FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends.

As we know, the length of Lent is 40 days and some people wonder why it has to be 40 days, and not 30 or 60. Well, the answer is that because 40 is a scripturally-inspired number related to lot of significant moments both in the Old and New Testament.

In the Old Testament, the great Flood in the time of Noah prolonged for 40 days, meant to purify human wickedness; then the Israelites had to wander in the deserts for 40 years before they were allowed to enter the land God had promised to give them due to their failures to put their trust in him, and prior to his

acceptance of the tablets of the Ten Commandments, Moses had to spend three consecutive periods of 40 days and nights on Mt Sinai, and in time of the prophets later on, Elijah had to walk for 40 days and nights to get to Mt Horeb.

In the New Testament, 40 days is the period from Jesus' Resurrection and Ascension, and prior to Jesus' public ministry, Jesus went into a retreat in the wilderness for 40 days living with the wild beasts and was tempted by Satan as the writer of Mark's Gospel recounts in his narrative today. Though being alone in the wilderness, Jesus actually was not lonely at all, because he had by his side the angels who were there to look after him.

When his retreat time ended Jesus came out to start his public ministry proclaiming God's Good News. He asked his contemporary to repent and believe the Good News of faith and love as their way to welcome the kingdom of the God, the time of God.

Significantly the short and sweet message that Jesus preached to the crowds is the highlight both of the Gospel's account this Sunday, and of the entire season of Lent before us. It re-echoes the message you heard last Wednesday when you came up to receive your ashes asking each of us to turn away from the wrong path of sins and show our faith in God by means of hearing Jesus' teachings, ultimately summed up in two parts or two commandments if you like, meaning the love of God and the love of humanity asking us to love God and others, and putting them into practice.

Let us draw from the wellspring of the Eucharist today the grace to help us identify the areas of our weakness and turn away from them, and be more committed in bearing witness to the Gospel by the ways we love God and those around us.

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS

Dear brothers and sisters, buongiorno!



Today's Gospel presents us with the healing of a leper (cf. *Mk* 1:40-45). To the sick man, who implores Him, Jesus answers: "I will; be clean!" (v. 41). He utters a very simple phrase, which He immediately puts into practice. Indeed, "immediately the leprosy left him, and he was made clean" (v. 42). This is Jesus' style with those who suffer: few words, and concrete deeds. Many times, in the Gospel, we see Him behave in this way towards those who suffer: deaf mutes (cf. *Mk* 7:31-37), paralytics (cf. *Mk* 2:1-12), and many others in need (cf. *Mk* 5). He always does this: He speaks little and His words are followed promptly by actions: He bows, takes by the hand, and

heals. He does not waste time with discourses or interrogations, much less in pietism or sentimentalism. Rather, He shows the delicate modesty of one who listens attentively and acts with solicitude, preferably without being conspicuous.

It is a wonderful way to love, and how it would do us good to imagine it and assimilate it! Let us also think of when it we happen to encounter people who act like this: sober in words, but generous in action; reluctant to show off but ready to make themselves useful; effective in helping because they are willing to listen. Friends to whom one can say: "Do you want to listen to me? Do you want to help me?", with the confidence of hearing them answer, almost with Jesus' words: "Yes, I will, I am here for you, to help you!". This concreteness is so much more important in a world such as our own, in which an evanescent virtuality of relationships seems to be gaining ground. Let us listen instead to how the Word of God provokes us: "If a brother or sister is ill-clad and in lack of daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace, be warmed and filled', without giving them the things needed for the body, what does it profit?" (James 2:15-16). The Apostle James says this. Love needs tangibility, love needs presence, encounter, it needs to be given time and space: it cannot be reduced to beautiful words, to images on a screen, momentary selfies and hasty messages. They are useful tools that can help, but they are not enough for love; they cannot substitute real presence.

Let us ask ourselves today: do I know how to listen to people, am I ready to meet their requests? Or do I make excuses, procrastinate, hide behind abstract or useless words? In real terms, when was the last time I went to visit someone who was alone or sick – everyone can answer in their heart – or when was the last time I changed my plans to meet the needs of someone who asked me for help?

May Mary, solicitous in care, help us to be ready and tangible in love.

After the Angelus

Today, María Antonia de Paz y Figueroa was canonized: an Argentine saint. A round of applause for the new saint! Today, on the memorial of the Blessed Virgin of Lourdes, we celebrate World Day of the Sick, which this year draws attention to the importance of relationships in sickness. The first thing we need when we are ill is the proximity of loved ones, of healthcare professionals and, in our heart, God's closeness. We are all required to be a neighbour to those who suffer, to visit the sick as Jesus teaches us in the Gospel. Therefore, today I wish to express my closeness, and that of the entire Church, to all those who are sick or frail. Let us not forget God's style: proximity, compassion and tenderness. But on this Day, brothers and sisters, we cannot remain silent about the fact that there are many people today to whom the right to care, and thus the right to life, is denied! I am thinking of those who live in extreme poverty; but I am also thinking of those who live in war zones: fundamental human rights are violated there every day! It is intolerable. Let us pray for Ukraine, for Palestine and Israel, let us pray for Myanmar and for all peoples who are tormented by war. I greet you all, Romans and pilgrims from various countries. In particular, I greet the faithful of Moral de Calatrava and Burgos, Spain, those from Brasilia and Portugal; the Youth Choir and Orchestra of Mostar; the School of Vila Pouca de Aguiar, Portugal. I greet the faithful of Enego and Rogno, volunteers from the Shrine of Sant'Anna of Vinadio, the Choir of Eraclèa and the Santa Paola Frassinetti Association of San Calogero. I greet the young people of Lodi, Petosino and Torri di Quartesòlo; confirmands from Malta, Lallio and Almenno San Salvatore; students of the "Sant'Ambrogio" Salesian Institute of Milan and the Children's Choir of Piovène Rocchette; as well as the "Radio Mater" group, on the occasion of their thirtieth anniversary. I wish you all a good Sunday. Please, do not forget to pray for me. Enjoy your lunch, and arrivederci.

POPE FRANCIS' HOMILY AT A RECENT MASS By Linda Bordoni

Pope Francis celebrates Mass at the Casa Santa Marta on Thursday inviting the faithful not to content themselves with a fake inner peace that bears no fruit. Reflecting on the reading from the Book of Haggai, Pope Francis spoke of how the Lord urges His people to reflect on their behavior and to change it by working to rebuild the House of God.

Procrastinating conversion

The prophet Haggai, the Pope explained, was trying to move the heart of the lazy people who had resigned themselves to a life of defeat. The Temple had been destroyed by enemies, all was in ruin, but those people let the years go by without taking any action. Then, he said, the Lord sent the prophet to "rebuild the Temple," but the hearts of the people were bitter and they had no wish to take risks and to work. Those people, the Pope continued, "did not want to pick themselves up, to start again. They would not let the Lord help them to do so", and their excuse was that the time had not yet come. This, he continued, is the same drama of so many lukewarm Christians who say "Yes, yes, Lord, it's fine ... but slowly, slowly, Lord, let's leave it like this ... I'll do it tomorrow!"

Lukewarm spirituality leads to "a graveyard-like peace"

Lukewarm faith, the Pope said, leads so many to find excuses in uncertainty and fuels the tendency to procrastinate. It causes so many people to waste their lives and end up "in tatters because they have done nothing except nurture sentiments of peace and calm within themselves". But that, he said, "is the peace of graveyards". Pope Francis warned the faithful that when we become "spiritually lukewarm", we become half-Christians, without substance. Instead, he said, the Lord wants conversion, today. He described that tepid spirituality as something that transforms our lives into a graveyard: a place where there is no life. Let us ask the Lord for the grace not to fall into that "half-Christian" spirit which makes us Christians without substance – "Rose water Christians" as some would say - the Pope said, Christians who perhaps "sowed a lot but reaped very little, lives that promised so much, and in the end did nothing".

May the Lord help us, he concluded, to "wake-up from a tepid spirit" and fight "this gentle anesthesia of spiritual life".

POPE FRANCIS AT A RECENT GENERAL AUDIENCE

Cycle of Catechesis. Vices and Virtues. 8. Acedia

Dear brothers and sisters,

Among all the capital sins there is one that is often overlooked, perhaps because of its name, which is very much often incomprehensible to many: I am talking about *acedia*. Therefore, in the list of vices, the term acedia is often substituted by another, much more commonly used: sloth, or laziness. In reality, laziness is an effect more than a cause. When a person is idle, indolent, apathetic, we say he is lazy. But as the wisdom of the ancient desert fathers teaches us, often the root of this laziness is acedia, which from its Greek origin literally means a "lack of care".

It is a very dangerous temptation, which one must not joke about. It is as though those who fall victim to it are crushed by a desire for death: they feel disgust at everything; the relationship with God becomes boring to them; and even the holiest acts, those that in the past warmed their hearts, now appear entirely useless to them. A person begins to regret the passing of time, and the youth that is irretrievably behind them.

Acedia is defined as the "noonday demon": it grips us in the middle of the day, when fatigue is at its peak and the hours ahead of us seem monotonous, impossible to live. In a famous description, the monk Evagrius represents this temptation thus: "The eye of the slothful person is continually fixed on the windows, and in his mind he fantasizes about visitors [...] When he reads, the slothful person often yawns and is easily overcome by sleep, wrinkles his eyes, rubs his hands and, withdrawing his eyes from the book, stares at the wall; then turning them back to the book, he reads a little more [...]; finally, bowing his head, he places the book underneath it, and falls into a light sleep, until hunger awakens him and urges him to attend to his needs"; in conclusion, "the slothful man does not do God's work with solicitude" [1].

Contemporary readers perceive in these descriptions something that closely recalls the evil of depression, both from a psychological and a philosophical point of view. Indeed, for those who are gripped by acedia, life loses its significance, prayer becomes boring, and every battle seems meaningless. If in youth we nurtured passions, now they seem illogical, dreams that did not make us happy. So, we let ourselves go, and distraction, thoughtlessness, seem to be the only ways out: one would like to be numb, to have a completely empty mind... It is a little like dying in advance, and it is ugly. Faced with this vice, which we recognize to be very dangerous, the masters of spirituality envisage various remedies.

I would like to note one that to me seems most important, and which I would call the patience of faith.

Although in the clutches of acedia, man's desire is to be "elsewhere", to escape from reality, one must instead have the courage to remain and to welcome God's presence in the "here and now", in the situation as it is. The monks say that for them the cell is the best teacher of life, because it is the place that concretely and daily speaks to you of your love story with the Lord. The demon of acedia wants precisely to destroy this simple joy of the here and now, this grateful wonder of reality; it wants to make you believe that it is all in vain, that nothing has meaning, that it is not worth taking care of anything or anyone. In life we meet slothful people, people about whom we say, "He is boring!", and we do not like to be with them; people who even have an attitude of boredom that is infectious. This is acedia.

How many people, in the grip of acedia, stirred by a faceless restlessness, have stupidly abandoned the good life they had embarked upon! The battle of acedia is a decisive one, that must be won at all costs. And it is a battle that did not spare even the saints, because in many of their diaries there are some pages that confide terrible moments, of genuine nights of the faith, when everything appears dark. These saints teach us to get through the night in patience, accepting the poverty of faith. They recommended, under the oppression of sloth, to maintain a smaller measure of commitment, to set goals more within reach, but at the same time to endure and persevere by leaning on Jesus, who never abandons us in temptation. Faith, tormented by the test of acedia, does not lose its value. On the contrary, it is the true faith, the very human faith, which despite everything, despite the darkness that blinds it, still humbly believes. It is that faith that remains in the heart, like embers beneath the ashes. It always remains. And if one of us falls prey to this vice, or to the temptation of acedia, try to look within and fan the embers of faith; that is how we keep going.

Summary of the Holy Father's words

In our reflections on the vices and virtues, we now consider *acedia* or *sloth*, which, although associated in English with laziness, is above all a deep spiritual apathy, manifested by discontent and aversion to attentive prayer and growth in our relationship with God. According to the monastic tradition, this "noonday devil" is best overcome by the patience of faith. This includes accepting the poverty or dark night of faith, which then enables us, by God's grace, to sense the divine presence and to continue to reach out to God. The saints themselves show us that perseverance in time of temptation leads us to set practical goals, however small, for our daily life and moves us to lean on Jesus, who always remains with us.
