FIRST READING A reading from the Acts of the Apostle 5:27-32. 40-41

The high priest demanded an explanation of the apostles. 'We gave you a formal warning,' he said 'not to preach in this name, and what have you done? You have filled Jerusalem with your teaching, and seem determined to fix the guilt of this man's death on us.' In reply Peter and the apostles said, 'Obedience to God comes before obedience to men; it was the God of our ancestors who raised up Jesus, but it was you who had him executed by hanging on a tree.

By his own right hand God has now raised him up to be leader and saviour, to give repentance and forgiveness of sins through him to Israel. We are witnesses to all this, we and the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him.' They warned the apostles not to speak in the name of Jesus and released them. And so they left the presence of the Sanhedrin glad to have had the honour of suffering humiliation for the sake of the name.

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 21:1-19

Jesus showed himself again to the disciples. It was by the Sea of Tiberias, and it happened like this: Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee and two more of his disciples were together. Simon Peter said, 'I'm going fishing.' They replied, 'We'll come with you.' They went out and got into the boat but caught nothing that night.

It was light by now and there stood Jesus on the shore, though the disciples did not realise that it was Jesus. Jesus called out, 'Have you caught anything, friends?' And when they answered, 'No', he said, 'Throw the net out to starboard and you'll find something.' So they dropped the net, and there were so many fish that they could not haul it in. The disciple Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord.' At these words 'It is the Lord', Simon Peter, who had practically nothing on, wrapped his cloak round him and jumped into the water. The other disciples came on in the boat, towing the net and the fish; they were only about a hundred yards from land.

As soon as they came ashore they saw that there was some bread there, and a charcoal fire with fish cooking on it. Jesus said, 'Bring some of the fish you have just caught.' Simon Peter went aboard and dragged the net to the shore, full of big fish, one hundred and fifty-three of them; and in spite of there being so many the net was not broken. Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' None of the disciples was bold enough to ask, 'Who are you?'; they knew quite well it was the Lord. Jesus then stepped forward, took the bread and gave it to them, and the same with the fish. This was the third time that Jesus showed himself to the disciples after rising from the dead.

After the meal Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these others do?' He answered, 'Yes Lord, you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He replied, 'Yes, Lord, you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Look after my sheep.' Then he said to him a third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter was upset that he asked him the third time, 'Do you love me?' and said, 'Lord, you know everything; you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep.

'I tell you most solemnly, when you were young you put on your own belt and walked where you liked; but when you grow old you will stretch out your hands, and somebody else will put a belt round you and take you where you would rather not go.' In these words he indicated the kind of death by which Peter would give glory to God. After this he said, 'Follow me.'

The Gospel of the Lord

FROM FR. HENRY

Dear friends,



For this Third Sunday of Easter, we have the opportunity to listen to another account of Jesus' appearance to the disciples after his Resurrection, and this time he appeared to seven disciples as they gathered together by the Sea of Tiberias for a fishing trip, a possible indication of their intention to return to their former profession, the one Jesus asked them to leave and follow him to become fishers of men, probably out of their fear and despair: fear for the persecution of the Jews and despair due to the death and disappearance of Jesus from the tomb.

After a hard working night at sea, the disciples came back to the shore in the morning, tired and disappointed because they caught no fish all night long. In such a time of frustration Jesus came in for the rescue, he stood on the shore and gave them the advice to throw the net out to starboard. They followed his instruction and the catch caught them completely by surprise. At first the disciples didn't know it was Jesus, and they just came to realise him as they caught a lot of big fish: 153 of them altogether. Peter and John knew it truly was their Master, and Peter after a short exchange with John grabbed a cloak to wrap round him, jumped into the water and swam for about 90 meters to reach the shore to catch Jesus before everyone.

When they all came ashore, the disciples found Jesus had already prepared a breakfast for them with bread and grilled fish, being cooked on a charcoal fire. He invited them to put some of their fish on the fire and shared the food with him. Here Jesus repeated what he did at the Last Supper by taking the bread and giving it to them.

This is his uniquely distinctive gesture known as the breaking of bread which was gradually developed to become what we call the Eucharist or Holy Mass today.

At the end of their breakfast together, Jesus both re-affirmed his decision to appoint Peter as the head of his discipleship by entrusting Peter with the task to feed His lambs and look after His sheep, symbolising the papal ministry to guide and govern the whole Church (cf. Mt 16.18), and foretold the martyrdom that Peter bravely endured to bear witness to Jesus, the one whose obedience must come before the obedience of men as he mentioned in the first reading.

As we come together to celebrate this Eucharist in memory of Jesus today, we acknowledge his real presence with us and ask him to strengthen our faith in him and inspire us to serve others as he has shown us. We also pray for our Church cardinals as they prepare for the coming conclave, that they may be able to discern and choose the right person among them most worthy to the papal ministry Jesus entrusted to St Peter and his successors in the Gospel today. LATE POPE FRANCIS' EASTER HOMILY (READ BY CARDINAL ANGELO COMASTRI)



Mary Magdalene, seeing that the stone of the tomb had been rolled away, ran to tell Peter and John. After receiving the shocking news, the two disciples also went out and — as the Gospel says — "the two were running together" (Jn 20:4). The main figures of the Easter narratives all ran! On the one hand, "running" could express the concern that the Lord's body had been taken away; but, on the other

hand, the haste of Mary Magdalene, Peter and John expresses the desire, the yearning of the heart, the inner attitude of those who set out to search for Jesus. He, in fact, has risen from the dead and therefore is no longer in the tomb. We must look for him elsewhere.

This is the message of Easter: we must look for him elsewhere. Christ is risen, he is alive! He is no longer a prisoner of death, he is no longer wrapped in the shroud, and therefore we cannot confine him to a fairy tale, we cannot make him a hero of the ancient world, or think of him as a statue in a museum! On the contrary, we must look for him and this is why we cannot remain stationary. We must take action, set out to look for him: look for him in life, look for him in the faces of our brothers and sisters, look for him in everyday business, look for him everywhere except in the tomb.

We must look for him without ceasing. Because if he has risen from the dead, then he is present everywhere, he dwells among us, he hides himself and reveals himself even today in the sisters and brothers we meet along the way, in the most ordinary and unpredictable situations of our lives. He is alive and is with us always, shedding the tears of those who suffer and adding to the beauty of life through the small acts of love carried out by each of us.

For this reason, our Easter faith, which opens us to the encounter with the risen Lord and prepares us to welcome him into our lives, is anything but a complacent settling into some sort of "religious reassurance." On the contrary, Easter spurs us to action, to run like Mary Magdalene and the disciples; it invites us to have eyes that can "see beyond," to perceive Jesus, the one who lives, as the God who reveals himself and makes himself present even today, who speaks to us, goes before us, surprises us. Like Mary Magdalene, every day we can experience losing the Lord, but every day we can also run to look for him again, with the certainty that he will allow himself to be found and will fill us with the light of his resurrection.

Brothers and sisters, this is the greatest hope of our life: we can live this poor, fragile and wounded existence clinging to Christ, because he has conquered death, he conquers our darkness and he will conquer the shadows of the world, to make us live with him in joy, forever. This is the goal towards which we press on, as the Apostle Paul says, forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead (cf. *Phil* 3:12-14). Like Mary Magdalene, Peter and John, we hasten to meet Christ.

The Jubilee invites us to renew the gift of hope within us, to surrender our sufferings and our concerns to hope, to share it with those whom we meet along our journey and to entrust to hope the future of our lives and the destiny of the human family. And so we cannot settle for the fleeting things of this world or give in to sadness; we must run, filled with joy. Let us run towards Jesus, let us rediscover the inestimable grace of being his friends. Let us allow his Word of life and truth to shine in our life. As the great theologian Henri de Lubac said, "It should be enough to understand this: Christianity is Christ. No, truly, there is nothing else but this. In Christ we have everything" (*Les responsabilités doctrinales des catholiques dans le monde d'aujourd'hui*, Paris 2010, 276).

And this "everything" that is the risen Christ opens our life to hope. He is alive, he still wants to renew our life today. To him, conqueror of sin and death, we want to say:"Lord, on this feast day we ask you for this gift: that we too may be made new, so as to experience this eternal newness. Cleanse us, O God, from the sad dust of habit, tiredness and indifference; give us the joy of waking every morning with wonder, with eyes ready to see the new colors of this morning, unique and unlike any other. [...] Everything is new, Lord, and nothing is the same, nothing is old" (A. Zarri, *Quasi una preghiera*).

Sisters, brothers, in the wonder of the Easter faith, carrying in our hearts every expectation of peace and liberation, we can say: with You, O Lord, everything is new. With you, everything begins again.

CARDINAL ASK US TO PRAY FOR THEIR DISCERNMENT FOR NEW POPE

The Holy See released a declaration on Wednesday in which the Cardinals preparing for the upcoming conclave ask the faithful to pray for them.

"The College of Cardinals gathered in Rome, engaged in the General Congregations in preparation for the Conclave, wishes to invite the People of God to live this ecclesial moment as an event of grace and spiritual discernment, listening to the will of God," read the statement.

The Cardinals said they feel "the need to be supported by the prayers of all the faithful," since they are aware of their responsibility in choosing the next Successor of Peter.

Prayer, they added, "is the true force that in the Church promotes the unity of all the members of the one Body of Christ."

"Faced with the enormity of the task ahead and the urgency of the present time," said the Cardinals, "it is first of all necessary to make ourselves humble instruments of the infinite wisdom and providence of our Heavenly Father, in docility to the action of the Holy Spirit."

The Cardinals noted that the Holy Spirit is "the protagonist of the life of the People of God, the One to whom we must listen, accepting what He is saying to the Church."

"May the Blessed Virgin Mary accompany these prayers with her maternal intercession," concluded the Cardinals' declaration.

CARDINAL GAMBIETTI AT THE NOVEMDIALES MASS: SEE THE FULLNESS OF GOD IN THE LEAST

At the fourth *Novemdiales* Mass celebrated in St Peter's Basilica, Cardinal Mauro Gambetti reflected on the passage from Matthew's Gospel describing the Final Judgement, when all peoples of the world are gathered before Christ, the Son of Man.

Some, the Gospel tells us, will enter into the joy of the Kingdom. Others will find themselves alone - outside love, outside God. "Excluded from the Kingdom," Cardinal Gambetti said, "they remain desperately alone in their soul".

The Gospel speaks of sheep and goats, a familiar image. But Cardinal Gambetti invited the faithful to look deeper. Sheep, he explained, are faithful and gentle, caring for the weakest of the flock. Goats, instead, are more independent and proud, often concerned only with themselves. "Which of these attitudes do we embody," he asked, both "personally and institutionally?"

Belonging to the Kingdom, he reminded the faithful, is not about knowing all the answers or performing all the right actions. In the Gospel, those welcomed into the Kingdom ask, "Lord, when did we see you?" The word used - *oráo* in Greek - means more than simply seeing. It means to truly understand, to recognise.

The message is clear: we meet Christ when we meet others, especially the most vulnerable, with compassion. "The Word became flesh," the Cardinal continued, quoting theologian Elia Citterio, "so that whoever touches man touches God, whoever honours man honours God, whoever despises man despises God."

This is the heart of the Gospel. This is the heart of the Church. And it is this humanity that Cardinal Gambetti saw in Pope Francis. He recounted the farewell to the Pope written by Edith Bruck, who described the Pope as "a man who loved, was moved, wept, pleaded for peace... his humanity was contagious, it softened even the stones".

As the Church prays for Pope Francis and walks through these days of mourning, Cardinal Gambetti reminded the faithful that "Christian humanity" must be at the centre of the Church's mission. "Everyone, everyone, everyone is called to live in the Church", Pope Francis once said - words that today feel more urgent than ever.

In the first reading, Peter's encounter with Cornelius offers a model: openness, trust, and the courage to proclaim the Gospel through relationship, not fear.

Finally, Cardinal Gambetti noted that on this Feast of Saint Catherine of Siena, whose bold love for Christ saw no boundaries, the Church is reminded of the call to walk closely with humanity - because God has done the same.
