Second Reading: Hebrews 4:14-16: 5:7-9



EASTER TRIDUUM

A triduum is a three-day period of prayer, usually in preparation for an important feast or in celebration of that feast. Triduums recall the three days that Christ spent in the tomb, from Good Friday until Easter Sunday. The best known triduum is the Paschal or Easter Triduum, which begins with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on the evening of Holy Thursday and continues until the start of second vespers (evening prayer) on Easter Sunday. Triduum is also known as (when capped) Paschal Triduum, Holy Triduum, Easter Triduum

The Origin of the Term

Triduum is a Latin word, formed from the Latin prefix tri(meaning "three") and the Latin word dies ("day"). Like its
cousin the novena (from the Latin novem, "nine"), a
triduum was originally any prayer recited over the course
of multiple days (three for triduums; nine for novenas). As
every novena recalls the nine days that the disciples and
the Blessed Virgin Mary spent in prayer
between Ascension Thursday and Pentecost Sunday, in
preparation for the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost,
every triduum recalls the three days of Christ's Passion
and Resurrection.

The Paschal Triduum

That is why, when capitalized, *Triduum* most often refers to the Paschal Triduum (also known as the Holy Triduum or Easter Triduum), the final three days of Lent and Holy Week. This is, as the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) notes, the "summit of the Liturgical Year" in the Catholic Church. Formerly considered a part of the liturgical season of Lent, since 1956 the Paschal Triduum has been regarded as its own liturgical season. It is both the shortest and the most liturgically rich of all seasons; as the USCCB declares, "Though chronologically three days, [the Paschal Triduum is] liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery."

While the liturgical season of Lent ends with the start of the Paschal Triduum, the discipline of Lent (prayer, fasting and abstinence, and almsgiving) continues until noon on Holy Saturday, when preparations for the Easter Vigil—the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord—begin. (In those Protestant churches that observe Lent, such as the Anglican, Methodist, Lutheran, and Reformed churches, the Paschal Triduum is still regarded as part of the liturgical season of Lent.) In other words, the Paschal Triduum is still part of what we commonly call the 40 days of Lent, even though it is its own liturgical season.

Holy Thursday

The evening Mass on Holy Thursday is referred to as The Mass of the Lord's Supper. This is where the Church relives the institution of the Eucharist and the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass at the Last Supper, as well as the institution of the priesthood, which took place the evening before Jesus was crucified. After the homily there is an optional "washing of the feet" ceremony, where the priest washes the feet of others to signify his role as servant—just as Jesus did with his disciples. Extra hosts are consecrated at this Mass to be used on Good Friday when no Mass will be celebrated. The Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday concludes with a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the "altar of repose," a place where the consecrated Host is kept, away from the main altar where Mass is normally celebrated. Many parishes will create space for people to stay and pray with the reposed Eucharist at this altar of repose late into the night, remembering Jesus' request in the Garden of Gethsemane for someone to "watch and pray" with Him.

Good Friday

Good Friday is a mandatory day of fasting and abstinence. This is the day of the crucifixion, the day Jesus died for the sins of the world.

The parish altar looks very different on Good Friday: it is plain and bare. There is no consecrated Host in the tabernacle at the main altar of the church; it was carried away on Holy Thursday night to the "altar of repose" to signify Jesus' death. The candle by the tabernacle is blown out, and the tabernacle doors are left open to show that it is empty. Jesus is gone. This is quite dramatic, reminding us that Good Friday is a solemn day of mourning and prayer.

The ceremony on Good Friday is not a Mass—it is a communion service using the consecrated hosts from Holy Thursday. Good Friday is the only day of the year on which no Masses are offered.

These Good Friday services often take place at 3 p.m., the hour that Jesus breathed his last on the cross. Often the priest will begin the service by prostrating himself in front of the altar. Veneration of the Cross usually takes place at this service, in which the priest and the faithful kneel before a cross and kiss it.

On this day Christ is in the tomb.

There is no daytime Mass on Holy Saturday. It is still a day of fasting and sorrow before the Easter Vigil begins that evening. We recall, with Mary and the disciples, that Jesus died and was separated from them for the first time as He lay in the tomb. The faithful often continue their Good Friday fast through Holy Saturday.

In the Apostles Creed we pray "He descended into hell" (translated *hades*, that is, the temporary abode of the dead—not the eternal lake of fire) which describes what Jesus did in the time between his burial and Resurrection. Jesus descended to the realm of the dead on Holy Saturday to save the righteous souls—the Old Testament patriarchs, for example—who died before his crucifixion.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church calls Jesus' descent into the realm of the dead "the last phase of Jesus' messianic mission," during which he "opened heaven's gates for the just who had gone before him." Before Holy Saturday, there were **no** souls enjoying the beatific vision of God in heaven!

Christ's work on Holy Saturday is also known as the "Harrowing of Hell."



GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION FOR THE HOLY LAND

On Good Friday a collection is taken up in every Catholic Church around the world to support the people and places of the Holy Land. Christians of the Holy Land rely heavily on the help that comes to them during this special moment of the year. The collection also allows the Holy Land Franciscans to staff and maintain the Holy places and shrines. When you contribute to the Holy Land Collection, you become an instrument of peace in the land where Jesus walked.

Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday

A vigil Mass is held after nightfall on Holy Saturday, or before dawn on Easter Sunday, in celebration of the resurrection of Jesus.

This is called the Easter Vigil: the most glorious, beautiful, and dramatic liturgy for the Church.

The vigil is divided into four parts and can last up to three hours:

- the Service of Light,
- 2) the Liturgy of the Word,
- 3) the Liturgy of Baptism,
- 4) the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

This is also the Mass in which many RCIA catechumens are brought into full communion with the Catholic Church.

Pope Francis' homily for Holy Mass 2023

What attracts our attention is how Jesus, just the day before is crucified, accomplishes this deed. Foot washing was customary at that time because the streets were dusty. People would come in from outside and, on entering a house, before dining, before gathering, they would wash their feet. But who would wash their feet? The slaves, the slaves – because this was work relegated to slaves.

Let us imagine how the disciples were astonished when they saw Jesus beginning to perform this task fit for slaves... He wanted to make them understand the message for the next day when he would die like a slave to pay the debt for all of us. If we were to listen to these things from Jesus, life would be so beautiful because we would hurry to help each other out instead of getting the best of others, to take advantage of each other, the way con artists teach us. It is very beautiful to help each other, to give a hand - these are human universal gestures that are born from a noble heart. And with this celebration today, Jesus wants to teach us this: the nobility of the heart. Each one of us could say: "But if the Pope only knew the things I have inside...." But Jesus knows that, and he loves us just like we are! And he washes each of our feet. Jesus is never shocked at our weaknesses. He is never astonished, because he has already paid. He just wants to accompany us; he wants to take us by the hand so that life won't be so harsh for us.

I will perform the same deed of the washing of the feet, which is not something folkloric, no. We can all think of it as a gesture that tells us how we should treat each other. In society, we see how many people take advantage of others; how many people are in a corner and can't get out.... How many injustices, how many people are without jobs, how many people work and are paid half, how many people have no money to purchase medicine, how many families are destroyed, so many awful things....

And none of us can say, "Thanks to God I am not like, you know". "If I am not like that it is because of the grace of God!" Each one of us can slip, every one of us. And this awareness, this certainty that each of us can slip, is what gives us the dignity – listen to the word – the "dignity" of being sinners. And Jesus wants us like this, and because of this he wanted to wash [his disciples'] feet and say: "I came to save you, to serve you".

Now, I will do the same thing as a memory of what Jesus taught us, to help each other and in this way, life is more beautiful and we can carry on like this. During the washing of the feet – I hope I succeed in doing it because I cannot walk that well – but during the washing of the feet, think about this: "Jesus has washed my feet. Jesus has saved me, and I have this difficulty now". But it will pass, but the Lord is always next to you, he never abandons, never. Think about all this.




