#### GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 14:1.7-14

On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour.

A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'

Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'

#### FROM FR. HENRY



Dear friends,

At the wake following my dad's funeral, I noticed a completely unfamiliar face sitting alone at the table reserved for relatives who had travelled from afar. The stranger looked highly uncomfortable as I approached, but I quickly reassured him, letting him know he was welcome to join us—with just a few adjustments. I gently asked him to move to another table to make room for others.

This encounter came back to me as I reflected on the parable Jesus told during a meal at the home of a prominent Pharisee. He addressed a common habit of his contemporaries—rushing to claim the best seats at gatherings. Luke describes these as "places of honour." In this symbolic story, Jesus warned his listeners about the potential embarrassment of choosing the most prestigious seat, only to be asked to move down for someone more important. On the other hand, those who chose the lowest place could not be asked to move further down and might instead be honoured by being invited to sit in a more distinguished position.

Beyond the themes of honour and shame, Jesus also taught an important lesson on humility, concluding this part of the Gospel with the powerful statement: "Everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

The second part of the Gospel focuses on Jesus' address to his host—the man who had extended him hospitality. Jesus challenged both his host and us to go beyond the boundaries of conventional hospitality. Rather than only inviting relatives, friends, or wealthy acquaintances who can repay us, we are called to invite those who cannot return the favour—the poor, the outcast, and the forgotten. In doing so, Jesus assures us that God will reward our generosity at the end of time.

We are proud to remember how our late Pope Francis responded to this radical call from Jesus by leading through example. Beginning in 2017, he invited the homeless and poor in Rome to share lunch with him, an initiative meant to counteract the neglect of the vulnerable and to foster direct engagement with those in need. It is comforting to know that Pope Leo XIV is continuing this beautiful tradition in the Church.

Today, let us ask the Lord to help us:

- 1. Treasure the virtue of humility and put it into practice whenever we can; and
- 2. Be as generous as possible to those around us—especially to those unfamiliar to us, just as Jesus asks. Have a charity-filled week.

#### **POPE LEO'S ANGELUS**

Dear brothers and sisters, happy Sunday!

At the heart of today's Gospel (Lk 13:22-30), we find the image of the "narrow gate," which Jesus uses in his answer to someone who asks him if only a few will be saved. Jesus says, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will try to enter and will not be able" (v 24).

At first glance, this image can make us think: if God is the Father of love and mercy, who always stands with open arms to welcome us, why does Jesus say that the gate of salvation is narrow?

Certainly, the Lord does not want to discourage us. Rather, his words are meant primarily to challenge the presumption of those people who think they are already saved, who perform religious acts and feel that is all that is needed.

They have not realized that it is not enough to perform religious acts unless they change hearts. The Lord does not want worship detached from life. He is not pleased with sacrifices and prayers, unless they lead to greater love for others and justice for our brothers and sisters. For this reason, when such people come before the Lord boasting that they ate and drank with him and heard him teaching in their streets, they will hear him reply: "I do not know where you come from; go away from me, all you evildoers!" (v 28).

Brothers and sisters, the challenge presented to us in today's Gospel is worth considering. While we may sometimes be judgmental towards those distant from the faith, Jesus calls into question "the security of believers." He tells us that it is not enough to profess the faith with words, to eat and drink with him by celebrating the Eucharist or to have a good knowledge of Christian doctrine. Our faith is authentic when it embraces our whole life, when it becomes a criterion for our decisions, when it makes us women and men committed to doing what is right and who take risks out of love, even as Jesus did. He did not choose the easy path of success or power; instead, in order to save us, he loved us to the point of walking through the "narrow gate" of the Cross. Jesus is the true measure of our faith; he is the gate through which we must pass in order to be saved (cf. Jn 10:9) by experiencing his love and by working, in our daily lives, to promote justice and peace.

There are times when this involves making difficult and unpopular decisions, resisting our selfish inclinations, placing ourselves at the service of others, and persevering in doing what is right when the logic of evil seems to prevail, and so on. Once we cross that threshold, however, we will discover that life flourishes anew. From that moment on, we will enter into the immense heart of God and the joy of the eternal banquet that he has prepared for us.

Let us ask the Virgin Mary to help us find the courage to pass through the "narrow gate" of the Gospel, so that we may open ourselves with joy to the wide embrace of God our loving Father.

I greet all of you, the faithful of Rome and pilgrims from various countries, especially those from Karaganda (Kazakhstan), Budapest and the seminarians and faculty of the Pontifical North American College. I am pleased to welcome the Gozzano Music Band and the parish groups from Bellagio, Vidigulfo, Carbonia, Corlo and Val Cavallina. I also greet the faithful who have come by bicycle from Rovato and Manerbio, and the itinerate Via Lucis group. I wish everyone a happy Sunday.

#### **POPE LEO'S GENERAL AUDIENCE**

Continuing his cycle of catechesis for the Jubilee Year of Hope, Pope Leo XIV focused on Jesus' Passion during this week's Wednesday General Audience, specifically highlighting the moment of His arrest in the Garden of Gethsemane. St. John the Evangelist does not portray Jesus as frightened or as someone who flees the scene. Rather, Jesus is depicted as a "free man, who comes forward and speaks, openly facing the hour in which the light of the greatest love can be revealed."

#### Not a victim but a giver

Jesus was not unaware of what He was to endure following the arrest. Yet, he still remains strong and does not retreat, but rather, gives Himself up to the guards. As Pope Leo points out, this act was done "not out of weakness, but out of love." A full love that is mature and does not fear rejection.

Jesus is not a victim of the arrest because He lets Himself be taken. He is the "giver of a gift" as He "embodies a hope of salvation for our humanity: to know that, even in the darkest hour, one can remain free to love to the end."

#### True act of love

The Pope highlights a passage in the Gospel that is mysterious—the moment Jesus says, "I am he", and the soldiers fall to the ground. It is a moment that, in biblical revelation, recalls God's name, "I am". In that moment in the garden, Jesus is showing that God is present exactly in the times when people experience injustice, fear, and loneliness. Pope Leo explains it is in moments like those that "the true light is ready to shine without fear of being overcome by the advancing darkness."

In the darkness of night, when all seems to be falling apart, Jesus shows that Christian hope is not evasion but decision. The Pope underlines that this attitude comes from a deep prayer in life where "God is not asked to spare us from suffering, but rather to give us the strength to persevere in love".

Pope Leo continues, highlighting that during His arrest, Jesus is not worried about himself. On the contrary, He is focused on saving the disciples. This reveals that His sacrifice is truly an act of love—He is taken so His friends might go free.

#### A lifetime of preparation

Jesus had been preparing for this "dramatic and sublime hour" his entire life, the Pope underlines, and it is for this reason that he responded courageously. He understood that offering up one's life for love does not mean failing, but rather it means being fulfilled.

However, this does not mean that Jesus was not troubled at this moment that began his path to the cross. But He was able to carry on because He knew He was offering up His life out of love.

"This is what true hope consists of: not in trying to avoid pain, but in believing that even in the heart of the most unjust suffering, the seed of new life is hidden."

#### Turn to the logic of the Gospel

How does all of this relate to us, the Pope asks. Rather than defending our lives, plans, securities, and still being alone, he urges us to turn to the logic of the Gospel. That is, "only what is given flourishes; only the love that becomes free can restore trust even where everything seems lost."

Using the image of the young man who, when Jesus is arrested, runs away naked, Pope Leo explains we too have moments when we follow Jesus that we are caught off guard and are tempted to abandon the way of the Gospel because it seems impossible to love.

But the story ends with a young man clothed in a white robe announcing the resurrection, which symbolizes the hope of our faith. God is not limited in forgiveness because of our sins and reservations and He is able to restore in us the desire to retake our role as His followers—making us capable of giving our life for others.

Pope Leo concludes his catechesis encouraging everyone to let our lives "be a response to the good we have received." While we cannot control everything, "it is enough to choose to love freely every day." Our hope remains that even in the darkest of days, God's love is there, sustaining us and ripening the fruit of eternal life that awaits us.

#### POPE LEO WITH ALTAR SERVERS

Pope Leo XIV met with around 360 altar servers from France on Monday, as they made a pilgrimage to Rome with their priests and bishops as part of the Jubilee Year.

In his address, the Pope said their pilgrimage through the Holy Doors offers them a chance to turn toward God and grow in faith and love so that they may be more faithful disciples of Christ.

He invited the young French Catholics to take time to speak to Jesus in the secrecy of their hearts and to love Himmore

"He desires nothing more than to be part of your life, to illumine it from within, to become your best and most faithful friend," he said. "Life becomes beautiful and joyful with Jesus."

Pope Leo recalled that hope is the focus of the Jubilee, noting that the world's many problems reminds Christians of our need for the theological virture of hope.

In the midst of global issues, as well as personal pain due to loss or worry, the Pope invited the young people to look to Jesus, who has the power to save us and is always near because He loves us.

"There is certain proof that Jesus loves us and saves us: He gave His life for us by offering it on the cross," he said. "In fact, there is no greater love than to lay down one's life for those one loves."

Hope, he added, will always accompany us throughout life and will serve as an anchor in the storms and difficulties that are sure to arise.

The most wonderful thing about the Catholic faith, said Pope Leo XIV, is that God Himself "willed to suffer and die for the creatures we are. God loved us to the point of dying for us!"

Humanity, he said, has nothing to fear from God, who loves us so much that He continuously offers His imperishable life to us.

Pope Leo recalled that the Church hands down the memory of Jesus' sacrifice to save us through the Eucharist and daily celebration of Mass, which altar servers assist the priest in celebrating.

"Dear Altar Servers, the celebration of the Mass saves us today!" he said. "It saves the world today! It is the most important event in the life of the Christian and in the life of the Church, for it is the encounter where God gives Himself to us in love, again and again."

Christians, added the Pope, do not attend Mass out of obligation but out of love and our own need for the life of God.

Pope Leo XIV then thanked the French altar servers for their generous service to their parishes, and urged them to always "keep in mind the greatness and holiness of what is being celebrated."

"May your attitude, your silence, the dignity of your service, the liturgical beauty, the order and majesty of your gestures, lead the faithful into the sacred greatness of the Mystery," he said.

The Pope also invited young people to consider a vocation to the priesthood or religious life, saying that "the lack of priests in France is a great misfortune" for France and for the Church.

In conclusion, Pope Leo said the altar servers can bear witness to the pride and joy that comes from serving at Mass, inviting them to persevere in offering a sign of hope to the world.



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
