Jesus spoke the following parable to some people who prided themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else, 'Two men went up to the Temple to pray, one a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood there and said this prayer to himself, "I thank you, God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous like the rest of mankind, and particularly that I am not like this tax collector here.

I fast twice a week; I pay tithes on all I get." The tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." This man, I tell you, went home again at rights with God; the other did not. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the man who humbles himself will be exalted."

The Gospel of the Lord.

Dear friends,

The Gospel this Sunday talks about two prominent groups of people in Israel during Jesus' time, the Pharisees and the tax collectors.

The Pharisees whose name means 'the separated ones' followed the oral traditions containing of a long list of rules and regulations which they believed could help them not to violate Moses' law, and true to their name, they refused to associate with those who did not observe the oral traditions for fear of being corrupted by them, and they had no problem to refer to themselves as righteous.

The tax collectors or publicans, on the other hand, helped to collect tax money from Jewish people for the Roman Empire, the money they thought should go for the upkeep of the Jerusalem Temple instead, and it was even worse when the they got rich by collecting more money than they were supposed to and using the excess to consolidate their position through bribery. Jewish people as a whole had no respect for this group of people whom they regarded as sinners.

What Jesus aims to do by telling this parable is to challenge those 'who pride themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else,' as Luke said right at the start of the Gospel, and who was proud of themselves as virtuous if not the Pharisees, and who were despised by Jewish people if not the tax collectors.

In the story, Jesus put the two men in the context of their prayer in the Jerusalem Temple: the Pharisee proudly went on and on about how good he was by citing the list of his achievements which he thought made him far more better than the tax collector. Interestingly, Jesus made this significant comment prior to the Pharisee even opening his mouth, that 'he said this prayer to himself', meaning the Pharisee didn't pray to God at all, but to himself; the tax collector, however, showed nothing but deep humility before God by staying away from the sanctuary, beating his breast, keeping his eyes downward, and humbly mumbling this humble prayer, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner.' Just wonder you remember who famously said 'I am a sinner' when asked by a journalist to introduce himself in an interview.

The results that came out of the prayers of these two men, according to Jesus, were the tax man was at rights with God, while the Pharisee was not. Jesus then went further to encourage his followers to go for the virtue of humility, and stay away from being haughty through the statement he made at the end of the Gospel reading, that 'for everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'

Inspired by the message Jesus gives us in the Gospel today, let us pray today for the wisdom to know what the Lord expects from us and the strength to help us remain humble servants of the Lord both before God and all. Have a humility-oriented week.

POPE LEO'S ANGELUS

I extend my heartfelt greetings to all of you who have taken part in this celebration, which has been a great feast of holiness!

I thank the Cardinals, Patriarchs and Bishops who are present. I also greet with gratitude the President of the Italian Republic, the President of Lebanon and the distinguished official delegations, in particular those from Armenia and Venezuela.

I welcome the spiritual daughters of the Foundresses who have been canonized today and the various communities and associations inspired by the charisms of the new Saints. Thank you all for your devout participation!

I extend my greetings to the other pilgrims present, in particular to the *Hermandad del Señor de los Milagros*, which celebrated the traditional procession.

Today is World Mission Day. While the whole Church is missionary, today we pray especially for those men and women who have left everything to bring the Gospel to those who do not know it. They are *missionaries of hope among all peoples*. May the Lord bless them!

The news from Myanmar is sadly distressing: there are reports of ongoing armed clashes and aerial bombardments, including the targeting of civilians and civilian infrastructure. I am spiritually close to those who are suffering as a result of the violence, insecurity and many hardships. I renew my heartfelt appeal for an immediate and effective ceasefire. May the instruments of war give way to those of peace, through inclusive and constructive dialogue.

Let us entrust to the intercession of the Virgin Mary and the new Saints our constant prayer for peace in the Holy Land, Ukraine and other places affected by war. May God grant all their leaders the wisdom and perseverance to advance in the search for a just and lasting peace.

POPE LEO XIV MESSAGE TO YOUNG PEOPLE ON BEL ESPOIR

Pope Leo XIV travelled to the coastal town of Ostia, some 25 kilometres southeast of Rome, on Friday afternoon, to visit the crew of the *Med25 Bel Espoir*, a sailing ship that has been touring Mediterranean ports for months with 25 young people of different nationalities and religions on board.

Also present was Cardinal Jean-Marc Aveline of Marseille, where the peace training project began. Speaking off the cuff and chatting to the young people on board, the Pope encouraged them to give "signs of hope" amid hatred, violence, and division.

Standing on the deck as the sea breeze blew, and then below deck before a cup of coffee, Pope Leo urged the young sailors to "learn to be builders and promoters of peace in a world moving toward violence and polarisation."

The 'Bel Espoir'

The *Bel Espoir*—a 1940s French ship—has spent eight months sailing from port to port in the Mediterranean to spread a message of fraternity, with stops in La Valletta, Tunis, Crete, Istanbul (where they met Patriarch Bartholomew),

Ravenna, and Naples. Originally bound for Civitavecchia, which is further north on the coast, they changed course to Ostia at the Pope's suggestion.

In this town deeply linked to St. Augustine and St. Monica, the Augustinian Pope recalled his own visits to the area, calling Ostia "an important harbour in the history of the world and of the Church."

Signs of hope

Addressing the group in English, he said: "We can be united even if we come from different countries, languages, cultures, and religions, because we are all human beings."

The Pope thanked the youth for their gifts—a drawing of the ship, a "White Book of the Mediterranean," and a map signed by all—and praised them as "a sign of hope for the Mediterranean and for the world."

Three guiding words

He left them with three words to guide their journey: dialogue, bridges, and peace. "Learn to listen to one another, respect each other, and overcome difficulties together. Build bridges—not just across the Mediterranean, but among all peoples."

"I'm sure that so many people living together on such a small boat... You must learn to live together, to respect one another, and to overcome difficulties," he added, noting that "This is a great experience for all of you young people—but it's also something you can teach all of us."

"Finally," the Pope continued, "the third word, which is so important—and some of you told me you are Palestinian—is to learn to be builders of peace. We are all sons and daughters of the one God. We all live together in this world and share a common responsibility: to care for creation, to care for one another, and to promote peace throughout the world."

Thank you, thank you, thank you!

"Congratulations!" the Holy Father said, "and thank you for contributing to this sign for the world, which truly gives hope to all of us."

"May your generation, and many other young people like you, continue to promote this kind of initiative—one that truly builds peace across the world. Thank you, thank you, "he exclaimed.

After a group photo and a final song—"Peace, pace, salam, paix"—the *Bel Espoir* cast off again, leaving Ostia behind on its way to Corsica, carrying forward its message of unity and hope.

POPE LEO'S GENERAL AUDIENCE

"To journey with Jesus means to experience being sustained despite everything—to have our thirst quenched and to be refreshed amid the hardships and struggles that, like heavy stones, threaten to block or divert our path through life."

Pope Leo XIV offered these consoling words during his General Audience on Wednesday morning in St. Peter's Square, as he continued his catechesis series titled 'Jesus Christ, Our Hope.'

Reflecting on the realities of human experience, the Holy Father acknowledged the often conflicting emotions and limitations that mark our lives.

"At times, we feel joyful; at other times, sad. We may feel fulfilled or stressed, gratified or demotivated. We live busy lives, focusing on results, sometimes even attaining prestigious goals. Other times, we remain suspended—precarious—awaiting success or recognition that never comes," he said.

"In short," he observed, "we find ourselves in a paradox: we long to be happy, and yet lasting happiness often eludes us."

Wrestling with our limitations

Pope Leo noted that this tension reveals both our limitations and our deep desire to transcend them. "We come to terms with what we lack, while feeling an irrepressible urge to overcome it. We sense, deep down, that something is always missing."

Yet, he reassured the faithful, this longing is no accident, "We were not created for lack, but for fullness—to rejoice in life, and life in abundance."

"This deep desire in our hearts," the Holy Father continued, "cannot be satisfied by roles, power, or possessions. It can only be fulfilled by the certainty that someone sustains this foundational impulse of our humanity—by the assurance that our deepest hopes will not be disappointed."

The Risen Christ is our certainty and hope

That assurance, Pope Leo affirmed, is found in Jesus Christ.

"This certainty," he highlighted, "is what we call hope. It's not mere optimism—optimism often collapses under the weight of disappointment. But hope, Christian hope, promises and fulfills."

"Sisters and brothers, the Risen Jesus is the guarantee of this deliverance! He is the wellspring that satisfies our thirst, the infinite thirst for fullness placed in our hearts by the Holy Spirit."

Christ's Resurrection, he emphasized, is not simply a historical event, but the transformative mystery at the heart of time. "The Risen One is a living wellspring—He does not dry up, nor does He change. He is always pure, always present, always ready for those who thirst."

A taste of eternal peace

Quoting St. Augustine's *Confessions*, Pope Leo spoke of the deep spiritual longing awakened by divine beauty, "You exhaled fragrance, and I drew in my breath and pant for You. I tasted, and now I hunger and thirst. You touched me, and I burned for Your peace."

"Jesus, in His Resurrection, has guaranteed a permanent source of life. He is the Living One (cf. Rev 1:18), the Lover of Life, the Victor over death," the Pope declared. "He alone can refresh us along our earthly pilgrimage and offer us a peace that endures into eternity."

Only Jesus, he stressed, responds to the deepest questions of the human heart: "Is there truly a destination for us? Does our existence have meaning? And how can the suffering of the innocent be redeemed?"

Christ walks with us

"The Risen Jesus does not offer answers 'from above,' detached from our pain," Pope Leo said. "Instead, He walks with us—on a road that is often difficult, painful, and mysterious."

"When our flask is empty, when thirst becomes unbearable," the Pope reminded, "only He can fill it."

The Holy Father emphasized that Jesus is not only our companion but our destination. "Without His love," he said, "life becomes aimless—a tragic journey without a true end."

He acknowledged human fragility, noting that "the wound of sin" can cause us to fall, give up, or despair. But we are not meant to remain fallen.

Only the peace He gives

Thus, Pope Leo encouraged, we are to "rise again" and "stand on our feet," for the Risen Christ "guarantees that we will arrive" and "leads us home, to a place where we are awaited, loved, and saved."






