

Dear Friends,



Welcome to our first bulletin of 2024 meant to keep our parishioners informed with things that happen in our parish and beyond.

Last week, my dear friend from Vancouver sent me two photos of our former classmates and his own photo taken around 1973 or 1974, which brought back to me lot of memories of the good old days when we were a group of young boys starting the vocation journey together, and 50 years later circumstances have dispersed us all over the world and become old men, with a few no longer with us anymore. As young students doing the Formation program we had to follow a strict timetable, and the first thing we

did every day after a light exercise and brushing teeth was to head for the church together with a hundred plus other students for a contemplative prayer session followed by the Eucharist. Imagine a lot of teenagers active and restless that had to sit for one and a half hours in silence and you can have the picture. That was tough, very tough and many found it wasn't their call, but a few embraced it and have turned into a spiritual wellspring.

I can't help but recall this part of the training process that my friends and I had to endure many years ago to help us grow into who we are today, especially that bond between us together as friends forever, and in the context of the Gospel this Sunday, it reminds me very much of what Jesus chose to do after a busy day offering healing to many sick people, including

Simon's mother-in-law.

While the disciples probably were still in bed, Jesus got up, went out by himself to find a lonely place and there he prayed. Jesus obviously treated his daily prayer as the highest priority, above all other things he was going to do during the day and by doing so he has shown us an inspiring example to follow.

Here he seems to encourage each of us to do the same in our everyday lives no matter who we are, where we are and what we do. We need to give prayer the most prominent place amongst our daily activities. We need to treat prayer as an indispensable and inseparable means to re-charge ourselves spiritually like Jesus led us by example. Let us earnestly ask Jesus help us be inspired by his example and prepared to spare our time to re-energize us by

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS



Dear brothers and sisters, *buongiorno*!

Today's Gospel shows us Jesus freeing a person possessed by an "evil spirit" (see Mk 1:21-28), tormenting and making them scream (see. vv. 23, 26). This is how the devil acts this is the way he acts: he wants to take possession of us in order to "enchain our souls." To enchain our souls: this is what the devil wants. We must be careful with the "chains" that suffocate our freedom, because the devil always takes away our freedom. Let us try to name some of the *chains* that can shackle our hearts.

I am thinking of addictions, which enslave us and make us constantly dissatisfied, and which devour our

energies, goods, and relationships. Another chain I am thinking of is dominant trends that encourage the pursuit of

impossible perfectionisms, consumerism, and hedonism, which commodify people and spoil relationships. And yet more chains: there are temptations and conditionings that undermine self-esteem, that undermine peacefulness, and the ability to choose and love life. Another chain is fear, which makes us look to the future with pessimism, and dissatisfaction, which always blames others. Then there is a very ugly chain, which is the idolatry of power, which generates conflicts and resorts to weapons that kill or uses economic injustice and thought manipulation.

Many are our chains, there truly are many in our lives. And Jesus came to free us from all these chains. Today, facing the devil who challenges him by shouting, "What have you to do with us? Have you come to destroy us?" (v. 24), Jesus

answers, "Quiet! Come out of him!" (v. 25). Jesus has the power to drive out the devil. Jesus frees us from the power of evil but – let us be careful – he drives out the devil but he never negotiates with him! Jesus never negotiated with the devil and when he was tempted in the desert, Jesus' responses were always words from the Bible, never a dialogue. Brothers and sisters: with the devil there must be no dialogue!

Be careful: with the devil there can be no dialogue, because if you start speaking to him, he will always win. Be careful. So, what should we do when we feel tempted and oppressed? Negotiate with the devil?

No: there must be no negotiating with him.

We must invoke Jesus: let us call on Him from those places where we feel that the chains of evil and fear are tightest. Once more, by the power of His Spirit, the Lord wants to say to the evil one today: "Be gone, leave that heart in peace, do not divide the world, do not divide our families and communities; let them live serenely so that the fruits of my Spirit may flourish there, not yours- this is what Jesus says. Let love, joy, meekness reign among them, and instead of violence and

shouts of hatred, let there be freedom and peace.

Let us ask ourselves: Do I really want to be freed from those chains that shackle my heart? And also, am I capable of saying "no" to the temptations of evil before they creep into my soul? Finally, do I invoke Jesus, allowing Him to act in me, to heal me from within?

May the Holy Virgin guard us from evil.

After the Angelus

Dear brothers and sisters,

For three years now, the cries of pain and the noise of weapons have replaced the smiles that used to characterize the people of Myanmar. I join the call of some Burmese bishops "in order that weapons of destruction may be transformed into instruments for the growth of humanity and justice." Peace is a journey, and I invite all parties involved to take steps in dialogue and to clothe themselves in understanding so that the land of Myanmar may reach the goal of fraternal reconciliation. The transit of humanitarian aid must be allowed, in order to ensure that the basic necessities of every person may be met.

The same must happen in the Middle East, in Palestine and Israel, and wherever there is conflict: the populations must be respected! I always think intensely of all victims, especially of those who are civilians, who are killed by the war in Ukraine. Please, listen to their cry for peace: it is the cry of the people, who are tired of violence and want the war to stop. It is a disaster for the peoples and a defeat for humanity!

I have been relieved to learn about the release of the nuns and of the other people who were kidnapped with them in Haiti last week. I ask that those who are still being held captive be set free, and that every form of violence may cease.

Everyone must contribute to the peaceful development of this country, for which renewed support from the international community is needed.

I would like to express my closeness to the community of the church of Santa Maria in Istanbul, which suffered an armed attack during Mass that caused one death and left several injured.

Today we celebrate World Leprosy Day. I encourage those who are engaged in granting assistance to and in the social reintegration of the people affected by this disease, which, despite its decline, is still one of the most feared diseases and affecting the poorest and most marginalized.

Greetings to all of you who have come from Rome, Italy, and many parts of the world. In particular, the students of the "Puente Ajuda" Institute in Olivenza (Spain) and those of the "Sir Michelangelo Refalo" Institute in Gozo.

Now I address you, boys and girls of the Catholic Action, of the parishes and Catholic schools in Rome. You have come here at the end of the "Caravan of Peace," during which you have reflected on the call to be guardians of Creation, which is a gift from God. Thank you for your presence! And thank you for your commitment to building a better society. Now let's listen to the message that your friends, who are here by my side, will read.

I wish everyone a good Sunday. Please, do not forget to pray for me. You see that young people, the children of Catholic Action, are good! Take courage! Have a good lunch, and *arrivederci*!

POPE FRANCIS' FEBRUARY PRAYER INTENTION: FOR THE TERMINALLY ILL By Deborah Castellano Lubov Pope Francis releases his prayer intention for the month of February 2024, and invites everyone to pray for the terminally ill and their families. Pope Francis' monthly prayer intention this February is for the terminally ill and their families. The Pope invited the Church to pray for this intention in this month's *The Pope Video*, which is entrusted to the entire Catholic Church through the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network.

This month's Video comes during the month in which the Church observes the liturgical memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes, 11 February, on which the World Day of the Sick takes place. Pope Francis explains that "when some people talk about terminal illnesses, there are two words they often confuse: incurable and un-'carable.' But they are not the same." **Caring even if cannot cure**

He cites his predecessor Pope St. John Paul II, in saying, "Cure if it is possible; always take care."

The images from The Pope Video for February exemplify situations showing love and tenderness for the terminally ill, and depending on how they are interpreted, depict a series of failures or successes, the failures being "if the only acceptable outcome is a cure," and successes instead being "if the objective is the care of the patient."

Pope Francis explains clearly that even when little chance for a cure exists, "every sick person has the right to medical, psychological, spiritual and human assistance."

"Healing," he acknowledges, "is not always possible, but we can always care for the sick person, caress them."

Guarantee of closeness and support

Reflecting on the importance of palliative care, Pope Francis reaffirms that such care "guarantees the patient not only medical attention," but also "human assistance and closeness."

Meanwhile, when speaking about the role of the family, he underscores that those suffering "should not be left alone in these difficult moments." The role of the family "is decisive," the Pope said, stressing relatives "need access to adequate means so as to provide appropriate physical, spiritual and social support."

Pope Francis concludes by asking for prayers and a commitment from everyone so that "the terminally ill and their families always receive the necessary medical and human care and assistance."

The Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network

POPE FRANCIS' ADDRESS: BLESS THE PERSON, NOT THE UNION By Joseph Tulloch

In an address to the plenary assembly of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, Pope Francis discusses the

Sacraments, human dignity, evangelisation, and Fiducia supplicans.

Pope Francis addressed the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith on Friday, as the department brought its annual plenary assembly to a close.

Thanking officials for their "precious work", the Pope recalled that, in his 2022 reform of the Roman Curia, he divided the Dicastery into two sections, one concerned with Doctrine and the other with Discipline.

It was the former subject, the Pope said, that he wanted to touch on in his address, and he offered a number of thoughts organised around three words: 'Sacraments', 'dignity', and 'faith'.

New document from DDF

The first word that Pope Francis touched on in his address was 'Sacraments'.

The Sacraments, he said, "feed and make grow the life of the Church", he said, and thus require "special care" on the part of those who administer them.

"Let us," the Pope urged the DDF officials, "love and cherish the beauty and saving power of the Sacraments!"

Pope Francis then moved on to discuss dignity, noting that the DDF is "working on a document on this subject."

"I hope," he said, "that it will help us, as a Church, to always be close to all those who, without fanfare, in concrete daily life, fight and personally pay the price for defending the rights of those who are disregarded."

Proclaiming the Gospel today

The Pope's third subject, faith, was the one he dwelt on for the longest period.

"We cannot hide the fact," he said, "that in large areas of the planet, faith, as Benedict XVI put it, no longer constitutes an obvious prerequisite for common living." Indeed, Pope Francis noted, faith is often "denied, mocked, marginalised, and ridiculed." The proclamation and communication of faith in today's world, he said, must therefore take a number of factors into account. In particular, Pope Francis specified the "new urban cultures, with their many challenges but also the unprecedented questions of meaning they raise", the need for "missionary conversion of ecclesial structures", and, finally, "the centrality of *kerygma* ['proclamation'] in the life and mission of the Church."

"It is here," the Pope said, "that help is expected from this Dicastery."

Pastoral blessings

It was "in this context of evangelisation," Pope Francis continued, that he wanted to mention the recent Declaration Fiducia supplicans. The purpose of the "pastoral and spontaneous blessings" discussed in the Declaration, the Pope stressed, is to "concretely show the closeness of the Lord and the Church to all those who, finding themselves in different situations, ask for help to continue—sometimes to begin—a journey of faith."

In this regard, the Pope emphasized two points.

Firstly, he said, "these blessings, outside of any liturgical context and form, do not require moral perfection to be received." Secondly, he noted, "when a couple spontaneously approaches [a minister] and asks for them, he is not blessing the union, but simply the people who together have requested it."

"Not the union," the Pope stressed, "but the persons, naturally taking into account the context, sensitivities, the places where one lives, and the most appropriate ways to do it."




