GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 7:1-8. 14-15. 21-23

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture:

This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations. You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions. He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.

The Gospel of the Lord

FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends.

As we know, the Ten Commandments were given to the people of Israel, God's Chosen people through Moses, and Moses even asked them to keep God's Commandments as they were. 'You must add nothing to what I command you, and take nothing from it,' Moses told the Israelites in the first reading this Sunday. Despite such a strong warning from Moses, they managed to come up with 613 clauses known as the oral traditions to help interpret God's Commandments. Some of the scribes and Pharisees then considered these newly added oral traditions as important as the Commandments or the laws themselves, consequently

they taught that anyone who wanted to be holy had to observe both the oral traditions and the laws, and those who failed to follow them were regarded as sinners.

According to their oral traditions, Jewish people were required to wash their hands before having a meal, and point their fingers to certain direction as they poured water over their hands. Their oral traditions also instructed them about the type of container for water storing and how much water to be used for the purification rite. Based on these manmade traditions, they came to the claim that anyone who did not observe these requirements was ritually unclean, and so the unclean had to go through even more rituals to be cleansed of the impurity.

This ritual background helps us understand why the Pharisees and the scribes questioned Jesus for allowing the disciples to violate the oral traditions by failing to wash their hands before eating. In response to their charge, Jesus quoted the teaching of the prophet Isaiah to make these points that their traditions were nothing but human regulations and that their worship was worthless before God because they failed to put their heart into it and try to cling on to nothing but human regulations (cf. Isaiah 29.13).

Jesus then went on to make this important point about what we should do to keep ourselves clean before God, that we need to keep guard of bad thoughts and intentions, such as fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, fried and folly that come from within us, instead of paying too much attention on the purifying process.

Let us pray today for the grace from this Holy Eucharist to free us from all wicked thoughts and ill intentions, and make our worship pleasing to God and bearing good fruits in all what we do and say in our witnessing lives. Have a Christocentric weekend,

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS



Dear brothers and sisters, happy Sunday!

Today the Gospel of the liturgy (*Jn* 6:60-69) relates to us the famous response of Saint Peter, who says to Jesus: "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life." (*Jn* 6:68). It is a very beautiful expression that gives witness to the friendship and manifests the trust that bind him to Christ, along with the other disciples. "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life." Beautiful. Peter speaks these words at a critical moment. Jesus has just finished a discourse in which he said he was the "bread

come down from heaven". It is a difficult language for people to understand and many, even disciples who were following Him, abandon Him because they did not understand. The Twelve, however, remained with Him. They stayed because in Him they found "words of eternal life." They heard Him preach, they saw the miracles He performed, and they continue to share with Him public moments and the intimacy of daily life (*cf. Mk* 3:7-19). The disciples do not always understand what the Master says and does. At times they struggle to accept the paradoxes of His love (*cf. Mt* 5:38-48), the extreme demands of His mercy (*cf. Mt* 18:21-22), the radical nature of His way of giving Himself to all. It is not easy for them to understand, but they are faithful. Jesus' choices often go beyond common thinking, beyond the very canons of institutional religion and traditions to the point of creating provocative and embarrassing situations

(cf. Mt 15:12). It is not easy to follow Him. Yet, among the many teachers of that time, Peter and the other apostles found only in Him the answer to the thirst for life, for joy, for love that animates them. Only thanks to Him did they experience the fullness of life they seek, beyond the limits of sin and even death. Therefore, they do not leave. Indeed, all but one, even amidst many falls and times of repentance will remain with Him to the end (cf. Jn 17:12). And, brothers and sisters, this also concerns us. Even for us it is not easy to follow the Lord, to understand His way of acting, to make His criteria and His example our own. It is not easy for us. However, the closer we are to Him the more we adhere to His Gospel, receive His grace in the Sacraments, stay in His company in prayer,

imitate Him in humility and charity - the more we experience the beauty of having Him as our Friend and realise that He alone has the "words of eternal life." Then we can ask ourselves: how much is Jesus present in my life? How much do I let myself be touched and moved by His words? Can I say that they are also "words of eternal life" for me? To you, my brother, my sister, I ask: Are the words of Jesus, for you - also for me - words of eternal life? May Mary, who received Jesus, the Word of God, in her flesh, help us to listen to Him and never leave Him.

After praying the Angelus the Holy Father continued:

Dear brothers and sisters! I wish to express my solidarity with the thousands of people affected by Mpox (monkeypox), which is now a global health emergency. I pray for all those infected, especially the people of the Democratic Republic of Congo suffering greatly. I express my sympathy to the local Churches in the countries most affected by this disease and I encourage governments and private industries to share available technology and treatments so that no one lacks adequate medical care. To the beloved people of Nicaragua: I encourage you to renew your hope in Jesus. Remember that the Holy Spirit always guides history towards higher projects. May the Immaculate Virgin protect you in times of trial and help you feel her motherly tenderness.

May Our Lady accompany the beloved people of Nicaragua. I continue to follow with sorrow the fighting in Ukraine and the Russian Federation. And in thinking about the laws recently adopted in Ukraine, I fear for the freedom of those who pray, because those who truly pray always pray for all.

A person does not commit evil because of praying. If someone commits evil against his people, he will be guilty for it, but he cannot have committed evil because he prayed. So let those who want to pray be allowed to pray in what they consider their Church. Please, let no Christian Church be abolished directly or indirectly. Churches are not to be touched! And let us continue to pray for an end to wars, in Palestine, in Israel, in Myanmar and in every other region. The people are asking for peace! Let us pray that the Lord will give us all peace. I greet all of you, Romans and pilgrims from Italy and from many countries. In particular, I greet the new seminarians of the North American College and wish them a good formative journey; and I also wish them to live their priesthood with joy, because true prayer gives us joy. I greet the young people with motor and cognitive disabilities, who are taking part in the "relay of inclusion" to affirm that barriers can be overcome.

I greet my friends, the young people of the Immaculata. And I wish everyone a good Sunday. Please do not forget to pray for me. Have a good lunch and arrivederci!

19. "I believe in life everlasting". So our faith professes. Christian hope finds in these words an essential foundation. For hope is "that theological virtue by which we desire... eternal life as our happiness". The Second Vatican Council says of hope that, "when people are deprived of this divine support, and lack hope in eternal life, their dignity is deeply impaired, as may so often be seen today. The problems of life and death, of guilt and suffering, remain unsolved, so that people are frequently thrown into despair". We, however, by virtue of the hope in which we were saved, can view the passage of time with the certainty that the history of humanity and our own individual history are not doomed to a dead end or a dark abyss, but directed to an encounter with the Lord of glory. As a result, we live our lives in expectation of his return and in the hope of living forever in him. In this spirit, we make our own the heartfelt prayer of the first Christians with which sacred Scripture ends: "Come, Lord Jesus!" (Rev 22:20). 20. The death and resurrection of Jesus is the heart of our faith and the basis of our hope. Saint Paul states this succinctly by the use of four verbs: "I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received, that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas and then to the twelve" (1Cor 15:3-5). Christ died, was buried, was raised and appeared. For our sake, Jesus experienced the drama of death. The Father's love raised him in the power of the Spirit, and made of his humanity the first fruits of our eternal salvation. Christian hope consists precisely in this: that in facing death, which appears to be the end of everything, we have the certainty that, thanks to the grace of Christ imparted to us in Baptism, "life is changed, not ended", forever. Buried with Christ in Baptism, we receive in his resurrection the gift of a new life that breaks down the walls of death, making it a passage to eternity. The reality of death, as a painful separation from those dearest to us, cannot be mitigated by empty rhetoric. The Jubilee, however, offers us the opportunity to appreciate anew, and with immense gratitude, the gift of the new life that we have received in Baptism, a life capable of transfiguring death's drama. It is worth reflecting, in the context of the Jubilee, on how that mystery has been understood from the earliest centuries of the Church's life. An example would be the tradition of building baptismal fonts in the shape of an octagon, as seen in many ancient baptisteries, like that of Saint John Lateran in Rome. This was intended to symbolize that Baptism is the dawn of the "eighth day", the day of the resurrection, a day that transcends the normal, weekly passage of time, opening it to the dimension of eternity and to life everlasting: the goal to which we tend on our earthly pilgrimage (cf. Rom 6:22). The most convincing testimony to this hope is provided by the martyrs. Steadfast in their faith in the risen Christ, they renounced life itself here below, rather than betray their Lord. Martyrs, as confessors of the life that knows no end, are present and numerous in every age, and perhaps even more so in our own day. We need to treasure their testimony, in order to confirm our hope and allow it to bear good fruit. The martyrs, coming as they do from different Christian traditions, are also seeds of unity, expressions of the ecumenism of blood. I greatly hope that the Jubilee will also include ecumenical celebrations as a way of highlighting the richness of the testimony of these martyrs. 21. What, then, will become of us after death? With Jesus, beyond this threshold we will find eternal life, consisting in full communion with God as we forever contemplate and share in his infinite love. All that we now experience in hope, we shall then see in reality. We are reminded of the words of Saint Augustine: "When I am one with you in all my being, there will be no more pain and toil; my life shall be true life, a life wholly filled by you". What will characterize this fullness of communion? Being happy. Happiness is our human vocation, a goal to which all aspire. But what is happiness? What is the happiness that we await and desire? Not some fleeting pleasure, a momentary satisfaction that, once experienced, keeps us longing for more, in a desperate quest that leaves our hearts unsated and increasingly empty. We aspire to a happiness that is definitively found in the one thing that can bring us fulfilment, which is love. Thus, we will be able to say even now: I am loved, therefore I exist; and I will live forever in the love that does not disappoint, the love from which nothing can ever separate me. Let us listen once more to the words of the Apostle: "I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom 8:38-39). POPE FRANCIS: YOUNG PEOPLE DON'T NEED US, THEY NEED GOD! By Deborah Castellano Lubov

"The young people do not need us, they need God!" stressed Pope Francis to participants in the XVIII General Chapter of the Congregation of the Oblates of St. Joseph on Monday in the Vatican. Addressing the religious congregation founded by St. Joseph Marello in 1878, the Pope recalled, "As you know, my family also has roots in Asti." "We share common origins in that land of Piedmont, which gave birth to your founder, St. Joseph Marello," he reminded. Remembering their Chapter's theme is the phrase from St. Paul to Timothy: "I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you" (2 Tim 1:6), the Pope said, "these are demanding words." In them, he pondered, you "recognize yourselves as beneficiaries of a gift," namely, "the holiness of your founder," and "commit yourselves to the responsibilities that come with it, to safeguard and make fruitful the talents received by placing them at the service of others today." St. Joseph, guardian of the Holy Family These two attitudes of gratitude and responsibility, the Pope said, are well reflected in the figure of St. Joseph, "the guardian of the Holy Family," who, he highlighted, "is the model, he who inspires, and the intercessor, of your Congregation." Reflecting on the beloved Saint, the Pope reminded them he himself keeps a 'sleeping St. Joseph' statue in his room. "One of the striking things about the Holy Spouse of Mary is the generous faith with which he welcomed into his home and life, a God who, contrary to all expectations," the Pope marveled, "presented Himself at his door in the son of a fragile girl, lacking any possibility of making claims." Keeping this in mind, the Pope urged each of them to root their lives of faith and their religious consecration in "a daily 'being' with Jesus." "Root your life of faith and religious consecration in a daily 'being' with Jesus." Sustains us amid our fragility This, the Pope who had declared a Year of St. Joseph observed, "is primarily how St. Joseph responded to the immense gift of having the Son of God made man in his home: by being with Him, listening to Him, speaking to Him, and sharing daily life with Him." Each of us, with our own fragility, Pope Francis recognized, cannot stay standing without the Lord who sustains us. Therefore, he encouraged them always to cultivate a good life of prayer, through participation in the Sacraments, listening to and meditating on the Word of God, and Eucharistic Adoration, both personally and as a community. As he called on those before him to reflect on their own sins, the Pope suggested that we all need to stay so close to the Lord, that, when we start to slip into sin, we can cling to Him and are able to stay afloat. Their prayerfulness and closeness to God, the Pope encouraged, "will positively reflect on your apostolate, especially on that mission that characterizes you as 'apostles of the youth.'" Young people need God "The young people do not need us; they need God!" Pope Francis underscored, saying, "The more we live in His presence, the more we are capable of helping them encounter Him." The youth, the Pope reminded, have a great potential for good, and "just waiting to bloom and bear fruit if supported and accompanied by wise, patient, and generous guides." "Young people do not need us; they need God! The more we live in His presence, the more we are capable of helping them encounter Him." While it "is a great task that takes a lot of work," he said that especially in our times it remains "indispensable. Pope Francis concluded by thanking the Oblates of St. Joseph for their service and generosity to the Church and society.
