The Gospel of the Lord

FROM FR. HENRY

Dear friends,



In the flight back to Rome from Brazil in 2013, a journalist asked Pope Francis a question about gender treatment and the Holy Father came up with this answer, 'if someone is gay, and he searches for the Lord and has good will, who am I to judge?' His who-am-I-to- judge response, immediately made headlines around the world, and a lot of people gave credit to the pope for the guote without knowing that it was a passage from the letter of

St James (cf. 4.12) which the pope and anyone who prays the breviary everyday should know, since it is one of the readings there. St James, as we know was surely inspired by the 'don't-judge' advice of Jesus (cf. Mt 7.1; Lk 6.37), and perhaps by the way Jesus responded to the scribes and Pharisees in the Gospel of John this Sunday as they brought to him a woman caught cheating on her husband.

They played the game of innocence by taking the woman before Jesus and telling him what Moses' law instructed them to do in her case, namely a stoning execution, and then asking for Jesus' opinion. 'What have you to say?' they asked him.

These were the nastiest people, as they put Jesus in a deadly dilemma to which he could say neither yes nor no: if he agreed with the law, he contradicted himself with his own teaching of love and forgiveness, and if he chose to stand with his commandment of love, he breached the law.

Instead of giving them a black and white answer as they expected, Jesus decided to do something different by bending down to write on the ground with his finger. Though John told us nothing about what Jesus was writing, we incline to think that he probably wrote down the list of sins committed by accusers of the woman, and this helps explain why they all began to go away one after another. They felt extremely shameful to see their secret sins exposed in public, so they had to run away as quick as they could, and left the woman alone with Jesus. The last words Jesus said to the woman really reflect his 'don't judge' stand that 'neither do I condemn you, go away and don't sin anymore.' In other words, he probably meant to tell her 'I don't judge you, try to be a better person from now.'

Let us pray today for the strength to follow Jesus' footsteps by not judging people around us and showing them our compassion and understanding instead.

POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS FROM THE HOSPITAL Text prepared by the Holy Father



Dear brothers and sisters, Happy Sunday!

In today's Gospel (Lk 15:1-3, 11-32) Jesus notices that the Pharisees are scandalised and murmur behind His back, instead of being happy because sinners come to Him. So Jesus tells them about a father who has two sons: one leaves home, but then, having been reduced to poverty, he returns and is welcomed with joy. The other, the 'obedient' son, is indignant at his father and does not want to enter the feast. This leave reveals the heart of God: He is always merciful towards all he heart our wounds so that we can leave

is how Jesus reveals the heart of God: He is always merciful towards all; he heals our wounds so that we can love each other as brothers.

Dearest friends, let us live this Lent as a time of healing, all the more as it is the Jubilee. I too am experiencing it this way, in my soul and in my body. That is why I give heartfelt thanks to all those who, in the image of the Saviour, are instruments of healing for their neighbour with their word and their knowledge, with kindness and with prayer. Frailty and illness are experiences we all have in common; all the more, however, we are brothers in the salvation Christ has given us.

Trusting in the mercy of God the Father, we continue to pray for peace: in martyred Ukraine, in Palestine, Israel, Lebanon, the Democratic Republic of Congo and Myanmar, which is also suffering so much because of the earthquake.

I am following the situation in South Sudan with concern. I renew my heartfelt appeal to all leaders to do their utmost to lower the tension in the country. We must put aside our differences and, with courage and responsibility, sit around a table and engage in constructive dialogue. Only in this way will it be possible to alleviate the suffering of the beloved South Sudanese people and to build a future of peace and stability.

And in Sudan, the war continues to claim innocent victims. I urge the parties concerned in the conflict to put the safeguarding of the lives of their civilian brothers and sisters first; and I hope that new negotiations will begin as soon as possible, capable of securing a lasting solution to the crisis. May the international community increase its efforts to address the appalling humanitarian catastrophe.

Thanks be to God, there are also positive events: for example, the ratification of the Agreement on the demarcation of the border between Tajikistan and Kyrgyzstan, which is an excellent diplomatic achievement. I encourage both countries to continue on this path.

May Mary, Mother of Mercy, help the human family to be reconciled in peace.

POPE FRANCIS' MESSAGE TO PARTICIPANTS IN THE SECOND SYNODAL ASSEMBLY OF ITALIAN CHURCHES By Lisa Zengarini

In a message addressed to participants in the Second Synodal Assembly of Italian Churches, Pope Francis

reminds them that the Church is made by the people of God who walk together, and that Christian joy does not come from easy solutions to problems but from the certainty that the Lord never abandons us.

"Christian joy is never exclusive, but always inclusive—it is for everyone." Pope Francis offered that reminder in a message he addressed on Tuesday to participants in the Second Synodal Assembly of the Churches in Italy, gathered in the Vatican from March 31 to April 3.

Four years of listening and discernment

The session marks the final "prophetic" phase of the Italian Church's Synodal Path launched in 2021 to redefine its mission in Italy in a spirit of shared responsibility and discernment, reflecting Pope Francis' vision of a synodal Church.

The theme of joy is at the heart of the discussions in which over one thousand bishops, and diocesan delegates from across Italy, will vote the Propositions presenting ideas and proposals that have emerged during these four years of listening and discernment.

Christian joy is trusting in God in every situation of life

Reflecting on the title of the Propositions "So that joy may be full", the message recalls that true joy " is not mere happiness, it does not arise from easy solutions to problems, it does not avoid the cross, but it springs from the certainty that the Lord never abandons us."

He assures his audience that he has personally experienced this closeness of God during his hospitalization and now in this time of recovery.

"Christian joy is trusting in God in every situation of life," the Pope writes "It is fulfilled in the folds of daily life and in sharing: it is a joy with wide horizons, which accompanies a welcoming attitude."

Walking together guided by the Holy Spirit

As they prepare to vote on the Propositions, which are "crucial for the future of the Churches in Italy", Pope Francis therefore invites participants to let themselves be "guided by the creative harmony generated by the Holy Spirit", reminding them that "The Church is not made up of majorities or minorities, but of the holy faithful people of God, who walk through history illuminated by the Word and the Spirit."

POPE FRANCIS: CATECHESIS

Cycle of Catechesis – Jubilee 2025. Jesus Christ our Hope. II. The life of Jesus. The encounters *3. Zacchaeus.* "*Today I must stay at your house!" (Lk 19:5)*

Dear brothers and sisters,

Today we will continue to contemplate Jesus' encounters with some figures from the Gospel. This time, I would like to focus on Zacchaeus: an episode that is particularly close to my heart, because it has a special place in my spiritual journey.

The Gospel of Luke presents Zacchaeus to us and one who seems irredeemably lost. Perhaps we too feel this way at times: without hope. Instead, Zacchaeus will discover that the Lord was already looking for him.

In fact, Jesus came to Jericho, a city located below sea level, considered to be an image of the underworld, where Jesus wants to go in search of those who feel they are lost. And in reality, the Risen Lord continues to descend into today's underworlds, in places of war, in the suffering of the innocent, in the heart of mothers who see their children die, in the hunger of the poor.

Zacchaeus, in a certain sense, is lost; perhaps he has made the wrong decisions or perhaps his life has put him in situations from which he struggles to get out. Indeed, Luke insists on describing the characteristics of this man: not only is he a publican, a person who collects taxes from his fellow citizens for the Roman invaders, but he is the chief of publicans, no less, as if to say that his sin is multiplied.

Luke then adds that Zacchaeus is rich, suggesting that he has grown rich on the backs of others, abusing his position. But all this has consequences: Zacchaeus probably feels excluded, despised by everyone.

When he comes to know that Jesus is passing through the city, Zacchaeus feels the desire to see Him. He does not dare to imagine a meeting; it would be enough to watch him from a distance. However, our desires encounter obstacles and are not automatically fulfilled: Zacchaeus is short! It is our reality: we have limitations that we have to deal with. And then there are others, who sometimes do not help us: the crowd prevents Zacchaeus from seeing Jesus. Perhaps it is something of a revenge on their part.

But when you have a strong desire, you do not lose heart. You find a solution. However, you need to be courageous and unashamed; you need a little of the simplicity of children and not to worry about your own image. Zacchaeus, just like a child, climbs a tree. It should be a good vantage point, especially in order to watch without being seen, hiding behind the branches.

But with the Lord, the unexpected always happens. Jesus, when He comes close, raises His eyes. Zacchaeus feels he has been discovered, and probably expects a public rebuke. The people may have hoped for it, but they are

disappointed: Jesus asks Zacchaeus to come down immediately, almost surprised to see him in the tree, and says to him, "Today I must stay at your house!" (*Lk* 19:5). God does not pass by without looking for those who are lost.

Luke highlights the joy in Zacchaeus' heart. It is the joy of one who feels that he has been seen, acknowledged, and above all forgiven. Jesus' gaze is not one of reproach, but of mercy. It is that mercy we sometimes struggle to accept, especially when God forgives those who, in our opinion, do not deserve it. We grumble because we would like to impose limits on God's love.

In the scene at home, Zacchaeus, after listening to Jesus' words of forgiveness, stands up, as if he were arising from a condition of death. And he gets up to make a commitment: to return four times what he has stolen. It is not a price to be paid, because God's forgiveness is free, but rather the desire to imitate the One by whom he felt loved. Zacchaeus makes a commitment to which he was not bound, but he does so because he understands that this is his way of loving. And he does so by combining the Roman legislation regarding theft and the Rabbinic law on

penance. Zacchaeus, then, is not only the man of desire; he is also one who knows how to take practical steps. His purpose is not generic or abstract, but stems precisely from his history: he looked at his life and identified the point from which to begin his transformation.

Dear brothers and sisters, let us learn from Zacchaeus not to lose hope, even when we feel we have been cast aside or are incapable of change. Let us nurture our desire to see Jesus, and above all let us allow ourselves to be found by the mercy of God, who always comes in search of us, in whatever situation we may be lost.


