FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends.

A friend of mine, an ex-seminarian told me once about how shocked and scandalized he was when he heard for the first the charge from his communist teacher against Catholics as cannibals for consuming the flesh of someone, and he of course was one of the targets of such a charge due to his faith background. We then spent some time to talk about the Eucharist from a faith perspective which in no doubt facilitated our belief and acceptance of the sacrament better than those who had no faith such as his teacher.

Just like the teacher in the story above, Jesus' Jewish listeners had a big problem to digest his teaching on the Eucharist as he began to bring his conversation with them to a theological level by referring to himself as the bread coming down from heaven. They took his statement literally and as a result became bogged down in their own misconception. They failed miserably to reach the level he meant to lift them up to, the level we are privileged to enjoy today thanks to our faith.

Despite their misunderstanding and misinterpretation of his message, Jesus went on to reveal more dimensions of the Eucharist in the following part of the Gospel. He called himself 'the bread of life' and 'the living bread' which was far better than the manna God once showered upon the Israelites to keep them survived in the desert, the bread of life given by the Son of God sent to us by the Father, which is Jesus' flesh, will grant everlasting life to those who have it, and we are blessed to be one of those.

Inspired by Jesus' teaching in the Gospel this Sunday, let us offer our prayer of thanksgiving to God for the lifegiving gift of his Beloved Son granted to us as food for our earthly journey through the Eucharist, and pray that the grace from the Holy Masses we celebrate this weekend will help strengthen our faith in the Son of God, to become better witnesses to him through the kindness and friendship we share both in this Faith community and

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS



Dear brothers and sisters, happy Sunday!

Today the Gospel tells us about Jesus who, after the miracle of the loaves and fishes, invites the crowds who are looking for him to reflect on what took place to understand the meaning of it (cf. *Jn* 6:24-35).

They had eaten the food that was shared and seen how even with few resources all had been fed and had their fill through the generosity and courage of a young man who made available what he had with others. (cf. *Jn* 6:1-13). The sign was clear: if everyone gives to others what they have, with God's help, even with little everyone can have something. Let us not forget this: if one gives to others what one has, with God's help,

even with little everyone can have something.

The crowds did not understand: they mistook Jesus for some kind of magician and went back to look for him, hoping he would repeat the miracle as if it were magic (cf. v. 26).

They were the protagonists of an experience in their journey, but they did not grasp its significance: their attention focused only on the loaves and fishes, the actual food that finished immediately. They did not realise that this was only an instrument through which the Father, while satisfying their hunger, revealed something far more important to them. And what did the Father reveal to them? The path of life that lasts forever and the taste of bread that satisfies beyond any measure. The true bread, in short, was and is Jesus, his beloved Son made man (cf. v. 35), who came to share our poverty in order to lead us through it to the joy of full communion with God and with our brothers and sisters (cf. *Jn* 3:16).

Material things do not give fullness to life. They help us go forward and are important, but they do not fulfill our lives. Only love can do that (cf. *Jn* 6:35). And for this to happen, the path to take is that of charity which keeps nothing for itself, but shares everything. Love shares everything.

And does this not happen also in our own families? We can see it. Let us think of parents who struggle all their lives to raise their children well and leave them something for the future. How beautiful when this message is understood, and the children are grateful and in turn become supportive of each other like brothers and sisters! How sad, on the other hand, when they fight over inheritance – I have seen so many cases and it is sad - and they are fighting each other and perhaps they do not speak to each other again for years! The message of a father and a mother, their most precious legacy, is not money. It is the love with which they give their children everything they have, just as God does with us, and in this way, they teach us to love.

Let us ask ourselves, then: what kind of relationship do I have with material things? Am I a slave to them, or do I use them freely as instruments to give and receive love? Am I able to say "thank you" to God and my brothers and sisters for the gifts I have received. And do I know how to share them with others?

May Mary, who gave Jesus her whole life, teach us to make everything an instrument of love.

After praying the Angelus the Holy Father continued:

Dear Brothers and Sisters!

Last Friday in Bkerke, Lebanon, Patriarch Estephan El Douaihy was beatified. He led the Maronite Church with wisdom from 1670 to 1704 during a difficult time marked also by persecution. A teacher of the faith and an attentive pastor, he was a witness of hope always close to the people. Even today, the Lebanese people suffer so much! In particular, I think of the families of the victims of the explosion at the Port of Beirut. I hope that justice and truth will soon be done. May the new Blessed sustain the faith and hope of the Church in Lebanon, and intercede for this beloved country. Let us applaud the new Blessed!

I am following with great concern what is taking place in the Middle East, and I hope that the conflict, already terribly bloody and violent, will not spread even further. I pray for all the victims, especially the innocent children, and express my sympathy to the Druze community in the Holy Land and the populations in Palestine, Israel, and Lebanon. Let us not forget Myanmar. Let us have the courage to resume dialogue so that there is an immediate ceasefire in Gaza and on all fronts, the hostages are freed, and the people are helped with humanitarian aid. Attacks, even targeted ones, and killings can never be a solution. They do not help to walk in the path of justice, the path of peace, but generate even more hatred and revenge. Enough, brothers and sisters! Enough! Do not stifle the word of the God of Peace, but let it be the future of the Holy Land, the Middle East and the entire world! War is a defeat!

I am equally concerned about Venezuela, which is experiencing a critical situation. I make a heartfelt appeal to all parties to seek the truth, to exercise restraint, to avoid any kind of violence, to settle disputes through dialogue, to have at heart the true good of the people and not partisan interests. Let us entrust the country to the intercession of Our Lady of Coromoto, so loved and venerated by Venezuelans, and to the prayer of Blessed José Gregorio Hernandez, whose witness unites us all.

I express my closeness to the people of India, especially Kerala, who have been hard hit by torrential rains, which have caused numerous landslides, resulting in the loss of life, many displaced persons and extensive damage. I invite you to join me in my prayers for those who have lost their lives and for all those affected by such a devastating calamity.

Today, the memorial of the Holy Curé d'Ars, some countries celebrate the "feast of the parish priest." I express my closeness and also my gratitude to all those parish priests who with zeal and generosity, at times amidst much suffering, offer themselves for God and the people. Let us applaud our parish priests!

I greet you, Romans and pilgrims from Italy and from many countries, especially the group from the Czech Republic, the Companions of Saint Ursula, the faithful from Chiusa Sclafani and Siderno, the young people from San Vito dei Normanni, the young men from the Sacro Cuore parish in Padua and the bicyclists from Sambuceto. With joy I send greetings to the participants in the First Youth Festival of Portugal being held in Fatima. Dear young people, I see that last year's enthusiastic experience in Lisbon continues to bear fruit. Thanks be to God! I pray for you and please pray for me at the Chapel of the Apparitions.

I wish you all a happy Sunday. And please, do not forget to pray for me. Enjoy your lunch. Arrivederci!

BULL OF INDICTION OF THE ORDINARY JUBILEEOF THE YEAR 2025 FRANCIS BISHOP OF ROME SERVANT OF THE SERVANTS OF GOD TO ALL WHO READ THIS LETTERMAY HOPE FILL YOUR HEARTS

10. During the Holy Year, we are called to be tangible signs of hope for those of our brothers and sisters who experience hardships of any kind. I think of prisoners who, deprived of their freedom, daily feel the harshness of detention and its restrictions, lack of affection and, in more than a few cases, lack of respect for their persons. I propose that in this Jubilee Year governments undertake initiatives aimed at restoring hope; forms of amnesty or pardon meant to help individuals regain confidence in themselves and in society; and programmes of reintegration in the community, including a concrete commitment to respect for law. This is an ancient appeal, one drawn from the word of God, whose wisdom remains ever timely. It calls for acts of clemency and liberation that enable new beginnings: "You shall hallow the fiftieth year and you shall proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants" (Lev 25:10). This institution of the Mosaic law was later taken up by the prophet Isaiah: "The Lord has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and release to the prisoners, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour" (Is 61:1-2). Jesus made those words his own at the beginning of his ministry, presenting himself as the fulfilment of the "year of the Lord's favour" (cf. Lk 4:18-19). In every part of the world, believers, and their Pastors in particular, should be one in demanding dignified conditions for those in prison, respect for their human rights and above all the abolition of the death penalty, a provision at odds with Christian faith and one that eliminates all hope of forgiveness and rehabilitation. In order to offer prisoners a concrete sign of closeness, I would myself like to open a Holy Door in a prison, as a sign inviting prisoners to look to the future with hope and a renewed sense of confidence. 11. Signs of hope should also be shown to the sick, at home or in hospital. Their sufferings can be allayed by the closeness and affection of those who visit them. Works of mercy are also works of hope that give rise to immense gratitude. Gratitude should likewise be shown to all those healthcare workers who, often in precarious conditions, carry out their mission with constant care and concern for the sick and for those who are most vulnerable. Inclusive attention should also be given to all those in particularly difficult situations, who experience their own weaknesses and limitations, especially those affected by illnesses or disabilities that severely restrict their personal independence and freedom. Care given to them is a hymn to human dignity, a song of hope that calls for the choral participation of society as a whole. 12. Signs of hope are also needed by those who are the very embodiment of hope, namely, the young. Sadly, they often see their dreams and aspirations frustrated. We must not disappoint them, for the future depends on their enthusiasm. It is gratifying to see the energy they demonstrate, for example, by rolling up their sleeves and volunteering to help when disasters strike and people are in need. Yet it is sad to see young people who are without hope, who face an uncertain and unpromising future, who lack employment or job security, or realistic prospects after finishing school. Without the hope that their dreams can come true, they will inevitably grow discouraged and listless. Escaping into drugs, risktaking and the pursuit of momentary pleasure does greater harm to them in particular, since it closes them to life's beauty and richness, and can lead to depression and even self-destructive actions. For this reason, the Jubilee should inspire the Church to make greater efforts to reach out to them. With renewed passion, let us demonstrate care and concern for adolescents, students and young couples, the rising generation. Let us draw close to the young, for they are the joy and hope of the Church and of the world! 13. Signs of hope should also be present for migrants who leave their homelands behind in search of a better life for themselves and for their families. Their expectations must not be frustrated by prejudice and rejection. A spirit of welcome, which embraces everyone with respect for his or her dignity, should be accompanied by a sense of responsibility, lest anyone be denied the right to a dignified existence. Exiles, displaced persons and refugees, whom international tensions force to emigrate in order to avoid war, violence and discrimination, ought to be guaranteed security and access to employment and education, the means they need to find their place in a new social context. May the Christian community always be prepared to defend the rights of those who are most vulnerable, opening wide its doors to welcome them, lest anyone ever be robbed of the hope of a better future. May the Lord's words in the great parable of the Last Judgement always find an echo in our hearts: "I was a stranger and you welcomed me" for "just as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you did it to me" (Mt 25:35.40). POPE FRANCIS writes letter on how literature can educate the heart and mind By Tiziana Campisi

A good book opens the mind, stimulates the heart, and prepares us for life, Pope Francis writes in a letter to future priests, but also all pastoral workers and Christians will appreciate "reading novels and poems as part of one's path to personal maturity." With his letter on the role of literature in formation, written on 17 July and published Sunday, 4 August, Pope Francis aims to encourage "a renewed love for reading" and above all "to propose a radical change of course" in the preparation of candidates for the priesthood, so that more space is given to reading literary works. Because literature can educate "the hearts and minds of pastors" to "the free and humble exercise of our use of reason" and to "a fruitful recognition of the variety of human languages," thus broadening human sensitivity and leading to greater spiritual openness. Moreover, the task of believers, and of priests in particular, is to touch the hearts of contemporary people so that they may be moved and open before the proclamation of the Lord Jesus, and in all this "the contribution that literature and poetry can offer is of incomparable value." Beneficial effects of reading In his letter Pope Francis first emphasises the beneficial effects of a good book that can "provide an oasis that keeps us from other choices that are less wholesome," and when "in moments of weariness, anger, disappointment or failure, when prayer itself does not help us find inner serenity," can help us get through difficult moments and "find peace of mind". People used to dedicate themselves to reading more often "before our present unremitting exposure to social media, mobile phones and other devices", observes the Pope, who points out that in an audio-visual product, although more complete, "the time allowed for 'enriching' the narrative or exploring its significance is usually quite restricted", while reading a book the reader is much more active. A literary work is "a living and ever fruitful text." It happens, in fact, that in reading, the reader is enriched by what is received from the author, and this enables him to make the richness of his own person flourish. Devoting time to literature While it is positive that "some seminaries have reacted to the obsession with 'screens' and with toxic, superficial and violent fake news, by devoting time and attention to literature," to reading and discussing books, new or old, that have much to say, Pope Francis acknowledges that in general those in formation for ordained ministry may not have enough time to dedicate to literature, sometimes considered "a 'minor art' that need not belong to the education of future priests and their preparation for pastoral ministry." "Such an approach is unhealthy", says the Pope, and can lead to "serious intellectual and spiritual impoverishment of future priests", who thus do not have privileged access which literature grants to the very heart of human culture and, more specifically, to the heart of every individual". Because, in practice, literature has to do with what each of us desires from life, he writes, and it enters into an intimate relationship with our concrete existence and all its tensions, desires and meanings.

Encountering Jesus In order to "respond adequately to many people's thirst for God, lest they try to satisfy it with alienating solutions or with a disembodied Jesus", believers and priests, in proclaiming the Gospel, must endeavour so that "everyone be able to encounter *Jesus Christ made flesh, made man, made history.*" One must never lose sight of the "flesh" of Jesus Christ.




