Throughout Jesus' public ministry, some powerful groups in Israel such as the Pharisees, the scribes, the elders known as the Temple authority often tried to make life difficult for him with all sorts of tricks and

tactics, but Jesus always outsmarted them and came out on top. The more that happened the more they became determined to get rid of him, and they succeeded at the end as we know with his crucifixion, and again came out as a clear winner with his glorious resurrection from death.

Well, the story of the Gospel this Sunday presents to us a typical example of how the Temple authority groups managed to ensnare Jesus into a trap by posing to him as deadly question, 'is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?'

It's worth to remember that the Jews in Jesus' time considered God as their king and their tax money should go for the upkeep of God's house, namely the Jerusalem Temple, but the Roman invaders also asked the Jews to pay tax to the emperor of the Roman empire. This demand of course had made the Jews angry, because they thought the emperor was trying to take God's place.

As a result, the Jews used two different currencies for different purposes: the Roman coin with the head of the emperor on it for business, and their own coin for religious purposes.

Unhappy with the Roman tax system for reasons mentioned above, and seeing the opportunity to embarrass Jesus and even cause him big trouble, the Pharisees grabbed the opportunity asking him the question about whether they should pay taxes to the Roman emperor or not. Here Jesus can't answer yes or no to them, because if he says yes, he would be condemned by the Jews seeing him as a Roman agent, on the other hand, if he says no, he surely is in trouble with the Roman occupiers, who regard it as an attempt to advocate a rise against the Roman empire.

Jesus, however, came up with a genius answer, which has become the world wisdom of all times. After asking the Pharisees to identify the face and the name of the emperor on the coin, he advised them to 'give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God,' in other words, he means to ask them in a smart way to fulfill their duties both civic and religious. He was cautious both with the Roman authority and the fanatic Jews, and upset neither of them through the solution.

Let us celebrate Jesus' inspiring wisdom shown in the Gospel today, and ask for the grace to help us fulfill what we are expected to do in the world, such as paying taxes, caring for nature, and also from the Lord, such as our charity towards God and others.

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS



Dear brothers and sisters, *buongiorno*!

Today's Gospel passage tells us about a king who prepares a wedding banquet for his son (cf. *Mt* 22:1-14). He is a powerful man, but he is above all a generous father, who invites others to share in his joy. In particular, he reveals the goodness of his heart in the fact that he does not compel anyone, but invites everyone, even though this way of his exposes him to the possibility of refusal. Take note: he prepares a banquet, *freely* offering an

opportunity to meet, an opportunity for a feast. This is what God prepares for us: a banquet, to be in communion with him and among ourselves. And we, all of us, are therefore *invited by God*. But a wedding banquet requires time and

commitment on our part: it requires a "yes": to go, to go to the Lord's invitation. He invites, but he leaves us free. This is type of relationship that the Father offers us: he calls us to stay with him, leaving us the possibility to accept, or not accept, the invitation. He does not propose to us a relationship of subjection, but rather of fatherhood and sonship, which is necessarily conditioned by our free assent. God is respectful regarding freedom; very respectful. Saint Augustine uses a very beautiful expression in this regard, saying: "He who created us without our help will not save us without our

consent" (Sermon CLXIX, 13). And certainly not because he does not have the capacity to do so - God is omnipotent! - but because, being love, he respects our freedom fully. God proposes: he does not impose, never.

Let us return, then, to the parable: the king - says the text - "sent his servants to call those who were invited to the

marriage feast; but they *would not come*" (v.3). Here is the drama of the story: the "no" to God. But why do men refuse his invitation? Was it perhaps an unpleasant invitation? No, and yet – the Gospel says – "they made light of it and went off, one to his farm, another to his business" (v.5). They did not care, because they were thinking of their own affairs. And that king, who is a father, God, what does he do? He does not give up, he continues to invite; indeed, he extends the invitation, until he finds those who accept, among the poor. Among those who know they have little else, many come, until they fill the hall (cf. vv. 8-10).

Brothers and sisters, how many times do we fail to heed God's invitation, because we are intent on our own affairs! Often, we struggle to have *free* time, but today Jesus invites us to find the time that *frees*: the time to dedicate to God, that

lightens and heals our hearts, that increases peace, confidence and joy in us, that saves us from evil, loneliness and loss of meaning. It is worth it, because it is good to be with the Lord, to make space for him. Where? In the Mass, in listening to the Word, in prayer and also in charity, because by helping those who are weak or poor, by keeping company with those who are lonely, by listening to those who ask for attention, by consoling those who suffer, one is with the Lord, who is

present in those in need. Many, however, think that these things are a "waste of time", and so they lock themselves away in their private world; and it is sad. And this generates sadness. How many sad hearts there are! For this reason: because they are closed.

Let us ask ourselves, then: how do I respond to God's invitations? What space do I give him in my days? Does the quality of my life depend on my affairs and my free time, or on love for the Lord and for my brethren, especially those most in need? Let us ask ourselves this.

May Mary, who with her "yes" made room for God, help us not to be deaf to his invitations.

After the Angelus

Dear brothers and sisters!

I continue to follow with great sorrow what is happening in Israel and Palestine. I think again of the many... in particular of the children and the elderly. I renew my appeal for the freeing of the hostages and I strongly ask that children, the sick, the elderly, women, and all civilians not be made victims of the conflict. Humanitarian law is to be respected, especially in

Gaza, where it is urgent and necessary to ensure humanitarian corridors and to come to the aid of the entire population. Brothers and sisters, already many have died. Please, let no more innocent blood be shed, neither in the Holy Land nor in Ukraine, nor in any other place! Enough! Wars are always a defeat, always!

Prayer is the meek and holy force to oppose the diabolical force of hatred, terrorism and war. I invite all believers to join with the Church in the Holy Land and to dedicate next Tuesday, 17 October, to prayer and fasting. And now let us pray to Our Lady. [Hail Mary].

My concern for the crisis in Nagorno-Karabakh has not waned. In addition to the humanitarian situation of the displaced people - which is serious - I would also like to make a special appeal for the protection of the monasteries and places of worship in the region. I hope that, starting with the Authorities and all the inhabitants, they can be respected and protected as part of the local culture, expressions of faith and a sign of a fraternity that makes it possible to live together despite differences. Today the Apostolic Exhortation on Saint Therese of the Child Jesus and of the Holy Face is published,

entitled "*C'est la confiance*": indeed, as this great Saint and Doctor of the Church testified, trust in God's merciful love is the way that leads us to the heart of the Lord and his Gospel. I express my closeness to the Jewish community of Rome, which tomorrow commemorates the eightieth anniversary of the Nazi deportations.

I greet you all, Romans and pilgrims from Italy and many parts of the world, in particular the Gonfalone Archfraternity of Subiaco and the "Fiat 500" Club of Rome.

I greet the more than 400 young missionaries of New Horizons and other associations and communities, who from yesterday until next Sunday are engaged in the "Street Mission" here in Rome, going to places where young people gather, in schools, hospitals, prisons and on the streets to proclaim the joy of the Gospel. They are good! Let us support them with prayer in their commitment to listening to the cry of many young people and many people in need of love. I am looking at the Ukrainian flags: let us not forget tormented Ukraine. I wish you all a good Sunday. And please, do not forget to pray for me. Enjoy your lunch, and *arrivederci*!

Although I believe it is not always prudent to respond to questions directly addressed to me, and it would be impossible to answer all of them, in this case, given the proximity of the Synod, I have deemed it appropriate to do so.

1. Dubium regarding the assertion that the Divine Revelation should be reinterpreted based on current cultural and anthropological changes.

Following the statements of some bishops, which have neither been corrected nor retracted, we ask whether the Divine Revelation should be reinterpreted in the Church according to the cultural changes of our time, and the new anthropological vision promoted by these changes. Or if, on the contrary, the Divine Revelation is binding forever, immutable, and therefore not to be contradicted, in accordance with the dictum of the Second Vatican Council, which states that "the obedience of faith" must be given to God who reveals, (*Dei Verbum 5*); that what is revealed for the salvation of all nations must remain "forever whole and alive", and be "handed on to all generations" (7), and that progress in understanding does not imply any change in the truth of things and words because faith is "handed on once and for all " (8), and the Church's Magisterium is not above the Word of God, but only teaches what has been handed on (10).

Response to the first Dubium

a) The answer depends on the meaning you give to the word "reinterpret." If it is understood as "interpret better," the expression is valid. In this sense, the Second Vatican Council affirmed that it is necessary that with the work of exegetes - and I would add of theologians - "the judgment of the Church may mature" (*Second Vatican Council, Dogmatic Constitution Dei Verbum, 12*).
b) Therefore, while it is true that the Divine Revelation is immutable and always binding, the Church must be humble and

recognize that she never exhausts its unfathomable richness and needs to grow in her understanding.

c) Consequently, she also matures in her understanding of what she has herself affirmed in her Magisterium.

d) Cultural changes and new challenges in history do not modify Revelation but can stimulate us to express certain aspects of its overflowing richness better, which always offers more.

e) It is inevitable that this can lead to a better expression of some past statements of the Magisterium, and indeed, this has been the case throughout history.

f) On the one hand, it is true that the Magisterium is not superior to the Word of God, but it is also true that both the texts of the Scripture and the testimonies of Tradition require interpretation in order to distinguish their perennial substance from cultural conditioning. This is evident, for example, in biblical texts (*such as Exodus 21:20-21*) and in some magisterial interventions that tolerated slavery (Cf. *Pope Nicholas V, Bull Dum diversas, 1452*). This is not a minor issue given its intimate connection with the perennial truth of the inalienable dignity of the human person. These texts need interpretation. The same applies to certain considerations in the New Testament regarding women (*1 Corinthians 11:3-10; 1 Timothy 2:11-14*) and other texts of Scripture and testimonies of Tradition that cannot be materially repeated today.

g) It is important to emphasize that what cannot change is what has been revealed "for the salvation of all" (*Second Vatican Council, Dogmatic Constitution Dei Verbum, 7*). Therefore, the Church must constantly discern between what is essential for salvation and what is secondary or less directly connected with this goal.

In this regard, I would like to recall what St. Thomas Aquinas affirmed: "The more one descends to matters of detail, the more frequently we encounter defects" (Summa Theologiae I/II q. 94, art. 4).

h) Finally, a single formulation of a truth can never be adequately understood if it is presented in isolation, detached from the rich and harmonious context of the entire Revelation. The "hierarchy of truths" also implies placing each of them in proper connection with the central truths and with the entirety of the Church's teaching. This can ultimately lead to different ways of presenting the same doctrine, even though "for those who long for a monolithic body of doctrine guarded by all and leaving no room for nuance, this might appear as undesirable and leading to confusion. But in fact such variety serves to bring out and develop different facets of the inexhaustible riches of the Gospel" (*Evangelii Gaudium*, 40). Every theological current has its risks, but also its opportunities.
