#### FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends,

Careerism has been one of the issues Pope Francis has defined as a serious problem the Catholic Church needs to combat against and get rid of. Careerism means to say of a clergy who constantly looks for opportunities to climb higher and higher in the hierarchical order, and one word that would well describe this person is ambition. I used to observe the ways a clergy younger than me made his careerist move and began to warn him against that. He ignored me for the first time and barked at me the second time 'there's nothing wrong with ambition, if

you don't like it (meaning the episcopacy) let someone else do it.' Obviously he was unaware of St James' warning against the threat of ambition to Church members as we heard from the Second reading this Sunday that jealousy and ambition could bring disharmony and wicked things of every kind to a Church community.

A typical example of ambition could be seen in the Gospel account as the evangelist recounted the topic that the disciples of Jesus kept arguing on their mission journey of who was the greatest amongst them. Jesus overheard their ambition-related discussion and of course was unimpressed with that, since it was completely out of touch with the image of the Suffering Messiah he just told them of before. Jesus was quick to counter the disciples' misconception of their call by presenting what we call the Humble Service model of leadership asking the disciples to opt for the humble service as the standard criteria to measure their greatness in the community. They should be prepared to serve even a child with humility, Jesus seemed to send out to the disciples this message when he brought a child before them, telling 'anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me'

Let us pray for the grace from this Sunday Eucharist we celebrate today to take away from us, especially our ordained ministers, any temptation to dominate others in the community, and fill us with the desire to serve each other with humility.

### REPORT FROM THE LAST PASTORAL COUNCIL MEETING

The meeting started with a reflection upon the Settlers and Pioneers theologies highlighting the differences between Church members in the ways we look at the Church and this article is made available for our parishioners to read this weekend. As usual, there were reports from various groups in the parish and a good amount of time was given to talk about the Family Group movement we are going to introduce to this community.

## THE PASSIONIST FAMILY GROUP MOVEMENT:

The Passionist Family Group Movement (PFGM) began in Australia over 50 years ago to meet a very evident need for parishioners and to get to know one another and so build a strong community sense and commitment to each other. The idea is that you meet with other parishioners occasionally for low cost or no cost outings. These gatherings, in turn, enrich your experience of the Parish formal celebrations and services. The motto of the Family Group Movement is "a family for all". You don't have to be a Catholic, a parent, old or young, married, or single - you just have to be yourself! If you do have kids, they really enjoy it, and you are able to share life's adventures and trials with the support of a caring community. Your Parish Pastoral Council has decided to start this initiative as an important strategy in connecting parishioners with the broader parish family. Dennis Farrar, a promoter of the Passionist Family Group Movement, will be speaking to us at all Masses on the weekend of the September 28/29 and extending an invitation to join. 

### **POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS**



Dear brothers and sisters, happy Sunday!

The Gospel of today's Liturgy tells us that Jesus, after asking the disciples what the people thought of Him, directly asks them: "But who do you say that I am?" (*Mk* 8:29). Peter answers on behalf of all the group, saying. "You are the Christ" (v. 30), that is, you are the Messiah. However, when Jesus starts to talk about the suffering and death that await Him, the same Peter objects, and Jesus harshly rebukes him: "Get behind me, Satan!" – He says Satan – For you are not on the side of God, but of men" (v. 33).

Looking at the attitude of the apostle Peter, we too can ask ourselves what it means to truly know Jesus. What does it mean to know Jesus? In fact, on the one hand Peter answers perfectly, saying to Jesus that He is the Christ. However, behind these correct words there is still a way of thinking that is "of men", a mentality that imagines a strong Messiah, a victorious Messiah, who cannot suffer or die. So, the words with which Peter responds are "right", but his way of thinking has not changed. He still has to change his mindset, he still has to convert. And this is a message, an important message for us too. Indeed, we too have learned something about God, we know the doctrine, we recite the prayers correctly and, perhaps, we respond well to the question "Who is Jesus for you?", with some formula we learned at catechism. But are we sure that this means really knowing Jesus? In reality, to know the Lord, it is not enough to know something about Him, but rather to follow Him, to let oneself be touched and changed by His Gospel. It is a matter of having a relationship with Him, an encounter. I can know many things about Jesus, but if I have not encountered Him, I still do not know who Jesus is. It takes this encounter that changes life: it changes the way of being, it changes the way of thinking, it changes the relationships you have with your brothers and sisters, the willingness to accept and forgive, it changes the choices you make in life. Everything changes if you have truly come to know Jesus! Everything changes. Brothers and sisters, the Lutheran theologian and pastor Bonhoeffer, victim of Nazism, wrote: "What is bothering me incessantly is the question of what Christianity really is, or indeed who Christ really is, for us today" (Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Letters and papers from prison). Unfortunately, many people no longer pose themselves this question and remain "unbothered", slumbering, even far from God. Instead, it is important to ask ourselves: do I let myself be bothered, do I ask who Jesus is for me, and what place He occupies in my life? Do I follow Jesus only in word, continuing to have a worldly mentality, or do I set out to follow Him, allowing the encounter with Him to transform my life? May our mother Mary, who knew Jesus well, help us on this question.

# After the Angelus

Dear brothers and sisters,

I express my closeness to the populations of Vietnam and Myanmar, who are suffering as a result of the floods caused by a violent typhoon. I pray for the deceased, the injured and the displaced. May God sustain those who have lost their loved ones and their home, and bless those who are coming to their aid. Yesterday, Moisés Lira Seraphin was beatified in Mexico City. A priest and founder of the Congregation of the Missionaries of Charity of Mary Immaculate, he died in 1950, after a life spent helping people to advance in faith and in love of the Lord. May his apostolic zeal encourage priests to give themselves unreservedly, for the spiritual good of the holy people of God. A round of applause for the new Blessed! I can see the Mexican flags over there. Today marks World Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Day in Italy. I assure remembrance in prayer for sufferers and their families; I encourage research work on this pathology, and volunteer associations. And let us not forget the wars that are causing bloodshed in the world. I think of tormented Ukraine, Myanmar, I think of the Middle East. How many are innocent victims. I think of the mothers who have lost their sons in war. How many young lives cut short! I think of Hersh Goldberg-Polin, found dead in September, along with five other hostages in Gaza. In November last year, I met his mother, Rachel, who impressed me with her humanity. I accompany her in this moment. May the conflict in Palestine and Israel cease! May the violence cease! May hatred cease! Let the hostages be released, let the negotiations continue, and let peaceful solutions be found! I greet you all, Romans and pilgrims from Italy and many countries. In particular, the faithful of the parish of Saint Queen Jadwiga in Radom, Poland; the group of Jesuit priests who have come to Rome to study; the students of Stade, Germany, and participants in the relay walk from Rome to Assisi. And I greet the young people of the *Immacolata*, who have had three ordinations in these days: congratulations! I wish you all a good Sunday. And please, do not forget to pray for me. Enjoy your lunch, and arrivederci.

### POPE FRANCIS' HOMILY IN SINGAPORE: LOVE IS THE CENTRE OF THE GOSPEL

"Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up" (1 Cor 8:1). Saint Paul addresses these words to the brothers and sisters of the Christian community at Corinth. In his letters to this community, which was rich in many charisms (cf. 1 Cor 1:4-5), the Apostle often recommends that it cultivate communion in charity.

Let us listen to those words of Paul as together we thank the Lord for the Church in Singapore, which is also rich in gifts, a Church that is vibrant, growing and engaged in constructive dialogue with the various other Confessions and Religions with which it shares this wonderful land.

For this reason, then, I would like to reflect on Paul's words, taking as a starting point the beauty of this city and its great and bold architecture, especially this impressive National Stadium complex, which contribute to making Singapore so famous and fascinating. First, let us remember that, in the end, at the origins of these imposing buildings, as with any other undertaking that leaves a positive mark on our world, while people may think that they are primarily about money, techniques or even engineering ability, which are certainly useful, very useful, what we really find is *love*, precisely the "love that builds up".

While some may think this is a naive statement, by reflecting on it we see that this is not the case. Indeed, while good works may have brilliant, strong, rich and creative people behind them, there are always fragile women and men, like us, for whom without love there is no life, no impetus, no reason to act, no strength to build.

Dear brothers and sisters, if there is anything good that exists and endures in this world, it is only because, in innumerable situations, love has prevailed over hate, solidarity over indifference, generosity over selfishness. Without this, no one here would have been able to give rise to such a great metropolis, for the architects would not have designed it, the workers would not have worked on it and nothing would have been achieved.

So what we see is a sign, and behind each of the works in front of us there are many stories of love to be discovered: of men and women united with one another in a community, of citizens dedicated to their country, of mothers and fathers concerned for their families, of professionals and workers of all kinds sincerely engaged in their various roles and tasks. It is good for us, then, to learn to read these stories, written on the front of our homes and on the paths of our streets, and to pass on their memory, in order to remind us that nothing lasting is born or grows without love.

Sometimes it happens that the greatness and grandeur of our projects can make us forget this, and fool us into thinking that we can be the sole authors of our lives, of our wealth, our wellbeing, our happiness. Yet, ultimately, life always brings us back to one reality: without love we are nothing.

Faith, then, confirms and enlightens us even more deeply regarding this conviction, because it tells us that at the root of our capacity to love and be loved is God himself, who with a Father's heart has willed and desired to bring us into existence in an utterly gratuitous way (cf. 1 Cor 8:6) and who in an equally gratuitous way has redeemed us and freed us from sin and death, through the death and resurrection of his only Son. It is in Jesus that all that we are and can become have their origin and fulfilment.

Thus, in our love we see a reflection of God's love, as Saint John Paul II said during his visit to this land (cf. *Homily at Holy Mass at the National Stadium, Singapore*, 20 November 1986). He went on to add the important point that, "love is characterized by a deep respect for all people, regardless of their race, belief or whatever makes them different from ourselves" (*ibid*.).

Brothers and sisters, these are important words for us because, beyond the astonishment we feel in front of human works, they remind us that there is an even greater wonder to be embraced with even greater admiration and respect: namely, the brothers and sisters we meet, without discrimination, every day on our path, as we see in Singaporean society and the Church, which are ethnically diverse and yet united and in solidarity!

The most beautiful building, the most precious treasure, the most profitable investment in God's eyes, what is it? It is ourselves, all of us, for we are beloved children of the same Father (cf. Lk 6:35), called in turn to spread love. The readings of this Mass speak to us of this in various ways. From different points of view, they describe the same charity, which is gentle in respecting the vulnerability of the weak (cf. 1 Cor 8:13), provident in knowing and accompanying those who are uncertain on life's journey (cf. Ps 138), and generous, kind in forgiving beyond all calculation and measure (cf. Lk 6:27-38). The love that God shows us, and that he invites us to share with others, "responds generously to the needs of the poor... is marked by compassion for those in sorrow... is quick to offer hospitality and is persevering in times of trial. It is always ready to forgive, to hope", to forgive and hope even to the point of returning "a blessing for a curse... love is the very centre of the Gospel" (SAINT JOHN PAUL II, Homily at Holy Mass at the National Stadium, Singapore, 20 November 1986). Indeed, we can see this in a great many of the saints, those men and women who were so conquered by the God of mercy that they became a reflection of that mercy, an echo, a living image. Here, to conclude, I would like to call to mind just two of them.

The first is Mary, whose Most Holy Name we celebrate today. She has given hope to so many people by her support and presence, which she continues to do! On how many lips has her Name appeared, and continues to appear in moments of joy and sorrow! This is because in her, in Mary, we see the Father's love manifested in one of the most beautiful and fulsome of ways, for in her we see the tenderness – let us not forget tenderness! – of a mother, who understands and forgives everything and who never abandons us. This is why we turn to her!

The second is a saint dear to this land, who found hospitality here many times during his missionary journeys. I am speaking of Saint Francis Xavier, who was received in this land on numerous occasions, the last on 21 July 1552.

We still have a beautiful letter that he addressed to Saint Ignatius and his first companions, in which he expresses his desire to go to all the universities of his time in order to cry out "like a madman [to] those with more learning than charity" so that they might feel compelled to become missionaries for the love of their brothers and sisters, and to "cry out with all their heart: 'Lord, I am here! What do you want me to do?'" (*Letter,* Cochin, January 1544).

We too could make these words our own, following his and Mary's example: "Lord, here I am; what do you want me to do?", so that they may accompany us not only in these days, but always, as a constant commitment to listening and responding readily to the invitations to love and live justly that continue to come to us today from the infinite love of God.




