

### FROM FR. HENRY

Dear friends,

As we celebrate Palm Sunday each year, the name of a Hispano-Roman Christian woman called Egeria, or Etheria, or even Aetheria often came up to keep us informed of what took place in the Holy Land in the fourth century regarding the celebrations of Holy Week and Easter in the earliest days of the Church.

Thanks to Egeria's travel diary entitled Travels of Egeria, we know that the Holy Week in Jerusalem began with the Palm Sunday celebration in which a passage of the Gospel was read followed by a procession from the top of the Mount of Olives down through the entire city. All participants including toddlers, carried on their parents' shoulders, held in their hands olive branches and palms. They joined the bishop and distinguished guests in the procession and kept on responding 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord' to the hymns and antiphons.

Originally in Rome, the Passion Sunday was celebrated and the highlights of the liturgy were the reading of the Passion story according to Matthew and the giving of the Creed to the catechumens. It wasn't until the ninth century that the Jerusalem -like procession with palms was introduced to the Roman Church, perhaps due to the influence of pilgrims such as Egeria for instance.

Just like what happened in Jerusalem thousands of years ago, we, prior to the Palm Sunday procession have the opportunity to listen to the Gospel account according to Luke recounting the story about how Jesus prepared for his solemn entry into Jerusalem on a colt and how the crowds widely welcomed him into the city by spreading their garments on the road and singing praise to him as 'the King who comes in the name of the Lord,' and in the accounts of Matthew and Mark, the two evangelists also depict the scene of people cutting and spreading branches from the trees on Jesus' road as well.

As the procession comes to an end, the mood of the Palm Sunday Mass begins to shift to a rather sombre and reflective atmosphere as the first two readings give us a foretaste of what the Passion story aims to do which is to take us through the last moments in Jesus' life on earth starting from the Last Supper and ending with his burial in the tomb.

Let us pray that our reflections on Jesus' Passion, death, participations in the Eucharist today and other liturgies throughout the Holy Week help us better appreciate such enormous sacrifices Jesus endured for the sake of saving us from sins, and shall renew and transform our lives to become stronger and better disciples of the Lord in the world today Have a grace-filled Holy Week,

# WHY DO WE COVER THE STATUES IN THE CHURCH DURING LENT?

Because we continue a tradition known as "veiling" or "shrouding marking the beginning of the last two weeks of Lent starting from the Fifth Sunday of Lent till the Easter Vigil, also known as "Passion Week" or "Passiontide," which focuses on the Passion of Christ. The veiling is a symbolic act of humility and a way to heighten the focus on Christ's suffering and death, preparing the faithful for the celebration of Easter. The tradition of veiling is rooted in the Gospel readings of Passion Sunday, which formerly included John 8:46-59, where Jesus hides himself from the crowd who wanted to stone him.

### POPE FRANCIS' ANGELUS FROM THE HOSPITAL Text prepared by the Holy Father



Dear brothers and sisters.

The Gospel of this fifth Sunday of Lent presents to us the episode of the woman caught in adultery (Jn 8:1 -11). While the scribes and the pharisees want to stone her, Jesus restores the lost beauty to this woman. She has fallen in the dust; Jesus passes his finger on this dust and writes a new story for her. It is the "finger of God", who saves His children (cf. Ex 8:15) and frees them from evil (cf. Lk 11:20).

Dear friends, as during my hospitalization, even now in my convalescence I feel the "finger of God" and experience His caring touch. On the day of the Jubilee of the sick and the world of healthcare, I ask the Lord that this touch of His love may reach those who suffer and encourage those who care for them. And I pray for doctors, nurses and health workers, who are not always helped to work in adequate conditions and are sometimes even victims of

aggression. Their mission is not easy and must be supported and respected. I hope that the necessary resources will be invested in treatment and research, so that health systems are inclusive and attentive to the most fragile and the poorest.

I thank the inmates of Rebibbia women's prison for the note they have sent to me. I pray for them and for their families. On International Day of Sport for Development and Peace, I hope that sport may be a sign of hope for so many people who need peace and social inclusion, and I thank the sporting associations that educate in fraternity in practical way.

Let us continue to pray for peace: in tormented Ukraine, stricken by attacks that are claiming many civilian victims, including a lot of children. And the same is happening in Gaza, where people are reduced to living in unimaginable conditions, without shelter, without food, without clean water. May the weapons be silenced and dialogue resumed; may all the hostages be freed and aid brought to the population. Let us pray for peace throughout the Middle East; in Sudan and South Sudan; in the Democratic Republic of the Congo; in Myanmar, hard hit by the earthguake; and in Haiti, where violence rages, and two religious sisters were killed a few days ago.

May the Virgin Mary protect us and intercede for us.

### POPE FRANCIS: 'THE SICKBED CAN BECOME A HOLY PLACE' By Francesca Merlo

In his homily for the Jubilee of the Sick and Healthcare Workers, taking place on the 5th and 6th of April, Pope Francis drew inspiration from the prophet Isaiah.

In his sermon, which was read aloud by Archbishop Rino Fisichella. Pope Francis invited the faithful to contemplate the situation of the Israelites in exile: "it seemed that all was lost", the Pope said. However, he continued, it was precisely in their moment of trial that a new nation was bring born.

Pope Francis compared this experience to the woman in the day's Gospel reading, who had been condemned and ostracized for her sins. Her accusers, ready to cast the first stone, were halted by the quiet authority of Jesus who told her "Go your way. You are free. You are saved".

In comparing the stories, Pope Francis says that God does not wait for our lives to be perfect before he intervenes in them. Rather, said the Pope, "He enters into our wounds. He knocks at our door, not despite our suffering, but because of it".

### Illness and care

Turning then to those who are ill and to all those who assist them, the Pope acknowledged the deep suffering that illnesses can bring. "It can make us feel like the people in exile... or like the woman in the Gospel," he said. But, he continued, it can also be a place of encounter, a "school" in which we learn to love and be loved with humility and grace.

Pope Francis then reflected on his own illness, and consequent dependence on others, describing it not as a burden but as a lesson in trust, gratitude and hope.

"Let us not push back", he said, adding: "Let us allow ourselves to be loved".

Pope Francis then turned to the healthcare professionals, thanking them for their work and encouraging them to receive every patient as an opportunity to renew their sense of humanity. "The sickbed can become a holy place," he said, "where charity burns away indifference and gratitude nourishes hope."

### Call to compassion

Bringing his address to a close, Pope Francis recalled the words of his predecessor Pope Benedict XVI, who reminded the Church that "the true measure of humanity is determined in relation to suffering". A society that turns its back on the weak, he warned, becomes cruel and inhuman.

Finally, Pope Francis urged all those present to resist the temptation to marginalise and forget those who are elderly, ill, or weighed down by the hardships of life. "Let us not banish suffering from our surroundings," he said. "Let us not exclude those who are frail." Instead, we must allow God's love - poured into our hearts - to transform even suffering into a space of communion and growth.

### **POPE FRANCIS: CATECHESIS**

# Cycle of Catechesis – Jubilee 2025. Jesus Christ our Hope. II. The life of Jesus. The encounters 4. The rich man. Jesus looked at him (Mk 10:21)

### Dear brothers and sisters,

Today we will look at another of Jesus' encounters, narrated by the Gospels. This time, however, the person encountered does not have a name. The evangelist Mark presents him simply as "*a man*" (10:17). He is a man who has observed the commandments ever since his youth but who, despite this, has not yet found the meaning of his life. He is searching for it. Perhaps he is one who has not yet truly made up his mind, despite his appearance as a committed person. Indeed, beyond the things we do, our sacrifices and successes, what truly counts in order to be happy is what we carry in our heart. If a ship has to set sail and leave the port to navigate in the open sea, it can be a wonderful ship, with an exceptional crew, but if it does not pull up the ballast and the anchors that hold it down, it will never manage to depart. This man has made himself a luxurious ship, but he has stayed in the port!

As Jesus makes His way through the street, this fellow runs up to Him, kneels before Him and asks: "Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" (v. 17). Notice the verbs: "what *must I do* to *have* eternal life?".

Since observance of the Law did not give him the happiness and security of being saved, he turns to the Master Jesus. What is striking is that this man does not know the vocabulary of gratuitousness! Everything seems to be owed. Everything is a duty. Eternal life is for him an inheritance, something that is obtained by right, through

meticulous observance of commitments. But in a life lived in this way, although certainly for good purpose, what space can love have?

As always, Jesus goes beyond appearances. While on the one hand this man sets out before Jesus his fine resume, Jesus goes beyond and looks within. The verb that Mark uses is very significant: "*looking at him*" (v. 21). Precisely because Jesus looks within each one of us, He loves us as we truly are. Indeed, what will He have seen inside this person? What does Jesus see when He looks within every one of us and loves us, despite our distractions and our sins? He sees our fragility, but also our desire to be loved as we are.

Looking at him, says the Gospel, He "*loved him*" (v. 21). Jesus loves this man before He even extended the invitation to follow Him. He loves him just as he is. Jesus' love is gratuitous: exactly the opposite of the logic of merit that has beset this person. We are truly happy when we realize we are loved in this way, freely, by grace. And this also applies to the relationships between us; as long as we tru to huw love or beg for affection, those relationships will

applies to the relationships between us: as long as we try to buy love or beg for affection, those relationships will never make us feel happy.

The proposal Jesus makes to this man is to change his way of living and relating with God. Indeed, Jesus recognizes that inside him, as in all of us, something is lacking. It is the desire we carry in our heart to be loved. There is a wound that belongs to us as human beings, the wound through which love passes. To overcome this lack we do not need to "buy" recognition, affection, consideration: instead, we need to "sell off" everything that weighs us down, to make our hearts freer. There is no need to continue to take for ourselves, but rather to give to the poor, to provide, to share.

Finally, Jesus invites this man not to stay alone. He invites him to follow Him, to be within a bond, to live a relationship. Indeed, only in this way will it be possible to emerge from his anonymity. We can hear our name only within a

relationship, in which someone calls us. If we remain alone, we will never hear our name spoken, and will continue to be that *"man*", anonymous. Perhaps today, precisely because we live in a culture of self-sufficiency and individualism, we find ourselves more unhappy because we no longer hear our name spoken by someone who loves us freely.

This man does not accept Jesus' invitation and stays alone, because the ballast of his life keeps him in the port. His sadness is the sign that he has not managed to leave. At times, what we think are riches are instead only burdens that are holding us back. The hope is that this person, like each one of us, will sooner or later change and decide to set sail.

Sisters and brothers, let us entrust to the Heart of Jesus all people who are sad and undecided, so that they may feel the loving gaze of the Lord, who is moved by looking tenderly within us.


