FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends.

In the past, especially in ancient times, leprosy or Hansen's disease was considered as incurable, and Jewish lepers were instructed to isolate themselves from the community as we learn from the first reading today from the book of Leviticus.

Though these days this disease no longer terrorise's people as it used to, since it has become preventable and curable thanks to the Multi Drugs Therapy that includes these three drugs called Dapsone, Rifampicin and Clofazimine, it has still posed a serious threat to many in the underdeveloped world. According to a

report from the World Health Organisation (WHO), 133 802 cases of leprosy were registered for treatment by the end of 2021, and the majority of them were found in South East Asia with 124,377 new cases reported in 2022.

In Jesus' time, as we know, it was incurable and people were asked to avoid making any contact with them but Jesus was prepared to break the law by using his hand to touch the leper when he was approached by him and asked for help.

He said to the man 'be cured' and the disease has gone immediately. The leper was completely healed from the disease and advised by Jesus to do the right thing according to the law of Moses, which was to present himself to the priest and offer an oblation.

Despite Jesus' request asking him not to reveal the story to no one, the man went away to fulfil his religious requirement and also loudly shared his healing experience with people he met.

This healing story highlights both Jesus' power over human illness, the power of the Son of God and his deep love and compassion for the weak and the sick to the point that he was prepared to do what was forbidden by the law by making physical contact with the untouchable, though this daring act of course began to put himself into trouble with the authority, and finally led to his death at the end.

This healing power of Jesus in a way reminds us of the healing intervention of Our Lady of Lourdes, our Parish patroness, whose feast day we proudly celebrate this Sunday. She has been well known worldwide for listening to the cry of the sick and grant them her healing power. As we know, more than 7,000 cases of healing have been reported at Lourdes since the apparitions in 1858, and amongst them 70 cases have been recognised as miraculous by the Church so far.

Let us praise the Lord for his kindness shown to the needy and ask him to help us follow the example he has given to us. We also offer our prayer of thanksgiving for the gift of Our Lady of Lourdes, for she has been so generous to listen to our prayer and lend her healing hand to many who came to her, pray that she will continue to be our intercessor both powerful and effective before God.

Happy Feast Day and Lunar New Year to you all and have a compassion-filled week,

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS



Dear brothers and sisters, buongiorno!

The Gospel of today's Liturgy shows us Jesus on the move: indeed, He has just finished preaching and, after leaving the synagogue, He goes to Simon Peter's house, where He heals his mother-in-law; then, towards the evening, He goes out again towards the city gates, where He meets many sick and possessed people and heals them; the morning after, He gets up early and goes out to withdraw in prayer; and finally, He sets out again across Galilee (cf. *Mk* 1:29-39). Jesus on the move.

Let us look at this continual movement of Jesus, which tells us *something important about God* and, at the same time, challenges us with *some questions* on our faith.

Jesus goes towards wounded humanity and shows us the face of the Father. It may be that within us there is still the idea of a distant, cold God, indifferent to our fate. On the contrary, the Gospel lets us see that Jesus, after teaching in the synagogue, goes out, so that the Word He has preached may reach, touch and heal people. By doing this, He reveals to us that God is not a detached master who speaks to us from on high; on the contrary, He is a Father filled with love who makes Himself close to us, who visits our homes, who wants to save and liberate, heal from every ill of the body and spirit. God is always close to us. God's attitude can be expressed in three words: *closeness, compassion* and *tenderness*.

God makes Himself close to accompany us, tenderly, and to forgive us. Do not forget

this: closeness, compassion and tenderness. This is God's attitude.

Jesus' incessant walking challenges us. We might ask ourselves: have we discovered the face of God as the Father of mercy, or do we believe and proclaim a cold God, a distant God? Does faith instil in us the restlessness of journeying or is it an intimist consolation for us, that calms us? Do we pray just to feel at peace, or does the Word we listen to and preach make us go out, like Jesus, towards others, to spread God's consolation? It will be good for us to ask ourselves these questions.

Let us look, then, at Jesus' journeying and remind ourselves that our first spiritual task is this: to abandon the God we think we know, and to convert every day to the God Jesus presents to us in the Gospel, who is the Father of love and the Father of compassion. The Father who is close, compassionate and tender. And when we discover the true face of the Father, our faith matures: we no longer remain "sacristy Christians", or "parlour Christians", but rather we feel called to become bearers of God's hope and healing.

May Mary Most Holy, Woman on the way, help us to proclaim ourselves the witness of the Lord who is close, compassionate and tender.

After the Angelus

Dear brothers and sisters!

This coming 10 February, in East Asia and various parts of the world, millions of families will celebrate the lunar new year. I send them my warm greeting, with the hope that this feast may be an opportunity to experience relationships of affection and gestures of care, which contribute to creating a society of solidarity and fraternity, where every person is recognized and welcomed in his or her inalienable dignity. As I invoke the Lord's blessing for everyone, I invite you to pray for peace, for which the world longs so much and which, today more than ever, is endangered in many places. It is not the responsibility of a few, but of the entire human family: let us all cooperate to build it with gestures of compassion and courage!

And let us continue to pray for the populations who suffer as a result of war, especially in Ukraine, Palestine and Israel. Today, in Italy, we celebrate the *Day for Life*, on the theme "The strength of life surprises us". I join with the Italian bishops in hoping that ideological visions can be overcome so as to rediscover that every human life, even those most marked by limitations, has an immense value and is capable of giving something to others.

I greet the young people of many countries who have come for the *World Day for Prayer and Reflection against Human Trafficking*, which will be celebrated on 8 February, memorial of Saint Josephine Bakhita, the Sudanese religious sister who was enslaved as a child. Today too, many brothers and sisters are deceived with false promises and are then subjected to exploitation and abuse. Let us all join to counter the dramatic global phenomenon of human trafficking. Let us also pray for those killed and injured in the devastating fires that have broken out in the centre of Chile.

And I greet all of you who have come to Rome, from Italy and many parts of the world. I greet in particular the consecrated men and women from over sixty countries who are participating in the meeting "Pilgrims of hope on the path to peace", organized by the Dicastery for the Institutes of Consecrated Life and the Societies of Apostolic Life. I greet the students from Badajoz, Spain, and those from the "Sévigné" Salesian School of Marseille, as well as the Polish faithful from Warsaw and other cities; and the groups from San Benedetto del Tronto, Ostra and Cingoli. And I can see the Japanese flags there! I greet the Japanese. And I can see Polish flags: I greet the Polish and all of you, and the young people of the *Immacolata* too.

I wish you all a happy Sunday. Please, do not forget to pray for me.

POPE FRANCIS PRESIDES OVER COUNCIL OF CARDINALS MEETING

The new session of the C9 is underway in the Vatican, in the presence of Pope Francis.

Bv Vatican News

The February meeting of the Council of Cardinals began on Monday, 5 February, at the Vatican.

The Holy See Press Office released a statement saying all members of the so-called C-9 were present together with Pope Francis.

The Council of Cardinals last met on 4 and 5 December 2023 at Casa Santa Marta, also in the presence of the Pope.

December meeting

The main theme of the December meeting was the "role of women in the Church", thanks also to the interventions of Sister Linda Pocher, Lucia Vantini, and Father Luca Castiglion, all of them teachers and theologians.

According to a Holy See statement, on that occasion "the need to listen, also and above all in the individual Christian communities, to the feminine aspect of the Church, so that the processes of reflection and decision-making can enjoy the irreplaceable contribution of women" were reiterated.

The focus of that meeting was also on the conflicts in Ukraine and the Holy Land, on the work of COP28 which was underway in Dubai, and also on initiatives to prevent the abuse of minors and vulnerable persons.

The two-day meeting also offered an opportunity to discuss what emerged from the Synod on Synodality in October and the 'implementation' of the Apostolic Constitution *Praedicate Evangelium* in the diocesan curias.

The new C9

The Council of Cardinals, after the Pope's renewal of the body on 7 March 2023, is composed of Cardinals Pietro Parolin, Secretary of State; Fernando Vérgez Alzaga, President of the Pontifical Commission for Vatican City State and the Governorate of Vatican City State; Fridolin Ambongo Besungu, Archbishop of Kinshasa; Oswald Gracias, Archbishop of Bombay; Seán Patrick O'Malley, Archbishop of Boston; Juan José Omella Omella, Archbishop of Barcelona; Gérald Lacroix, Archbishop of Québec; Jean-Claude Hollerich, Archbishop of Luxembourg; Sérgio da Rocha, Archbishop of San Salvador de Bahia. The secretary is Monsignor Marco Mellino, titular bishop of Cresima. The first meeting of the new C9 took place on 24 April.

The Council of Cardinals

Pope Francis established the Council with the chirograph of 28 September 2013 with the task of assisting him in the governance of the Universal Church and to study a project for the revision of the Roman Curia, the latter realised with the new Apostolic Constitution *Praedicate Evangelium* published on 19 March 2022. The first C9 meeting took place on the 1st October 2013.

In his message for Lent 2024, Pope Francis invites the faithful to "pause" for prayer and to assist our brothers and sisters in need, in order to change our own lives and the lives of our communities.

POPE FRANCIS: LENT IS A TIME OF CONVERSION AND FREEDOM

"When our God reveals Himself, His message is always one of freedom," Pope Francis says in the opening of his Message to the faithful for Lent 2024.

Recalling the Exodus of the Hebrew people from Egypt, the Holy Father explains that our journey through the desert can be a season of grace – not an abstract journey, but a concrete path that involves seeing the world as it is and hearing the cries of our oppressed brothers and sisters.

Countering a globalization of indifference

The Pope insisted on the need to counter a "globalization of indifference."

"Our Lenten journey will be concrete if... we realize that even today we remain under the rule of Pharoah. A rule that makes us weary and indifferent. A model of growth that divides us and robs us of our future."

At the same time, Pope Francis reminded us that it is God who takes the initiative. Too often, he said, there remains within us "an inexplicable longing for slavery," a desire to cling to idols that paralyze us, as Israel was paralyzed in the desert.

Lent, however, is a "season of grace, a time of conversion," where the desert can become "a place where our freedom can mature in a personal decision not to fall back into slavery," where "we find new criteria of justice and a community with which we can press forward on a road not yet taken."

Pausing for prayer and to help our neighbour

He added that the Lenten journey involves a struggle. It is a time for action, the Pope said, but also a time "to pause" - to pause in prayer and to pause "in the presence of a wounded brother or sister."

"Love of God and love of neighbour are one love," Pope Francis continued, explaining that "the contemplative dimension" of Lent can help us "release new energies," to be "more sensitive to one another: in the place of threats and enemies, we discover companions and fellow travelers."

'A flash of new hope'

Pope Francis concluded his Lenten message on a hopeful note: "To the extent that this Lent becomes a time of conversion, an anxious humanity will notice a burst of creativity, a flash of new hope."

Calling on the faithful to "be ready to take risks," he invited them "to find the courage to see our world, not as in its death throes, but in a process of giving birth; not at the end, but at the beginning of a great new chapter of history."

"Faith and charity," he said, "take hope, this small child, by the hand. They teach her to walk, and at the same time, she leads them forward.



Puzzle is based on Mark 1:40-45




