Not merely because we have been reconciled but because we are filled with joyful trust in God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have already gained our reconciliation.

From Fr. Henry

Dear friends,

The Apostles' Creed, as we know, is one of the earliest summaries of our Christian beliefs originated from early baptismal formulas around the second century, and widely used in the Catholic Church and other Christian Churches both as a profession of faith and a catechetical tool, highlighting our key doctrines such as Trinity of God, creation, Incarnation, Crucifixion, Resurrection, Ascension, Judgement, and eternal life,

and emphasising the unity of the Church, the Communion of Saints and the hope of resurrection.

As usual, the first two days of November each year refresh our awareness of this particular part of the Apostles' Creed we recite weekly in this church at our Sunday Masses which is about the Communion of Saints namely the union between (1) the Militant Church consisting of those living on earth and fighting their way into the next life, (2) the Suffering Church including souls in purgatory undergoing purification, and (3) the Triumphant Church of saints in heaven enjoying the beatific vision.

For the feast of All Saints, we give praise and thanks to God for the gifts of All Saints both known and unknown to keep inspiring us with their lives and examples. We also ask for their intersessions for us before God and ask the Lord for his grace to support us in our efforts to join them by faithfully walking along the way of the Beatitudes.

For the feast of All Souls also known as the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed and the whole month of November, we are called to pray for all those who have gone before us, especially our loved ones and those believed to be in purgatory relying on the merits of the prayers from the living to help them go through their purification to join the saints in the Triumphant Church. Historically, St Odilo of Cluny began the tradition to set aside November 2 as a day of prayer for the deceased in Cluniac monasteries starting in 998, and this inspiring custom quickly spread throughout Europe and then has become part of our liturgical calendar worldwide.

Let us ask our Lord Jesus who died and rose again from the dead to bring us salvation to show mercy to all the faithful departed, especially our loved ones, to forgive all their sins, and to grant them eternal life as he once granted life back to the only son of the widow at Nain according to the Gospel account the evangelist shares with us today, consequently they will joyfully join the rank of God's Holy Men and Women to praise Him forever in heaven. Have a Communion of Saints-oriented week.

POPE LEO'S ANGELUS

Dear brothers and sisters, happy Sunday!

Today's Gospel (cf. Lk 18:9-14) presents two individuals, a Pharisee and a tax collector, who are praying in the Temple. The first boasts a long list of merits. He has done many good works, and for this reason he feels superior to others, whom he judges contemptuously. He stands with his head held high. His attitude is clearly presumptuous, denoting a strict observance of the law, but one that is poor in love, made up of "giving" and "taking," of debts and credits, devoid of mercy. The tax collector is also praying, but in a very different way. He is in great need of forgiveness: he is a tax collector paid by the Roman Empire, and he works under a contract that allows him to speculate on the proceeds to the detriment of his own countrymen. Yet, at the end of the parable, Jesus tells us that it is the tax collector who returns home "justified," that is, forgiven and renewed by his encounter with God. Why? First, the tax collector had the courage and humility to present himself before God. He did not close himself off in his own world or resign himself to the evil he has done. He left the places where he was feared, safe and protected by the power he wielded over others. He went to the Temple alone, without an escort, even at the cost of facing harsh glances and sharp judgments, and he stood before the Lord, at the back, with his head bowed, uttering a few words: "God, be merciful to me a sinner" (v. 13). Jesus gives us a powerful message: it is not by flaunting our merits that we are saved, nor by hiding our mistakes, but by presenting ourselves honestly, just as we are, before God, ourselves and others, asking for forgiveness and entrusting ourselves to the Lord's grace. Commenting on this passage, Saint Augustine compares the Pharisee to a sick man who, out of shame and pride, hides his wounds from the doctor. The tax collector is compared to another who, with humility and wisdom, lays bare his wounds before the doctor, however unpleasant they may be to look at, and asks for help. The saint concludes: "It is not surprising that it was the tax-collector... who went away cured, since he had not been ashamed of showing where he felt pain" (Sermo 351,1).

Dear brothers and sisters, let us do the same. Let us not be afraid to acknowledge our mistakes, lay them bare, take responsibility for them and entrust them to God's mercy. That way, his Kingdom — which belongs not to the proud but to the humble and is built through prayer and action, by practicing honesty, forgiveness and gratitude — can grow in us and around us. Let us ask Mary, the model of holiness, to help us grow in these virtues.

POPE LEO XIV: LET US BUILD A HUMBLER, MORE WELCOMING CHURCH By Kielce Gussie

During the Mass for the Jubilee of the Synodal Teams and Participatory Bodies in St. Peter's Basilica, Pope Leo XIV invited all the participants to reflect on the "mystery of the Church." He reminded them that she is not simply a religious institution with hierarchies and structures. Rather, the Church is "the visible sign of the union between God and humanity", where God brings everyone together as one family united in love. Through contemplating what ecclesial communion created and preserved by the Holy Spirit means, the Pope explained we can begin to understand what synodal teams and participatory bodies are. "They express what occurs within the Church, where relationships do not respond to the logic of power but to that of love", he underlined, stressing that the most important thing in the Christian community is the spiritual life.

Love is the supreme rule

Above all else, Pope Leo urged all the participants to remember that love is the highest rule in the Church. "No one is called to dominate; all are called to serve," he explained, "No one is excluded; we are all called to participate." Therefore, we are all called to seek the whole truth together. This invitation to "togetherness" reiterates the call to communion within the Church. Recalling the words of his predecessor, Pope Francis, in his last Lenten message, the Holy Father reflected on idea of "walking together". The Argentine pontiff stressed that "Christians are called to walk at the side of others, and never as lone travelers."

Together but alone

The call to walk together, Pope Leo highlighted, is what the Pharisee and the tax collector from the Gospel parable were missing. While they are in the same place, they are divided and they do not communicate. "Both take the same path, but they do not walk together. Both pray to the Father, but without being brothers and without having anything in common." The Pope explained this separation stems above all from the Pharisee's attitude as his prayer, "though seemingly addressed to God, is only a mirror in which he looks at, justifies and praises himself." He feels superior to the tax collector and looks down on him. Thus, he focuses on himself rather than on his relationship with God and others.

This, Pope Leo warned, can happen in the Christian community. When egos prevail over the community, leading to an individualism that renders true and brotherly relationships impossible. It can also happen when someone thinks they are better than others. But, he continued, instead of placing our focus on the Pharisee, we should look to the tax collector. His humility reminds us that within the Church, we all need God and each other. We need to listen and love each other and enjoy walking together because Christ belongs to the humble.

Unity amidst tension

Pope Leo highlighted how synodal teams and participatory bodies are an image of the Church living in communion with one another. Listening to the Holy Spirit with a sense of dialogue, fraternity, and parrhesia (speaking the truth openly and courageously), we can respond to the call to walk together seeking God.

The Pope explained that by clothing ourselves with the sentiments of Christ, we expand the ecclesial space so that it becomes collegial and welcoming. With this approach, we can live confidently in the midst of tensions in the Church unity and diversity, tradition and novelty, authority and participation.

"It is not a question of resolving them [the tensions] by reducing one to the other, but of allowing them to be purified by the Spirit, so that they may be harmonized and oriented toward a common discernment," the Holy Father argued.

Members of synodal teams and participatory bodies have an understanding that ecclesial discernment takes interior freedom, humility, prayer, and trust. It is never just one person's opinion. Pope Leo called on all those present to dream of and dare to build a humbler Church, who "bends down to wash the feet of humanity; a Church that does not judge as the Pharisee does the tax collector, but becomes a welcoming place for all".

POPE LEO XIV: EDUCATE TO PROMOTE DIGNITY, JUSTICE AND TRUST IN A WART-TORN WORLD

The Apostolic Letter "Drawing New Maps of Hope", released on 28 October, marks the sixtieth anniversary of the conciliar declaration "Gravissimum Educationis". In it, Pope Leo XIV reaffirms and expands that document's vision, applying it to the challenges of the present time. Pope signs Apostolic Letter marking sixtieth anniversary of Gravissimum Educationis Reflecting on the millions of children who still lack access to basic education, and on the educational crises caused by war, migration, inequality, and poverty, the Pope asks how Christian education can respond today. In his Apostolic Letter Drawing New Maps of Hope, signed on 27th October 2025 and released to mark the 60th anniversary of the Concliar declaration **Gravissimum Educationis**, he notes that the insights of Gravissimum Educationis remain relevant in today's fragmented and digitalised environment, continuing to inspire educational communities to build bridges and to offer civic and professional formation with creativity. This direction, first traced by the Second Vatican Council, has generated a rich array of works and charisms that remain a spiritual and pedagogical treasure for the Church.

Educational charisms as living responses The Letter emphasises that educational charisms are not fixed formulas but living responses to the needs of each age. Recalling the teaching of Saint Augustine on the true educator as one who awakens the desire for truth and freedom, the Pope surveys the tradition that spans from monastic communities to the mendicant orders and to the *Ratio Studiorum*, where scholastic thought met Ignatian spirituality. He recalls the contributions of educators such as Saint Joseph Calasanz, Saint John Baptist de La Salle, Saint Marcellin Champagnat, and Saint John Bosco, each of whom advanced distinctive educational methods serving the poor and marginalised. He highlights the pioneering witness of women religious and laywomen including Vicenta María López y Vicuña, Frances Cabrini, Josephine Bakhita, Maria Montessori, Katharine Drexel, Elizabeth Ann Seton who expanded access to education for girls, migrants, and the disadvantaged.

Education as a shared mission Pope Leo XIV underlines that education is always a collective effort in which teachers, students, families, administrators, pastors, and civil society all participate. He recalls the thought of Saint John Henry Newman—now named co-patron of the educational world alongside Saint Thomas Aquinas—as a model of intellectual rigour united with deep humanity. The Pope encourages renewal in educational environments through empathy and openness, insisting that education must form the whole person, integrating knowledge with the heart and the capacity for discernment. Catholic schools and universities are to be places where inquiry is guided and supported, not suppressed. Teaching is to be understood as a vocation of service that offers time, trust, competence, and compassion, joining justice with mercy. **The human person at the centre** The Letter reaffirms Paul VI's warning against reducing education to functional training or economic productivity. Education, Pope Leo XIV writes, must serve human dignity and the common good. A person cannot be confined to a set of measurable skills or to a predictable digital profile, but must be recognised as a unique individual with a face, a story, and a calling. **Restoring trust amid conflict** Without indulging nostalgia, the Pope situates his reflection in the present. Using the image of fixed stars to describe the principles guiding education, he stresses that truth is discovered in communion, that freedom implies responsibility, and that authority must be exercised as service. He calls Catholic education to rebuild trust in a world marked by fear and division, cultivating a sense of shared belonging that fosters fraternity among peoples and nations.

The interweaving of faith, culture, and life Recalling his years of service in the diocese of Chiclayo Peru, Pope Leo XIV reflects on education as a gradual journey of growth, built through dedication and perseverance. He presents Catholic schools as communities where faith, culture, and life are harmoniously united. Technical updates alone, he writes, are not sufficient to meet contemporary challenges; what is needed is discernment and coherence of vision. The educator's witness, both intellectual and spiritual, is as important as classroom instruction. For this reason, the formation of teachers academic, pedagogical, cultural, and spiritual—is described as essential to the mission of Catholic education.

The family as the primary educator The Pope reaffirms that the family remains the first and fundamental place of education. Other institutions can assist but never replace it. Collaboration among families, schools, the wider community is essential, based on listening, shared responsibility, and mutual trust. In an interconnected world, formation too must be interconnected. The Pope encourages greater cooperation between parish, diocesan schools, universities, professional institutes, movements, and digital and pastoral initiatives. Differences in methods or structures, should be viewed as resources rather than obstacles, contributing to a coherent and fruitful whole. The future, he says, demands growth in collaboration and unity of purpose. Linking social and environmental justice Integral education, the Letter insists, unites every dimension of the person and treats faith not as an additional subject but as the breath that gives life to all learning. In this way, Catholic education becomes a seedbed for an integral humanism that can respond to the urgent questions of our age. The Pope situates this within a world wounded by conflict and violence. Education for peace, he explains, is not passive but active: it rejects aggression, teaches reconciliation, and cultivates a language of mercy and justice. He connects this mission with the need to link social and environmental justice, reminding readers that when the earth suffers, the poor suffer most. Education, therefore, must form consciences capable of choosing what is right, not merely what is advantageous, and of promoting sustainable and simple lifestyles.

Technology at the service of humanity Drawing again on the teaching of Vatican II, Pope Leo XIV cautions against subjugating education to market logic or financial interests. He calls for the responsible use of technology, which should enrich learning rather than weaken relationships or community life. He warns against purely technical efficiency that lacks soul, and against standardised knowledge that impoverishes the human spirit. No digital system, can replace the human capacities that make education fully alive imagination, art, creativity, empathy, and the willingness to learn through error. Artificial intelligence and digital environments, he adds, must be guided by ethical reflection and a concern for human dignity, justice, and the value of work.

Toward a culture of encounter Building on the legacy of Pope Francis and the *Global Compact on Education*, Pope Leo XIV identifies three current priorities: the cultivation of interior life, which responds to young people's search for depth; the formation of a humane digital culture that places the person before the algorithm; and the education of new generations in the ways of peace, dialogue, and reconciliation. He calls for educational culture marked by cooperation rather than rivalry, and by shared discernment rather than rigid hierarchy.

A symphony of the Spirit In conclusion, the Letter invites educators to use language that heals, to keep an open and discerning heart, and to face today's challenges with courage and generosity. The Pope acknowledges the difficulties of the present: fragmented attention caused by hyper-digitalisation, fragile relationships, social insecurity, and inequality. Against these threats, he calls for a spirit of inclusivity and evangelical gratuity that expresses itself in concrete acts of justice and solidarity. When education loses sight of the poor, he warns, it loses its very soul.






