#### FIRST READING A reading from the first book of Joshua 24:1-2. 15-18

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel together at Shechem; then he called the elders, leaders, judges and scribes of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Then Joshua said to all the people: 'If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve, whether the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are now living. As for me and my House, we will serve the Lord.

The people answered, 'We have no intention of deserting the Lord and serving other gods! Was it not the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors out of the land of Egypt, the house of slavery, who worked those great wonders before our eyes and preserved us all along the way we travelled and among all the peoples through whom we journeyed. We too will serve the Lord, for he is our God.'

#### SECOND READING A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the Ephesians 5:21-32

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy.

He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body – and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

#### GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 6:60-69

After hearing his doctrine many of the followers of Jesus said, 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?' Jesus was aware that his followers were complaining about it and said, 'Does this upset you? What if you should see the Son of Man ascend to where he was before?

'It is the spirit that gives life, the flesh has nothing to offer. The words I have spoken to you are spirit and they are life. 'But there are some of you who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the outset those who did not believe, and who it was that would betray him. He went on, 'This is why I told you that no one could come to me unless the Father allows him.' After this, many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him.

Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.'

The Gospel of the Lord

#### FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends,

All the Gospel accounts in the last three Sundays highlight the tension between Jesus and his Jewish followers gradually rising as they began to ask Jesus questions about the feasibility of his claims as the bread coming down from heaven, the bread given as his flesh, and his flesh as real food and his blood as real drink to give eternal life to the partakers. Their language began to turn from diplomatic of the weeks before to confrontational in the Gospel today as they no longer hid their frustration against what he preached, something they defined as intolerable and unacceptable. 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?' They frankly told

him. In response, Jesus on the one hand acknowledged their disappointment and on the other hand continued to teach what he was sent down from heaven to teach, and this time he turned their focus on the precious value of his words that he called life-giving and brought forth by the spirit.

More significantly Jesus also realized that even some of the disciples had difficulties to digest his teachings and started to consider the move to betray him. It could not be wrong for us to call this moment as the turning point drawing the line between those who remained with him and those who decided to turn away from him with Judas Iscariot as their representative, the one the evangelist vaguely revealed to us in the story.

When witnessing such a move amongst his followers and disciples, Jesus turned to his closest collaborators namely the Apostles and invited them to clarify their position. 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' asked Jesus. Peter, on behalf of the others confirmed their decision to stick with Jesus, and publicly professed their faith in him as the Holy One of God who has the message of eternal life.

Above all, Jesus indirectly talked about faith as he made the point about how God helps people to believe in him. 'No one can come to me unless the Father allows him,' said Jesus, and we consider faith as God's gift to us, a gift we are given not because of our own merits, but out of the Father's love for us. Faith helps both the disciples of old and us as Jesus' followers today believe in him as the Son of God, and his teaching especially the one about the Eucharist calling himself the bread of life, the bread from heaven, the gift of his flesh to give eternal life to those who share it.

Let us pay more attention to the precious gift of faith God has given to help us believe in Jesus as the Son of God and give thanks to God for such a wonderful gift. We also ask Jesus to strengthen our faith in him and especially in the Eucharist, the sacrament he established at the Last Supper to keep nourishing us as we journey towards our eternal home.

#### **POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS**



Dear brothers and sisters, happy Sunday!

Today, the Gospel tells us about Jesus, who says, very simply: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven" (*Jn* 6:51). Before the crowd, the Son of God identifies himself with the most common and ordinary food- bread: "I am the bread". Among those who are listening to Him, some start arguing among themselves (cf. v. 52): how can Jesus give us His own flesh to eat? Even today, we ask ourselves this question, but with wonder and gratitude. Here are two attitudes to reflect on: wonder and gratitude before

the miracle of the Eucharist.

Firstly: wonder, because Jesus' words surprise us. But Jesus always surprises us, always! Also today, in the lives of each one of us, Jesus keeps surprising us. The bread from heaven is a gift that exceeds all expectations. Those who do not grasp Jesus' way remain suspicious: it seems impossible, even inhuman, to eat the flesh of another (cf. v. 54). Flesh and blood, however, are the humanity of the Saviour, His very life offered as a nourishment for our own.

And this brings us to the second attitude: *gratitude*. First: *wonder*. Now, *gratitude*, because we recognize Jesus where He makes Himself present for us and with us. He makes Himself bread for us. "Whoever eats my flesh remains in me and I in him" (cf. v. 56). Christ, the true man, knows well that one must eat to live. But He also knows that this is not enough. After multiplying the earthly bread (cf. *Jn* 6:1-14), He prepares an even greater gift: He Himself becomes true food and true drink (cf. v. 55). Thank you, Lord Jesus! Let us say "Thank you, thank you" with all our heart.

The heavenly bread, which comes from the Father, is the Son Himself made flesh for us. This food is more than necessary because it satisfies the hunger for hope, the hunger for truth, and the hunger for salvation that we all feel not in our stomachs, but in our hearts. Every one of us needs the Eucharist!

Jesus takes care of the greatest need: He saves us, nourishing our lives with His own, and He will do this forever. And it is thanks to Him that we can live in communion with God and with each other. The living and true bread is not, therefore, something magical, no. It is not something that will immediately solve all problems, but it is the very Body of Christ, that gives hope to the poor and overcomes the arrogance of those who gorge themselves at their expense.

Let us ask ourselves, then, brothers and sisters: Do I hunger and thirst for salvation, not just for myself, but for all my brothers and sisters? When I receive the Eucharist, which is the miracle of mercy, do I stand in awe before the Body of the Lord, who died and rose again for us?

Let us pray together to the Virgin Mary, that she may help us to welcome the gift of heaven in this sign of the bread.

#### After the Angelus

Dear brothers and sisters!

Today, in Uvira, in the Democratic Republic of Congo, the Italian missionaries of Saint Francis Xavier Luigi Carrara, Giovanni Didoné, and Vittorio Faccin, along with Albert Joubert, a Congolese priest, were beatified. They were killed in that country on November 28th, 1964. Their martyrdom crowned a life spent for the Lord and for their brothers and sisters. May their example and intercession foster paths of reconciliation and peace for the good of the Congolese people. A round of applause for the newly Blessed!

And let us continue to pray that paths of peace may be found in the Middle East — Palestine, Israel — as well as in the suffering Ukraine, Myanmar, and every war-torn region, through dialogue and negotiation, refraining from violent actions and reactions.

I greet all of you, dear faithful of Rome and pilgrims from Italy and various countries. In particular, I greet those from the state of São Paulo in Brazil; and also the Sisters of Saint Elizabeth.

I send my greetings and blessings to the women and girls gathered at the Marian Shrine of Piekary Śląskie in Poland, and I encourage them to witness the Gospel joyfully in their families and society. And I greet the young people of the *Immacolata*.

I wish everyone a happy Sunday. Please do not forget to pray for me.

# BULL OF INDICTION OF THE ORDINARY JUBILEEOF THE YEAR 2025 FRANCIS BISHOP OF ROME SERVANT OF THE SERVANTS OF GOD TO ALL WHO READ THIS LETTERMAY HOPE FILL YOUR HEARTS

17. The coming Jubilee Year will also coincide with a significant date for all Christians, namely, the 1700<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the celebration of the first great Ecumenical Council, that of Nicaea. It is worth noting that, from apostolic times, bishops have gathered on various occasions in order to discuss doctrinal questions and disciplinary matters. In the first centuries of Christianity, synods frequently took place in both East and West, showing the importance of ensuring the unity of God's People and the faithful proclamation of the Gospel. The Jubilee can serve as an important occasion for giving concrete expression to this form of synodality, which the Christian community today considers increasingly necessary for responding to the urgent need for evangelization. All the baptized, with their respective charisms and ministries, are co-responsible for ensuring that manifold signs of hope bear witness to God's presence in the world.

The Council of Nicaea sought to preserve the Church's unity, which was seriously threatened by the denial of the full

divinity of Jesus Christ and hence his consubstantiality with the Father. Some three hundred bishops took part, convoked at the behest of the Emperor Constantine; their first meeting took place in the Imperial Palace on 20 May 325. After various debates, by the grace of the Spirit they unanimously approved the Creed that we still recite each Sunday at the celebration of the Eucharist. The Council Fathers chose to begin that Creed by using for the first time the expression "We believe", [10] as a sign that all the Churches were in communion and that all Christians professed the same faith. The Council of Nicaea was a milestone in the Church's history. The celebration of its anniversary invites Christians to join in a hymn of praise and thanksgiving to the Blessed Trinity and in particular to Jesus Christ, the Son of God, "consubstantial with the Father", [11] who revealed to us that mystery of love. At the same time, Nicaea represents a summons to all Churches and Ecclesial Communities to persevere on the path to visible unity and in the quest of fitting ways to respond fully to the prayer of Jesus "that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me" ( Jn 17:21).

The Council of Nicaea also discussed the date of Easter. To this day, different approaches to this question prevent celebrating the fundamental event of our faith on the same day. Providentially, a common celebration will take place in the year 2025. May this serve as an appeal to all Christians, East and West, to take a decisive step forward towards unity around a common date for Easter. We do well to remind ourselves that many people, unaware of the controversies of the past, fail to understand how divisions in this regard can continue to exist.

#### Anchored in hope

18. Hope, together with faith and charity, makes up the triptych of the "theological virtues" that express the heart of the Christian life (cf. 1 Cor 13:13; 1 Thess 1:3). In their inseparable unity, hope is the virtue that, so to speak, gives inward direction and purpose to the life of believers. For this reason, the Apostle Paul encourages us to "rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, and persevere in prayer" (Rom 12:12). Surely we need to "abound in hope" (cf. Rom 15:13), so that we may bear credible and attractive witness to the faith and love that dwell in our hearts; that our faith may be joyful and our charity enthusiastic; and that each of us may be able to offer a smile, a small gesture of friendship, a kind look, a ready ear, a good deed, in the knowledge that, in the Spirit of Jesus, these can become, for those who receive them, rich seeds of hope. Yet what is the basis of our hope? To understand this, let us stop and reflect on "the reasons for our hope" (cf. 1 Pet 3:15). (to be continued)

#### POPE FRANCIS TO REMINI MEETING: FAITH IN JESUS IS WHAT IS ESSENTIAL IN LIFE By Vatican News

Pope Francis has sent a message to participants in the 2024 *Meeting for Friendship Among Peoples*, commonly known as the Rimini Meeting.

Each year, prominent politicians, entrepreneurs, representatives of religion and culture, intellectuals, artists, athletes, and others converge on the Italian city of Rimini for a cultural experience "driven by the desire to discover the beauty of reality".

In his letter, released on Monday and signed by Cardinal Secretary of State Pietro Parolin, the Pope highlighted the theme for this year's Meeting - "If we are not after the essential, what are we after?"

#### Quest for true meaning of life

The letter notes that "the search for what constitutes the core of the mystery of life and reality is of crucial importance" amid the challenges of the day, and offers encouragement for "that endeavour to seek... that which brings forth the beauty of life."

The Pope urges participants to see, in the struggles of modern life, "a call to reflection" aimed at opening hearts for an encounter with God and fostering in every person an awareness of self, of neighbour, and of reality.

This, in turn, reveals that what is most important in life is not material goods or successes, but "that relationship that sustains us, rooting our journey in trust and hope" that is, friendship with God, which is then reflected in our relationships with others.

#### What is most essential: faith in Jesus Christ

The letter recalls the Pope's speech to the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith earlier this year: "What is essential, most beautiful, most attractive, and at the same time most necessary for us is faith in Jesus Christ".

The Pope expresses his appreciation and support for the Rimini Meeting, and encourages everyone to become "responsible protagonists for change, actively collaborating in the mission of the Church to give life to places where the presence of Christ can be seen and touched."

Finally, Pope Francis expresses his hope that the 2024 Rimini meeting "might inspire many to become seekers of the essential, and make the passion for the proclamation of the Gospel – a source of liberation from all slavery and a force that heals and transforms humanity – blossom in their hearts."




