This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead.

Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

The Gospel of the Lord.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

The Gospel of the Lord.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead.

Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

The Gospel of the Lord.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead.

Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

The Gospel of the Lord.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead.

Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

The Gospel of the Lord.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

The Gospel of the Lord.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead.

Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

The Gospel of the Lord.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead.

Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

The Gospel of the Lord.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead.

Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally.

He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





GOSPEL A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 1:18-24

FROM FR. HENRY



According to scholars, marriage customs in Palestine in Jesus' time often included two parts: the engagement and the wedding.

The engagement period usually lasted for a year during which the bride and the groom stayed in their homes and communicated to each other through messages delivered by the best man. The engagement began with

the signing of a formal marriage agreement or with the groom offering gifts to the bride's family. At this stage, the bride and the groom were legally husband and wife even though they did not yet live together. Vietnamese people have done the same, except the engagement period is less than a year, usually six months.

After a year-long engagement time, the wedding ceremony then took place, and the groom could formally take his wife into his home to begin their married life together.

This background knowledge of Jewish marriage customs will help us better appreciate the Gospel account this Sunday, as it allows us to understand the dilemma St. Joseph faced when he discovered Mary's conception during their engagement. On the one hand, they were legally husband and wife; on the other hand, Mary was clearly carrying a child who was not his. For Joseph, a righteous and honorable man, divorce seemed to be the best solution, one that would end the relationship quietly and protect Mary's life, since she could otherwise be accused of adultery, an offense that, under Jewish law, could result in death by stoning. This messy entanglement is finally cleared up by the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream to reveal the mystery behind Mary's conception, that she was conceived by the Holy Spirit. The angel also asked Joseph to take Mary home to be his wife with the obligation to name the child Jesus, a name that means 'the Lord saves' or simply 'salvation.'

In the eyes of Matthew whose Gospel was meant to bring Jesus' Good News to the group of Jewish followers often familiar with the teachings of the prophets in the scripture, what happened here was extra special, because it fulfilled exactly what Isaiah prophesied long before, as we hear in the first reading today, that 'the maiden is with child and soon give birth to a son, whom she will call Emmanuel, a name which means God-is-with-us.' This prophetic fulfillment Have a joy-filled week.

The Resurrection of Christ and the challenges of the contemporary world. 8. Easter as the refuge of the restless heart

Greeting of the Holy Father to the sick in the Audience Hall before the General Audience

Good morning everyone! Good morning! Welcome!

I will offer a brief greeting, a blessing for each of you.

On this day, we wanted to protect you a little from the elements, especially the cold... It is not raining, but this way you may be a little more comfortable. Afterwards, you can follow the Audience on the screen, or if you wish, you can also go outside, but we would like to make the most of this small, more personal encounter to greet you, to offer you the Lord's blessing, and also our best wishes. Christmas is almost here, and we would like to ask the Lord that the joy of this Christmas season accompany you all: your families, your loved ones, and that you may always be in the Lord's hands with the trust and love that only God can give us.

I give my blessing to all of you now, and then I will come and greet you.

Blessing

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

Human life is characterized by a constant movement that drives us to do, to act. Nowadays speed is required everywhere in order to achieve optimal results in a wide variety of fields. How does Jesus' resurrection shed light on this aspect of our experience? When we participate in his victory over death, will we rest? Faith tells us: yes, we will rest. We will not be inactive, but we will enter into God's repose, which is peace and joy. So, should we just wait, or can this change us right now?

We are absorbed by many activities that do not always leave us satisfied. A lot of our actions have to do with practical, concrete things. We have to assume responsibility for many commitments, solve problems, face difficulties. Jesus too was involved with people and with life, not sparing himself, but rather giving himself to the end. Yet we often perceive how too much doing, instead of giving us fulfilment, becomes a vortex that overwhelms us, takes away our serenity, and prevents us from living to the fullest what is truly important in our lives. We then feel tired and dissatisfied: time seems to be wasted on a thousand practical things that do not, however, resolve the ultimate meaning of our existence. Sometimes, at the end of days full of activities, we feel empty. Why? Because we are not machines, we have a "heart"; indeed, we can say that we *are* a heart.

The heart is the symbol of all our humanity, the sum of our thoughts, feelings and desires, the invisible centre of our selves. The Evangelist Matthew invites us to reflect on the importance of the heart, quoting this beautiful phrase of Jesus: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (*Mt* 6:21).

It is therefore in the heart that true treasure is kept, not in earthly safes, not in large financial investments, which today more than ever before are out of control and unjustly concentrated at the bloody price of millions of human lives and the devastation of God's creation.

It is important to reflect on these aspects, because in the numerous commitments we continually face, there is an increasing risk of dispersion, sometimes of despair, of meaninglessness, even in apparently successful people. Instead, interpreting life in the light of Easter, looking at it with the Risen Jesus, means finding access to the essence of the human person, to our heart: *cor inquietum*. With this adjective "restless", Saint Augustine helps us understand the human being's yearning for fulfilment. The full sentence refers to the beginning of the *Confessions*, where Augustine writes: "Lord, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (I 11)

Restlessness is the sign that our heart does not move by chance, in a disordered way, without a purpose or a destination, but is oriented towards its ultimate destination, the "return home". The authentic approach of the heart does not consist in possessing the goods of this world, but in achieving what can fill it completely; namely, the love of God, or rather, God who is Love. This treasure, however, can only be found by loving the neighbour we meet along the way: brothers and sisters in flesh and blood, whose presence stirs and questions our heart, calling it to open up and give itself. Our neighbour asks us to slow down, to look them in the eye, sometimes to change our plans, perhaps even to change direction.

Dear friends, here is the secret of the movement of the human heart: returning to the source of its being, delighting in the joy that never fails, that never disappoints. No one can live without a meaning that goes beyond the contingent, beyond what passes away. The human heart cannot live without hope, without knowing that it is made for fullness, not for want.

Jesus Christ, with his Incarnation, Passion, Death and Resurrection, has given us a solid foundation for this hope. The restless heart will not be disappointed, if it enters into the dynamism of the love for which it was created. The destination is certain, life has triumphed, and in Christ it will continue to triumph in every death of daily life. This is Christian hope: let us always bless and thank the Lord who has given it to us!

DOCTRINAL NOTE ON MARIAN TITLES: MOTHER OF THE FAITHFUL, NOT CO-REDEMPTRIX

The document of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, approved by Pope Leo XIV, offers clarifications on titles applied to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and calls for special attention to the use of the expression, "Mediatrix of all graces."

Co-redemptrix

Regarding the title "Co-redemptrix," the Note recalls that "some Popes have used the title "without elaborating much on its meaning." Generally, it continues, "they have presented the title in two specific ways: in reference to Mary's divine motherhood (insofar as she, as Mother, made possible the Redemption that Christ accomplished) or in reference to her union with Christ at the redemptive Cross. The Second Vatican Council refrained from using the title for dogmatic, pastoral, and ecumenical reasons. Saint John Paul II referred to Mary as 'Co-redemptrix' on at least seven occasions, particularly relating this title to the salvific value of our sufferings when they are offered together with the sufferings of Christ, to whom Mary is united especially at the Cross" (18).

The document cites an internal discussion within the then-Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, which in February 1996 had discussed the request to proclaim a new dogma on Mary as "Co-redemptrix or Mediatrix of all graces." Then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was opposed to such a definition, arguing, "the precise meaning of these titles is not clear, and the doctrine contained in them is not mature. [...] It is not clear how the doctrine expressed in these titles is present in Scripture and the apostolic tradition."

Later, in 2002, the future Benedict XVI expressed himself publicly in the same way: "The formula 'Co-redemptrix' departs to too great an extent from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings... Everything comes from Him [Christ], as the Letter to the Ephesians and the Letter to the Colossians, in particular, tell us; Mary, too, is everything that she is through Him. The word 'Co-redemptrix' would obscure this origin."

The note clarifies that Cardinal Ratzinger did not deny the good intentions behind the proposal, nor the valuable aspects reflected in it, but nonetheless maintained that they were "being expressed in the wrong way" (19). Pope Francis also expressed his clear opposition to the use of the title Co-Redemptrix on at least three occasions. Tuesday's Doctrinal Note concludes: "It is always inappropriate to use the title 'Co-redemptrix' to define Mary's cooperation. This title risks obscuring Christ's unique salvific mediation and can therefore create confusion and an imbalance in the harmony of the truths of the Christian faith. [...] When an expression requires many, repeated explanations to prevent it from straying from a correct meaning, it does not serve the faith of the People of God and becomes unhelpful" (22).

Mediatrix

The Note emphasises that "the biblical statement about Christ's exclusive mediation is conclusive. Christ is the only Mediator" (24).

At the same time, MPF recognises "the fact that the word 'mediation' is commonly used in many areas of everyday life, where it is understood simply as cooperation, assistance, or intercession. As a result, it is inevitable that the term would be applied to Mary in a subordinate sense. Used in this way, it does not intend to add any efficacy or power to the unique mediation of Jesus Christ, true God and true man" (25).

Further, "it is clear that Mary has a real mediatory role in enabling the Incarnation of the Son of God in our humanity" (26).

Mother of believers and Mediatrix of all graces

Mary's maternal role "in no way obscures or diminishes" the unique mediation of Christ, "but rather shows its power [...] Understood in this way, Mary's motherhood does not seek to weaken the unique adoration due to Christ alone but, rather, seeks to enkindle it."

Therefore, the Note states, "one must avoid titles and expressions that present Mary as a kind of 'lightning rod' before the Lord's justice, as if she were a necessary alternative before the insufficiency of God's mercy" (37b). Thus, the title "Mother of Believers" "enables us to speak of Mary's role in our relation to our life of grace". However, MPF goes on to urge caution concerning the use of expressions that may convey "less acceptable notions" (45).

"Cardinal Ratzinger already affirmed" for example, "that the title 'Mary, Mediatrix of All Graces' was not clearly grounded in Revelation." So, the Note continues, "in line with this conviction, we can recognize the difficulties this title poses, both in terms of theological reflection and spirituality" (45). In fact, "no human person — not even the Apostles or the Blessed Virgin — can act as a universal dispenser of grace. Only God can bestow grace, and he does so through the humanity of Christ" (53).

"Some titles, such as 'Mediatrix of All Graces,' have limits that do not favour a correct understanding of Mary's unique place," MPF explains, adding, "In fact, she, the first redeemed, could not have been the mediatrix of the grace that she herself received" (67).

Nonetheless, the Doctrinal Note acknowledges that "the term 'graces,' when seen in reference to Mary's maternal help at various moments in our lives, can have an acceptable meaning. The plural form expresses all the aids — even material — that the Lord may grant us when He heeds His Mother's intercession" (68).





An angel appeared to Joseph in a dream and told him what God wanted him to do. What did the angel say? Look in a mirror to find out!
