From Fr. Henry

Dear friends,

As we know, black mustard bushes grew wild along the shores of the Sea of Galilee, not far from Capernaum, where Jesus lived during his public ministry. In ancient times, people used the mustard plant for oil, as a herb and as a condiment. It perhaps was a common ingredient in the foods eaten by Jesus, the disciples, and the wider community of that time. The mustard seed itself is extremely small, about 1 to 2 millimeters in

diameter, roughly the size of a grain of sand. Apart from the popular mustard plants, there was another type of plant called the black mulberries also familiar amongst Jesus' followers, they have deep and extensive roots and can reach 2 to 3 meters. Due to their longevity, they became the symbol of deep-seeded sin, unforgiveness, and stubborn resistance to grace.

The two specific species of trees mentioned above would have been familiar to the crowds who followed Jesus, and he singled them out in this Sunday's Gospel reading in response to the Apostles' request to increase their faith. In his reply, Jesus used the image of a tiny mustard seed and the deeply rooted, tall mulberry tree to illustrate the incredible impact and transformative power of faith. 'Were your faith the size of a mustard seed you could say to this mulberry tree, "be uprooted and planted in the sea", and it would obey you', literally said Jesus.

From the transformative power of faith, Jesus then talked about his discipleship through a parable about a servant who, after fulfilling all his duties, is expected to continue his service without any recognition from his master, and the reason is that he just simply carried out his duties, no more no less. Like the servant in the story, Jesus' disciples are called and chosen to take part in the mission to proclaim his Good News throughout the world with no expectation of any this or that reward, since their call to serve him in itself truly is a great gift and honour and nothing in the world can surpass that. Though Jesus made no direct link between the first and second part of the story today, he seemed to let the Apostles know that the increase of faith they asked from him actually depended on them, and that they need to keep on doing what they are called to perform as his servants, meaning they have to love God and others whole-heartedly as they are commanded to do. This is exactly the point St James aims to address to his community with the warning that a faith without deed is totally dead (Cf. Jas 2.17).

Let us give praise and thanks to God for the gift of our faith in Jesus and pray for the grace to help us grow better and stronger in our faith by means of the way we show our love for God and others both at home and in the community. Have a faith-filled week.

POPE LEO'S ANGELUS

Dear brothers and sisters.

I send warm greetings to all who have participated in this Jubilee celebration dedicated to catechists, especially those who have been instituted today for this ministry. Together with you, I extend my good wishes for a fruitful service to all catechists in the Church throughout the world! Thank you for your service to the Church. Let us pray for them, especially for those who work in difficult conditions. God bless you all!

I greet the pilgrims from the Diocese of Vicenza with their Bishop and the other groups of faithful from various countries.

In recent days, a very powerful typhoon has struck several Asian territories, in particular the Philippines, the island of Taiwan, the city of Hong Kong, the Guangdong region and Vietnam. I assure the affected populations, especially the poorest, of my closeness and of my prayers for the victims, the missing, the many displaced families, the countless people who have suffered hardship, as well as the rescue workers and civil authorities. I invite everyone to put their trust in God and to show solidarity with others. May the Lord give strength and courage to overcome every adversity.

I am pleased to announce that on November 1, during the Jubilee of the World of Education, I will confer the title of Doctor of the Church on Saint John Henry Newman, who contributed decisively to the renewal of theology and to the understanding of the development of Christian doctrine.

Let us now entrust ourselves to the intercession of the Virgin Mary. May she, who was the mother and first disciple of Jesus, sustain the Church's commitment to proclaim the faith today.

POPE LEO XIV RECENT CONVERSATION WITH JOURNALISTS By Gabriella Ceraso

The Gaza peace plan, the flotilla approaching the coast, concerns over U.S. nuclear rhetoric, the Vatican trial on the management of Holy See funds, and a brief comment in English on controversies surrounding Cardinal Cupich were among the topics addressed by Pope Leo XIV at Castel Gandolfo in a conversation with journalists before returning to the Vatican.

The Pope answered reporters waiting outside Villa Barberini, as has been the custom for nearly a month every Tuesday evening. "We hope they accept it; so far it seems a realistic proposal," Pope Leo XIV said regarding the 20-point peace plan presented to the White House for Gaza by U.S. President Trump, with the approval of Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu. He stressed the importance of a ceasefire and the release of hostages, adding, "There are very interesting elements," and reiterating, "We hope Hamas accepts within the established timeframe."

Respect for people

On the flotilla approaching Gaza to deliver humanitarian aid, amid ongoing tensions, the Pope highlighted the difficulty of the situation, noting that "there is a desire to respond to a real humanitarian emergency." He expressed hope that "there is no violence and that people are respected."

Working for peace

Regarding the meeting convened by U.S. Secretary of Defence Pete Hegseth with military leaders prepared for war, including the use of nuclear weapons, the Pope commented, "This way of speaking is worrying," as it reflects increasing tensions. On President Trump's decision to rename the department from "Defence" to "War," the Holy Father said, "We hope it is just rhetoric." He noted that it demonstrates a style of government "that uses force to exert pressure," and added, "We hope it works, but that there is no war; we must work for peace."

No Interference in Vatican trial

Asked about the ongoing trial in the Vatican concerning the management of Holy See funds, the Pope did not comment on the specifics, stating that it "must proceed" and that he "does not intend to interfere," leaving it to the judges and defence lawyers to reach a conclusion.

Look to Church Teaching

In English, the Pope was asked for his opinion on the awarding of a prize to Democratic Senator Dick Durbin, who supports legalised abortion, by Cardinal Blase Cupich, Archbishop of Chicago. "I'm not very familiar with the particular case," Pope Leo XIV said. "I think it is very important to look at the overall work a senator has done during, if I am not mistaken, 40 years of service in the United States Senate."

The Pope acknowledged the difficulties and tensions but emphasised that "it is important to consider many issues related to the teaching of the Church." He underlined that saying "I am against abortion" while supporting the death penalty is not truly pro-life, nor is agreeing with the inhumane treatment of immigrants in the United States. "These are very complex issues. I do not know if anyone has the full truth on them, but I would first of all ask that

there be greater mutual respect, and that together — as human beings, in that case as American citizens or citizens of Illinois, as well as Catholics — we say: 'We need to look closely at all these ethical issues and find the way forward as a Church.' Church teaching on each of these issues is very clear."

Return to the Vatican

Pope Leo XIV left Castel Gandolfo by car around 8:30 p.m., where he had arrived the previous evening, Monday, September 29. He will return tomorrow afternoon after the General Audience to meet over 400 religious leaders at the Mariapoli Centre of the Focolare Movement for the international event "Raising Hope for Climate Justice." On the tenth anniversary of Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato si'*, the Pontiff will preside over the "Celebration of Hope," attended by climate experts, civil society representatives, and institutional delegates from around the world.

POPE LEO'S GENERAL AUDIENCE

Cycle of Catechesis - Jubilee 2025. Jesus Christ our Hope. III. The Passover of Jesus. 9. *The Resurrection.* "Peace be with you!" (Jn 20:21)

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!

The centre of our faith and the heart of our hope are firmly rooted in the resurrection of Christ. When we read the Gospels carefully, we realize that this mystery is surprising not only because a man – the Son of God – rose from the dead, but also because of the way he decided to do so. Indeed, Jesus' resurrection is not a bombastic triumph, nor is it revenge or retaliation against his enemies. It is a wonderful testimony to how love is capable of rising again after a great defeat in order to continue its unstoppable journey.

When we get up again after a trauma caused by others, often the first reaction is anger, the desire to make someone pay for what we have suffered. The Risen One does not react in this way. When he emerges from the underworld of death, Jesus does not take revenge. He does not return with gestures of power, but rather with meekness he manifests the joy of a love greater than any wound and stronger than any betrayal.

The Risen One does not feel any need to reiterate or affirm his own superiority. He appears to his friends – the disciples – and he does so with extreme discretion, without forcing the pace of their capacity for acceptance. His only desire is to return to communion with them, helping them to overcome the sense of guilt. We see this very well in the Upper Room, where the Lord appears to his friends who are enclosed in fear. It is a moment that expresses extraordinary power:

Jesus, after descending into the abysses of death to liberate those who were imprisoned there, enters the closed room of those who are paralyzed by fear, bringing them a gift that no-one would have dared to hope for: peace.

His greeting is simple, almost ordinary: "Peace be with you!" (Jn 20:19). But it is accompanied by a gesture so beautiful that it is almost disconcerting: Jesus shows the disciples his hands and his side, with the marks of the passion. Why show his wounds to those who, in those dramatic hours, had denied and abandoned him? Why not hide those signs of pain and avoid reopening the wound of shame?

Yet, the Gospel says that, seeing the Lord, the disciples rejoiced (cf. *Jn* 20:20). The reason is profound: Jesus is now fully reconciled with everything he has suffered. There is not a shadow of resentment. The wounds serve not to reproach, but to confirm a love stronger than any infidelity. They are the proof that, even in the moment of our failure, God did not retreat. He did not give up on us.

In this way, the Lord shows himself to be naked and defenceless. He does not demand, he does not hold us to ransom. His is a love that does not humiliate; it is the peace of one who has suffered for love and can now finally affirm that it was worthwhile

Instead, we often mask our wounds out of pride, or for fear of appearing weak. We say, "it doesn't matter", "it is all in the past", but we are not truly at peace with the betrayals that have wounded us. At times we prefer to hide our effort to forgive so as not to appear vulnerable and to risk suffering again. Jesus does not. He offers his wounds as a guarantee of forgiveness. And he shows that the Resurrection is not the erasure of the past, but its transfiguration into a hope of mercy.

Then, the Lord repeats: "Peace be with you!". And he adds, "As the Father has sent me, even so I send you" (v. 21). With these words, he entrusts the apostles with a task that is not so much a power as a responsibility: to be instruments of reconciliation in the world. As if he said: "Who will be able to proclaim the merciful face of the Father, if not you, who have experienced failure and forgiveness?".

Jesus breathes on them and gives them the Holy Spirit (v. 22). It is the same Spirit who sustained him in obedience to the Father and in love even to the cross. From that moment, the apostles will no longer be able to remain silent about what they have seen and heard: that God forgives, lifts up, and restores trust.

This is the heart of the mission of the Church: not to administer power over others, but to communicate the joy of those who are loved precisely when they did not deserve it. It is the strength that gave rise to the Christian communities and made them grow: men and women who discovered the beauty of returning to life to be able to give it to others.

Dear brothers and sisters, we too are sent. The Lord shows us his wounds and says: *Peace be with you*. Do not be afraid to show your wounds healed by mercy. Do not be afraid to draw close to those who are trapped in fear or guilt. May the breath of the Spirit make us, too, witnesses of this peace and this love that is stronger than any defeat.

Summary of the Holy Father's words:

Dear brothers and sisters, in our continuing catechesis on Jesus our hope, we are meditating today on Jesus' resurrection, the very source of our faith and hope. With great meekness, Jesus appears to the disciples to restore communion and manifest his love, which surpasses betrayal, wounds and even death. As a sign of this love, Jesus gives the Apostles two gifts: his peace and the Holy Spirit. "Peace be with you" he says as he shows them his wounds. This is done not to shame those who abadoned him, but to assure them of his forgiveness and love, and to teach them that his death on the cross has been transformed into a sign of hope. In the giving of the Holy Spirit, Jesus entrusts the Apostles with the task of being his instruments in the world. This lesson is important for each of us: God forgives us, he raises us up, and sends us out anew. May we too be joyful witnesses of the resurrection by bringing the peace, hope and love of Christ to a broken world.
