FROM FR. HENRY DUC

Dear Friends,



Jewish people in Jesus' time believed that the laws in sacred Scripture were to the principal ways leading to holiness, consequently anyone who observed the laws of Moses was considered as holy, and vice versa, anyone who failed to follow the laws was a sinner. As a result, the Pharisees tried to avoid from accidently breaking the laws by making more laws known as the oral traditions, including 613 articles together, in which the phrase 'you shall..' was repeated 248 times and the phrase 'you shall not..' 365 times, and the Pharisees regarded the oral traditions as equally important as the sacred Scripture.

In the Gospel today, the evangelist recounts the story of Jesus' encounter with the Pharisees asking for Jesus' comment about which is the most important commandment of the Law. In response, Jesus chose a combination of two verses, one from Deuteronomy (6.4-5) and the other from Leviticus (19.18) as his way to turn something familiar to his Jewish audience into his own teaching.

These verses from Deuteronomy were the first Scripture passage every Jewish boy had to memorise, for Jewish people considered it as the summary of the entire Jewish law, and the pious Jew was expected to recite this passage every day from his or her rise.

With his addition of the verse from Leviticus, Jesus aims to point out the duty to love our neighbour as a visual exhibition of our total love for God. In his letter, St John explored Jesus' teaching by arguing that if we cannot love a brother or sister we can see, we surely cannot God whom we cannot see. In other words, love of God and love of people have to go hand in hand and they cannot be separated.

Most importantly, Jesus chose the Greek word AGAPE as his preferred choice to publicise his unique commandments of Love, that he means to tell us that this is the summary of all his teachings and expects nothing from his disciples but a love utterly selfless and unconditional.

Let us pray today for the grace to help us realise and appreciate the importance of Jesus' commandments of the dual love, and the power to support us in our effort to live them out.

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS



Dear brothers and sisters, buongiorno!

The Gospel of today's Liturgy tells us about some pharisees who join with the Herodians to set a trap for Jesus. They were always trying to set traps for Him. They go to Him and ask: "Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar, or not?" (*Mt* 22:17). It is a ruse: if Jesus legitimizes the tax, He places Himself on the side of a political power that is ill-supported by the people, whereas if He says not to pay it, He can be accused of rebellion against the empire.

A veritable trap. However, He escapes this snare. He asks them to show Him a coin, which bears the image of Caesar, and says to them: "Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's" (v. 21). What does this mean?

These words of Jesus have become commonplace, but at times they have been used incorrectly – or at least reductively – to talk about the relations between Church and State, Christians and politics; often they are interpreted as though Jesus wanted to separate "Caesar" from "God", that is, earthly from spiritual reality. At times we too think in this way: faith with its practices is one thing, and daily life is another. And this will not do. No. This is a form of "schizophrenia", as if faith had nothing to do with real life, with the challenges of society, with social justice, with politics and so forth.

In reality, Jesus wants to help us place "Caesar" and "God" each in their proper place. The care for earthly order belongs to Caesar – that is, to politics, to civil institutions, to social and economic processes, and we who are immersed in this reality must give back to society what it offers us, through our contribution as responsible citizens, taking care of what is entrusted to us, promoting law and justice in the world of work, paying our taxes honestly, committing ourselves to the common good, and so on. At the same time, though, Jesus affirms the fundamental reality: that man belongs to God: *all of man* and *every human being*. And this means that we do not belong to any earthly reality, to any "Caesar". We are the Lord's, and we must not be slaves to any earthly power. On the coin, then, there is the image of the emperor, but Jesus reminds us that our lives are imprinted with the image of God, which nothing and no-one can obscure. The things of this world belong to Caesar, but man and the world itself belong to God: do not forget this!

We understand, then, that Jesus is restoring each one of us to his or her own identity: on the coin of this world there is the image of Caesar, but you – each one of us - which image do you carry within yourself? Let us ask ourselves this question: what image do I carry inside myself? You - whose is the image of your life? Do we remember that we belong to the Lord, or do we let ourselves be shaped by the logic of the world and make work, politics and money our idols to be worshipped? May the Holy Virgin help us to recognize and honour our dignity and that of every human being.

After praying the Angelus, the Pope continued:

Dear brothers and sisters,

Once more my thoughts turn to what is happening in Israel and Palestine. I am very concerned, grieved. I pray and I am close to all those who are suffering: the hostages, the wounded, the victims and their relatives. I think of the serious humanitarian situation in Gaza and I am saddened that the Anglican hospital and the Greek-Orthodox parish have also been hit in recent days. I renew my appeal for spaces to be opened, for humanitarian aid to continue to arrive, and for the

hostages to be freed. War, any war that there is in the world -1 also thin

War, any war that there is in the world – I also think of tormented Ukraine – is a defeat. War is always a defeat; it is a destruction of human fraternity. Brothers, stop! Stop!

I remind you that next Friday, 27 October, I have proclaimed a day of fasting, prayer and penance, and that evening at 18.00 in Saint Peter's Square we will spend an hour in prayer to implore peace in the world.

Today we celebrate World Mission Sunday, which has the theme: "*Hearts on fire, feet on the move*". Two images that say everything! I urge everyone, in the dioceses and in the parishes, to participate actively.

I greet you all, Romans and pilgrims, in particular the *Siervas de los Pobres hijas del Sagrado Corazón de Jesús* religious sisters, from Granada; the members of the *Centro Académico Romano Fundación*, the Confraternity of the *Señor de los Milagros*, of the Peruvians in Rome; and thank you, thank you for your witness! Keep up the good work, with such beautiful piety.

I greet the members of the "All custodians of humanity" lay missionary movement; the polyphonic "Sant'Antonio Abate" choir of Cordenons, and the associations of the faithful from Naples and Casagiove.

I also greet the young people of the "*Casa Giardino*", the "Garden House" of Casalmaggiore; the group of young friends from the Emmanuel Community; the directors and teachers from the "*Jean XXIII*" Catholic School of Toulon, and the students from the "*Saint Croix*" High School of Neuilly.

I wish you all a good Sunday. You too, young people of the *Immaculata*. And please, do not forget to pray for me. Enjoy your lunch, and *arrivederci*!



POPE FRANCIS' RESPONSE TO DUBIA (DOUBTS) SUBMITTED BY A GROUP OF CARDINALS

Dear brothers,

Although I believe it is not always prudent to respond to questions directly addressed to me, and it would be impossible to answer all of them, in this case, given the proximity of the Synod, I have deemed it appropriate to do so.....

2. Dubium regarding the assertion that the widespread practice of blessing same-sex unions is in accordance with Revelation and the Magisterium (CCC 2357).

According to the Divine Revelation, attested in Sacred Scripture, which the Church teaches, "listening to it devoutly,

guarding it scrupulously and explaining it faithfully in accord with a divine commission and with the help of the Holy

Spirit" (*Dei Verbum,* 10), "In the beginning," God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them, and blessed them to be fruitful (cf. Genesis 1:27-28) and hence, the Apostle Paul teaches that denying sexual difference is the consequence of denying the Creator (Romans 1:24-32). We ask: can the Church deviate from this "principle," considering it, in contrast to what was taught in *Veritatis splendor*, 103, as a mere ideal, and accept as a "possible good" objectively sinful situations, such as unions with persons of the same sex, without departing from the revealed doctrine?

Pope Francis's Response to the Second Dubium

a) The Church has a very clear understanding of marriage: an exclusive, stable, and indissoluble union between a man and a woman, naturally open to procreation. Only this union can be called "marriage." Other forms of union realize it only in "a partial and analogous way" (Amoris Laetitia 292), so they cannot be strictly called "marriage."

b) It is not just a matter of names, but the reality we call marriage has a unique essential constitution that requires an exclusive name, not applicable to other realities. It is undoubtedly much more than a mere "ideal."

c) For this reason, the Church avoids any type of rite or sacramental that might contradict this conviction and suggest that something that is not marriage is recognized as marriage.

d) However, in our relationships with people, we must not lose the pastoral charity, which should permeate all our decisions and attitudes. The defence of objective truth is not the only expression of this charity; it also includes kindness, patience, understanding, tenderness, and encouragement. Therefore, we cannot be judges who only deny, reject, and exclude.

e) Therefore, pastoral prudence must adequately discern whether there are forms of blessing, requested by one or more persons, that do not convey a mistaken concept of marriage. For when a blessing is requested, it is expressing a plea to God for help, a supplication to live better, a trust in a Father who can help us live better.

f) On the other hand, although there are situations that are not morally acceptable from an objective point of view, the same pastoral charity requires us not to simply treat as "sinners" other people whose guilt or responsibility may be mitigated by various factors affecting subjective accountability (Cf. St. John Paul II, *Reconciliatio et paenitentia*, 17).

g) Decisions that may be part of pastoral prudence in certain circumstances should not necessarily become a norm. That is, it is not appropriate for a Diocese, a Bishops' Conference, or any other ecclesial structure to constantly and officially enable procedures or rituals for all kinds of matters, because not everything that "is part of a practical discernment in particular

circumstances can be elevated to the level of a rule" as this "would lead to an intolerable casuistry" (*Amoris laetitia,* 304). Canon law should not and cannot cover everything, nor should Episcopal Conferences with their varied documents and protocols claim to do so, as the life of the Church flows through many channels other than normative ones.

3. Dubium regarding the assertion that synodality is a "constitutive dimension of the Church" (Apostolic Constitution *Episcopalis communio*, 6), such that the Church is by nature synodal.

Since the Synod of Bishops does not represent the episcopal college but is merely an advisory body of the Pope, as bishops, witnesses of the faith, cannot delegate their confession of the truth, it is asked whether synodality can be the supreme regulatory criterion of the permanent governance of the Church without distorting its constitutive structure desired by its Founder, whereby the supreme and full authority of the Church is exercised both by the Pope by virtue of his office and by the college of bishops together with their head, the Roman Pontiff (*Lumen gentium*, 22).

Pope Francis's Response to the Third Dubium

a) Although you acknowledge that the supreme and full authority of the Church is exercised both by the Pope by virtue of his office and by the college of bishops together with their Head, the Roman Pontiff (Cf. Second Vatican Council, Dogmatic Constitution *Lumen gentium*, 22), with these very questions, you manifest your need to participate, to freely express your opinion, and to collaborate, thereby requesting a form of "synodality" in the exercise of my ministry.

b) The Church is a "mystery of missionary communion," but this communion is not only affective or ethereal; it necessarily implies real participation. Not only the hierarchy but the entire People of God in various ways and at different levels can make their voices heard and feel part of the Church's journey. In this sense, we can say that synodality, as a style and dynamism, is an essential dimension of the Church's life. On this point, St. John Paul II said some very beautiful things in *Novo millennio ineunte*.

c) It is quite another thing to sacralize or impose a particular synodal methodology that appeals to one group, turning it into a norm and an obligatory path for everyone, because this would only "freeze" the synodal journey, ignoring the different characteristics of the particular Churches and the varied richness of the universal Church.

such as wedding anniversaries, baptisms, birthdays, or death anniversaries. Please see Fr Henry or Ernie before Mass to arrange it.


