor gave her a small crucifix and she, who had never owned anything, conserved her treasure jealously. Looking at it, she experienced inner liberation, because *she felt understood and loved* and therefore *capable of understanding and loving*: this is the beginning. She felt understood, she felt loved, and as a consequence capable of understanding and loving others. Indeed, she went on to say: "God's love has always accompanied me in a mysterious way. The Lord loved me: you have to love everyone.. you have to have pity!". This is Bakhita's soul.

Truly, to pity means both to *suffer* with the victims of the great inhumanity in the world, and also to *pity* those who commit errors and injustices, not justifying, but humanizing. This is the caress she teaches us: to humanize. When we enter the logic of fighting, of division between us, of bad feelings, one against the other, we lose our humanity. And very often we think we are in need of humanity, to be more humane. And this is. The work that Saint Bakhita teaches us: to humanize, to humanize ourselves and to humanize others.

Saint Bakhita, who became Christian, was transformed by the words of Christ she meditated on every day: "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do" (*Lk* 23:34). And so she said: "If Judas had asked Jesus for forgiveness, he too would have found mercy". We can say that St Bakhita's life became an *existential parable of forgiveness*. How good it is to say to a person, "he was capable, she was capable of forgiving, always". And she was always capable of forgiving; indeed, her life is an existential parable of forgiveness. To forgive because then we will be forgiven. Do not forget this: forgiveness, which is God's caress to all of us. Forgiveness liberated her. Forgiveness first received through God's merciful love, and then the forgiveness given that made her a free, joyful woman, capable of loving. Bakhita was able to experience service not as slavery, but as an expression of the free gift of self. And this is very important: made a servant involuntarily – she was sold as a slave – she then freely chose to become a servant, to bear on her shoulders the burdens of others. Saint Josephine Bakhita, by her example, shows us the way to finally be free from our slavery and fears. She helps us to unmask our hypocrisies and selfishness, to overcome resentments and conflicts. And she encourages us, always.

Dear brothers and sisters, forgiveness takes away nothing but adds – what does forgiveness add? – dignity: forgives takes away nothing from you but adds dignity to the person, it makes us lift our gaze from ourselves towards others, to see them as fragile as we are, yet always brothers and sisters in the Lord. Brothers and sisters, forgiveness is the wellspring of a zeal that becomes mercy and calls us to a humble and joyful holiness, like that of Saint Bakhita.

Special Greetings

I extend a warm welcome to the English-speaking pilgrims and visitors taking part in today's Audience, especially the groups from England, Scotland, Denmark, Norway, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Canada and the United States of America. I also welcome the distinguished delegation from the NATO Defense College, with prayerful good wishes for their service to the cause of peace. Upon all of you I invoke the joy and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ. God bless you!

Appeals of the Holy Father

I continue to follow what is happening in Israel and Palestine with tears and apprehension: many people killed, others injured. I pray for those families who have seen a feast day transformed into a day of mourning, and I ask that the hostages be released immediately. It is the right of those who are attacked to defend themselves, but I am very concerned about the total siege under which the Palestinians are living in Gaza, where there have also been many innocent victims. Terrorism and extremism do not help reach a solution to the conflict between Israelis and Palestinians, but fuel hatred, violence, revenge, and only cause each to other suffer. The Middle East does not need war, but peace, a peace built on dialogue and the courage of fraternity. I address a special thought to the population of Afghanistan, suffering following the devastating earthquake that struck, claiming thousands of victims, including many women and children, and displaced persons. I invite all people of good will to help this people, already sorely tried, contributing in a spirit of fraternity to alleviating the sufferings of the people and supporting the necessary reconstruction.

Summary of the Holy Father's words

Dear brothers and sisters: In our catechesis on apostolic zeal, we have been reflecting on the spread of the Gospel through the witness of men and women of every time and place. Today we turn once more to Africa and to the powerful witness of Saint Josephine Bakhita. Born in Darfur in Sudan, Josephine was kidnapped as a child and sold into slavery. Despite the violence and terrible sufferings she endured, she never despaired. In the cross of Christ she discovered the source of a merciful love that affirms our innate dignity as God's children, brings true freedom and enables us to forgive and indeed love those who wrong us. The experience of God's mercy and forgiveness inspired Josephine to devote herself to Christ as a religious and to serve others humbly and selflessly in Italy, her new country. The life of Saint Josephine Bakhita reveals the power of God's grace to transform lives, to resolve conflicts and to bring about the justice, reconciliation and peace so greatly needed in our time. Let us entrust ourselves to her prayers and ask especially for the gift of peace for our brothers and sisters in war-torn Sudan and in so many other parts of our world.
