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
THE PILGRIM STATUE OF OUR LADY OF LOURDES

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir", he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness."

Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."

FROM FR. HENRY DUC



Dear Friends,

A few days ago, I rang a friend of mine in Vietnam for a catch up and was told about the stress that one of our friends, a single man has to go through due to the mishandling of his savings. The problem began when he decided to entrust the extra cash put away for his retirement to a trusted friend, believing that his friend could do a good job in looking after it for him, instead of depositing the money to his bank account.

When he needed some money for an urgent medical treatment, his friend failed to give him it back with the excuse that he has lent the whole lot to somebody else. Both of us agreed that he could have avoided the problem if he had entrusted his savings to the bank from the start, and that there is not much we can do to help him from here. Depositing money to the bank is exactly what the master in the parable today said to the servant who was given only one talent and chose to bury it underground instead.

This servant together with his two fellow servants were entrusted by their master with different amounts of talents prior to his abroad trip. He received one, and his friends: five and two.

While those with more talents made the effort to trade with what was given to them and proudly showed the profits they made, when asked by the master at his return. Both of them were highly praised by the master and rewarded with the inheritance of the master's happiness, the servant with one talent, on the other hand, was named and shamed for blaming the master for not giving him more, and doing absolutely nothing with what he had. The master ordered him to be thrown into the dark with weeping and grinding of teeth.

This Gospel account, according to the evangelist Matthew, is part of the body of parables Jesus taught the disciples aimed to tell them what the Kingdom of God is about. Symbolically, various characters of the story such as the master, and the servants symbolise God and all members of God's people; the talents symbolise the gifts and grace God has given to each of us, and the happy place and the dark stand for heaven and hell.

Here Jesus means to remind us his disciples of all the gifts, talents, and opportunities God has given us to work with, to gain credits for us in heaven, and to make God proud as our Creator. We are expected to perform, and shall receive the heavenly reward, otherwise we shall be harshly judged and dealt with.

Let us pray for the wisdom to recognize the gifts we have received from above, and for the commitment to make our gifts profitable for us before our ultimate Master, so that we deserve a place in His heavenly House. Have a spiritually profitable week.

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS



Dear brothers and sisters, happy Sunday!

Today's Gospel offers us a story regarding the meaning of life of each person. It is the parable of the ten virgins, called to go out to meet the bridegroom (cf. *Mt* 25:1-13). Living is this: a grand preparation for the day when we will be called to go to Jesus! However, in the parable of the ten virgins, five are wise and five foolish. Let us see what constitutes wisdom and foolishness. Wisdom in life, and foolishness in life.

All those bridesmaids are there to welcome the bridegroom, that is, they want to meet him, just as we too desire a happy fulfilment of life: the difference between wisdom and foolishness is therefore not in goodwill. Nor does it lie in the punctuality with which they arrive at the meeting: they were all there. The difference between the wise and the foolish is another: preparation. The text says: the wise "took flasks of oil with their lamps" (v. 4); the foolish, on the other hand, did not. Here is the difference: the oil. And what is one of the characteristics of the oil? That it cannot be seen: it is inside the lamps, it is not conspicuous, but without it the lamps have no light.

Let us look at ourselves, and we will see that our life runs the same risk: many times, we are very careful about our appearance – the important thing is to take good care of one's image, to make a good impression in front of others. But Jesus says that the wisdom of life lies elsewhere: in taking care of what cannot be seen, but which is more important, taking care of the heart. *Nurturing the inner life*. This means knowing how to stop and listen to one's heart, to keep watch over one's own thoughts and feelings. How many times are we unaware of what has happened in our heart in that day? What happens within each one of us? Wisdom means knowing how to make room for silence, so as to be capable of listening to ourselves and others. It means knowing how to give up some of the time passed in front of the telephone screen to look at the light in the eyes of others, in one's own heart, in God's gaze upon us. It means not falling into the trap of activism, but devoting time to the Lord, to listening to His Word.

And the Gospel gives us the right advice so not to neglect the oil of inner life, the "oil of the soul": it tells us that it is important to *prepare it*. And in the account, we see, in fact, that the virgins already possess the lamps, but they must prepare the oil: they must go to the sellers, buy it, put it in the lamps... (cf. vv. 7-9). It is the same for us: the inner life cannot be improvised, it is not a matter of a moment, of once in a while, of once and for all; the inner life must be prepared by dedicating a little time every day, with constancy, as one does for every important thing.

So, we can ask ourselves: what am I preparing at this moment in life? Within myself, what am I preparing? Perhaps I am trying to put aside some savings, I am thinking about a house or a new car, concrete plans... They are good things; they are not bad things. They are good things. But am I also thinking about dedicating time to the care of the heart, to prayer, to service to others, to the Lord who is the destination of life? In short, how is the oil of my soul? Each one of us, let us ask ourselves this: how is the oil of my soul? Do I nourish it, do I keep it well?

After the Angelus

Dear brothers and sisters!

For some months Sudan has been in the throes of a civil war that shows no sign of abating, and which is causing numerous victims, millions of internally displaced people and refugees in neighbouring countries, and a very grave humanitarian situation. I am close to the sufferings of those dear populations of Sudan, and I address a heartfelt appeal to local leaders to facilitate access to humanitarian aid and, with the contribution of the international community, to work in search of peaceful solutions. Let us not forget these brothers and sisters of ours who are in distress! And our thoughts turn every day to the very serious situation in Israel and in Palestine. I am close to all those who are suffering, Palestinians and Israelis. I embrace them in this dark moment. And I pray for them a lot. May the weapons be stopped: they will never lead to peace, and may the conflict not widen! Enough! Enough, brothers! In Gaza, let the wounded be rescued immediately, let civilians be protected, let far more humanitarian aid be allowed to reach that stricken population. May the hostages be freed, including the elderly and children. Every human being, Christian, Jewish, Muslim, of any people or religion, every human being is sacred, is precious in the eyes of God and has the right to live in peace. Let us not lose hope: let us pray and work tirelessly so that the sense of humanity may prevail over hardness of heart. Two years ago, the Laudato si' Action Platform was launched. I thank those who have joined in this initiative and encourage them to continue on the path of ecological conversion. In this regard, let us pray for the Dubai Climate Change Conference, COP28, which is now close at hand. Today the Italian Church celebrates Thanksgiving Day, on the theme "The cooperative approach to agricultural development". I greet you all affectionately, pilgrims from Italy and other parts of the world, especially the priests from the archdiocese of Szczecin-Kamień, Poland, and the parish groups from Augsburg, Zara, Poreč, Pola, Porto and Paris. I greet the members of the Sant'Egidio Community from countries in Asia, and I encourage them in their commitment to evangelization and promotion. Keep going forward, bravely! And you also help make peace too.

I greet the faithful of Volargne, Ozieri and Cremona. I greet with affection the pilgrimage of Ukrainian faithful and Basilian monks – I can see the Ukrainian flags there – from various countries to celebrate the fourth centenary of the martyrdom of Saint Josaphat. I pray with you for peace in your beleaguered country. Brothers and sisters, let us not forget tormented Ukraine, let us not forget her.

And I wish you all a happy Sunday. Please, do not forget to pray for me.

POPE FRANCIS REAFFIRMS RIGHTS OF PARENTS TO EDUCATE THEIR CHILDREN IN FREEDOM

Pope Francis has reiterated the need to protect the right of parents to raise and educate their children consistent with their convictions. They should not be constrained "in any sphere, particularly in that of schooling, to accept educational programmes contrary to their beliefs and values," he said.

On Saturday, the Pope addressed participants in the General Assembly and Conference of the European Parents' Association taking place in Rome on 10-11 November. He stressed that "the fundamental role of parents in the social order" must "be acknowledged at every level."

A demanding task, especially in present cultural context

Pope Francis noted that the educational mission of parents is a demanding task, especially in today's "cultural context, at least in Europe, marked as it is by ethical subjectivism and practical materialism."

"Parents thus find themselves constantly having to show their children the goodness and reasonableness of choices and values that can no longer be taken for granted, such as the importance of marriage and the family, or the decision to accept children as a gift from God."

Faced with these difficulties, Pope Francis highlighted the importance of "mutual support and encouragement, so that parents can be helped to develop a 'passion' for their educational mission", which essentially amounts to teaching their children "what it means to be fully human."

A vital contribution to building a "healthy society"

This mission "can be said to be successful when children come to realize the beauty of life" and "grow confident and enthused about the prospect of embarking on the adventure of life," which, said the Pope, "presupposes the deeper realization of God's immense love for us."

Indeed, "when we realize that at the root of our being is the unconditional love of God our Father, then we see clearly that life is good, that being born is good, and that loving is good."

"This is the lofty educational mission of parents: to form free and generous persons who have come to know God's love, and to bestow freely on others what they themselves have received as a gift."

These are also the foundations of a "healthy society". Hence the crucial role of parents in transmitting values, thus forming "solid citizens capable of contributing to the workplace, civic affairs, and social solidarity."

"Raising a child represents a genuine contribution to society," he said, "because it means training a young person in sound and respectful relationships with others, a readiness to cooperate in view of a shared goal, responsibility, a sense of duty and the value of sacrifice for sake of the common good."

"Lacking this", Pope Francis remarked, "children grow up as 'islands,' disconnected from others, incapable of a common vision, and accustomed to considering their own desires as absolute values. As a result, society 'deconstructs', grows impoverished, and is progressively weakened and dehumanized."

Church's commitment to support parents in their work

While insisting on the need to protect the right of parents to raise and educate their children according to their beliefs and values, Pope Francis reiterated the Church's commitment to accompany and support families in their work and the importance of a closer collaboration with all institutions involved in education.

In this regard, he recalled the "Global Compact on Education" which he launched in 2019 in order to consolidate a shared commitment on the part of all institutions that deal with young people and "Compact on the Family" with cultural, academic, institutional and pastoral actors, in order to focus on the family and its various relationships.

Global Compacts on Education and on the Family

The intent of these initiatives, the Pope explained, "is to overcome a number of 'breakdowns' that are presently weakening the world of education: the breakdown between education and transcendence, the breakdown in interpersonal relationships, and the breakdown that distances society from the family, creating inequalities and new forms of poverty."

Bringing his address to a close, Pope Francis encouraged the European Parents Association "to move forward with hope" in its commitment, "drawing constant inspiration and support from the Gospel's witness to the holy parents Mary and Joseph."




